

Groundbreaking for Citizens Memorial Hospital this Thursday

The public is invited to a ground-breaking ceremony at 11 a.m. Thursday, Sept. 28, for the Citizens Memorial Hospital expansion in Bolivar. Lunch will be served after the ceremony.

"This groundbreaking is in conjunction with the 41st anniversary of the hospital opening on Sept. 28, 1982," said Michael Calhoun, CEO/executive director of CMH and the Citizens Memorial Health Care Foundation. "All inpatient areas will move to the expansion. We will repurpose space within the current hospital facility after construction is complete."

The three-story, 117,000-square-foot expansion on the south side of the hospital will double the size of the hospital. Patient care areas moving into the new space include an expanded emergency department, private medical/surgical patient rooms, and an expanded intensive care unit and birthing unit. Additional services include a new kitchen and dining area, the hospital pharmacy and an expanded gift shop.

"We will always be thankful for those who formed the Hospital District in the 1970s," Calhoun said. "Their persistence and vision for a better future for Bolivar, Polk County and beyond is inspiring. With this expansion, we position CMH for continued growth and service for patients in the community and the region."

Work will begin this fall on "makeready" projects to prepare the construction site. These projects include relocating offices, the kitchen and cafeteria, and additional parking. Construction on the new facility will start in early 2024.

"Our 41st anniversary is a fitting time to kick off the largest facility expansion in the hospital's history," Calhoun said. "Please join us to celebrate this historic event."

Missouri Governor Mike Parson will give special remarks during the ceremony. Hospital and community leaders will present the hospital's history, mission and vision, and the Bolivar High School Chorus will sing the national anthem.














Prostate cancer survivors stress the importance of early detection

Talk to your physician...

don't wait. Kermit Hargis and Neal Taylor, both want to stress how important it is to always pay attention to your body and what it might be trying to tell you. Prostate cancer symptoms can mimic other health issues and should never be ignored, while screening isn't recommended on a routine basis, talking to your physician and following up with tests that they think are necessary can mean the difference between catching the cancer in an early stage over a more advanced stage.

Kermit Hargis was only 56 years old when he was diagnosed with stage 1 prostate cancer, which is very

young for that diagnosis. Hargis was told that most likely his was hereditary, but since his father died at the age of 61, there was no way of knowing for sure. After his treatment, Hargis found that the cancer had returned six months later and proceeded with radi-

ation therapy at that time. Neal Taylor was 63 at the time of his diagnosis. Taylor was told in the beginning it was most likely an infection and given antibiotics, but when that treatment didn't take care of the problem, he was screened and got the cancer diagnosis. That was when he went forward with surgery.

Both Hargis and Taylor were very active and felt like that was a big help with the recovery and getting back to work and activities.

Taylor returned to work part-time after 10 weeks post-surgery and full-time after 12 weeks. Both men experienced tiredness for six months post-surgery.

Symptoms can vary from person to person, some not having any symptoms at all. Most commonly the symptoms men experience are trouble starting urination, weak or interrupted flow of urine, urinating often, trouble emptying the bladder, pain or burning during urination, blood in the urine or semen, painful ejaculation, and unrelenting pain in the back, hips or pelvis. All men are at risk for prostate cancer and experiencing any of those symptoms warrants a visit with their physician.

Prostate cancer is the most common cancer among men in Missouri.

About one out of nine men in Missouri will be diagnosed with prostate cancer.

All men are at risk for prostate cancer. The older a man is, the higher the risk. Other risk factors are race (African-American men are more likely to develop prostate cancer) and family history (those with a family history are more likely to develop prostate cancer).

Both Hargis and Taylor say there are a lot of options to be considered when a man is facing a prostate diagnosis. Those options need to be considered according to age, lifestyle, and stage of the cancer and each man has to decide what option will be best for him.

