Man found dead outside of Lebanon

LEBANON – Karl Harmon, 22, of Emmett, Kan. was reported missing on March 5 and located on March 7 around noon, approximately one quarter mile southwest of 220 Rd. and AA Rd. southwest of Lebanon, Kan.

Harmon was found by the Smith County Sheriff's Office and area volunteer firefighters who were searching for him on foot, after he was reported earlier as missing to the Pottawatomie County Sheriff's office.

According to Kansas Bureau of Investigation Communication Director, Melissa Underwood, the preliminary autopsy results revealed no indication of internal or external physical trauma, however the full autopsy report including toxicology laboratory reports are still pending.

The investigation is ongoing.

Red Flag Warning in effect for Mitchell Co.

BELOIT – The National Weather Service has issued a Red Flag Warning for today that includes Mitchell County.

The Red Flag Warning is valid from 1 to 7 p.m. today (Wednesday) for Rooks, Osborne, Jewell and Mitchell counties.

The National Weather Service office in Hastings, Neb., said near-critical fire weather conditions will occur across much of the remainder of the local area, but wind gusts are less likely to reach 25-plus miles per hour than in the warning area.

Mitchell County Commissioners announced a ban on all open burning last week. The open burn ban remains in effect until further notice.

"A Red Flag Warning is issued when the grasses and trees are critically dry and the weather conditions would support a fire growing out of control if started," said Mitchell County Emergency Management Director Rick Horn. "Be extra careful. Do not burn!"

Kansas Wildland Task Force announced

BELOIT – The Mitchell County Commissioners met on Monday. In their first order of business, they announced the formation of a fire task force for wildfires in North Central Kansas.

"The task force is being assembled as part of a statewide initiative and is a response to the two large wildfires in state and to improve readiness," Mitchell County Emergency Management Director Rick Horn said. "When deploying, the task force members will be utilizing equipment from their local fire departments. Trucks have to meet certain criteria. The firefighters have to meet certain criteria."

The North Central Kansas Wildland Task Force (KWTF) includes volunteers from Mitchell, Osborne, Ottawa and Jewell counties. They are one of the first such groups in the state to assemble.

"Hopefully, we don't have to use them," Horn said.

– Mitchell County Emergency Medical Service (EMS) Director Eric Hamel presented the department's activity report for the month of February. The EMS responded to 53 calls for the month. Including 37 in and around Beloit, five at Glen Elder, four at Hunter, three at Cawker City

and one at Asherville. The service also responded to a call in Osborne County and Lincoln County.

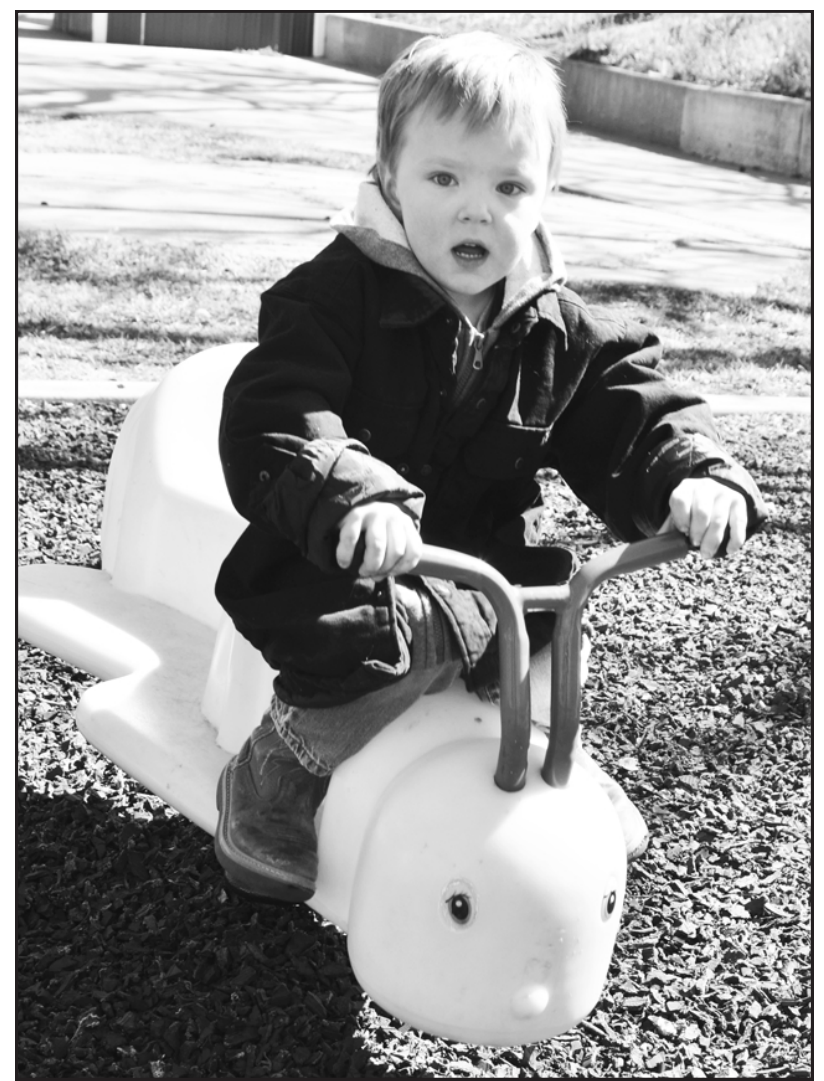
The busiest days of the week were nearly equal between Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays. Thirty-four patients were treated and transported among the 53 calls. The response time from the time of call received averaged under two-minutes with an average time of arrival on scene of just over nine minutes.

