File named first Beloit Homecoming Queen Eighty years later will watch 2020 ceremonies

Josephine Loraine File was crowned the first Beloit High School Homecoming Queen in 1940-41 and

will now view this 2020-21 Trojans royalty ceremonies streamline this Friday, 80 years later.

Beloit Trojans played Belleville that first night of competition with

File being named as the Royalty Queen. The event was Student Council sponsored and the candidates were chosen by the football team and voted on by the student body. File's attendants were Patricia Lundblade and Margert Collins. No kings took part in those years of ceremony and a dance was not held.

Captain Charles Vernon Hartman presented File with her bouquet of flowers as their was no crowing at the time.

"It was nice and simple," says File. "And I was honored, as Captain Hartman later became my husband in 1942."

The Beloit Trojan stadium was built in 1939 after plans and specifications of the high school stadium had been approved by the W.P.A. authorities at Topeka with final approval from Washington thereafter.

The planned stadium, track and other improvements totaled around \$45,000, with the Board of Education and Works Progress Administration co-operating in the financial setup.

Seating capacity was planned for around 1,400 people and included installation of flood lights, toilets, and shower facilities for both the home and visiting teams. A concession stand, and a private room for the home team coach was also planned for underneath the stadium.

Commissioners approve Revitalization Grants

Two Neighborhood Revitalization Grants were approved during Monday's Mitchell County Commissioners meeting. The first was for Edward and Jeannie Mondero in the amount of \$21,400. The second was for Roger and Brenda Budke in the amount of \$25,230.

– The Commissioners named Barb Wise as an alternate to the Pawnee Mental Health Board of Directors

– Contracts for the work on the Health Department rooms were approved.

– Eric Hamel stopped by to present his monthly ambulance report. The Mitchell County ambulance service made 54 runs in the month of August. Thirty-five were in the city of Beloit. Six runs were made to Simpson and five each to Cawker City and Glen Elder. Fifty-two runs were made in Mitchell County and one each in Saline and Osborne Counties.

Nine runs were made from 7-8 a.m. Five runs were made from 2-3 p.m. and from 3-4 p.m. Four runs were made between the hours of 9-10 a.m., 10-11 a.m., and 1-2 p.m.

Saturday and Monday tied for the most runs with 11 made each day.

The average time from when notification comes in until the ambulance leaves the barn is 1.69 minutes. The age range of 70-9 had 10 runs in that age category. The 40-49 year old age range followed closely with 9 runs. The age ranges of 50-59 and 80-89 had 7 runs each.

– Jason Rabe, Beloit City Manager, reported that the curb work is almost

Prochaska adds on two Oklahoma state records

CLAREMORE, Okla. – After leaving his mark with a first place championship watermelon in Arkansas at the start of September, Tony Prochaska of Simpson, has now left his name in the state of Oklahoma with two new state championships.

This time he added his record wins with a Marrow weighing in at 22 pounds and a Bushel Gourd weighing in at a massive 172 pounds at the Oklahoma Giant Pumpkin Growers Weighoff, in conjunction with the Rogers County Fair, (Roy Rogers birthplace).

Prochaska earned a second place win with his Giant 618 pound pumpkin, named "Peaches". He also earned a first place with a tomato weighing 1.15 pounds and a third place field pumpkin at 44 pounds.

