














1921 Leslie Bulldogs were improbable state champions

LESLIE — A stroll through the Heart of the Ozarks communities will produce some of the finest high school gyms in the state of Arkansas. Even small schools with only 200 students have quality facilities that are capable of hosting crowds in excess of 2,000 people.

Basketball has always been a crazy sport and the Heart of the Ozarks fans live and breath with the quality of their high school team.

However, a journey back in time has produced one of basketball's great history lessons.

In the 1920-1921 school year, the Leslie Bulldog basketball team had made a name for itself. The Bulldogs were very skilled and the team knew how to win.

As the season progressed, the squad had earned a trip to the state basketball tournament that was held in Little Rock.

Arkansas started crowning state basketball champions in 1909 and this was to be Leslie's first trip.

School administrators had given the squad permission to go to the tournament, but the team had to travel on the train to Little Rock. Rail service to the small Searcy County town

was erratic.

The athletes waited with their bags packed on Monday, a week before the tournament started. No train.

Tuesday came and went. So did Wednesday and Thursday.

If the train didn't come on Friday, the team could not go.

The entire morning passed, then the afternoon came and just as the players were starting to leave, the sound of the train whistle in Marshall was vaguely heard by a couple of the players.

The players started pacing with anticipation until the train arrived.

The nine-member team and their coach loaded the train and headed to Little Rock and the unknown.

Upon arriving in Little Rock, the Bulldogs saw other teams from large cities across the state.

The Little Rock High School coach took pity on the squad that looked to be out of their element. He arranged for them to practice and helped them to find lodging.

As the team was preparing for the tournament, a huge epiphany was realized. The tournament was going to be held indoors.

The Leslie coach quickly scrambled to find their new friend from Little Rock and to pick his brain on the ins-and-outs of playing indoors. The Bulldogs had never played inside a gym before. All of their games had been outside in the elements.

Adjusting quickly to the indoor game, the

team was ready for their first contest. After an easy first win, the team's trip to the big city was becoming even more exciting.

As the tournament progressed, the Little Rock coach began to realize that the Leslie team was very good, and that they were going to meet in the finals.

Little Rock High School had won six of the first 12 titles, and that included three of the last four.

Sure enough the two teams met with Leslie winning, 24-21, in what was described as the best game of the tournament.

The Bulldogs celebrated their first title.

Leslie entered the tournament with many odds stacked against them according to the scholars of the times. They were from a small town and the team was coached by a woman.

Irene Jones became the first women to lead a boys team to a state title. She was the only one to do so for more than 90 years of play. However in 2001, Barbara Wilburn led Marked Tree to a title to join the ranks.

Alpena finding ways to get it done

ALPENA — The Alpena Leopards have found a way to get it done.

This season, getting it done has taken on a new meaning for the Leopards. Innovation has become a part of basketball at the west Boone County school.

With the COVID-19 concerns, the Leopards found themselves on the sidelines for two weeks. That didn't stop veteran coach Phillip Roberts from coaching his team.

"We have been quarantined for two weeks," said Roberts. "We didn't sit around. We have had a lot of changes, but we have found ways to still have practices."

One of those ways was to have individual practice virtually.

"We had Zoom practice for two weeks," said Roberts. "I watched them on their home goals and we worked on some things. We also sent their kettle irons home with them so that they could continue their workouts."

Roberts and the Leopards took Zoom to another level of basketball.

"I had plays online and we went through those," he said. "We had everyone join in and we studied what we wanted to do for those two weeks.

"We had to get some things done," continued the coach. "We are not just sitting around. The two weeks off has affected us, but we have tried to lessen it. The kids have been on board."

COVID has also changed the schedule for the Leopards.

"We have games every week of the season," the coach said. "There are only two

weeks we only have one game and the rest of the time there are two."

Roberts went on to express his opinion about the upcoming basketball season.

"I think the season will continue," he said. "There may be a hiccup here or there, but I am confident that we are going to get to play."