The service conducted five patient transfers to locations including Salina Regional Health Center, Children's Mercy, and Via Christi in Wichita. The EMS billed a total of \$74,110 for the month. After adjustments and payments, the balance due to the department for the month is \$16,721.

Hamel reported that they are still having mechanical issues with one of their units. They expected to have it back two weeks ago, but an attempted repair did not solve the problem and it remains out of service.

The commissioners continued discussion about possibly purchasing a new unit for the EMS. Hamel has been gathering pricing options for a unit and passed along to the

Mitchell County in drought declaration

MANHATTAN — Governor Jeff Colyer signed a drought declaration on Tuesday, with Mitchell County listed in the all 105 counties in the state of Kansas, to be provided assistance to farmers and ranchers as they cope with the impact the drought will continue to have on crops and livestock.

This action activates the disaster response efforts at the state level and provides authority for the deployment and use of personnel, supplies, equipment, materials or facilities available to aid the drought response. Importantly, this declaration will temporarily suspend certain motor carrier rules and regulations in order to expedite efforts to transport hay to livestock in drought-stricken areas.

In addition, the Governor issued letters to the Kansas State Executive Director of the U.S. Department of Agriculture Farm Service Agency and all county executive directors to encourage them to act quickly to review the situation on the ground and consider making a request to permit the use of acres enrolled in the Conservation Reserve Program for haying and grazing. Granting access to

CRP acres would provide critical forage resources for Kansas livestock, and would also reduce potential fuel loads to aid in fire suppression.

Secretary of Agriculture Jackie McClaskey attended the signing of the drought declaration. "We are hopeful this early collaboration with our federal partners will allow for immediate relief to Kansas farmers and ranchers," she said, "and we are committed to continuing to work with all of our partners through the duration of the current drought."

At this time, 57 counties in the state of Kansas are at D2 (severe) or D3 (extreme) drought levels. The U.S. Drought Monitor, used to track drought across the United States, identifies general areas of drought and labels them by intensity. The Kansas Drought Response team utilizes this data along with projections from other sources to make recommendations about necessary action for drought conditions. Mitchell County is located on the edge of the DO level of abnormally

dry conditions. There is a chance of rain in the forecast for Thursday with a 50 percent chance of needed precipitation in the Beloit area.

Agriculture makes up 45 percent of the state's economy, and contributes \$68 billion to our state. When the state

experiences a drought, it can impact each and every Kansan, and KDA will continue to work with farmers and ranchers and all of our partners in agriculture to help provide access to the resources they need to cope with crop losses and impacts on livestock.