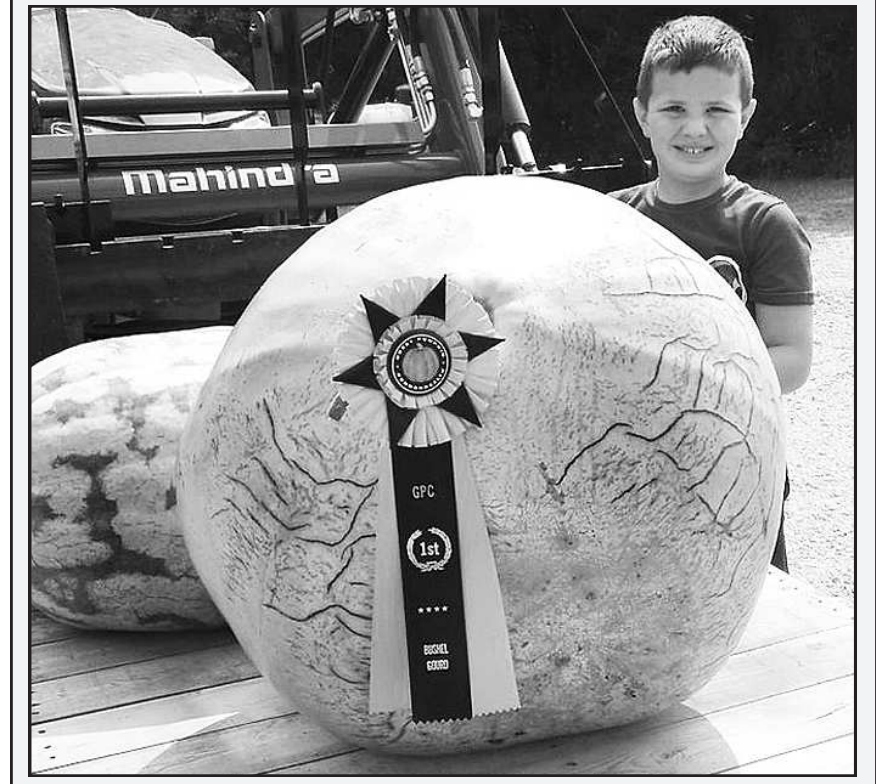
"I was really happy with a

second place in pumpkins but not with my watermelon as I lost first place to a competitor that used my own seeds," laughed Prochaska.

Prochaska broke the last years state of Kansas record with a 224.9 pound watermelon during the last years Great Pumpkin Commonwealth official weigh-off in Washington, Arkansas. He takes pride in growing his produce double, triple and quadruple ... in size.

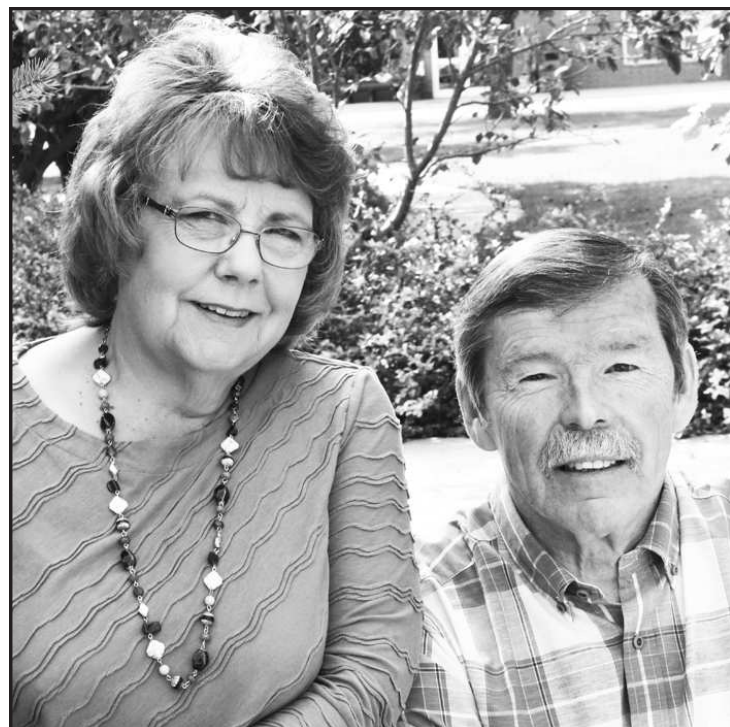

Dear Annie: I just found out tonight that my brother's second-oldest adult son passed away today. My brother's oldest son passed three years ago. My brother has been estranged from the family for a long time -- since he was in Vietnam. I have maintained a relationship with him by calling him a few times a year. He never calls me. I am the only sibling out of six who keeps in touch with him. My husband does not think highly of him, nor did he think highly of my nephew who just passed. The reason is that there was not a great meeting, which took place at our wedding.