That confidence has spilled over to his team. He likes this version of the Leopards.

"I like the willingness to work and get better," he said. "Even during quarantine and even last spring when they were homebound, I had some kids that were working their tails off to get better.

"When they were allowed to come back in, they were here and working hard."

The Leopards, like all teams across Arkansas, didn't get to have summer camps or scrimmages. The approach for this year may change the way the coach thinks about offseason workouts.

"We got our summer time," said Roberts. "I will be honest with you, coming in and working on ball handling and fundamental things has helped us. We got better than we would have scrimmaging. It will change our approach in the upcoming years."

Coming into the season, Roberts has aspects of his team that he points to as a strength.

"Our guard play is going to be the strength of this team," he said.

With solid guards, usually a weakness of a team will be inside play. That is true for the Leopards.

"We lack size inside," the coach said. "Our inside game is still developing. We have some kids that can, but they have to develop more."

When looking at covering his weakness, the coach looked to the University of Arkansas.

"We have tried to take notes from Coach (Eric) Musselman in Fayetteville," said Roberts. "We will go about playing defense different. When you are smaller you have to do things to make up for it."

The Leopards plan on using a variety of defenses this season. The team will use a matchup, 1-3-1 and some man-to-man.

Offensively, the coach would like to speed up the tempo.

"We are going to to try to get up and down the floor," he said. "We will look for early opportunities before the defenses get set."

Alpena will be looking at some tough competition this year to prepare themselves

Lady Leopards have new coach this season

ALPENA — There are a lot of new things at Alpena this season.

There is a new conference, a new region, a new look to the team and a new coach. Michael Smith is the new Alpena coach. He comes into a team that is deep in tradition.

Alpena made a run in the Class 1A State Tournament last season and look to do the same when moving up to Class 2A this year.

The Lady Leopards have really impressed the coach in the early going.

"They are hard workers," he said. "Every since I have been here, they are trying to learn my system. They have been high energy trying to catch on. I like to run set plays and they are not use to it, but they are working hard to learn.

"They really want to be here," continued the coach about his team. "They don't really miss any. They want to be here and they want to be better. They are giving me everything that they have."

When looking at his team, the coach was quick to point out the strength — guard play.

"All of my girls are able to shoot consistently," he said. "They handle the ball well. The ability to shoot the basketball will help us most nights."

When looking at the weakness of the team, Smith pointed to size and inside play. "We don't have a lot of size," he said. "We have to really use our guard play as our strength. We have to neutralize teams that have some bigs. We are going to do some of the things like (Eric) Musselman did last year with the Razorbacks."

When it comes to defense, teams will have to be ready for what the Lady Leopards will throw at them.

"We will do some man," started the coach. "Then we will play a 1-3-1 matchup and some 2-3."

The coach says the team will run a continuity offense similar to Princeton's offense. A new conference will have new teams. The schedule is full of tough opponents.

"Flippin will be pretty good," started Smith. "Cotter will be good. They have some bigs. Berryville will be pretty good.

"When we go down south we will see a different style of basketball," said the coach about the team's trip to Drew Central. "Rural Special returns several from last year and of course there is Valley Springs and Bergman. That will be two tough

games for us."

Alpena will be playing in a balanced conference.

"I like our conference. I think we have a chance to compete," he said. "The bottom teams will be competitive with the top teams. We will have to bring our A game every night or there is a chance of getting upset."

Smith pointed to Mountainburg, Lavaca and Magazine as some of the better teams from the other conference that will compete in the regional tournament. "I feel like we got a good placement regional-wise."

The Lady Leopards only have eight players this season, but those players have a lot of experience.

Anniston Armer will be one of the team's starters.

"This year she will be one of our main ball handlers," said the coach. "She is a good defender. She will draw one of the better guards from the other team. She is a good shooter."

Katherine Rodas will handle some paint play for the Lady Leopards.

"She will be an inside out person," said the coach. "She can handle it pretty well. She can play outside and she shoots it pretty well. She can score on the inside for us."