Retirement to bring new headaches

Dear Annie: After working my whole life, I am retiring in a couple of weeks. I've been looking forward to some downtime, sleeping in, time for myself and time to do the things I want to do, but a problem has appeared.

My husband wants me to take care of his 97-year-old semi-invalid father, who expects a full cooked breakfast every morning at 7 o'clock. On top of that, my son and his wife, who work different shifts, expect me to care for their screaming 2-year-old toddler and their new baby, who is due in a few weeks.

I hate to say "no" to my family, but what about me? What should I do? -- Distressed in Utah

Dear Distressed: Don't think of it as saying "no" to your family. Think of it as finally saying "yes" to yourself.

Someone was taking care of your father-in-law up until this point. Can that person continue to do so, at least in some capacity? Perhaps you could hire a part-time caregiver who could be with him during the day. Surely, you and your husband can come up with a plan that doesn't require you to serve as 24/7 nurse and chef. The same goes for your son and his wife. They should not rely entirely on you for child care. Baby-sitting should be a favor, not a duty.

Though setting boundaries may lead to some conflict with family members in the short term, it will make for healthier, less resentful relations in the long term. Congrats on your retirement.

Dear Annie: I am a gay man in my late 20s, and I've found myself in a very confusing situation. I could use some advice. My best friend, a woman I've known for almost 15 years, and I are so close we're almost like siblings. I spend holidays with her family and take vacations with them. Her parents consider me one of their children. She has three elder siblings, a sister and two brothers. I am incredibly close to all of them, especially one of her brothers, "Bryan."

Bryan is like a brother to me. We tell each other we love each other. If he were gay, I would most likely be in a relationship with him. So compatible are we that his parents often joke that we would make the perfect couple, and they say they would be so happy if that were something that could somehow be possible.

However, my fraternal relationship with Bryan has always sort of had an undertone of his appreciating the fact that I find him attractive. It's not uncommon for him to take his shirt off and ask me whether I think his workouts are paying off. I know that this is quite

common with other people, too; straight men often relish the idea that they are the object of desire for gay men. But recently, it's come to a weird apex.

Now, I should probably mention that he has a girlfriend whom he loves and is about to move in with. But I still have these complicated feelings. Is he just teasing me? Is he just joking?

I don't know how to process this or how to move forward. I love him like a brother, but I would definitely be intimate with him if he wanted. I'm so confused.

Could you lend a hand? -- Confused

Dear Confused: I take it Bryan is confused, too. But that's no excuse for his selfish behavior. He is using you for attention and validation, not only deceiving you -- by giving you false hope for a relationship -- but also deceiving his girlfriend. Tell him this needs to stop, and give yourself space and time to get over your feelings for him.

Dear Editor:

Have you seen the commercials on TV about the children starving in undeveloped countries? The music, the speaker and the sight of the starving children never fails to pull at my heartstrings; it hurts to think of innocent children being treated this way. However, every time I see that commercial I can't help but think about the innocent children abused and neglected that our CASA volunteers advocate for right here in Mitchell County. I wish I could afford to make a commercial for them so their sadness and need for help can be seen too. No one wants to think of children being abused but it happens everywhere, every day. Would it surprise you to know 32 new child abuse and/or neglected cases were filed in Mitchell County last year averaging

nearly three per month? We were able to provide advocates for ten of those children. For the past 23 years I have personally witnessed the difference an advocate can make in a child's life at a time when the child is confused, scared, lonely, and hurting. I am so grateful for the Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) volunteers we have had over the years but I am also so sad about all the children we could not be there for because we didn't have a volunteer available. Choosing which child will get a CASA when there are new cases and a limited number of volunteers is hard; even worse is when there isn't even one volunteer available. If you agree that every abused or neglected child under the Court's jurisdiction deserve an advocate, there is something

you can do to help. We are recruiting volunteers for a class we hope to start in April. You may have heard the radio ads, read the church bulletins or table tents in local restaurants about the need for CASAs and thought "I should do that sometime". Let me tell you there is no time like the present. If you want to make a difference in an abused child's life, give me a call at 243-8200 or email me at admin@nckcasa.com. I would love to talk to you about the program and how everyday people can make a difference. Join our team of dedicated CASA volunteers and become a powerful voice in an abused child's life.