Having a support system is also very important, both men were fortunate to have family, friends, and

co-workers supporting them through the whole situation. As with any life-threatening diagnosis, depression can be a battle that many men come up against. Hargis and Taylor both stress how important it is to reach out and ask for

help. They both are here

2nd Annual Play Fore Pink Golf Tournament To Benefit Babb Cancer Center

Golfers and sponsors alike will have the chance to turn an upcoming round of golf play into a tremendous benefit for a serious cause this October during the first Play Fore Pink golf tournament.

With an 8:30 a.m. tee time on Monday, Oct. 9, the event at Silo Ridge Golf and Country Club in Bolivar will raise money for breast cancer survivors and patients, plus raise awareness of the disease that afflicts 250,000 individuals each year and claims 46,000 victims annually.

GENESIS OF A GREAT IDEA

The Play Fore Pink tournament is the brainchild of Jim Figg — a labor of love for his wife, Jonnie, who lost her own courageous fight with the disease in 2021.

"Jonnie was one in a million, but her story is only one of millions," Figg laments. "We all think it will never happen to our loved one, but no one is protected from this awful disease."

And though men can develop breast cancer also, the proportion of victims is overwhelmingly female, so Figg especially wants to bring more awareness to how men can support their spouse or partner through the difficult seasons of diagnosis and treatment. Play Fore Pink became the perfect idea for reaching men right where they are at — on the golf course, quite often - with more information about the cause along with opportunities to help.

2022 PROVED A SUCCESSFUL EVENT

The inaugural Play Fore Pink Golf Tournament held in October 2022 raised \$10,000 that was donated to the Carrie J. Babb Cancer Center. Funds donated support additional financial services for breast cancer patients and

survivors. "I was extremely pleased with the support

and results from our inaugural event," stated Figg. "It was a beautiful day to play golf, men were educated about breast cancer and how to support their wives, mothers, sisters and female friends, and we provided some financial assistance to patients and survivors. Those were the goals of last year's tournament and they are the same for this year's tournament."

PLAYING AND PROMOTING WITH PURPOSE

Figg welcomes four player teams to participate in the tournament but has made numerous sponsorships available also for people wishing to offer their support in other

"For \$500, a team of four can Play Fore Pink with mulligans, lunch, snacks, water, shirts, microfiber towels, and swag bags included," Figg explains. "But all breast cancer patients and survivors will have their player fees waived, so this is going to be a tournament with lots of heart and purpose."

One very special opportunity is once again being made available: each of the 18 holes will feature a pink hole flag that for \$150 can be customized in

memory of or in honor of a special person who has experienced breast cancer. Following the tournament, sponsors will be given their flag as a keepsake. Those that purchased commemorative flags for last year's tournament can bring them back to fly again for \$100.

BREAST CANCER FACTS **AND FIGURES**

Breast cancer is a disease that strikes fear into women in particular, and understandably. In 2020, 3.8 million women claimed some history of the disease that is the second leading cause of death in women.

Locally, the Carrie J. Babb Cancer Center at Citizens Memorial Hospital in Bolivar serves hundreds of patients in partnership with Central Care Cancer Center in Kansas. A neighboring hospitality house serves friends and family traveling with their loved one to the cancer center for treatment. Money raised from the Play Fore Pink tournament will assist the Carrie J. Babb Cancer Center in providing oncology, hematology, radiation, and other medical or support services.

"There are lots of great causes out there," Figg adds. "But this one hits close to home for me and

Dee remembered by many

ear with me as we take time to remember Dee, for more than 23 years my South Dakota Bride, but much more than just the local newspaper editor's wife.

Dee was a force and personality all her own. Born DeAnn Joy Galbavy on April 28, 1952, in Sioux Falls, South Dakota, at age 14 she was one of six children left fatherless by her dad's untimely death.

When we met in the fall of 1970 Dee had come to Springfield to attend Baptist Bible College, and subsequently took a job as a bus girl at Bonanza Sirloin Pit, where I was an assistant manager. By Christmas we were an item of scandalous talk — a BBC freshman and an SMS senior — and in March we were married in her church.