Bergman ready to take next step in state

BERGMAN — Bergman got a taste of the Class 3A State Basketball Tournament last season. Now, the team wants to take a big bite.

The exciting thing for Panther fans is that the squad has the manpower to make a deeper run into the tournament.

Bergman's coach Bo Martin, who is entering his ninth-year at the helm of the Panthers, has some things about his team that he really likes.

"We are a good blend of returners and some that were role players," said the coach. "We are going to be the most athletic team that I have had here."

There were other things that the coach likes about his team.

"I like the depth of the bench," he said. "We have some good senior leaders with a lot of experience and a lot of playing time."

That playing time should amount to wins for the Panthers. Bergman completed last season with a 32-9 mark.

When asked what the strength of his team was going to be, Martin answered "Athleticism and we are very fast," he started. "We will be able to play at a high speed this year."

Even with the experience of some returning players, there is a weakness that will have to be overcome as the season begins.

"We will be replacing three three-year starters," he said. "Anytime that you have to replace that much experience and scoring it will take time for people to learn their role and fill the voids. That will be a process."



The Panthers have the skill set this year to put different defenses on the floor.

"We are going to mix it up and use some variety," said Martin. "We are going to do several different things."

While on the offensive end, the Panthers would not need a shot clock.

"We will play fast and shoot a lot of 3s," the coach said. "We are going to use Elijah (Royce) inside."

Royce is a two-time All-State player for the Panthers.

"He has averaged a double double the last two years," said the coach. "He is a great teammate. He is unselfish. Sometimes he is too unselfish. He impacts the game in a lot of ways. He can rebound, pass, score and defend."

Another senior star and returning to the lineup this year is Asher Fultz.

"He is a really hard worker," stated Martin. "He improved a lot between his 10th and 11th grade year. He made an even bigger step this year. He is a great scorer that can get other guys involved. He can score outside and get to the rim."

Another pair of Panthers have earned their starting spots this year — Anthony Hodge and Walker Patton.

"Anthony (Hodge) played good minutes the last two years," said Martin. "He has worked hard and has improved. He is 6-foot-3 so he adds length. "He can impact the game. He will have a much bigger role this year.

"Walker is a special sophomore," continued the coach. "He is very athletic. He can do a lot. He will also take on a much bigger role this year."

There is a fifth spot up for grabs for the team and according to the coach, any of four players could fill the position.

Marcus Bryant is a junior that has really improved and will start some. Even if he doesn't start, he will see a lot of minutes.

Mingo Kennedy is a sophomore that is very athletic and a good defender. The coach said that he could be a good playmaker on offense.

Junior Kaden Henson is a long player. He has a nice touch with the ball and can be an athletic scorer at the basket. He has a little bit of experience.

Senior Trevor Little is a 6-3 senior that can shoot the basketball and offers some size for the team off of the bench.

Bergman's bench doesn't stop there. Erick DeDear and Tristen Pritchett will be fighting to see the valuable minutes for the Panthers.

The Panther development may have been slowed a little this season by the COVID-19 virus. "Not having team camps have hurt us," said Martin. "This year in particular we have a lot of guys that haven't played or guys in different roles. So, team camps were

Youthful Lady Panthers will be solid team

BERGMAN — As teams face the COVID-19 virus this season, the Bergman Lady Panthers hope to not face the same bug that they had last season.

The "injury bug" hit the squad and created an interesting season for the team. This year, seventh-year head coach James Halitzka is looking for his team to be

very competitive. The coach likes what he sees on the floor.

"This group is competitive," he said about his team. "They bring a competitive atmosphere to the floor every day. They are willing to put in extra time outside of what is required. They are the most dedicated group that I have had."

Put the team's dedication with the strengths of the team and fans get excited about the upcoming season.

"They are physical, strong and they can shoot," said the coach about his team. "There are a lot of scorers on this team."