March 3, 1983

It came down to the final two, Matt and Teresa Holmes, St. John’s of Beloit eighth grader.

Both missed on “malocclusion,” so each had another chance.

By the rules for the final two, the other contestant must spell the word missed by his opponent and then another one. Up come “mascara.”

That’s when Matt gave full credit to his sisters, Dina, Cara and Tammy.

He said bringing a laugh from the spectators, “Thank God for sisters.”

Matt then put the spelling touch on mascara with no problem to become 1983 Mitchell County Spelling Bee champion succeeding Joan Dubbert, Tipton, who won the last two years in a row and was not eligible this year.

Matt Engelbert, also a senior, took on intense competition in the 145 pound weight class, which is considered to be the toughest class in the state this year. Three defending state champions matched up with each other for a toss-up for the title. Engelbert walked away

Ranch couple worries about dry conditions in the Flint Hills

Unless something changes in the moisture situation, Barb Downey and husband, Joe Carpenter will not burn their grassland in the Flint Hills this season. The ranch couple report no (moisture) run-off event in more than a year on their native grassland in Riley and Wabaunsee counties.

Every spring across the vast, open Flint Hills grasslands, fires blaze for miles. The flames lick at the blue Kansas sky as the brown, dry grass crackles, crackles and bursts into orange.

Cattlemen like this east-central Kansas couple understand that controlled burning remains a range management tool that helps maintain the economic viability of the Flint Hills. Fire remains an essential element of the ecosystem.

Long before civilization came to the prairie, fires were ignited by lightning storms and the

charred prairie restored the health of the native grasses. Native Americans set the first prairie fires. They used the fire to attract bison for easier hunting.

Controlled burning by those who live on the tall-grass prairie of the Flint Hills is an annual event designed to mimic nature’s match. It’s part of a tradition – part of the culture of the communities and the people who inhabit this region of our state.

This annual pasture burning only occurs for a few days each year. It is not a procedure that is drawn out and lasts for weeks. Weather conditions dictate the length of the burning seasons most years.

Not every cattlemen burns his pastures every year. Instead, individual ranchers and landowners survey and decide each spring, which pastures will benefit and produce a healthier, lush grass for livestock after



burning. Often neighbors plan and burn together, giving them more hands to ensure a safe, controlled burn.

Because of continued dry conditions, Downey and Carpenter fear they would not be able to control the burn this season.

“It’s so dry and the winds blow nearly every day,” Barb says. “At the ground level, there’s no humidity in the thatch in our native grasses.”

Downey believes her Flint Hills region remains in an extended drought. She’s not counting on moisture any time

our livestock.”

Downey is the fourth generation in the ranching business. Her daughter represents the fifth. Decades of experience have provided this cattle family with the know-how and knowledge to plan for their cattle enterprise.

The current drought conditions began on their Riley and Wabaunsee county ranch back in 2005. Except for a couple of years of adequate moisture, drought has been a way of life for more than a decade.

“Twenty twelve marked the peak of this extended drought here in the Flint Hills,” Barb says. “Right now, we’re already worse this year than in 2012.”

Continued dry conditions indicate burning this March or April would ensure little, if any, pasture regrowth. Downey and Carpenter are already operating in “drought-crisis mode.” Irrigated land that

would ordinarily soon be planted to corn will be planted to forage this spring.

“We’re beyond the idea of burning,” Barb says. “Conditions today remain too dry. We’re not even receiving what I call ‘band-aid’ rains or brief showers, to help us along.”

Some of the older cows will be culled earlier this year on the Downey and Carpenter ranch. They continue to look at options to lighten the feed load for their herd.

“We’re planning for the worst, and hoping for better times ahead,” Barb says. “Without continued moisture and soon – we’re headed for trouble.”

commissioners, but no official decision has yet been made. Estimates on a new unit range from about \$173,000 to \$193,000.

Sheriff Tony Perez appeared before the commissioners to discuss vehicles. He said he will be purchasing a new Chevy Tahoe to serve as the K-9 transport unit. The current unit has 180,000 miles on it and Perez said it is spending more and more time in the shop. Commissioner Jim Marshall commented that a lot of repairs can be made for the price of a new vehicle.

