#### BERRYVIILE IS UNDER DIRECTION OF CHERMAK

ERRYVILLE — Excitement has filled the air for the new Berryville football season.

Part of that excitement comes with the hiring of a new head coach.

Mack Chermak took the position in the spring and is ready to show the community his team.

Chermak, who served the last four seasons as defensive coordinator at Coweta, Okla., brings collegiate and high school coaching experience to the Bobcats.

Chermak knows that there will be a learning curve for his Bobcats as they adapt to his system.

"Every head coach is different and with that different expectations and ways of doing things," said the coach. "This team has been very malleable and coachable. They've adjusted very well to my personality and ways of doing things." Coming into the season, there are a few players that are taking on different roles.

"We have two seniors that will have to be very versatile for us," said Chermak. "Nick Utt and Talen Hill both have to be able to play on the offensive and defensive line, but also roles like linebacker and fullback when we need them. Both are terrific young men who will play any role the team needs them to."

A new coach always looks to his seniors to help develop his

program. The coach has been impressed with the class.
"The senior class is a small group," he started. "But, they are great young men who are doing a great job of leading by example. Carlos Barrios. Alex Figerna. Zane Gentry. Samuel.

example. Carlos Barrios, Alex Figeroa, Zane Gentry, Samuel Hasuman, Talan Hill, Lucas Pierce and Nick Utt will be our leaders in the lockerroom.

"The senior class is doing a better and better job leading the team," continued the coach. "I would definitely say that Talan Hill and Lucas Pierce are separating themselves a bit from the pack with how well they are leading."

Chermak pointed to Talan Hill as the "heart of the team."
While the seniors will be leaders on and off the field, the coach has tapped a few players that will be expected to do a solid job on the field.

"Decimus Ruiz is at quarterback and Andre Esparza is at running back and they will definitely be key players on offense," said Chermak. "On the line, we need to find ways to get Talan Hill and David Moreno in position to make plays." Chermak went on to comment about Esparza as a sophomore will make a big impact on the team.

"Andre Esparza has been a key piece of the puzzle for us." said the coach. "A sophomore that starts at running back on offense and linebacker on defense and most special teams. The hard part is finding him some rest."

When asked about the most improved players this year, the

cnach commented.

"It is tough to say with this being my first year here," he started. "It looks like Decimus Ruiz is throwing the ball better. He is definitely playing with the confidence of a second year starter. Lucas Pierce is another second year starter that seems to be on his way to being a big time player for us at corner, receiver, and punter."


The Bobcats have some challenges that lay before them. "Attendance," was Chermak's answer about challenges. "There are a lot of legitimate reasons to miss practice, but a lot more illegitimate reasons to miss practice. We suffer from both right now. It takes a lot of work to be good at something, we need to be at football practice to be good at football."

Even though he is new to the Bobcat program and the 4A-1, the coach knows who to look for at the top of the heap. "Elkins," he answered about the toughest game of the season. "They are very athletic and like every team in this conference, well coached. It's also our homecoming so it will mean a lot to us."

When asked which game the team is motivated to win, the coach gave a similar answer.

"Elkins," was the repeat answer. "I was lucky enough to poach my offense coordinator from their staff."

The Tigers will use a pro style set to be ready to move the ball this year. The team has had a lot of players that have stepped up over the summer to help lead the team.

Green Forest has had several players that has impressed the coach. He commented on three in particular.

"Brityn Gilliam has taken owership of the quarterback position," said Tibbitt. "He has been a leader all summer. Ridge Gordon-Swofford has had a great summer and is in better shape and looks better than he did as a sophomore.

"Colton Fancher has high energy," continued the coach. "He is a leader on defense.

When the Tigers have the football, Tibbitt expects Gordon-Swofford and Braden Epperly to be the players to get it done for Green Forest.

Tibbitt pointed to Epperly and Victor Cervantis as the most improved players on the squad when comparing last season's and this year's squad.

The youth movement of the Tigers have produced some players. that will be in the lineup early.

"Gabe Serna, Axel Ochoa, Kasen Robinson and Colton Fancher will all have an immediate impact for us," said Tibbitt. "All four will be immediate starters as sophomores."

When asked who are the leaders on offense and defense. Tibbitt

"On defense we will look to Fancher and Carlos Lemus," stated the coach. "On offense it will by Gilliam and Victor Cervantis." Tibbitt tapped Gilliam as the heart of the team.

