Sheriff catches attempted murder suspect

The long arm of the law seems to know no boundaries after local law enforcement nabbed an attempted murder suspect from another state in Morrisville Monday afternoon.

According to Polk County Sheriff Danny Morrison, he arrested Demarcus T. Stokes, 20, of Cedar Rap-

ids, Iowa, at Hannah's General Store in Morrisville at around 4:15 p.m. Monday, Jan. 27.

A news release from the Ames Police Department in Ames, Iowa, said Stokes is the suspect in a shooting at around 10:50 p.m. Sunday, Jan. 26, at a McDonald's in the central Iowa community.

"When officers arrived, they found damage to a window, which was consistent with the discharge of a fire-

arm," the release said.

The victims and a witness said Stokes walked into the McDonald's and then "left a short time later," the release said.

After Stokes got into a red vehicle parked near the customer seating area, the release said he "displayed a shotgun and fired one round toward a male and female inside McDonald's."

The victims were not injured. Morrison said it appears the victims were Stokes' ex-

girlfriend and her boyfriend.

Stokes fled the scene in the red car, which he abandoned in rural Story County, Iowa, the release said. Officers believed he then began traveling in a gray 2001 Chevrolet Suburban.

As he made the around 360-mile trip from central Iowa to southwest Missouri, a warrant for class B felony attempted murder, carrying a \$50,000 cash only bond, was issued for Stokes' arrest.

Dream in progress

The Polk County Humane Society's plan to expand to help manage the inflow of animals is still yet to be realized, while more pressing needs have taken priority, shelter manager Lindy Stubbs said Tuesday, Jan. 21.

Last summer, a \$12,000 donation as part of a local veteran's will helped kickstart a campaign that aims to give the shelter's staff and animals more space by adding a separate intake and isolation area.

John Krumanocker, Humansville, donated the initial sum of money as part of his will after a life "of patriotism combined with a love for dogs," according to a PCHS news release. PCHS staff did not personally know Krumanocker.

The project could cost \$50,000, according to the release, and Stubbs said at the time PCHS would need more donations to reach its goal.

The manager said Tuesday the organization's dream project was still in the works but had taken a partial backseat to more pressing needs.

"We're still working on the expansion, but we also still need to run the shelter daily," she said. "That's a huge cost that not everyone may realize what goes into this place."

Stubbs said the organization has had to, at times, pull from the Krumanocker donation, which didn't specify a purpose, to fund daily operational expenses.

Dunnegan man faces arson charges

A Dunnegan man faces felony arson and domestic charges in two separate cases in Polk County Circuit Court.

According to online court records, Phillip Marshall Wilson, 35, is charged with class D felony second degree arson and class E felony third-degree domestic assault.

The probable cause statement for the arson case, filed by a fire marshal with the Missouri State Division of Fire Safety, said Dunnegan Rural Fire and Rescue requested investigative assistance for a structure fire in the 400 block

of East 375th Road, Dunnegan, at around 7 p.m. Sunday, Nov. 24.

The building, which had wood siding and a gabled metal roof, had

significant damage.

"The exterior examination revealed heavy fire damage," the statement said, and "the east, west and north exterior

walls were consumed from the roof line to the floor level."

The interior also revealed "heavy fire damage," with everything

"consumed down to metal parts and pieces," the statement said.

The property owner said the building had no electricity and was primarily used to store antiques, the statement said. She valued it at around \$90,000.

Dunnegan's fire chief, Ben Esh, previously told the BH-FP the structure was fully involved when firefighters arrived on scene.

Crews from Central Polk County Fire Protection District and Humansville Rural Fire Department responded in mutual aid.

Esh previously said he'd made the initial

Public hearing Feb. 3 in Empire rate case

The Missouri Public Service Commission will hold a question-and-answer session and public hearing Monday, Feb. 3, in Bolivar focused on the electric rate case filed by The Empire District Electric Co.

According to a PSC news release, the question-and-answer session is set to begin at noon at Comfort Inn, 2451 Tower Drive, Bolivar. The commission will begin receiving public testimony at 12:30.