For reasons I've never known, Dee had "unsettling" experiences before we met, living for a time with a couple from church, for a summer with an aunt in Washington State, and another summer on a mission trip in Taos, New Mexico (where she developed a passion for sopapillas).

Though not the eldest sibling, at the time Dee seemed the glue that held her disparate family together. Her older sister was married to a musician and living in Arkansas, her older brother was a US Marine veteran

recently returned from Vietnam, her younger sister was a college student, and two younger brothers still lived at home with their mother in Sioux Falls. Though just 18, she was way more mature than I was at 23.

Dee and I were scarcely wed when Uncle Sam called and we headed for North Carolina, where our daughter, Angela, was born on the last day of 1971. Not quite five years later, while I was news editor in Bolivar, a second girl, Melissa came along.

Wife and mother were arguably
Dee's most important roles, but along
the way she was a bus girl, deli worker, waitress, heat-seal machine operator, store clerk and a newspaper advertising director, none of which allowed
her to finish college.

Though she never aspired to a newspaper advertising career, she excelled at it — all the while feeling insecure because she did not have the college degree touted by many of her contemporaries.

She might have realized that goal, had she not lost her life on Sept. 30, 1994, three years and four months after our eldest daughter was killed in a car crash

Cancer got the blame, but I have to believe it was a mother's grief that claimed the life of my South Dakota bride

Yet, she is remembered, not just by friends and family, but by legions of newspaper advertising professionals. Shortly after her passing, Dee's peers on the Missouri newspapers made her their "Old Pro Award" namesake.

Today the award is officially the Missouri Press Advertising and Marketing Executives Dee Hamilton Memorial Sales Pro Award. The most recent recipient was Pam Simmons, senior account executive with the St. Louis American Newspaper.

Let that soak in.

Dee's name hangs on the wall in that big St. Louis newspaper, as well as dozens more around the state.

We should all be proud. She was Buffalo's "Old Pro" before even she knew.

Archery deer season

ovember is still the prime month for deer hunters, but more and more whitetail enthusiasts are circling Sept.

15 on their calendars, too.

As many local deer hunters know, Sept. 15 is the opening date of Missouri's archery deer season. (Technically, it's the opening of the archery deer and turkey season because turkeys taken by archery methods are legal harvests during this season, too. However, when most people refer to the "bow season," they're talking about this season as it applies to hunting deer.)

As usual, the season has two segments – Sept. 15 to Nov. 10 and Nov. 22 through Jan. 15. These segments wrap around the November firearms season.

The season limit for an archery permit is two deer (and two turkeys if you choose to archery hunt for turkeys), providing that only one antlered deer is taken prior to Nov. 10. In addition to this, bow hunters can buy additional archery antlerless permits for most counties in Missouri. These permits are for antlerless deer only. The map of where these permits are valid can be found in the "2023 Fall Deer & Turkey Hunting Regulations and Information" booklet, a free publication available at all Missouri Department of Conservation offices and most sites that sell hunting permits.

Of course, it needs to be remembered that the archery deer season isn't only an opportunity for hunters to bag deer; it's also a chance for landowners to alleviate deer problems they may be experiencing. People who do not have the time or interest to hunt white-tails might

be able to solve their deer problems by asking for help from people who hunt. This doesn't have to be a blanket invitation that opens your land to all hunters. Talking to your neighbors or asking people at your workplace or church if they'd be interested in hunting deer are good ways to stay in control of the hunting traffic on your land. Your acreage may be too small to be viable for firearms hunting, but archery – a method that consists of shots made from a much shorter range, is often a viable solution to deer problems.

As you, the landowner, talk to people interested in hunting on your land, here are some questions that will help you screen prospective hunters:

- How long have you been hunting deer?
- When will you be hunting morning, evening, weekday, weekend, specific dates, etc?
- Will you be bringing anyone with
- What kind of vehicle will you be driving?
- Can you give me a courtesy call the day before you come to my land?

• Would you be willing to hunt only does? (If you have deer problems due to an overabundance of deer, studies have shown that taking does is the most effective way of reducing overall deer numbers.)

