Christian County Library Nixa Branch announces expansion

The Nixa branch of the Christian County Library celebrated its fifth birthday on May 19, and with this celebration came the announcement that the Nixa branch is expanding. According to Executive Director Renee Brumett, in 2022, the library's Board of Trustees voted to pursue the purchase

of Southern Bank's side of the Nixa community branch building. This was made possible by the forward thinking of the board when, five years ago, the Nixa branch building was leased with terms to eventually pursue the option to buy and expand into the rest of the building. Funding for this purchase came from multiple avenues: library savings that had been set aside

over the years for the expansion of the library district, a lease-purchase agreement (a specific type of financing that tax-funded entities can use) that will be paid off in six years and money from the library's operating budget. Before the purchase took place, the property was appraised — funded by the Library Foundation — and inspected. Everything was finalized on

Dec. 29, 2022. Nixa has seen a large growth in population, which has contributed to the Nixa community branch receiving more foot traffic than any other library location in Christian County, with more than 300,000 visitors and over 1,200 events that have been held at the Nixa location (with over 28,000 at-

2023 annual school bus inspections

Colonel Eric T. Olson, superintendent of the Missouri State Highway Patrol, announced the results of the Driver and Vehicle Safety Division's 2023 annual school bus inspection program. Missouri's 2023 school bus inspection results are as follows:

- School buses rated as "approved" upon initial inspection — 9,995
- School buses rated as "defective" upon initial inspection — 1,088
- School buses rated as "out-of-service" upon initial inspection — 381

Buses with identified defective components require repair within 10 days. Buses placed out-of-service require correction of the component(s), and re-inspection and a return to service by Patrol personnel prior to further usage in transporting passengers.

A total of 256 Missouri school districts earned the Patrol's Total Fleet Excellence award for 2023. During the 2023-2024 school year, 4,769 buses in these award-winning fleets are eligible to display the Patrol's Total Fleet Excellence sticker in the lower corner of the first window on the passenger entry side of the bus.

"Everyone wants to keep our children safe as they travel to and from school. To that end, the Missouri State Highway

Ozark South Elementary adds 3D printer to science lab

There are always exciting things happening in the science lab at South Elementary. However, fourth graders got a little extra excitement this school year, thanks to a grant from Project Lead the Way (PLTW).

"Fourth graders designed a keychain on

Tinkercad to print on the 3D printer," said science teacher Leslie Thomas. "Students had many color options for their project, thanks to a large donation of printing filament. Twenty-four spools of filament — \$150 worth — were donated by my son, Matthew, a 2014 Ozark grad. He is thrilled the kids get to have this fun project and wanted them

to have lots of color choices. They loved it!" That's right, South Elementary science lab has its very own 3D printer. Earlier in the school year, Thomas received a \$5,000 PLTW grant to purchase the printer, along with other supplies for the science lab, such as masking tape, magnifying glasses, a weather station and more fun STEM activities.

Thomas applied for the grant in hopes of being able to purchase supplies to give her students more opportunities for hands-on learning experiences. According to the Project Lead the Way website, www.pltw.org, PLTW helps teachers "create an engaging, hands-on classroom environment and

Ozark Empire Fair Hay Show call for entries

Now that hay season is in full swing, it is a good time to pull hay samples for entry in the Ozark Empire Fair Hay Show in Springfield, says University of Missouri Extension agronomy specialist Tim Schnakenberg. Entry deadline is July 17. To enter, contact the nearest MU Extension specialist. They are available to help pull the core samples from the 10-bale entry.