As previously reported by the BH-FP, Empire filed an electric rate case with the Public Service Commission in August, seeking to increase annual electric revenues by about \$26.5 million. The filing reported an average residential customer using 1,000 kWh of electricity a

month would see electric rates increase by around \$7.85 a month.

The release said Empire serves about 155,165 electric customers in the Missouri counties of Barry, Barton, Cedar, Christian, Dade, Dallas, Greene, Hickory, Jasper, Lawrence, McDonald, Newton, Polk, St. Clair, Stone and Taney.

"Yeah, I want to expand, but we've also got to cover those operating costs, and sometimes it's a struggle to just do that. Without his donation, we might have been that much in the hole."

Stubbs said the organization has now replaced the funds it had drawn from the donation account.

An upcoming project will also need to be completed before the expansion project can return to the forefront, though, Stubbs said.

The shelter's kennel floors have become worn in some areas, and a large crack that runs across the room traps fecal matter and other waste, she said. While the issue is serious, it didn't stop the shelter from recently passing its annual state inspection, she said.

The organization will need to raise funds for the project.

"We're still wanting to fix the kennels," she said. "That's one of our big projects. The board asked me to get quotes and that's a huge step in the right direction, because if you have a goal, people will step up if you set a specific number."

Several factors have aligned to help the shelter in other ways, though, she said. The organization has a

partnership with PetSmart to adopt out cats and, as part of the partnership, will receive a \$5,000 donation for adopting 250 cats out of the Springfield store.

Stubbs said the sum is about \$3,000 more than shelter staff believed they would receive and is slated for its operational expenses.

The shelter is also set to receive a donation of chain link fencing, which Stubbs said it will use to build a 60-foot-by-60-foot play area so visitors can get to know the animals.

"We'd build it away from the building, so people can

meet and greet animals somewhere that isn't loud with all the barking from the kennels," she said. "If you try to bring people just outside with all the other dogs barking, it feels like you're in a kennel. It can be too much. It's distracting for the dog, and you can't bond."

There are ups and downs, Stubbs said. Where some projects have stalled, others are taking shape to help the shelter make things better for the county's homeless animals.

"Sometimes, it just feels like we're trying to carry the world," she said.

Presidential absentee ballots ready

The absentee ballots for the March 10 presidential preference primary are ready for voting.

Via a news release, the Polk County Clerk's office said it will be open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday-Friday during regular business days and open through the lunch hour for absentee voting.

Those casting a ballot by mail must make sure their written and signed request states the reason for voting absentee, an address to which the ballot should be mailed and designate which party ballot is requested, the release said.

Those requesting ballots by mail must make sure their written request for a ballot arrives at the County Clerk's office by 5 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 26, in order to be processed, the release added.

The deadline for casting an absentee ballot in person at the clerk's office is 5 p.m. the day before the election, Monday, March 9.

The clerk's office will also be open for absentee voting from 8 a.m. to noon Saturday, March 7.

The permanently disabled list has been processed and was mailed to those voters on Tuesday, Jan. 21, the clerk's office said in the release.

The last day to register to vote for the presidential primary is Wednesday, Feb. 12. For more information, contact the clerk's office at 326-4031.

Voting machine testing planned

Public pre-testing of the Op-Tech voting machines for the March 10 primary will be at 9 a.m. Wednesday, Feb. 26, at the Polk County Road & Bridge Complex conference room, 724 S. Killingsworth Ave., Bolivar.

Public post-testing of the machines will be at 9 a.m. Thursday, March 12, at the same location.

All candidates and the public are invited to attend.

City to hold public hearing for ballot issue

The City of Bolivar hopes to hear from the public at an upcoming public hearing regarding water and wastewater ballot issues on the April ballot.

The public hearing will be at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday, Feb. 25, during the city's board of aldermen meeting.

The board voted in November to approve a contract with Liberty Utilities to privatize the city's water and wastewater systems.