"He has really grown into his leadership role," he said.

Gilliam will be the starting quarterback this year.
Tibbitt mentioned his work ethic has really improved this year.
"His arm is pretty accurate," said the coach. "He's worked hard to develop more strenath."

The strength of the team will be the backfield.

"We are deeper than in years past," he stated. "Our goal is to pick up three or four yards on every carry.

There is a good news, bad news situation with the receiving corp. The team has a returning starter back, but the rest of the

group is young.
"Braden Epperly is a returning starter and lead receiver coming back," stated Tibbitt, "The rest of the corp is very young and inexperienced."

That doesn't worry Tibbitt much.

"We feel like we have the best guys in the right positions," he said.

It is a tale of two sides for the offensive line of Green Forest. "We are big on one side and quick on the other side." said the

The linemen have battled all summer on improving their tech-

"Yes," answered Tibbitt when asked if the line could open holes and protect the quarterback. "They've been working that all summer"

The Tiger defensive line might get over looked.

"We are small," started the coach. "We don't have much depth

Green Forest may have some players play on both side of the line this season. Tibbitt commented that would happened if needed and sometimes it would be situational.

The Tigers will be mostly a three front this year.

Green Forest will bring four linebackers this season. "I would say that is their strength," said Tibbitt when asked if the aroup was quick to the ball.

He calls the linebackers a decent hitting squad.



The coach is already making comments about winning the last regular season game of the year against Green Forest. When asked about which game that stands out, he replied, "Green Forest for obvious reasons."

Berryville starts the season on Sept. 1. The squad will host West Fork. Then the group hits the road for the next two weeks to complete the non-conference portion of the schedule. The Bobcats will travel to Greenland Magazine.

Conference football starts at home for the Bobcats. They will face Ozark on Sept. 22 in the first week of 4A-1 play. After a trip to Gentry the team is home for homecoming with Elkins.

A trip to Gravette is followed by home games with Huntsville and Lincoln.

The shortest trip of the season will be on Nov. 3 as the team heads to Green Forest.

As the team starts the season, the innate attributes of football will have to kick in for the team to be successful in

"Really, really good," answered Chermak about his team's chemistry. "With a handful of new players coming in, we will see how that proceeds."

He feels that his team's biggest asset is the ability to "fly under the radar."

For the Bobcats to be successful this year, the team and coaching staff will have to be on the same page.

"How well this comes together and buys in" said Chermak on the key to success this season.

Berryville has a weakness that Chermak would like to fix auickly.

"Inexperience for sure," he said. "There are a lot of changes and they have to be willing and able to adjust."
Cherrmak brings a new style of offense to the Bobcats this

"Soread." he said when asked about the new offense. "Inside and outside zone."

Berryville will be using a two quarterback system to run this offense.

"One of them does have an accurate arm and one doesn't." said Chermak about his quarterbacks. "One will beat you with their legs and one with their arm."

An area that Chermak doesn't find depth is in the backfield. "No," he said about having a large amount of ball carriers. "We've lost some key players and multiple of them were running backs."

Despite not having many running backs. The coach feels that the team can pick up three or four yards on every play.

The wide receivers can develop into the Robcats. "We are very

a bright spot for deep at wide

receiver." said the



down away from football."


Social media is not a distraction for the coach. "I still have Faebook."

"I just have Facebook," he said. "I don't believe in any of that junk. I am old school. I do use Facebook to keep in touch with old players and family members that live off."


Crain didn't know how many Facebook friends that he had or how to find out the number.

"I'm old school," he laughed.


When asked if he was a dog or cat person, Crain was quick to answer.

"Colin has had a history of knee issues throughout his career," stated Keylon. "His dedication to the weight room and building his body will make him a really good football player." There are players that are stepping up to lead the Goblins this season, but Keylon also points to the tremendous growth by the entire team.

Mason Ketterman has become a leader and has had huge growth from his sophomore year until now," started Keylon on Harrison's growth. "Braden Long has impressed me because of his work ethic; Jayce Straub because of his intelligence and capitalizing on being a starter for us. "Lee Catt has really impressed us since the spring," continued the coach. "He has really come on. especially on defense. In our spring game, he was the player of the game. But honestly and this is not coach speak, I'm impressed with every one of our kids. The reason is because of their work ethic and attitude. It is so much easier to coach when your kids work hard, give great effort and

care. Our entire team does this. We will need this approach this year due to the opportunity to overcome some inexperience we have."