None of these questions should be considered invasive. As the property owner, you're merely trying to learn more about the hunter or hunters whom you're going to trust to be on your land. Conversely, there are also questions responsible and courteous hunters should ask landowners. These questions will not only help with this year's hunting but may pave the way for hunts in future years as well. Hunters should ask:

- Where are your property bound-
- Are there any restrictions on when or where I can hunt?
- How do your neighbors feel
- about hunting?Can I use tree stands, screw-in
- steps, etc.?
 Do you mind if I field-dress the deer on your land? (If the answer is "yes," ask where you can field-dress deer so that you'll be able to dispose of the waste parts in an

out-of-the-way area.)
Also, unless told otherwise, always presume that any gate you pass through on the property needs to be shut behind you, both when entering and exiting the property.

Hi, my name is Joyce Moss, I have spent 40-plus summers at Lake Pomme de Terre. We became homeowners in 1999, and moved here permanently in 2018. We have watched the lake's clarity degrade over those forty years. In 1984 you could see your feet when you swam, that's long gone now. I believe the worst degradation has happened in the past 5-years. We've had toxic blue-green algae blooms closing down beaches and making people sick.

Now we have a meat processing plant apply for a permit to discharge 350,000 gallons of effluent daily from their Pleasant Hope plant. How on earth can this not be harmful to our beautiful Pomme de Terre Lake? The ecological impact would be devastating to a lake and river already stressed by other pollutants.

Destroying Lake Pomme de Terre would reduce the state's revenue from outdoor recreation which is such a huge money generator for the State of Missouri. Tourism is big in this part of the state. If the lake becomes contaminated, lost revenues for every business that rely on tourists would be devastating.

Clean water is essential. It's irreplaceable. I want our children and grandchildren and for all the generations ahead to be able to splash along the shore at sunset. It's time for us to act. It's time to make the commitment to keep contamination out of our water.

I am reaching out to you to see what you can do to ensure the waste coming from this plant does not become an environmental disaster.

COM's food pantry is visited by all kinds of people. About one quarter of pantry shoppers are seniors, others are unemployed individuals, and many are working one or two jobs.

COM operates a shopper's choice, grocery store-style pantry that is open three days per week. Families can come to the pantry and shop to pick out their own food. This not only allows them to get food they like and will use, but as they shop they are also able to have conversations with volunteers, staff, and other shoppers. We believe this relational aspect is really important.

COM also does a mobile food pantry at LIFE Church in Humansville once a month on the second Tuesday at 8:30 am.

At COM, combating food insecurity is a two-prong strategy. Providing food through the pantry is just the first step. We offer food in order to remove that concern from people so they are in a better position to focus on long-term goals. But, the second step is engaging with people to work on long-term development goals that improve their stability. This is done through our life skills classes and one-onone case management opportunities.

MDC confirms 117th confirmed mountain lion sighting in Missouri

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo. - The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) confirms that an adult elk was killed by a mountain lion in Shannon County on Sept. 12.

Reports of a mountain lion sighting were sent to MDC staff early on Sept. 12, and members of MDC's Large Carnivore Response Team responded to the area later that same day to confirm the sighting. Trail camera images were used to confirm that a mountain lion was in the area and had returned to the elk carcass to feed. "Mountain lions are natural predators to elk, and this scenario is nothing to be concerned about," says MDC Furbearer Biologist Nate Bowersock. "Here in Missouri, we have an abundant of natural foods for mountain lions. While we do get questions regarding livestock, there has never been a confirmed instance of a mountain lion killing livestock in Missouri."

Mountain lions are known to travel through Missouri, but there is no known breeding population in the state. MDC staff did collect genetic samples from the site which are in the process of being analyzed to provide further information about the animal such as the sex of the animal. Most confirmed sightings of mountain lions in Missouri are males.