Under the agreement — pending voter approval in the April 7 municipal election — the city would sell its water and wastewater systems, including all property and equipment, to Liberty Utilities for \$23.5 million.

The city would also franchise out water and wastewater services to the utility company for 20 years, per the agreement.

MARCH: Pot search sparks controversy

MARCH 2 — With a unanimous vote during their Thursday, Feb. 14, regular session, Pleasant Hope R-6 school board members ensured their district would be the third in Polk County to move to a four-day school week. Two other districts — Marion C. Early R-5 and Halfway R-3 — have also opted for the nontraditional schedule.

A Bolivar man charged in the shooting of a man in Humansville will serve 15 years in prison. According to online court records, Clint J. Poling, 21, pleaded guilty to class A felony first-degree assault and felony armed criminal action in a Polk County courtroom Thursday, Feb. 28, as part of a plea deal with Prosecuting Attorney Ken Ashlock.

MARCH 6 — Bolivar Laundry was left high and dry by thieves Saturday, March 2, as suspects broke into the business, damaging property and stealing coins and computer equipment. Upon arrival, officers found that someone had broken out a window to gain access to the building, where the person damaged two arcade games, stealing the quarters out of them.

MARCH 9 — A search for marijuana in a Citizens Memorial Hospital patient room sparked controversy after a video of the encounter between police, hospital staff, a patient and his supporters went viral. The Facebook live video was filmed by Lake of the Ozarks resident Nolan Sousley — who said he had stage 4 pancreatic cancer — at around midnight Thursday night, March 7, as a Bolivar police officer searched bags in a CMH patient room.

Community members reminisced amid the loss of longtime Bolivar photographer, spirited song leader, golf buddy and World War II veteran Gerald "Steve" Stephens. He died Wednesday, March 6, at 99.

MARCH 16 — On Tuesday evening, March 12, Polk County Sheriff's Deputy Don Van Black quickly drove his tractor to a flooded bridge near his home and saved a man who was stranded in rising waters.

MARCH 20 — The City of Bolivar was on the hunt for a new leader of its fire department after Chief Jim Ludden resigned Friday, March 15, after six years at its helm.

MARCH 23 — A former police corporal, Chris Covert, filed a civil petition in Polk County Circuit court against the City of Bolivar alleging employment discrimination and retaliation on Thursday, March 14.

MARCH 27 — Humansville mayor Paula Jonson and southward alderman Dillard "Dee" Medlock turned in letters of resignation at city hall on Monday, March 18. In their

Jail. According to Sheriff Danny Morrison, jail staff had a close call as four inmates broke a hole in a ceiling tile and climbed into an overhead crawl space between the tiles and the roof in an unsuccessful escape attempt late Monday night, March 25.

APRIL: April election brings winds of change

APRIL 6 — After 22 years as an alderman, incumbent John Credille lost the fight for the Ward 2 seat by just two votes to newcomer Michael Ryan. In a similar fashion, Charles W. Keith garnered three more votes than incumbent Vicky Routh, who had served on the board for seven years, to win the Ward 4 alderman seat.

•••

Two Polk County school districts, Bolivar R-1 and Pleasant Hope R-6, saw voters give the go-ahead to proposed bond issues Tuesday. Around 80% of voters said yes to a \$6 million R-1 no-tax-levy-increase. The estimated \$5.5 million early childhood learning center will be built on district land east of the intermediate and primary schools. Additional plans include an expansion at the middle school and the potential construction of a practice track. Around 65% of R-6 voters cleared the district's request to borrow \$1.18 million to acquire, improve, renovate, furnish and equip district facilities currently under lease.

APRIL 10 — Southwest Baptist University's unveiled its new 5,372-square-foot, state-of-the-art simulation lab and learning resource center on the univer-

sity's Bolivar campus. Along with the Don and Carrie Babb Department on Nursing, the training facilities were officially dedicated during a ribbon cutting ceremony Thursday, April 4.