Keylon found another asset of

Keylon found another asset of the Goblins this season — team chemistry.

"I feel like it is really good," he said. "We can always get better. Historically, there is a slight division between seniors and sophomores. We have to close that gap some. This year, I see our older guys more involved in helping our younger players which is a great thing for our team chemistry."

team chemistry."
While the team has great work ethic, toughness and great attitudes, Keylon may see a chink in the armor.

"Due to inexperience, when things don't go our way, we need to have the mental toughness to overcome obstacles," said the coach about areas that may have to be addressed. "I think we will do that, but with inexperienced players you never know until the fight starts. We will help them navigate this."

When the team takes the field, the coach knows what the key to success

will be this year.
"It will be overcoming our inexperience on the offensive and defensive line," he said. "Also, we need to be consistent in staying in the fight and overcoming obstacles as they approach. We have a good foundation to do this with our team's work ethic

and attitude."

Overcoming the inexperience will start at the first of the season in the non-conference contests. This will push the Goblins to get better for the long road of the 5A-West.

"I think there will be several for different reasons," started the coach when asked about the toughest game of the season. "Springdale will be running a new offense, the flexbone. That is a difficult offense to stop. Mountain Home will be much improved. Coach (Steve) Ary has done an unbelievable job there, which we all knew he would. They have some very talented kids on their team.

"Within the conference, Shiloh Christian is always loaded with talent," he continued. "We played very poorly against them last year. We are excited to face them at home this year. Farmington will be a very tough matchup this year. They are a very well coached football team all around."

Keylon points to a flaw from last season that he will be correcting this

"One of the mistakes we made last year I believe is getting too excited or not excited enough to play certain opponents," said the coach. "We need to have the same approach to each game in terms of focus and being ready to play.

"But with that said, there are several games that are very important to

us," he continued. "The opener versus Springdale. Your first game is always important. Mountain Home due to the rivalry. Farmington and Shiloh Christian because of how good they are. Prairie Grove will be a game for us that we need to show up ready to play. Last year, we lost to them. All the credit goes to their staff and kids. They did a wonderful job fighting us, running their offense and not quitting. We didn't show up that night with the right mindset. We will not make that mistake again this year."

Keylon expects the Goblins to be at the top of the conference standing when the season is over.

Goblin fans should not expect to see a new offense trot on the field at F.S. Garrison Stadium.

"We will run the same offense we have for the past eight years in terms of plays." Keylon stated. "We will have some new formations this year and will base out of a two back and one tight end set."

Ketterman is ready to be under center this year.

"I have a ton of confidence in Mason," said Keylon. "He has a strong arm for sure. His accuracy has gotten better year-over-year. I gauge that by all of our competitions this summer in seven-on-seven and team camps." When it comes to the backfield, the Goblins are solid in that position. "We have six or seven guys that can play right now," he said.

"Yes, but that is dependent upon the offensive line play," Keylon said about picking up three or four yards on each play. "Each of these guys have the capability to go the distance when they touch it. But our running game is only as good as our offensive line." Keylon feels that his receiving group is ready for the spotlight and that they have the intangibles to play the position.

"What I like is that every receiver brings something different to this position," he said of the Goblins. "I feel good about our receiving corp. J. Henry Brandt has become a powerful, big, fast receiver. Jon Bartlett has had a great summer. He is a tough kid. You will see others play this position this year like Lucas Brumley, Brody Burge, Jackson Criner and others."

Protecting the quarterback and backfield is important.

Keylon thinks that his offensive line has the size and the strength to get his accomplished.

The coach likes what he sees in his blossoming defensive line. The squad will have to overcome no game experience as the season progresses. It is no secret that the Goblins bring the linebackers on defense. Keylon is happy with his crew and doesn't plan on changing much.

"Our inside linebackers are quick to the ball," he said. "We blitz a lot. We have four inside backers that are excellent blitz guys, but also can read well too."

The linebacking group brings a twinkle to Keylon's eyes.

"The linebacker position is near and dear to my heart," he started. "I played this position in college, so I have an extra interest in this position. I absolutely love our linebackers and the way they play the game. They are physical, smart and have a thirst to get to the football."

Änother bright spot of the Goblin defense is the secondary.

"I've been pleased with our secondary play this summer," commented Keylon. "They are coached well, have an identity and they take pride in what they do."