Commissioner Tom

Claussen questioned him in depth about the potential purchase. After discussion, the commissioners voted unanimously to allow Perez to exercise his already existing budget authority to purchase a 2018 Chevy Tahoe from for \$36,000. The vehicle will be financed through Solomon Valley Bank of Beloit.

The commissioners then conducted a department head meeting. Extended discussion was held about the new time clock system which is set to go live for the county in the final week of April. The new system will streamline and help better monitor payroll and accountability functions for the county.

Other items presented and discussed included a courthouse project for moving the district court judge to a new office. Sheriff Perez said they are fully staffed at this time at the jail and sheriff's department. They're also switching over to a new record keeping system next week.

Clint Offutt said he is working with Mitchell County Tourism doing mapping work for their website. They have identified places of interested such as old stone arch bridges, cemeteries and Chautauqua Park.

Weed Department Director Stan Deneke said he recently attended conferences. It is too dry to spray, so he is working on cutting and trimming trees in the county.

Directory of Public Works Dale Housh said they are working on several county roads. They are expecting delivery of a new backhoe this week, and they started a new employee in the past two weeks. The county took their first load of refuse from the landfill to Topeka last week. The county determined weeks ago that they can transport the waste less expensively than they were paying Dunstan Trucking to do it in the past.

County Treasurer Yvonne Melton said they are working on the new federally required Real ID system which has been painstaking at times. She said digital plates will go into effect in August. License plates will not be handed out at the courthouse. They will be mailed from the state. Decals for renewals will still be provided by the treasurer's office.

Emergency Management Director Rick Horn reminded the group that a burn ban is in effect for all of Mitchell County as well as all the municipalities. Storm spotter training was conducted last week. Horn is also working closely with the fire task force previously mentioned in this story.

Community Development Director Heather Hartman said SVED will travel to a business expo on Thursday this week in place of their monthly meeting. Federal and state representatives will be on hand. March 28 is next Strategic Doing meeting at 7 p.m. at North Central Kansas Technical College.

A total of \$53,000 was distributed in the latest round of grants awarded by the Dane G. Hansen Foundation. The next round of applications are due August 1. A cleanup grant was awarded to Beloit for a city-wide clean-up, and a grant was awarded to put trash cans in public places. No date has yet been set for the city-wide cleanup.

Hartman is also working with a couple of housing programs. These are moderate income programs for new construction in the City of Beloit. It is a grant for 10 percent of the cost for use as a down payment. The other is available county wide for down payment assistance on new or existing homes with no income limitations. Individual grants are available up to \$10,000.

It was announced that the courthouse will be closing at noon on Good Friday.

County Health Nurse Courtney Murrow discussed grant applications coming due soon for their funding. They are working with Smith County to set things up like they have done in the past several months with Jewell County. The health department has also hired a new employee.

Jeff Roberg talked about new software at the Sheriff's Department. He's also working on servers at the communications center which were in need of address.

County Communications Directory Becky Snook spoke about the new records system set to go live for the Communications Center next week. INTERPOL will be on hand when the system goes live to help iron out any issues. She also discussed issues which arose for Mitchell County when a fiber-optic line was cut by a farmer in Clay County.

County Clerk Chris Treaster noted that the new Real ID will not be accepted as proof of citizenship for new voting registrants, regardless of the fact that people must provide a copy of their birth certificate in order to acquire a Real ID.

The next commissioner's meeting is scheduled for 8:30 a.m. on Monday, March 19 at the Mitchell County Courthouse in Beloit.

In 2017, a record 625 people attended the sisters' spaghetti dinner, which raised almost \$11,000 to support the Concordia sisters and their ministries.

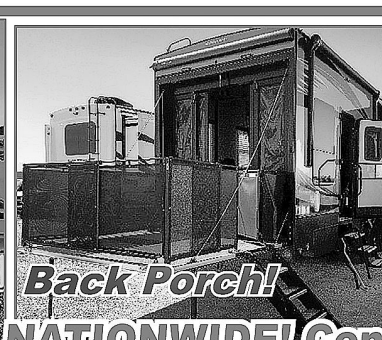