The show allows either dry hay or haylage in conventional small bales or large, high-moisture forage, says Schnakenberg. It is best to allow about two weeks before collecting the hay bale sample and four weeks for haylage. Space at the fair only allows for displaying the Champions and Reserves in the two divisions. Within each division, the classes are split into legumes, cool-season grass, warm-season perennial grass, grass-legume mix and summer/winter annual grass. The educational hay exhibit at the fair features a display of booklets with exhibitor data that includes test results from Custom Laboratory in Monett. Past exhibitors credit the show with marketing assistance. The class placings will be based on relative forage quality (RFQ). Data in addition to RFQ will include moisture, crude protein, acid detergent fiber, neutral detergent fiber and total digestible nutrients. The forage must have been harvested in Missouri in 2023. Exhibitors are limited to two entries per

class. No more than one entry per field per cutting may be made. Premiums are limited to ribbons, rosettes and cash prizes for the top six entries in each class, says Schnakenberg. Sponsors of this year's hay show are Pennington Seed, Crown Power and Equipment, Green Seed, MFA Inc. and Custom Laboratory. For more details, contact Schnakenberg at the MU Extension Center in Stone County at 417-357-6812. The hay show is held in conjunction with the 2023 Ozark Empire Fair, July 27-Aug. 5, at the fairgrounds in Springfield.

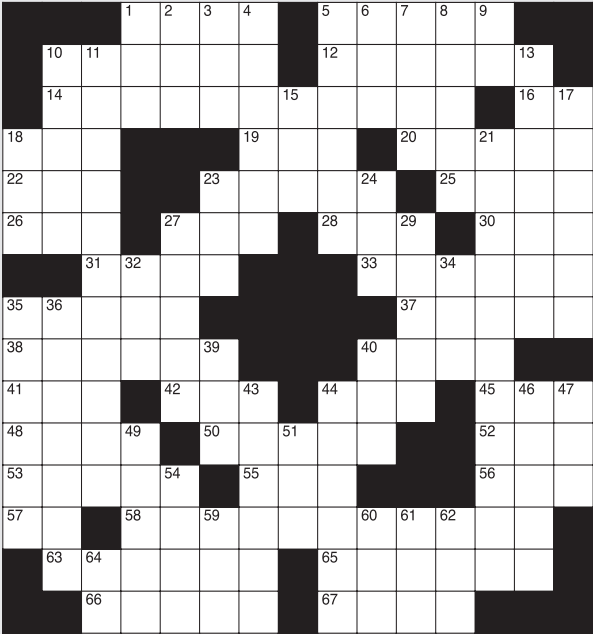

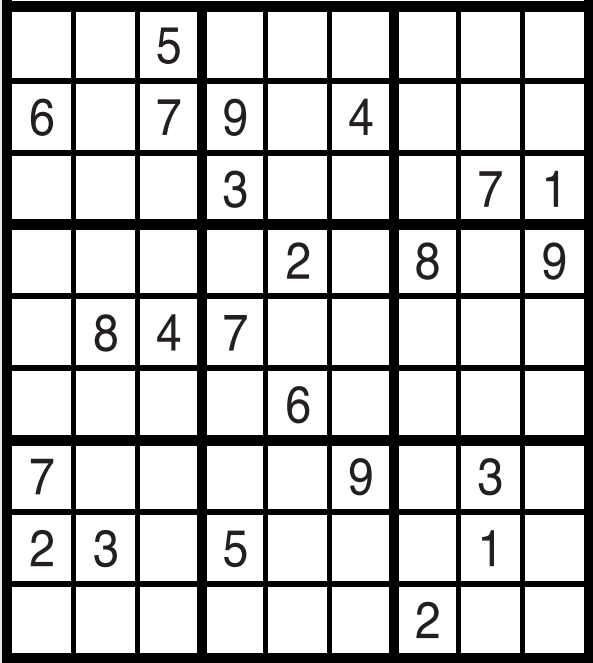
SUDOKU

tendeers). Already, the Nixa branch has received 3,000 more visitors from January through April than this time last year.

The expansion will bring the Nixa community branch from 9,000 square feet to 22,000 square feet.

"For right now, we're basically using it for office space," Brumett said. "Administratively, we've been split between the Ozark and Nixa branches because of space, so we're in the process — and are almost complete — of moving all of the administration (except for branch managers) to this extra space."