APRIL 20 — Following an assessment study and recent instructions from the Ozarks Regional YMCA board of directors, Roy Blunt YMCA executive director Paula Shepard is unsure about the future of Bolivar's Y — and unsure what that means for local kids needing a safe place to be active — leading her to call the community to action.ORYMCA executive board commissioned an assessment study through the Haralson Group in August 2018 after years of Bolivar's Y struggling with \$1.6 million in debt and \$2.3 million in operating losses over 11 years.

APRIL 27 — The Polk County Commission said it's taking the first step to make a dream — creating a new judicial center — a reality by purchasing the Village Boutique building on the southwest corner of the square from the Rayl family in March. According to Presiding Commissioner Shannon Hancock, the county purchased the building at 102 E. Jackson Street for \$233,000, what he said was its appraised value.

MAY: Even better

MAY 1 — Eric Turner was officially inaugurated as the 25th president of Southwest Baptist University on Friday, April 26. Turner formerly led Black River Technical College in Pocahontas, where he served four years as president.

auction of the real estate, including the landmark mansion and some of the surrounding land, was the following Saturday. Bolivar's David Cribbs bought the property.

MAY 18 — Phoenix Decor LLC, which manufactures and distributes artificial floral decorations and related decor, announced it would take up shop in Bolivar's Teters building at 1425 S. Lillian Ave., in 2019.

MAY 29 — Bolivar coach Daniel Bayless offered a short summary of his state silver medal 4-x-800 meter relay's past seven days. Bolivar's Brett Pollock, Tracen McKinney, Hunter Davis and Dylan Rowell broke a school record at the

Class 4 Section 1 meet the weekend before, running 7:59.70. The four turned in 7:59.65 to set a new mark on the state's highest stage Saturday. Meanwhile, Bolivar's Bladen Hancock claimed silver in the 300 hurdles at the meet. A week earlier, Marion C. Early's Zakhary Taylor claimed gold in the Class 1 boys 100 dash and silver in the 200 dash.

JULY 13 — Just over a year after an explosion and fire destroyed AM Pyrotechnics, killing one woman and shaking Polk County to its core, the wounds left behind began to heal, thanks in large part to the resilience of a community that's become family.

AUGUST: Standoff leads to terrorist charge

AUG. 7 — A standoff between law enforcement and an armed man in a Bolivar neighborhood Monday afternoon, Aug. 5, ended peacefully but led to felony charges for a Bolivar man. According to online court records, Chesley Rayleen Mincks, 20, was charged with class D felony first-degree terrorist threat and class D felony unlawful possession of a firearm in Polk County Circuit Court. The probable cause statement said Mincks barricaded himself inside a room in the home and demanded law enforcement leave when they attempted to make contact with him. At around 7 p.m. Tuesday evening, Aug. 6, Sheriff Danny Morrison said Mincks was

taken into custody in the 4200 block of South 103rd Road.

Former Bolivar head football coach Lance Roweton started his first year as superintendent of the Halfway School District on Aug. 15. Roweton led the Liberator for 13 years. The approval of SPOs allows selected MCE faculty and staff to complete the necessary training and requirements to carry concealed firearms or a self-defense spray device in any school in the district.

AUG. 31 — Local band Floodwater hosted its 40th anniversary concert.

SEPTEMBER: No place like home

SEPT. 4 — After nearly six months, the City of Bolivar's search for a new fire chief ended Tuesday, Sept. 3, with the promotion of deputy chief Brent Watkins to the department's top leadership role.

Most recently, Watkins served as the department's deputy chief and the city's emergency management director.

SEPT. 7 — Bolivar R-1 broke ground Wednesday, Sept. 4, on the district's Early Childhood Learning Center.

The estimated \$5.5 million facility is set for construction on district land east of the intermediate and primary schools.

It was finalized in April, when around 80% of voters greenlighted a bond issue — a \$6 million no-tax-levy-increase measure — to help see the facility come into fruition, along with potential expansions to Bolivar Middle School and a possible new high school practice track.