This season the Lady Panthers will run a man defense and while on offense they will be approaching the game in a quick manner.

"We will be shooting the first good shot and then we go get it if it misses," said Halitzka.

The Lady Panthers will be playing in a new conference this season. The coach likes the change.

"I think it will be good for us," he said. "The drives will be a little further, but it will be easier. It is a good conference, but it is not as tough as last year. Last year's conference was tough top to bottom."

A top four finish in the district tournament will get a team to regionals. This cycle the region for the conference moves to the southwest.

"The region will be about the same for us," said Halitzka. "It think it will be a little down. That conference had an adjustment. There are some teams that moved up from 2A that return a lot of players from last year."

Halitzka pointed to Charleston, Danville and Cossatot as some of the teams to look for in the other region.

COVID concerns has hurt the Bergman schedule, but the school almost filled it. "It has been miserable," said Halitzka about the schedule. "We lost 17 games. We had to replace games from three tournaments and seven classic games. Haas Hall dropped its program this year. We found 14 games, but we are still three games shy."

The Lady Panthers have not had many problems with the "Q" word.

"We have had two players quarantined this year," he said. "They were both at

the same time at the beginning of the school year. We have been able to practice together."

Now that the schedule is completed, the coached looked at some of the teams on his scheduled. He looked at Viola, Norfork, Elkins and Valley Springs as all being quality opponents.

There are 11 Lady Panthers on the roster this season, and seven of them could be in the lineup.

"There will be several player that will be rotating in and out of the starting lineup," said the coach.

Kara Ponder averaged 18.3 points a game last season for the Lady Panthers. She is a junior that is a good shooter. She was injured late in the season.

Maddi Holt is a sophomore that averaged 15.2 points a game last year as a freshman on the varsity squad. According to the coach, she is a natural scorer.

Karsen Edwards is a good athletic, well-rounded post player.

Kessa Willis didn't play much last season due to an injury. She did get to play in the postseason.

Abigail Hodges is a junior transfer from Mountain Home. "She will be a good addition," said Halitzka.

Tru Cartwright is a transfer from Western Grove. She is the only senior on the team.

Antlers have a wealth of talent for new coach

DEER — The Deer Antlers are getting a slow start, but expect the team to finish fast.

This season the team is being coach by Rick Napier.

"I didn't get the job until a few weeks before school started," said Napier. "We have to hit the ground running."

Running is at a slower pace than what the coach would like. Injuries have limited the amount of players in practice.

"We have eight players available right now," he said. "Two are injured."

Another concern that may slow down the Antlers is the COVID-19.

"It will take longer to get games completed," said the coach. "They will have to do some cleaning between games and everyone will have to leave. Our entry point for the games will be around the office area of the school. The exit will be through the gym lobby."

Another area of concern for the coach was getting a completed schedule put together. The team is not allowed to play in tournaments and classics.

"We have had to work on our schedule," he said. "We have 32 games in senior high and the limit is 34. We may add some more. We hope to play all of our games, but that could change in the blink of a second if someone comes down with it."

The Antlers just missed the regional tournament last season. The team has that and the state tournament on its mind this season. It's a goal that seems reachable for the squad.

"This league is going to be so equal from top to bottom," said the coach. "There will be exciting games every night."

Napier pointed to Ozark Mountain as the team to beat.

"Jasper has a lot of talent," he said. "You can never look past Coach (Mike) Parker. He is a good coach wherever he is coaching. His team at Jasper will be good.

"Kingston will be in the hunt," continued the coach. "Coach (Pat) Summers does a good job. They have a good pee wee program and that helps build his team. Lead Hill will be loaded. Rocky Dodson (Omaha) will be in the hunt. Mt. Judea

will be a little down, but they will get better."

Who ever makes it to the regional tournament will have some teams to watch.

"New School will always have a good team," stated Napier. "County Line and the Future School in Fort Smith could be tough."

Deer will be looking to use its natural attributes this season.

