Welcome to the John Paul Hammerschmidt Men and Women of Distinction luncheon

Our sponsor, Arvest Bank and The Harrison Daily Times is excited to honor this year's community volunteers and leaders. We also congratulate the two North Arkansas College students who will each receive a \$1,000 scholarship for their education.

The Women of Distinction began in 2011 and the Men of Distinction in 2015. Since that time, more than \$26,000 has been raised for scholarships and 123 outstanding men and women from the area have been honored for their service and passion they have poured into the community.

The honorees continue the tradition of character and selflessness of the late Congressman John Paul Hammerschmidt. U.S. Marine Corps Vietnam veteran Matt Russell was chosen by the community as a Man of Distinction.

M a t t admits after serving four years in the Marines, he was quiet and

withdrawn. It wasn't until he began helping other veterans discover the services and benefits they were owed that he came out of his "shell."

Before he became the president of the Camp Jack Board of Directors, he served veterans in five Arkansas counties as the Commander of the Baughman-Conner Post 2881 and Veterans of Foreign Wars for more than 10 years. He's also been a member of the Boone County War Memorial Association. Matt authors a weekly column for the Harrison Daily Times that features information about the resources available to veterans and the services of Camp Jack.

"Since the military, all the companies I've worked for, or start-ups I began have prepared me with the skills needed to serve this community with the help of lots of volunteers to see Camp Jack blossom into the tremendous resource center it is becoming," Matt said. "Even my carpentry skills were learned

at a previous job," he laughed.

He often can be seen sweeping the facility, setting up for an event, acquiring grants, planning fundraising events or building a ramp for a veteran in a wheelchair.

A friend said, "Matt is a community leader who gives of his time, talent and treasure ... all unpaid ... always with a smile. His work is about and for all the veterans who served, never about himself. He is smart, humble, caring, gentle and determined. A Marine forever, he is a shining example of the late John Paul Hammerschmidt's servant leadership approach to accomplishment."



Greg Satterfield grew up in the area and feels he is blessed to be a blessing to others. As a professional certified public accountant, he was highly successful and respected. Upon returning to the Harrison area in 1993, he continued his active accounting career as vice president of tax

services for FedEx Services for 20 years until he retired in 2013.

Since retiring, not only does he run a large cattle farm on his family land in Green Forest, he has been an active volunteer at Share and Care and serves on their Board of Directors. He often volunteers at the Sharing Kitchen which feeds people of the community on Friday, Saturday and Sunday. Greg also serves as the Share and Care financial director.

When the Salvation Army and Share and Care came to an agreement to pool resources instead of duplicating them, he regularly volunteers to organize the Bell Ringing fundraiser at Christmas, and often fills in as a bell ringer when needed.

Serving in his church at First Christian is also very important to him. He has taught Sunday School, served as a member of the Men's Fellowship and Stewardship committee and chair of the World Outreach Program.

A friend said, "To know Greg is to see someone in the community who is certainly humble and kind. He certainly sets an example of service and inspires others to do likewise. I have observed Greg as someone who has tremendous concern for others in need whether they are having health or financial issues. With his history of service and obvious concern for others, I feel he is someone that we should recognize as a Man of Distinction."

Administration (as it was known then) where Fred had a lot of interaction with the late John Paul Hammerschmidt. "He taught me once you win a political office, you work for all the people — not just those who voted for you."


As "Farmer Fred," he has invited first-graders to his farm to be around his beloved rescued Mustangs. Fred is getting ready to participate in a Mustangs for Vet program to help Camp Jack reach veterans who need to pour themselves into a wild mustang to rescue.

Fred has been known to pull the horse trailer onto the property of a retirement/nursing home and allow the residents to watch his horses do "tricks."

Part of the 200 missions Fred completed in Iraq was to teach the farmers the best practices for farming. Prior to

the U.S. military rescuing their county, the Iraqi government dictated what Iraqi nationals planted and were paid no matter what condition the crop resulted in. But when it became their source of income, the Americans knew the nationals needed to be taught better farming practices.

A friend said, "Fred is a great example of a caring citizen. He deserves to be recognized as a Man of Distinction."


Patsy is also the first to say that she is just one of the many volunteers serving the community.












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Dianna Grace

getting to know each pet living in the shelter.

Kay's dedication to shelter animals as well as her extensive professional business practices got her elected to coordinator volunteers. In 2017, she was elected president (chairperson) of the

Ozark Humane Society Board of Directors.

Kay's volunteer status allows her to oversee the animal shelter and thrift store, "Cause for Paws."

The budget of approximately \$270,000 per year includes a manager for the shelter and thrift store and seven full-time employees.

In 2021, the Ozark Humane Society had 203 homeless dogs and 105 homeless cats adopted. Kay has also set up a partnership with rescues in Colorado to find homes for approximately 29 shelter animals totaling 145 over the past five years.

Kay is often seen speaking to community civic groups and recruiting volunteers to walk dogs and love on puppies and kittens to acclimate them to humans.

A friend said, "Not only is she busy with the day-to-day operations of this non-profit organization, implementing new ideas and overseeing so many details, but she also still makes time to walk the dogs at the shelter, getting to know each homeless pet." Kay Watters

Kay Watters grew up visiting the area as a child and fell in love with the Ozarks. After retiring from a national sales company in Chicago in 2011, she and her husband Barry retired to the area and built a home on Mount Sherman to be close to her mother.

Kay quickly busied herself making friends and volunteering at the Ozark Humane Society Shelter. Her favorite job as a volunteer is walking the dogs and