"We're thankful for the space," said Nicholas Holladay, Director of Communications & Community Engagement for the Christian County Library. "In Ozark, specifically, four people shared an office that was, essentially, a hallway. (The expansion) is allowing staff to be more efficient and to get the job done better and faster. Overall staff happiness has increased. I was one of them; I shared an office with three people, and some shared with more than I did. It just gives us this ability to do what we do better."

"We're also looking at the support organizations — the Friends of the Christian County Library and the Library Foundation — to see if there's space for them here," Holladay added. "They're going to be in the equation, as far as what it looks like in the future to have spots for them to do the work they do, which supports the library."

The long term goal for the Nixa branch expansion is to increase the public space. Brumett notes that they are in the preliminary research phase at the moment and will eventually move into a planning and fundraising process. In addition to seeing the immediate need, Brumett is also considering what the Nixa branch

will need in the future to service the community.

"We need to sit down with a designer/architect to figure out what we can do in the building," she said. "We need some time to figure out how we work best as a team with the extra space and to look at our statistics to see what the public really needs. For instance, we know that our meeting room use is through the roof; our numbers for that go up all the time and there's always demand for that. So, we do expect in a renovation that we would be looking closely at trying to find a way to add some more meeting rooms or some place that can be used for meeting rooms some of the time. We need some time to ask the public, watch the statistics, see the trends and figure out what we really need the space to be long term. I'd love to see the public space doubled, but we'll have to see what's possible with the design and function and everything."

According to the library's statistics, wireless usage for just the Nixa branch has increased dramatically.

"This is something I think most new libraries, when they're built or renovated, are accommodating for; they're building in more seating without collection or even physical computers, but just places for people to sit and use their devices," Brumett said. "That's something I expect we'll be focusing on when we increase our public spaces — making sure there's good, usable spaces for people to do whatever they're choosing to do, probably on their own devices. A lot more people are working remotely, and a lot of times, they want somewhere they can be out and around people but still able to focus."

Brumett hopes that by the time the lease-purchase agreement is paid off, the library will have been able to raise enough money and complete

the renovation, which would then free up funds from their operating budget to run a larger branch.

"We have good circulation right now at Nixa, but if we had more product, we would have more usage," Brumett said. "I do think we need that long term. We'll be watching the trends in the next few years to see if that continues to be needed. Our digital usage is increasing at a rate higher than any other kind of usage. Over the next few. Years, it will be interesting to see if that continues to out-pace physical collection, and that will help us decide. But, I do expect that we'll need to have some increase in the physical collection, it's just a matter of how much — we'll kind of see how the next few years go."

"Every time I visit another library right now, I'm already like, 'What have they done, what can I borrow from this?' I'm filing away all these ideas for what could be possible with this kind of space," she added.

Holladay appreciates the forward thinking of the current Board of Trustees, noting that they were part of the push to look into expanding the library.

"We are continually evolving and serving our community better," he said.

"I really appreciate the community using the library. It's so affirming to see the increase in numbers," Brumett said. "There would have been no reason for us to explore buying the building or to think about future planning if it weren't for the community. We love that they love us. That's our drive; we want to serve the community, and to see that they acknowledge that and are making use of the library is very motivational to keep doing the good work that we're doing. We definitely appreciate the community and their use of their library."

Patrol personnel, in partnership with pupil transportation professionals statewide, inspected 11,464 school buses in accordance with Missouri revised state statutes," said Colonel Olson.

The 2023 school bus inspection results for Christian County are as follows:

- Billings R-IV presented 6 buses; 50.0 percent were approved, 16.7 percent were defective and 33.3 percent were out-of-service.
- Chadwick R-1 presented 9 buses; 66.7 percent were approved, 22.2 percent were defective and 11.1 percent were out-of-service.
- Clever R-V presented 15 buses; 93.3 percent were approved, 6.7 percent were defective and 0.0 percent were out-of-service.
- Nixa Public Schools presented 47 buses; 87.2 percent were approved, 10.6 percent were defective and 2.1 percent were out-of-service.
- Ozark R-VI presented 59 buses; 67.8 percent were approved, 23.7 percent were defective and 8.5 percent were out-of-service.
- Sparta R-III presented 13 buses; 69.2 percent were approved, 23.1 percent were defective and 7.7 percent were out-of-service.
- Spokane R-VII presented 12 buses; 91.7 percent were approved, 8.3 percent were defective and 0.0 percent were out-of-service.