"We have some quickness and some great size," said Napier. "We are working extremely well together. We have four seniors that are baring down and playing hard."

With the injuries, the team is missing a key component.

"We don't have much depth," said the coach. "If we get in foul trouble, we are in trouble. We only have eight."

The veteran coach has a plan to cover his weakness.

"We are trying to use our speed as much as possible and get a little stronger on defense," stated the coach. "Instead of reaching, we will play better. We have to do a better job on the defensive end."

Deer will play a variety of defenses depending on the foul situation for the squad. The team will use man to matchup zones.

On the offensive end, the Antlers will have a game plan in mind before the game starts.

"We will do a lot of isolation," Napier stated. "We will isolate some of our better players. We will try to score on our entry into the offense. If we don't, we will work into our offense."

The Antlers will be looking for senior leadership this year. The squad has four seniors.

"Dale Dotson is a senior that can play any position," said the coach. "He can rebound it and get it up the floor. He goes to the board and gets the ball to the open person. He is deceptive around the basket. He is smart and can finish at the rim."

Another senior is Jonah Windel.

"He is a quiet kid," said the coach. "He has a 34 ACT. He is shooting about 55 to 60 percent behind the 3-point line. If he is open, he can shoot it. He will be a real big surprise."

Another player that will be a surprise for the Antlers is Kieran

Deer girls are accustomed to change

DEER — One thing that has been consistent for the Deer Lady Antlers is change. This season the Lady Antlers will have another new coach.

"I am their sixth coach in six years," said new coach Rick Napier, who stated that this is his 40th year to be involved in coaching."

However, with the new coach there is optimism for the upcoming season.

"We have potential," said the coach. "If we can keep silly turnovers — one's where we don't have a chance to stop them — we will have a chance in our games."

The development of the Lady Antlers has grown over the course of the school year.

"They are coming on," stated Napier. "If they get a couple of key wins early, I feel that it will build some confidence. They will have a shot at being in the top four of the conference this year."

Coming back to the league is Omaha, Lead Hill and Ozark Mountain. The trio spent time in the 1A-2 before being placed back into the conference by the Arkansas Activities Association.

Napier handicapped the league race this season.

"Ozark Mountain will be good," he started. "Kingston is always well coached and they return a lot of players. Jasper has a new system with a new coach and they would be good.

"Omaha's coach (Joe) McKinney will have his team ready," continued Napier. "They will be in the game. Lead Hill should be a little down this year."

When looking to the other region, the coach liked the chances of his conference.

"We barely got beat out of regionals last year by that conference's top team," he said. "Our region will be down a little bit. The other conference should be down. I wouldn't be surprised if all of our conference's team make it state."

Entering the season, Napier stated that the Lady Antlers will have a strategy to get things accomplished.

"We have to do things by committee," he said. "We really have to work together as a team."

Napier pointed to team speed as one of the things that the squad will have to overcome.

Another area that concerns the coach is his team not playing with confidence.

"I don't want them to revert back to how they were," he said. "Our goal is make the state tournament. We have to finish ahead of some teams to get there." As the goal is the state tournament, Napier likes what he sees in the team.

"They are a great group of girls," he said. "I think they are tired of losing. They are going to surprise a few teams this season."

Deer is getting prepared for the postseason run with a tough schedule. The team has scheduled several Class 2A and 3A schools this season. Cotter, Bergman, Eureka Springs, Hector, Green Forest and Decatur all play in higher classifications than the Lady Antlers.


The Lady Antlers have several returning players from last season. There are three seniors, a pair of juniors and three sophomores on the squad.

JASPER — The Jasper Pirates will blend classes this season.

Veteran basketball coach Mike Parker looks for athletes from every class to contribute to the team this year as the Pirates play in the revamped 1A-1East.

Alpena and New School have left the league and Lead Hill, Omaha and Ozark Mountain (a combination of Bruno-Pyatt, St, Joe and Western Grove) have joined the league.