SEPT. 11 — Gov. Mike Parson announced his official bid for the 2020 gubernatorial race Sunday, Sept. 8, in what was, for the most part, an expected hometown campaign rally at Bolivar High School. The event focused on Parson's patriotism, conservatism and hometown pride — punctuated with shouts of "I like Mike!" and a crowd-rousing rendition of Lee Greenwood's "Proud to be an American."

During his speech, Parson called his hometown, Bolivar, "the perfect place to tell you a story about the American dream."

SEPT. 18 — A Colorado man and alleged gang member accused of robbing a Bolivar gas station at gunpoint last year entered a guilty plea in court Fri-

day, Sept. 13.

According to online court records, Brandon Scott Searl, 32, of Colorado Springs, Colorado, pleaded guilty to class A felony first-degree robbery, class D felony forgery and class D felony stealing charges in a Dallas County courtroom.

SEPT. 28 — Following a brief battle with an aggressive cancer, Polk County Sheriff's Office deputy and former Cedar County Sheriff Leon Dwerlkotte died Wednesday morning, Sept. 25. He was 65.

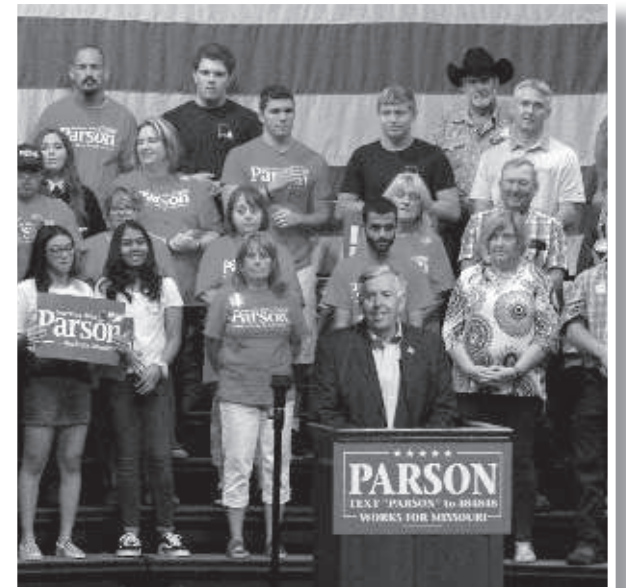
During his nearly 30-year career, Dwerlkotte served in Cedar County from 1992 to 2007 and then was hired on with Polk County in 2007 by former sheriff Steve Bruce.

In 2013, he returned to Cedar County when he was elected as sheriff.

After losing a close primary election in August 2016, Dwerlkotte again returned to Polk County, working primarily as a bailiff — but also filling other roles for the department — until his death.

In the last week, Mary Childress' family, former students and friends mourned and reflected on their time with the skilled musician, business owner and community organizer, who died Friday, Sept. 27, at 90. Funeral services were Tuesday, Oct. 1.

For the second time this year, the city of Humansville searched for a new leader after mayor Les Hendrich announced his resignation last month.

Hendrich submitted a letter of resignation to city hall Tuesday, Sept. 17, citing frustration with a perceived lack of support for Deb's Fresh Market, a local grocery store.

OCT. 9 — The Bolivar Police Department released more information about the circumstances that led up to a child's injuries during the Friday, Oct. 4, homecoming parade.

According to Lt. Roger Barron with the Bolivar Police Department, an 8-year-old girl was hurt when she was hit by a float — a truck pulling a flatbed trailer — at around 3:08 p.m. near 1303 E. Division Street, Bolivar.

OCT. 16 — Bolivar's leaders jumped on an opportunity to save the city over \$1 million by refinancing bonds for the city's Aqua Zone. During its Tuesday, Oct. 8, meeting, Bolivar's board of aldermen voted unanimously to refinance the bonds, generating a savings of around \$1,055,092 by the year 2040.

OCT. 19 — A new mayor will lead the City of Humansville after being sworn in. Carl Long, an insurance agent with Bankers Agency in Bolivar and pastor of Life Church in Humansville, was sworn in Monday, Oct. 7.