OZARK'S RFD FAVORITES

The heart and sinew of community

Country and small town churches are windows to the heart and sinew of this country. Anyone seeking to discover the “real America” need look no deeper than a rural church on Sunday morning. Understand the folks gathered there and you will understand what makes ours both the strongest and most compassionate nation on earth.

The country church building will likely be a cobbled, unpretentious structure. Somewhere under its painted boards may hide logs or rough-sawn timbers from the 1800s. Amid tiles in the high ceiling of the sanctuary may be hidden an old chimney pipe. On the wall behind the pulpit may hang a framed “Church Covenant,” its parchment paper yellowed and the wording faded, but the beliefs it embodies as sacred as the day it was agreed to.

Sunday school rooms, a kitchen, indoor restrooms, a fellowship hall and maybe even a brand-new sanctuary may have been tacked on to the original structure in a sprawling maze — wood and mortar contributions of many successive generations.

Whatever its appearance, whether humble or grand, it's just a building. The people are the real church.

Sunday morning worshippers arrive with the informality of kinfolk dropping in on Grandma for dinner, most dressed in their “Sunday best.” Understand, for many of them, their “best” may be jeans or overalls. It makes no difference how they're dressed — except maybe to some young boy or girl hoping to be noticed by another young lady or lad.

They file in shaking hands and giving hugs to one another — men, women, children and old folks, alike. It's obvious they're family. Visitors, though, get the same warm and

genuine welcome. None remain strangers long.

After a spell of this spontaneous fellowshiping, they settle into their pews — likely as not, in the same places they've sat for as long as they've attended. Like cows in an old dairy barn, each has a stanchion, and it just doesn't seem right if even one is out of place. The preacher knows exactly where to look, then, to ask Brothers Bill or John to offer up a prayer.

It's home, this country church. Some families are represented by four and five generations. Earlier generations of the same families are at rest in the cemetery out back. Children baptized in the church have grown up, gone off to school, joined the military or moved away, and then moved back. Even if all other places and people they've known are gone, the country church is home.

The rituals differ by denomination — Baptist, Methodist, Disciples of Christ and others — but the worship is much the same in every little church. You can always count on Scripture being quoted from the pulpit and an “Amen” from out in the pews.

Country churches have long lists of folks they're praying for, but they're not just lists of names — they're friends and family the folks in church genuinely love and care about, and they're doing the best they can to help them. They're asking in simple faith for God to care

for them.

Prayer lists are a phenomenon all their own. None of us can even imagine the numbers of folks lifting our names in prayer. As a local spokesman for the Gideons, I've been in many rural churches and noted the same names on prayer lists throughout the county. We are entwined in miraculous fashion. No matter who you are or how alone you might think yourself in your distress, Christians throughout the county are praying for you every week. That's not preaching, just fact.

As faithful as they are in their worship, as genuine as they may be in their faith in God, those people comprising small town and country churches must also embody a quiet tenacity to keep open the doors of their churches.

That so many small communities yet have Sunday services with as few as 20 or 30 worshippers is a testimony to their individual and spiritual strength. Most could go to bigger churches. They could close the doors of the old church and let someone else worry about paying the light bill in another building.

They could, but they don't. That church is not just the few people who sit in the pews on Sunday morning, but generations of folk beginning with they who hewed the first timbers. It is where the faithful go today to commune not only with God, but with those believers who came before them, and where they find the strength to persevere.

Visit a country church and you will see it, too — the heart and sinew of who we are.

Dark objects in the bright Milky Way

The Milky Way contains many bright objects, several of which are easily visible. Yet, some objects were discovered that can only be seen with a telescope. It took an early American astronomer to visually find these objects.