"It is the same conference that I have been in before several times," said Mike Parker, who is entering his 24th season as a head coach and second at Jasper. "There are several up and coming teams in the league.

When asked to handicap the conference race, Parker replied.

"Ozark Mountain is pretty loaded this year," he said. "Omaha has a good bunch of young ones coming up. Lead Hill has most of their team back and should be good. Kingston has some good players and Deer has some athletes."

While the conference has a lot of familiar faces, the league will have a new

conference to compete against in regional play.

"It is going to be a tough region," Parker said. "New School got a new transfer from Lincoln that is going to be good. County Line is always loaded. They are both well coached. There will be no gimmes in the regional tournament."

Valley Springs leads the area with six boys titles and four girls banners.

The Flippin girls have won three and Marshall and Leslie have two each. Kingston and Alpena have one apiece.

Green Forest and Pyatt have two state title each while Jasper, Bergman, Marshall, Western Grove and Leslie have one apiece.

Titles seem to come in clusters. Valley Springs' boys won a title in 1950, 1951 and 1952. Green Forest's two titles were in 1967 and 1968.

Harrison scored their four titles in a five-year span. The Lady Goblins won a title in 2000, 2001, 2002 and 2004. Over a five year period, Flippin won its three titles. The Lady Bobcats claimed a title in 1984, 1985 and 1988.

Marshall got its two girl titles in 2007 and 2008 and Leslie got its two titles in back-to-back years in 1962 and 1963.

Winning has been in the Omaha blood line. The team was a regional squad last year and three years ago the squad won a contest in the state tournament.

This season has not been like most seasons with the possible threat of COVID-19. However, the Eagles have dodged the threat so far.

"It has really effected us," said the coach. "We had a couple of boys catch it over the summer, but we haven't had any this school year. We have had a few junior high kids that were quarantined this year."

As the team looks for a new set of starters this year, one of the obvious weaknesses shows its head.

"We don't have any experience," said the coach. "Outside of one player that played some last year, we don't have anyone with senior high experience. We are so young that we are going to be inconsistent. We only have 10 boys on the roster, so we don't have a lot of depth.

"They do work well together," continued the coach. "I think we will surprise some people."

With the new pandemic, high schools are not allowed to host tournaments or

play in events. This created some work for Dodson to fill up the schedule. He has strengthened the contests for the Eagles this year.

"It may not be the year to play our schedule," he said. "But we lost four games when Ozark Mountain consolidated. We lost our tournaments. We may take some lumps early, but it will pay off in the end.

"We have added Valley Springs and Bergman to our schedule," continued the coach. "We are taking a tour of the local bigger schools. We also have Berryville, Marshall, West Fork and the New School out of Fayetteville. We also play Hollister (Mo.) as well."

With a tough schedule, the team will have to be ready to defend.

"That is a good question," said Dodson when he was asked about what type of defense the team would play this season. "We have been pressure defense and some full court, but with this group we will probably do a halfcourt defense. We will use a matchup."

A matchup zone is familiar to the Eagles.

"We have used it some in junior high last year," said the coach. "They are familiar with it. It could be a trial and error thing this season."

On the offensive end, the team is planning to take advantage of its size.

"We are going to be more of a ground and pound team," Dodson said. "We aren't quite as much of an up and down team as we were the past few years. We are going to try to get to the free throw as much as we can."

After spending the last two years with teams to the east in conference play, the Eagles are back in the Heart of the Ozarks.

"I like our travel a lot better than before," said the coach as the team has lost several two hour bus rides this year. "We are back to the familiar."

The coach sees a clear front runner in the race, but not a clear top tier of teams.

"Ozark Mountain will be the team to beat," he said. "Those three schools coming together really helped them. After that, it is pretty well wide open.

"Kingston is back in our conference and they will be pretty good," said Dodson. "Deer has some talent. Lead Hill will be good, Coach (Mike) Parker at Jasper always puts a good product on the floor. It is pretty wide open. It

With a young group, it is not hard to pick out the potential weakness of the