OCT. 26 — A Bolivar man accused of making terroristic threats during a standoff with law enforcement pleaded guilty to a federal charge in court this week. According to online court records, Chesley Rayleen Mincks, 21, of Bolivar pleaded guilty to one count class C felony unlawful drug user in possession of a firearm in the U.S. Western District Court on Monday, Oct. 21, before Magistrate Judge David P. Rush.

OCT. 30 — Two years ago this month, Bolivar Public Works Director Jerry Hamby was working on plans for a downtown sanitary sewer project that would eliminate a bottleneck in sewer lines. While sewer lines were replaced to improve inflow and infiltration issues, city streets and sidewalks were torn up, making them impassable at times in the process. Over 730 days later, Hamby was able to see evidence of completion thanks to paving work in the downtown area.

NOV. 20 — The search for a missing man in the northern portion of Polk County came to an end as searchers located the body of 39-year-old John David Hacker.

Local law enforcement picked up on Stokes' trail Monday afternoon.
"We had received information from Iowa on what he could possibly be driving," Morrison said. "Through our investigation, we were able to determine that he left the vehicle at a business outside of Bolivar."
After leaving the vehicle, Stokes then caught a ride with another driver, who Morrison said "had no knowledge" the 20-year-old was wanted for a crime.
The pair headed west.
Morrison said law enforcement learned Stokes was spotted in Fair Play.
They then made their way south to the Eudora area before heading east to Morrisville.
"I found the vehicle at a gas pump at Hannah's in Morrisville," Morrison said. "I took him into custody without incident."
The driver of the vehicle was not arrested, he added.
Morrison said Polk County deputies and troopers with the Missouri Highway Patrol played instrumental roles in tracking down Stokes.
"Central dispatch also helped by providing good information we used in the field during the search," Morrison said.
He said law enforcement "did everything we could to apprehend him quickly so he wasn't a threat to our county and the citizens in our county."
Morrison said he recovered a loaded 12-gauge shotgun from the scene of the arrest.
"That was taken into evidence to be turned over to Iowa law enforcement," he said. "The original vehicle, everything's being turned over to Iowa where the crime occurred."
Morrison said charges will not be filed in Polk County.

emergency call himself after a friend who lived near the burning home alerted him to the blaze.
The statement said a reporting party passed a white or silver Hyundai traveling eastbound from the residence on East 375th Road. They were able to get a license plate number for the vehicle.
Firefighters also said they "saw the same vehicle speed by them traveling westbound at a high rate of speed," the statement said.
The property owner told the fire marshal she had "placed a game camera on the property a few weeks prior due to break-ins to the structure," the statement said.
She gave investigators two photographs, the statement said, one showing Wilson and another person and another showing just Wilson.
Wilson and the other person gave investigators differing accounts of what happened that evening.
However, investigators found the silver Hyundai passenger car with a license plate that matched witness descriptions in the other person's driveway, and Wilson said it was him and the other person in the photographs, the statement said.
According to the probable cause statement for the assault case, deputies responded to the 3000 block of South 40th Road, Dunnegan, at around 8:15 p.m. Friday, Dec. 20, for a domestic assault.
The victim said Wilson threw her phone into a fire, the statement said. When she tried to re-

trieve her phone, Wilson "pushed the back of her head, causing her face to go into the floor and busting the inside of her bottom lip."
Wilson denied hitting the victim or throwing her phone into the fire.
A deputy "observed what looked to be like pieces of a cell phone 'metal' in the bottom of the fire stove, where new wood was covering it," the statement said.
The statement said the victim had a bite on the inside of her lip.
If convicted of the class D felony, Wilson faces two to seven years in prison, a year in county jail, up to \$10,000 in fines, or a combination of imprisonment and fines.
Wilson has been issued a summons for a Wednesday, Feb. 26, court date for both cases.

Bearcats fall following big wins

Southwest Baptist University men's basketball's brief streak of dominance met its end Saturday, Jan. 25, at the hands of the University of Indianapolis 78-97.

The Bearcats had owned a six-game winning streak on the road, including a win over NCAA Div. 2 No. 1 Bellarmine University on Thursday, Jan. 23.