E.E. Barnard was an American astronomer who made many contributions to astronomy without the aid of photography. Barnard was born Dec. 16, 1857, in Memphis, Tennessee, prior to the American Civil War. His father died three months prior to his birth, and he received very little formal education. His older brother had health issues, and Barnard and his family lived in poverty. He learned astronomy from the book “Practical Astronomer” given to him. From this book, he learned the constellations. While viewing one night, he heard the cannon fire from the Civil War.

At the age of seven, he worked at a photography business to support his mother and brother. He guided a large mirror that reflected light to the studio. He purchased his first telescope and began searching the night sky. With it, he discovered Jupiter and Venus. He took detailed notes of his observations. He also discovered several comets.

With his discovery of comets, he joined the Lick Observatory in 1887, which held the 30-inch refractor. Barnard was able to visually discover the fifth moon of Jupiter with the telescope. He also noticed dark patches in the Milky Way with the large telescope. He first thought that they were holes in the Milky Way itself. He later started using photography with other telescopes at Lick Observatory.

In 1895, he joined the Yerkes Observatory. While using the 40-inch refractor at the Yerkes Observatory, he continued to observe and photograph the dark nebula located in the Milky Way. He concluded that these were dust clouds that obscured the stars behind. He made a list of these dark nebula. This list, like the Messier Objects, is known as Barnard Objects. His list included 370 objects. The Pipe Nebula, located in the heart of the Milky Way, and the Horse Head Nebula, located in Orion, are two of the more famous objects.

Summer solstice, the first day of summer, will be on June 21. Venus is at its greatest height this month in the western sky on the evening of June 9.

Saturn and the moon will be above the eastern horizon after midnight on June 9.

On the morning of the 14th, Jupiter and the waning moon will be visible together.

On the night of the 21st, Venus and the moon will be the closest. Mars will be above them. On the 22nd, the moon will be above Mars.

The next meeting of the Springfield Astronomical Society will be June 27. It will be at the Library Center at 4653 S. Campbell Ave., Springfield. Starting time is 7:00 p.m. Visit the website at www.springfieldastronomy.org.

BBB offers tips to avoid job scams

As more people search for remote work opportunities, scammers are looking to cash in. Job fraud is the most common type of scam for people ages 18-34, and it is on the rise this year. In the first three months of 2023, consumers reported job scam losses of nearly \$840 thousand to Better Business Bureau’s (BBB) Scam Tracker, up over 250 percent compared to the same time last year. Job scammers pose as legitimate employers and are usually seeking at least one of two things: money or personal and financial information. Because normal employers have close access to both, it leaves many job seekers with their guard down. In some cases, scammers strike immediately upon making contact by creating a fake job opening and asking job seekers for their personal information. In others, the fraudsters lay a trail of deception for weeks or even months, slowly taking money from an unaware victim. One common tactic is to hire job seekers as “re-shippers” and ask them to purchase expensive items like computers and ship them overseas with the promise of reimbursement. Once the items are sent, the fraudsters disappear

and victims typically find out they were reimbursed with fraudulent credit cards or checks. In the most extreme cases, some people found themselves out tens of thousands of dollars. BBB recently released an update to its study on job scams, which you can read to learn about common job scams and what to look out for. BBB’s tips for job seekers:

- Research trusted companies offering jobs at BBB.org.
- Find a number on the business’ website and call to confirm the job or offer is real.
- Check the email address to ensure that it is connected to the company and not a personal “gmail” or “yahoo” address.
- Be cautious providing personal information to unverified recruiters and online applications.
- Watch out for:
 1. Jobs that require you to pay your own money
 2. Cold calls about jobs, especially if you can’t verify the caller’s identity
 3. Jobs that seem too good to be true with higher-than-average pay
 4. Interviews done strictly over email
 5. The following types of jobs: Mystery shopping, re-shipping, check-cashing, nanny and car wrap

