

From state, we went to the national competition in Round Rock, Texas. The competition was held at the Kalahari resort, which was a large complex that had facilities for us to cook, a convention space to hear from national BBQ chefs, and the nation's largest indoor waterpark for after the competition. Using most of the same recipes, our team placed 16th in the nation.

This experience for me was amazing. On the way down to Texas, we stopped at the Oklahoma City bombing memorial, and also the Oklahoma City Stockyards. When we got to Texas, we went to the Fort Worth Stockyards. All the places we went and my experience in Texas were great, and I recommend it to anyone who has the opportunity. I'm excited and ready for the 2023 season, and hopefully we will win state and go to nationals again.



received 285 SAE grant applications from Missouri.

Since she already has bottle calves that she raises and sells, Julia decided to try something new and expand her SAE, and her choice was show pigs. She plans to acquire new pigs in March and raise them to take them to local fairs. These fairs include the Polk County Fair in June, the Missouri State Fair in August, and the Pleasant Hope Community Show in September. Julia hopes to succeed in showing pigs and win many awards with her pigs. Along with receiving her grant for her SAE project as a freshman, Julia has been able to take herself to the National Convention through fundraising over \$1,200, as well as becoming a co-officer, aiding in, and participating in the business of our organization.





After graduating high school, I intend to attend Missouri State University and earn my Bachelor's in ag business.

# PLEASANT HOPE FFA ACHIEVEMENT

We are very proud of the Agriscience teams that competed this year. Two out of three of our teams that competed won State. One of those teams was Mackenzie Hamilton and Duane Hickman; their science project was the "Comparison of the Ripeness in Bananas Tested in Banana Bread." They competed in Food Products and Processing Systems, Division IV. In their experiment, they tested how the ripeness of a banana would affect the taste of banana muffins.

The other team at State was a project presented by Lorelia Myers and Clara Smith. They won with their project "The Science of Cooking a Hamburger." After winning State, they were able to move on to compete for Nationals and made it to FFA's 2022 National Convention.

Clara and Lorelia started their project in the spring of 2022. With the help of FFA advisor Mr. Parrack, they had the proper tools and environment for their experiment. The experiment was "The Science of Cooking a Hamburger." In this experiment, Clara and Lorelia measured the rate of bacterial growth in a hamburger patty at raw, 120°, 140°, and 160°. The results of this experiment showed that the raw hamburger patty, which the girls predicted to have the most bacteria on the agar plate, had grown the least. The hamburger patty cooked to 140° had the most bacteria

growth on the agar plate, and the hamburger patty cooked to an internal temperature of 160° had no bacteria.

Clara and Lorelia enjoyed being able to attend the National FFA Agriscience Fair. Clara said, "It was a fantastic experience that I was thrilled to do in my senior year." Clara and Lorelia presented the project at the Agriscience expo. Both girls thought that being up on that stage was one of the most unique experiences they had ever had. Lorelia said, "Everything was bright, almost blinding. I was very nervous waiting to see how we had placed. The whole experience was great." Clara and Lorelia received a silver rating and placed 7th out of 22 teams in Food Products and Processing Systems, Division VI.


# ADVISER SPOTLIGHT Jeff Voris





### Fair Play Chapter celebrates 70 years of tradition

The year 2023 is a milestone for the Fair Play FFA Chapter. This year, members and previous members are recognizing seventy years of the chapter's existence and perennial excellence.

There are various recognition activities being planned during this year to recognize the seventy-year history and those individuals who have been instrumental in laying a foundation of excellence for current and future members to build upon. The following chronology attempts to capture some of the noteworthy events that have led to the chapter's seven-decade history and contemporary relevance.

The Fair Play Future Farmers of America chapter was officially formed on December 3, 1953. The chapter began with thirty-two members, seven of which served as officers. The first advisor of the chapter was Mr. Claude E. Ferguson. The following individuals served as the charter officers for the Fair Play chapter. Gary Willard, president; Charles Cheek, vice-president; Bobby Wollard, secretary; Jerry Hamlin, treasurer; Bernard Sterling, reporter; Donnie Rovenstine, Assistant reporter; Guy Harville, sentinel.

combinations serving as chapter presidents. Paul and Michael Underwood, Mike and Tiffany (Hopkins) Phillips, Kelly and Carla (Moore) Barker.

Girls were officially allowed membership in the National FFA in 1969 and the first girls to take Vocational Agriculture classes at Fair Play in 1976-77 were Cindy (Moore) Bruce, Teresa Simmons, Joetta (Chastain) Reetz and Cathy (Lower) Whaley. Currently, approximately 50 percent of chapter membership is female along with twothirds of the present officer team.

There have been eleven agriculture instructors also serving as FFA advisor during the run of the program. As previously mentioned, Claude E. Ferguson was the inaugural advisor followed by the legendary Floyd Watkins who served as instructor and advisor for a twenty plus year tenure across the 1950's, 60's and 70's. The seventies and eighties marked decades of frequent change in the leadership role with Paul Griffin, Britt Ray, Carl Pearcy, Doug Yeager and Cindy Taylor

at the helm. The late eighties and early nineties saw stability find the program with Jason Haymes from 1988 to 1992 and Randy Lightfoot from 1992 to present. Lightfoot's tenure was shared with advisors Kevin Sawyer and Allison Fix from 2015 to 2021 when he served as high school administrator in addition to instructing part-time.

There have been numerous recognitions and accomplishments in addition to many successes found by chapter members, teams and the chapter as a whole over the many years. To date, there have been sixty State FFA Degree recipients, thirty-three American FFA Degree recipients, one nominee for Star American Farmer, five State Proficiency winners, and one National Proficiency finalist (top 4 in nation). 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
### Fair Play FFA attends National Convention





Your FFA history? I have been involved in FFA since 1989. I have been an FFA Advisor for 25 years.


Why did you choose to become a part of the FFA program? Always enjoyed agriculture and the outdoors.

have continued long after graduation.




# State FFA Degree The State FFA