So, when I broke the news to my husband, he said to me, "Sorry, but (expletive) your nephew for how he treated me, and (expletive) your brother." I am really hurt. I told my husband that his comments left me feeling hurt and sad. Are my feelings legitimate? -- Hurting

Dear Hurting: Yes, your feelings are legitimate. No one has the right to tell you how to feel, and you just found out that your nephew died. That is very sad, and when we are sad, it is nice if our spouse comforts us. Continue to encourage your husband to seek forgiveness in his heart for your nephew

and brother. Tell him that it is not for their sake but for yours and his. It doesn't feel good running around with a big bag of gripes that you have with people.

If he is unable to respond to your grief, then I would seek counseling.

The WPA workman at the time, foreman Charles Munsey, built the track with quarrying rock from John Shutts' farm for the historical retaining wall. The quarter mile track was to be set 25 feet wide with eight lanes with the curbing inside the track to be set 16 inches in height.

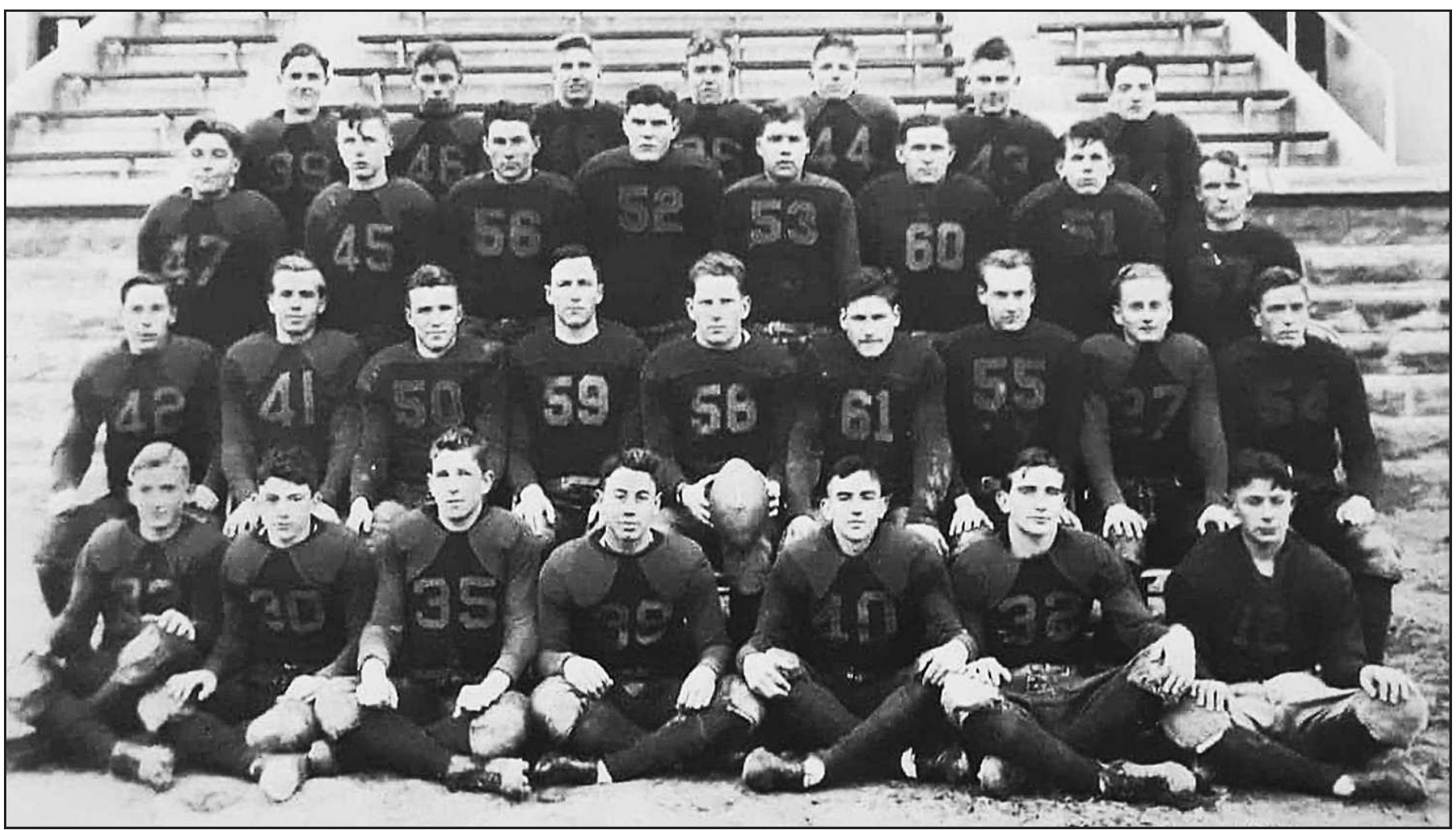
"It would be possible to rain in the morning and hold a track meet in the afternoon because of the efficient draining system," said Superintendent Morrell.