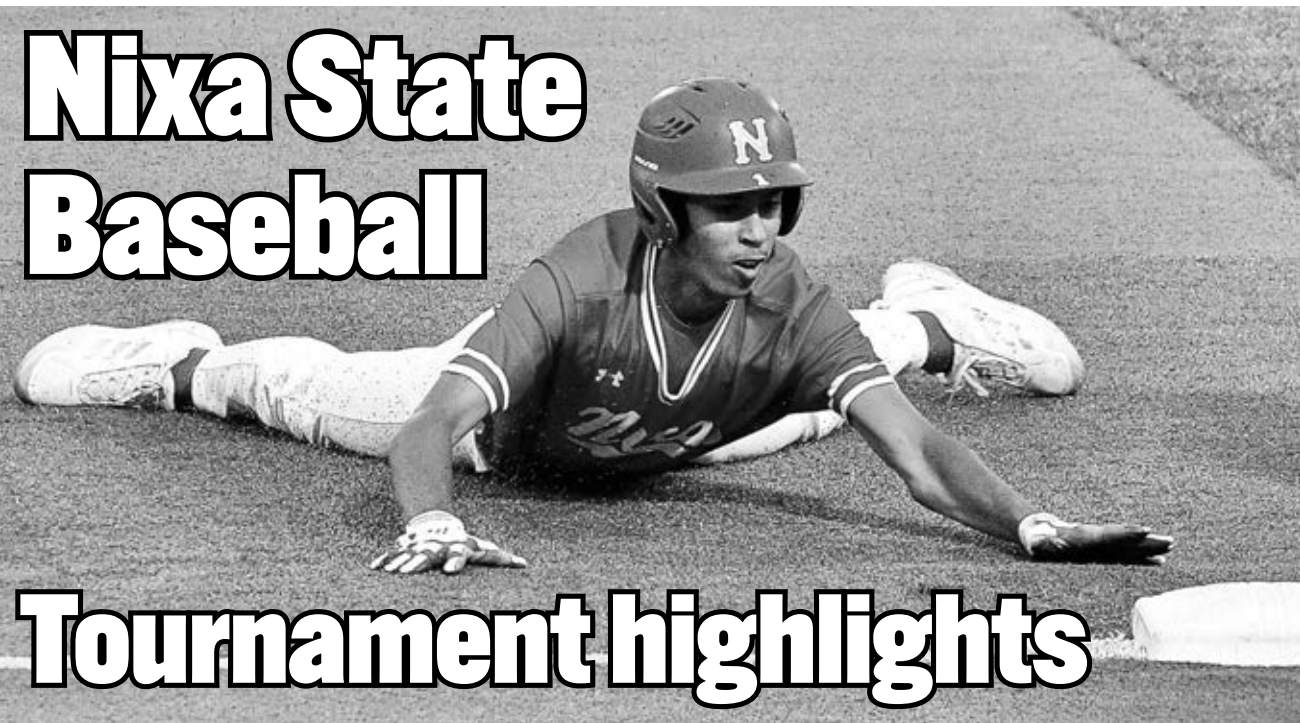

"I'm upset we lost, but good with the performance I put together," he added. McGuire overpowered Nixa hitters with his fast ball and slider. He struck out 11. "There's a reason he is who he is and he's going where he's going," Hughes said. "When he's got 'velo' like he has and the slider to go with it, you've got to

try to take one away. His slider is a plus-pitch. He threw it a couple times in a big moment, once to (Rylan) Michel and you could tell he threw it harder than he normally did and it was nastier." The hope from Nixa's side was McGuire might tire. But he was still throwing hard in the fifth and sixth innings. McGuire threw 96 pitches before Ty Wisdom took over for him for the seventh. Sophomores ‘showing up’ like they didn’t dare dream

With Nixa players placed in rows according to their class for their team photo in the pre-season this year, it occurred to Colin Kelley how super the Eagles’ sophomores were.