When asked if there was enough speed in the secondary, the coach replied.

"You can never have enough speed in the secondary," he laughed. "We are adequately fast, but not overly fast. We make up for it with smart football play in executing the fundamentals of our coverages and being smarter than the opponent."

The special teams will be a work in progress for Harrison. It is not that it will be bad, but the Goblins have not solidified the players expect to contribute there.

"We are in the infancy stages of our special team work." he said. "They will be good though. I have high expectations this year for this group. We will need several key plays out of special teams this year to win us some games."

One area that Keylon will not worry about is kicking.

Burge will be back for the Goblins. The senior was an All-Conference kicker last season.

"He could hit one from 40 yards," said the coach on his distance. "He was very accurate last year and I anticipate him being better this year. He already has a college offer from Evangel to kick in college."

The punter will be Ketterman or Owe

The punter will be Ketterman or Owen Strode. The coach said both do good jobs.

A return man is still not determined. "We are still in the process of determining who this will be," said the coach. "But speed is part of the attributes they will have to have to play this position. The second piece of it is that they have to have great hands to play as a returner."

Keylon is happy to be home in Harrison.

"I am excited and honored to coach our kids and work with our staff," concluded Keylon. "We look forward to getting this kicked off and having a lot of fun."

#### LINEBACKER ROOM FULL OF YOUNG PLAYERS

AYETTEVILLE — Travis Williams has a linebacker room that has a mixture
 of young players, sophomores and transfers, but he feels very confident in

the job they can do.

Williams not only coaches the linebackers but serves as the defensive coordinator. His room is led by redshirt sophomore Pooh Paul and sophomore Jordan Crook. A pair of transfers are also making an impact. They are South Florida's Antonio Grier Jr. and Cincinnati's Jaheim Thomas. Three freshmen, Alex Sanford, Carson Dean and Brad Spence also are drawing praise. "You can tell the guys like each other," Williams said. "Bringing high school guys in and guys out of the portal with guys that were already here and trying to put it all together. First of all, the guys like each other. Efford is really what we've been kind of honing in on, and trying to fly to the ball. The great thing is they're trying to do exactly what we're asking them to do. We tell them there's going to be stuff we have to correct every day, but control what you can control. It's fun to coach those guys."

Paul was nursing a minor injury last Saturday and didn't scrimmage. That gave Thomas a chance to get more reps. In 29 games with the Bearcats, Thomas had 95 tackles, including 34 solo, seven for loss, 2.5 sacks and three quarterback hurries. Williams liked what he saw.

"It was good to get him out there and get those scrimmage reps," Williams said. "He didn't go through spring ball at the last place he was at, and to get him some live reps was always good. And we went in with the mindset to get him a lot of reps just to see if he could work the rust off or whatever you want to say. He did a really good job. He's doing a good job. Very smart, very detailed, takes a lot of notes. I'm happy he's with us."

Paul started the Missouri and Kansas games last year, but played a lot while Bumper Pool was nursing an injury. Crook started the bowl game against Kansas when Drew Sanders opted out. Grier played 48 games at USF compiling 238 tackles, 139 solo, 23.5 for loss, 10 sacks, five forced fumbles, two recovered, a pair of interceptions, six quarterback hurries and three pass breakups.

"All three of those guys are doing a great job," Williams said. "It's a new defense for all of those guys. What's always exciting is to see the growth and football IQ and learning what we're doing and different concepts. All of those guys have a good football IQ. All of those guys love to come to work and come out to oractice. It's been good.

"Pooh is very detailed. He takes pride in his performance. Same thing with Crook. Same thing with Antonio. Even when you watch them in the summer workouts and the way those guys bond together and work together. We need all of them. We need everybody in that room. We talk in the terms of we don't have starters, we have standards. If you uphold the standard, you will play. All of those guys work well together. I'm proud of all three."

The freshmen are also competing for playing time. Spence and Dean enrolled at midterm and Sanford in June.

"I think all three guys have bright futures here," Williams said. "All of them have a great pace of being able to help us at some point this year on special teams and maybe on the defense. All of those guys have a skillset and you can see they are SEC players. Brad Spence is one we're putting at so many different positions because he can do so much, but all those guys have high ceilings and we're very, very happy with their progress right now."

Williams was asked if there's any specific intengibles involving the three true freshmen?