Architect Frank Slack stated that he had never seen such improved workmanship, and that Beloit would have a stadium and athletic field the community could always be proud of.

For five years, the Beloit football teams had fallen short of their goal of the Championship at the amazing stadium, Trojan field, but in the 1940 football season they won every one of their scheduled league games to become the Co-Champions with the Marysville Bulldogs.

At the first practice of the season, 60 Trojans answered roll call with Coach Murry as their leader, and Mr. Muck and Mr. Byrd as Assistant Coaches. Along with their captain, Vernon Hartman, the year of 1940-41 was a success.

File was a part of the Student Council of 1940-41 which was then a volunteer service. High points of their program, as stated in the annual yearbook, shows they held two

all school parties – one given during the football season as a spring party with 80 percent of the student body attending.

The council assisted in sales of activity tickets with a total of 230 tickets sold and 75 percent of those were from the students. They also sold

tickets for the one-act play contest between Beloit and Mankato performing – "The Happy Journey" by Beloit and "Farewell Cruel World" by Mankato. The council also helped in the purchase of an electric bulletin board outside of the office and scholarship

letters at the end of the year.

Today, File still resides in her home, north of Beloit.

"I am so blessed with my family, at the age of 99 and half years old," Josephine says. "I lost my team captain, Charles Vernon Hartman, in January of 2014."

As Mrs. Hartman can still remember those first days of being named Beloit High School's first Homecoming Queen, she too has been honored to watch so many generations of royalty ceremonies take part at the

historic Beloit Stadium, Trojan field.

The Trojan Pride will continue to flow through the historic stones, and its bones of the stadium, during the Friday night lights.

Calves Foot Jelly.....

The Palmer Museum in Jewell is getting their fall display ready. The theme is "Kitchens from 1870 to 1910." Readers might check the Jewell Items for further information about the upcoming exhibit. An expert on the topic would be Ellen Hudsonpillar Sorick Summers Merritt.

Ellen Hudsonpillar was born in Iowa about 1845. She married George Sorick in Harrison County, Iowa in March of 1870. She was sixteen years old. They immediately left Iowa headed for a new life in Jewell County, Kansas.

In the group with them was her sister, Adeline, who was married to George's brother, Henry. A third Sorick brother, John and his wife, Edith Kipe Sorick were also part of the group. Finally, their brother and sister-in-law, Ranslear Forgey (R. F.) and Apsela Page Hudsonpillar were also headed to Jewell County.

The four couples arrived near the area we now call Jewell, on April 8, 1870. They were some of "the first permanent settlers of the Buffalo Valley" (Everett Palmer's The Old Home Town.) Several of the group settled west and north of present-day Jewell.

Ellen and George built a sod house on their homestead which was located in the middle of Section 23 in Calvin Township – just a bit north and west of Jewell. Henry and Adeline were homesteading a little over a mile away in the SE 1/4 of Section 25. John and Edith Sorick along with R. F. and Apsela Hudsonpillar did not homestead in Jewell County. After a few years, they went on further west and homesteaded in Norton County.

Edith Sorick, according to her 1935 obituary, helped break the prairie, plowing with a gun strapped to her back. Unlike the John Sorick's and the R. F. Hudsonpillars's she and

George remained on their Jewell County homestead. They hauled the lumber for their first "permanent" home from Hastings, Nebraska. Along with their two sons, Frank and Ray, the family lived in Calvin Township until George's death in 1898. He is buried in the Jewell Cemetery.