“When I first realized how good our class is was on our picture day,” Kelley said. “You could see how promising the future is and how good the class is. Wyatt (Vincent) was to my left and Caeden (Cloud) to my right. They’re top-level guys. As a whole, our class is really good.”

Not many teams, much less a Final Four outfit, have been strengthened by sophomores to the degree Nixa has. Vincent is in his second go-around as the Eagles’ starting center-fielder and has assumed the lead-off role. Cloud has proven himself

at shortstop and as the team’s No. 3 hitter. Kelley and Jackson Gamble are two of the leaders of the pitching staff, whether used as starters or relievers.

All four could easily figure largely in Nixa’s run for the Final Four next season.

Outside a couple hiccups, Kelley has experienced plenty of success throughout the season. He recorded a no-hitter at Rockhurst in his second varsity start. In the post-season, he has gained two wins with lockdown extended relief outings.

His sophomore season has been far beyond Kelley’s prior expectations.

“I was a little skeptical on how many innings I would get,” Kelley said. “Coming from the freshman team, I didn’t know what my role was going to be, if I was going to be a reliever or a starter or how many innings I would throw. I didn’t expect

this many innings. I’ve been really satisfied and feel like I’ve done my job for the team.”

Gamble, too, has been on the mound more than he imagined going in.

“I talked to coach (Logan) Hughes (in the offseason) and he told me I would be one of our starters and I believed him,” Gamble said. “I was thinking maybe I’d get 20-30 innings. I was happy I got the opportunity, but didn’t know if I would be able to stick. I needed to trust myself.”

“My first start (a loss against Springfield Catholic), I felt good about,” he added. “I went out with the mindset of trusting my defense. We didn’t end up winning, but it was fun.”

Gamble went on to gain two wins against Ozark. He also points to losses to Willard and Republic as being part of his progress.

“Being in big games, I’ve learned a lot about high-pressure moments and breathing on the mound,” Gamble said. “I’ve experienced a couple losses. Learning from them is probably more impactful than learning from the wins, as far as what I can improve and gain from times when I’m not at my best.”

Kelley credits seniors the likes of Rylan Evans and Brayden Tangora for helping him feel settled in on the varsity.

“It’s a lot different pitching from the freshman team to the varsity team and a pretty good one, too,” Kelley said. “It was like getting called up. I was very nervous. Evans and Tangora, I’ve learned from them.”

Unlike most sophomores, Vincent already had a year’s experience to rely upon at the start of this year. If all goes as planned, he’ll be a rarity as a four-year starter for the Eagles.

Vincent’s first varsity at-bat as a freshman saw him hit into a double-play. But he never doubted he could play with 17-18-year-olds as a 14-year-old.

“I had the confidence going into this season I belonged,” he said. “Starting off not the best was kind of hard. But, I felt like I belonged the whole season. Even when things weren’t going well. I was still contributing.”

Vincent has taken pride in seeing his classmates join him by emerging so early in their careers.

“Our sophomore pitchers are all showing up,” Vincent said. “It’s amazing to see how they have progressed. It’s phenomenal how much work they have put in and how far they have come. I’m really proud of them.”

“It’s not always about you,” he added. “Seeing teammates succeed is awesome to watch.”

In his one season wearing a Nixa uniform, Ethan Taylor gained a strong loyalty to his new teammates that never wavered, even under adverse conditions.

All that possibly kept Taylor from pitching Nixa into a state championship game were a throwing error and not enough offensive support Friday.

“That’s who he is. He doesn’t get flustered by the big moment,” Hughes said. “He trusted himself and his catcher.”

Taylor’s delivery was free and easy.

“It was a big game and there were nerves,” he said.

“But I loved the pressure. I was really feeling comfortable. I went out there and cleared my mind. I was just having fun.”

Taylor agreed with Hughes that he was better at the end of the game than the first inning.

“The first couple of innings, I relied on my fast ball and two-seam (fast ball) to keep them on their toes,” Taylor said. “Toward the end, I got my curve ball and changeup to work. They were a little wild toward the beginning of the game.”