"I take all three of those guys and just shoutout to their high school coaches," Williams said. "All of those guys learn ball pretty quickly and easily. Like Brad Spence is doing some really good things out there. Carson Dean is doing some really good things. Alex didn't go through spring ball and you can just see right now he's just running to the ball as fast as he can go. He likes to play physical and he's learning the system. He's just 12 days into practice, but you can see the skillset in all three of those guys."

It wasn't just Thomas that got some extra reps and stepped up with Paul out. Crook also took advantage of the situation.

#### RUNNING BACKS SHINE FOR RAZORBACKS

AYETTEVILLE — Arkansas' deepest position on the team might be running back.

The Hogs return junior Raheim "Rocket" Sanders who finished second in the SEC in rushing last year. Sanders carried 222 times for 1,443 yards and 10 touchdowns. He also caught 28 passes for 271 yards and two touchdowns. Behind Sanders is junior AJ Green, sophomore Rashod Dubinion, redshirt junior Dominique Johnson and true freshman Isaiah Augustave. The group along with some walk-on backs were all at the first practice Friday morning.

Sam Pittman obviously is very pleased with this group and likes what he has. He also paid a compliment to Jimmy Smith, who coaches the running backs.

"Yeah, you know a good coach keeps his players out of my office," Pittman said. "Now, they come in to visit but it's not ... "Hey, hey ..." Jimmy does a great job. They respect him. Obviously we haven't oone in the portal there, so that means

two things to me: We're recruiting really well there, and, two, there's not conflicts in there. There could be, because you've got some good players in there. Dommo [Dominique Johnson] now, I believe, is going into Year 4 with us. Rocket and AJ is three. With R-Dub, I think he was the offensive MVP of the bowl game and all kinds of stuff. I just think we're very talented in there

"R-Dub had his best summer by far. He's in shape. There's power of being in shape. It's powerful. It fills a lot of confidence being in shape, and he's in good shape. Then Isaiah [Augustave], he's big and can run. I like him. I don't know how fast he's ... he's picking up things, smart, but he's a big, good-looking kid that can run. We'll see if we can't get him in there. But you know right now we've got a whole lot of guys that need a lot of touches, especially with Domo coming back. Domo is a little bigger than what he has been before, so we'll see what kind of shape he's in."

Johnson is coming off two ACL injuries and hoping for a healthy season. In 2021, Johnson played in all 13 games and started six of them. He rushed for 575 yards and seven touchdowns

Sanders is up to 242 pounds and Pittman was asked if he can handle that much weight?

"Can't do nothing about it," Pittman said laughing. "You'd have to cut skin. I mean, you pinch him and nothing moves. There's nothing you can do about it. We talked to the nutritionist about it and we talked to Ben (Sowders) about it. He's 242 and there's no fat there. So I don't know what you do with it. But he's in shape."

The team entered Friday's early practice in relatively good health. Obviously cornerback Quincey McAdoo isn't practicing after being involved in an automobile accident last spring. "(Wynne offensive lineman) Terry Wells would be one that is going to be out for a while," Pittman said. "He tore his pec. Man, he's had some bad luck. But Terry would be one, so we just activate someone else. That would be one, and I think the rest of them, now there will be some like (Dominique Johnson), we're not just going to run him out there and let him do everything. He will be at every position drill, every team drill, he just might not take as many team drills as he might late, early."

"He just walked in the room, so I can't really say too much," Williams said laughing. "Really good skillset, smart, can change direction and he brings length

to the room. He can cover out of the backfield. He's doing a really good job for us."

He also added what Thomas is like behind the scenes.

"Quiet," Thomas said. "Quiet. You see him in the back right now. He's not saying anything. He don't say anything in the meetings. He'll ask questions, but quiet and very detailed. A pro. Takes notes. He'll come talk to you one-on-one and ask questions. He's one of those guys that just loves ball and is always taking notes down and getting the fine details of everything."

Harrison redshirt junior linebacker Brooks Both is also expected to make an impact this season.
"Brooks Both is improving," Williams said. "Brooks Both, man, he gets a lot of reps for us on special teams and defense. He's very valuable to our team." He's someone who may help on special teams?
"There ain't no probably," Williams said. "He is. Coach (Scott) Fountain loves him, because he does a great job. He does a good job of coming to work everyday and we're proud he's on our team. He really helps us out a lot."

Both played in nine games in 2022. Both and the Razorbacks will hold a closed scrimmage on Saturday.