After his death Edith remarried twice. First to Col. Summers from Beloit and, after his death, to William Merritt of Mankato. After Merritt's death in 1910, she lived the remainder of her life in Mankato. When she died in 1935, she was buried next to George in the Jewell Cemetery. She had lived in Jewell and Mitchell Counties for sixty-five years. The first years of their existence.

At the time of the Bicentennial of the United States in 1976, there was a Jewell County Bicentennial Committee. At this time, it is not known who was on the committee but one of their projects was a book entitled Olde Recipes and Domestic Aids. Published in this book was one of Edith Sorick's recipes.

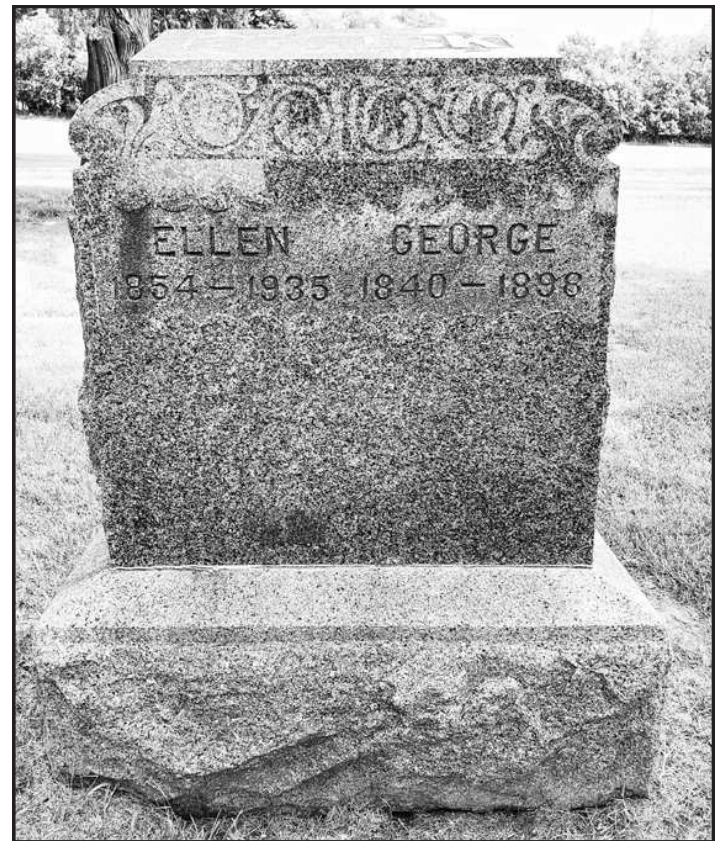
The recipe was submitted by Mrs. Alice Rogers of Del City, Oklahoma and is for Calf's Foot Jelly. This dish

was made by frugal pioneer cooks who used all parts of a butchered animal. "Waste not, want not." The dish would naturally "gel" when cooled because of the amount of collagen in the hooves and feet of the animal.

Considered a "dessert" as it was sweet, it was likely made with wine. Also, as a dessert, some cooks might not keep the bits of meat that fell off the bones during the cooking process. This dish is called a "jelly" but is actually a spicy, aspic gelatin, not to be confused with a "jelly" like grape or sand hill plum.

Here is Jewell County pioneer Edith Sorick's recipe from Olde Recipes and Domestic Aids:

Calf's Foot Jelly
Boil 4 calves (sic) feet in plenty of water, and keep up the quantity from the tea kettle. When the meat separates from the bones, strain the liquor into an earthen crock and let it stand until cold. When the jelly is cold, take off the oil and scrape off the sediment from the bottom. Add: 3/4 pound of sugar, 5 egg whites, beaten slightly, 4 lemons, sliced, 1 pint of wine, 1/2 oz cinnamon, 1/2 oz. mace.
Mix well, set it on the fire and let it boil 5 or 10 minutes,

then pour it into a white flannel bag with a wide mouth and tapering toward the bottom. Dig the bag in hot water just before straining the jelly. Do not squeeze the bag, as that will make the jelly muddy and dull. If it is not clear, strain again.

Jelly can be made of hog's feet in the same manner.