MDC continues to monitor confirmed mountain lion sightings in the state, and this sighting marks the 117th confirmed sighting since 1994. We the Teople The Constitutional Separation of Powers

Those who designed our constitutional sys- The president's capacity to negotiate treatem wrestled with the matter of the presidency. We fought the Revolutionary War

to escape the tyranny of King George. Yet, the first attempt to govern ourselves under the Articles of Confederation failed in part because of the lack of a single executive officer. The prospect of a President of the United States of America was frightening to many, yet the Framers realized the country could not succeed without one.


This ambivalence is captured in the contradictory positions presented by those who created our system of government. Alexander Hamilton argued in favor of an executive chosen for life, with a veto power that could not be overridden by Congress. Thomas Jefferson countered this idea, writing 'I am astonished at some people's considering a kingly government as a refuge." John Adams thought the chief executive should be referred to as "His Highness, the President of the United States and Protector of their Liberties." Benjamin Franklin saw the presidency in a starkly different light: "In free governments, the rulers are the servants."

Despite these disagreements, most of the Framers recognized the necessity of overcoming these differences and successfully completing their vital task. As Gouverneur Morris observed, "And this must take place or general anarchy will be the alternative."

The answer for the Framers of the Constitution was to establish a President of the United States, while creating check after check upon the power the president would possess and exercise. The president's authority as commander-in-chief was limited by providing Congress with the ultimate decision on whether war should be declared.

ties with other nations was restricted by the requirement of Senate ratification.

Similarly, while the president was given the power to make appointments to key governmental posts, those positions would not be filled until the Senate provided confirmation. The president is empowered to veto legislation passed by Congress, but the Framers gave Congress the ability to override that veto. The president leads the Executive Branch, yet the Constitution imposes the requirement that the president faithfully execute the laws enacted by the Legislative Branch. Finally, the president can be impeached by the House of Representatives and removed by the Senate.

The Framers' uncertainty about the executive foreshadowed later controversies over presidential power. Since the end of World War II, Harry Truman's seizure of the nation's steel mills during the Korean War, Richard Nixon's assertion of executive

privilege during Watergate, Bill Clinton's claim of presidential immunity from a sexual harassment suit and George W. Bush's policy of detention of enemy combatants after 9/11 each resulted in Supreme Court rulings that these presidential actions were inconsistent with the Constitution.

The genius of the Constitution is that the president is empowered to do what is necessary for the government to function, but that power is inevitably checked to ensure additional voices are heard and the whim of one person does not become the policy of the United States. Looking back, the Framers' varied ideas came together to ensure that for more than two hundred vears the president has functioned as a servant of the public and the Constitution and no single individual within the government operates as the ultimate protector of our liberties.

After a full day of Homecoming festivities, the Bolivar Liberator football team squared off with the Glendale Falcons at Plaster Stadium on the campus of Southwest Baptist University.

The Liberators were looking to rebound from defeat at Lebanon who is one of the best running teams in Southwest Missouri. They were facing a Falcon team who lives and dies with the passing game. Last season's Liberators struggled to stop teams who ran this type of offense.

Both teams had identical winning records at 3-1.

Glendale started the game with the ball first and with the first play from scrimmage scored on a 78-yard pass play to go up 7-0.

The Falcons completed a 35-yard pass to the 45yard line. Two plays later they struck with a pass to the 13-yard line. With Glendale, threatening penalties forced the Falcons to try a field goal. The snap was not good and the Liberators had stopped another advance.

The Liberator's offense the 25-yard line Casey snared a pass to the 40yard line. The Liberators were forced to take an 8-yard loss, but Evan Nickels moved the ball back to the 40-yard line to allow Trenton Patke to sneak a 17-yard run.

The Falcons moved the ball down the field until the Liberator's defensive back, Conner Neal picked a Falcon pass off.


Patke continued to advance the ball on the ground and Neal made a nice reception before Durham made a 40-yard run to paydirt to spread the lead to Bolivar 21-7.