SBU beat rival Drury University on Monday, Jan. 20.

The team's record currently stands at 14-4. It's 7-3 in the Great Lakes Valley Conference.

SBU 79, Bellarmine 74

gave up a spat of scoring to Bellarmine.

The comeback started before the half, with Bearcats Quinn Nelson and Prgomet cutting the advantage to 12 at half-time.

After taking a brief lead, SBU found itself tied with 50 second remaining. Rolle drove up the baseline, then kicked the ball out to Nelson, who hit a trey. Free throws closed the game.

Nelson led the Bearcats with 26 points.

SBU 82, Drury 74

After dropping a matchup earlier this season, SBU knocked off Drury University on Monday, Jan. 20.

SBU led 39-38 at the half.

After battling back and forth, SBU took a 70-60 lead with 5:17.





Every shot counts

Lady Libs take Hillcrest 66-65

After four quarters and one overtime period, it came down to a game of seconds for the Lady Liberators on Thursday, Jan. 23.

Standing at the free-throw line, Bolivar's Lexi Berry sank a shot to add to her team's lead over Hillcrest. Every shot counted Thursday, as the Lady Liberators claimed a 66-65 win.

Berry, who hit four out of six free throws in the extra period, did so after helping lead the team throughout the game and the week, coach Ben Glasgow said.

"She's played three games in four days, and she's only come out a total of two minutes," Glasgow said. "You can't hardly take her out. For her to be able to make those free throws at the end, that's big."

Berry finished Thursday's game with 30 points. She didn't score in the first quarter, and the Lady Liberators trailed 15-9 after the first eight minutes.

Both teams Thursday battled for a close lead throughout the contest.

Bolivar outscored Hillcrest 14-10 to trail 25-23 at halftime before surging to a 17-point third quarter for a 40-38 lead entering the final frame.

It was a tight contest Glasgow said he knew his team was above, even if they didn't always play like it.

"We made one more play than they did, let's put it that way," he said. "But we made way too many mistakes, and we dug ourselves too big of a hole early."

Glasgow said he's worked throughout the season to help the team realize its potential. The process can be like peeling away a dark curtain to see light shining through, he said. For now, the cracks of light are getting larger.

"Sometimes we're getting there, sometimes we relapse," he said. "We didn't offensively rebound at the beginning of the game, where at the end of the game, it's what saved us. It is getting better."

Key to that rebound resurgence were upperclassmen Trinity Williamson and Cara Larimore, he said. Larimore has been sick, he said, while Williamson played through an agitated ankle.

"They both put it on the line for us," he said.

Williamson nearly helped lead the Liberators to an upset of Camdenton before exiting the Tuesday, Jan. 21, game with ankle pain, Glasgow contended.

"We played really well," he said. "If Trinity didn't come out of that game, who knows what would have happened. We were down 2 points halfway through the third, and that was a team that beat us by 21 just 12 days earlier. That's the team that we can be."

Camdenton won the second matchup 73-60.

Key to Williamson's

success Thursday were freshmen Dailynn Vandoren and Cora Roweton, who freed the junior to prowl the perimeter for big plays, Glasgow said.

"She didn't have to bang around the post players with a hurt ankle," he said. "They took the pressure off on the defensive end. We were able to use both players really effectively. They're both freshmen, which is really big."

Roweton also hit a pair of shots in overtime.

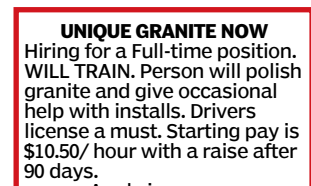

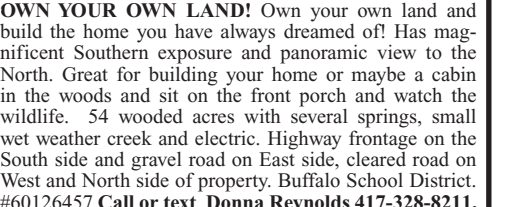