Bingesser qualifies for Nationals

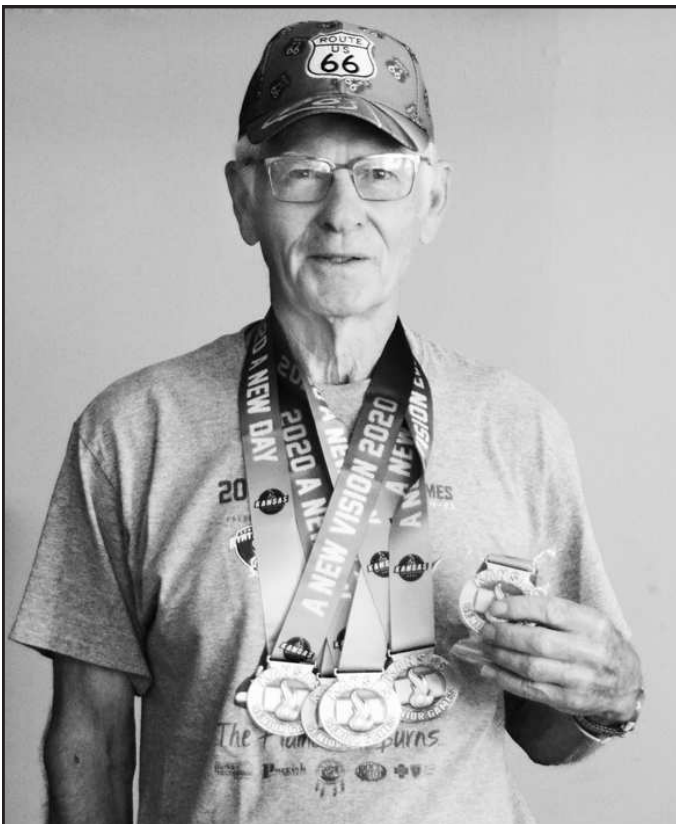
TOPEKA – Jon Bingesser was able to compete in his first Track and Field competition since Nationals in New Mexico, last June of 2019.

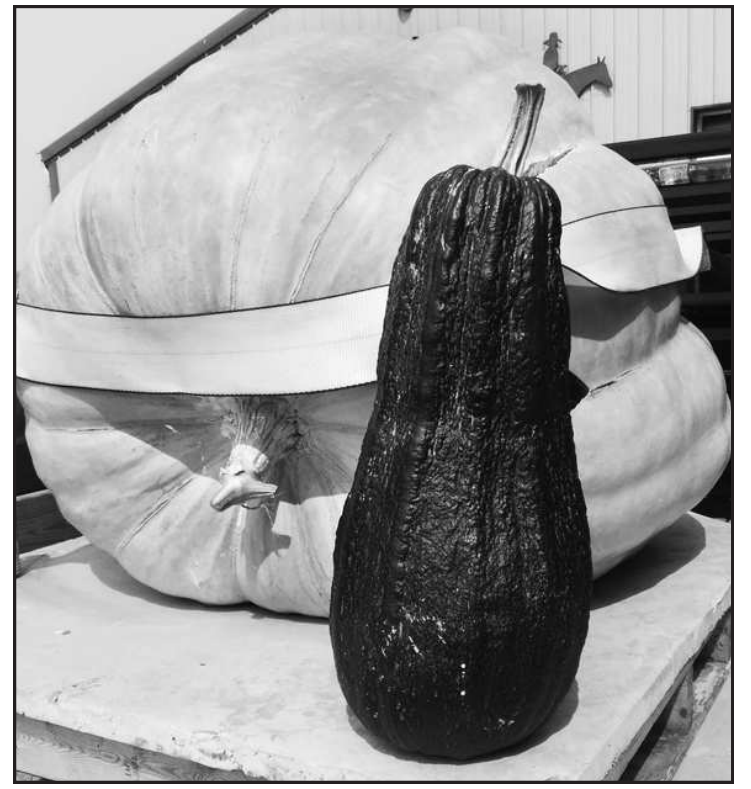
Gloria Ackerman, age 85 of Beloit, died Monday, September 21 at the Downs Care & Rehab Center.