A Name Doesn't Make You Local - A Lifetime Does!

akotah Lear and Chayla Hughes have been friends for somewhere in the vicinity of eight-years. They became friends through mutual friends and Dakotah's brother and sister-in-law. They have always enjoyed doing life together as friends, never knowing where that friendship would take them. Little did they know, God had a plan for them the whole time.

After having their son Tyten, Dakotah and Tyler later found out that they were not going to be able to have any more babies. The doctors told Dakotah she had a decision to make regarding her health and that decision led to her having a full hysterectomy. This decision was not something that came easy and they kept it a total secret, not informing family in the beginning. "It's really not something a 28-year-old woman wants to hear, especially when you're trying to conceive," said Dakotah.

"Literally, it wasn't 24-hours after we made this decision that I told Tyler I felt like I needed to tell Chayla," said Dakotah. Tyler wasn't sure why and when he asked about it, Dakotah said she really didn't know why either, she just felt like she needed to tell her what was going on.

Making this decision to have the surgery the idea came to light that maybe Dakotah could

preserve her eggs before surgery. The doctor confirmed that would be a possibility, if they could get it done promptly.

Again, the thought and feeling that she needed to tell Chayla never left Dakotah's heart. Even then, it wasn't really clear as to why she had that feeling that she needed to tell Chayla, they were friends, but not to the point that they called each other every day to report on their day.

Making contact with the doctor in Kansas City, Dakota had her eggs retrieved and in less that 2 weeks, had a complete hysterectomy. After that she asked Tyler, "What are we going to do with these embryo's?" His response was, "Your guess is as good as mine!" Surrogacy agencies are available, but neither of us wanted to go that route. "We were not ok with a total stranger carrying our child. We wanted someone that would forever be a part of our lives, and our children's lives" said Dakotah.

That's when Chayla came to mind again, just

That's when Chayla came to mind again, just the need to reach out to her, kept getting heavier on my heart. To see if maybe she knew somebody that could carry for us. "I just didn't know, I just knew God was telling me to talk to her and maybe she could give us some direction," said Dakotah. Tyler suggested they invite them over for dinner to have this conversation, not send them a text! "But, of course, I didn't listen to him, I was afraid they would dart for the door, once I brought it up! So I sent her a pretty long text briefly telling her what was going on and that she has been heavy on my



heart from the beginning and I didn't really know why. At the end of the message, I included 'maybe we can have dinner and talk more about it.' As I was sending that text, it was like a weight was being lifted off my chest, I just knew I was supposed to reach out to her.

It took Chayla a day to reply — being a person that has to analyze things a little, she needed some time to give this text a little thought. But after that Chayla's response was — let's have dinner! "Tyler and I knew from that, that she would have some type of direction for us!"

Chayla has family that had been involved with surrogacy and that really helped for her to be able to get their input about what she was going to be proposing to do for the Lears.



After the dinner and the idea was proposed there were a lot of things going forward that had to be done and covered before the doctors would even go into the process. Counseling, attorneys for each party, paperwork to draw up and sign. "Chayla and I were more on the handshake and a hug wavelength with our plans, but that isn't how it works, which did make it more stressful for both families," said Dakotah.

In the fall of 2021, they finally did the first transfer — which didn't work. "I felt like our prayers weren't answered. As a mother, I felt bad for Tyten for not being able to experience the bond that I share with my own siblings, for Chayla and the endless amount of sacrifices she made to prepare her body and family for this journey, and not to mention the overall expense of it all."

"A second attempt didn't really seem like an option for us, for multiple reasons." said Dakotah. But for Chayla (gestational carrier) it was. "After accepting to do this, I told Dakotah and Tyler (intended parents) that I would be willing to do two attempts."

After months of research and praying for some kind of guidance, I brought it up to Chayla again. I wanted to see how she felt about it and within a week, we started preparing! Chayla spent countless hours going to acupuncture, chiropractic, yoga — all while taking care of her own family.

On April 14, 2022 they did their last and final transfer. 

fore you wear your favorite dress. Your house doesn't have to be "perfect" be-


fore you invite your friends in. I could go on and on... but my point is - if


