Berryville is ready to get on solid footing

ERRYVILLE — The Berryville Bobcats are ready to return the pride to the school's football team. They will take a step toward that goal this season.

The team won three games last season while scoring 11.2 points a game. The Bobcats gave up 33 points a contest last season.

This year the team will open the conference season with a game against Huntsville at home. Berryville's schedule works in their favor as they have six home games this season.

After facing the Eagles, the Bobcats will face a loaded Elkins team on the road. Elkins is expected to be a top team in the 4A-1 this year.

The Bobcats remain on the road in the third week of conference play. The team travels to Prairie Grove to meet the Tigers who are returning to Class 4A after spending a cycle in Class 5A. The Tigers were members of the 5A-West.

Berryville will start to make a move toward the playoff picture as they face Gravette at home on Oct. 18. This will be a pivotal game in the league race.

After a trip to Gentry the next week, the Bobcats get Lincoln at home.

Berryville ends the regular season with the Carroll County Super Bowl against Green Forest. They Tigers won the contest last year, 16-6. The game will be held in Berryville.

The Bobcats have been enduring practice this summer and like other teams, they have been battling the heat.

"We have up and down," said secondyear coach Mack Chermak. "We are doing pretty well. When the heat hits, we struggle some."

Berryville comes into the season with some leadership.

"We have a core group of seniors that have been together for a while," said the coach. "They want to have a good season this year."

When looking at the team, Chermak points to what is the most veteran part of the team.

"We have and offensive and defensive line that has experience," he said. "They have the experience that we need there."

The Bobcats do have some size on the line. Two players top the scales above 285 while two more are in the 240 range.

Chermak said that his center may be undersized, but he is a smart player that is strong.

Coming into the season, the Bobcats could have a two-headed monster at quarterback. One quarterback is a returning starter from last season and the other is a sophomore.

If the sophomore gets the starting nod, then the veteran quarterback will be the running back. The coach stated that the ball needs to be in his hands.

The Bobcats should have a solid backfield. There can be several players that can handle the football for the team as

the season progresses. The players will all see time on the field.

"We have good emerging players," said Chermak. "We will be using them both ways, so we have to rotate them in on different series to keep them fresh."

The receivers will be a good group of players.

"We are young there," he said. "They are a good group, but young. We need our receivers to block. They run good routes.

"They are coming into the concept of what their routes mean," the coach continued. "They are coming along."

The receiving group will also be the secondary on the defensive side of the football. The team will be young in the possession and it lacks experience in a pass-happy conference.

It will be a mix of old and young at the linebacking positions.

"They are very coachable," said Chermak. "We will be missing a key player due to injury. We hope to get him back before the season is over."

Seat warms for Pittman, with hopes of fixes on defense

AYETTEVILLE—Sam Pittman acknowledges what he faces heading into the 2024 season, his fifth as Arkansas football coach. Another year like the last and he likely will no longer carry that title in December.

The Razorbacks are coming off a 4-8 season with a 1-7 record in the Southeastern Conference. It was the team's fourth season in the last seven in which they won just one SEC game. A big reason Pittman is getting another shot is that he led Arkansas to 9-4 and 7-6 records the previous two years. Those two seasons, combined with the good vibes created shortly after Chad Morris' two 2-10 seasons, bought some good will.

Those two quality seasons now feel like forever ago, partly because the Razorbacks lost five one-score games last season. Pittman believes that can change.

"I really like this team, and I think with the culture and the tightness of the team, I think you can win those games a little bit easier than if it's the other way," he said.

Petrino's back

Former head coach Bobby Petrino has returned to Fayetteville. His stint as head coach ended ignominiously in 2011 after a motorcycle wreck and subsequent scandal involving a female staffer. His publicimage rehabilitation tour started in 2013 at Western Kentucky and has seen him make stops at Louisville, Missouri State, UNLV, Texas A&M and now back where things went awry, this time as offensive coordinator.

Green Forest looking for successful seaso

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REEN FOREST — The Green Forest Tigers are looking forward to the new football season.

Tiger fans will think that they are seeing double when looking at the sidelines. Those fans would be right.

"We have about 50 kids out," said Green Forest coach Greg Tibbitt who is entering his fifth season at the position. "Doubling our numbers has been verv helpful."

The preseason has seen the Tigers working hard and developing the players into a team.

"We had a really good summer," said the coach of his team. "We return about eight or nine players on both sides of the ball. Couple that with good leadership from our seniors and juniors, it could be an exciting year."

The Tigers run a Spread offense and they are looking solid in the passing attack.

With a senior quarterback back to lead the team, the Tigers will be ready to move the football.

However, the Tigers have weapons in the backfield that will dominate play.

The coach stated that the shot callers for the team had a good summer. "They are grasping the offense better. The commitment has opened up new avenues than what we have had in the past."

"It is no secret that it runs downhill for us." he said of the running back

stable. "We want to run some RPOs with the Spread out there. But it goes through our backfield."

Green Forest has depth in the backfield that can provide difference looks in the running game.

Tibbitt likened the backfield to "the old thunder and lightning approach."

Green Forest averaged 21.8 points a game last season. This year the Tigers look get more.

When it comes to the receivers, the Tigers have a veteran group of players that will be snagging the ball.

"We have two players that are threeyear starters and one that is a two-year

starter for us," said Tibbitt. "They are really doing a great job of catching and running routes. They are understanding what we are trying to do. The have really bought into the system."

The Tiger offensive line has 60 percent of the starters

back. The right side and the center are all returning to the team. The two left side players will be sophomores that will be helping the squad. "They are really doing a good job," said the coach. "We have some size on the line."

Green Forest's defense will have a different look this season. "Those guys are playing extremely fast," he said. "We return several players on that side of the football."

The Tigers return a pair of starters on the front of the defensive line.

"We will use a six-man rotation for the spots up front," said Tibbit.

Another area where the team has experience is at the inside linebacker position.

"We have two returners on the inside," he said of the position. "We will rotate several players on the outside. We have a lot of speed coming back for us."

Using several of the receivers in the secondary, the Tigers bring in a group of players that have a lot of experience of defending in the conference.

"We are very solid in the secondary," said Tibbitt. "We have two three-year starters and a two-year starter backs.

"We will have a lot of depth back," he continued. "We have a lot of leadership in the first group and we will have the opportunity to rotate a lot of guys,"

Green Forest is coming off a fourwin season and will be ready to take another step in its victory totals this vear.

The Tigers will open on the road in Hollister, Mo. The team will host West Fork before ending the non-conference schedule with a trip to Greenland.

Opening up the league schedule on the road, the Tigers will play one of the league favorites in Prairie Grove.

Gravette will be the first home league game and then the Tigers hit the road to play Gentry.

Lincoln and Elkins are the next two home opponents and the last games in Tiger Stadium in the regular season.

Green Forest closes the season on the road at Huntsville and Berrvville.



"Not only do I think he's a wonderful offensive coordinator, he also was a very successful head coach," Pittman said. "So there is a lot of times where I'm able to run things by him and we decide collectively at times what is best for the University of Arkansas football team."

Fix-it list

Arkansas will be better if its offensive line doesn't exhibit the same sieve-like tendencies it did last year. Razorbacks quarterbacks were sacked 47 times, the sixth-most allowed in the Bowl Subdivision. Run blocking was little better as Arkansas' 139 yards per game ranked 89th.

Three new likely starters have come

roster.

Former Boise State quarterback Taylen Green will replace KJ Jefferson, who transferred to UCF. Green spent most of the last two seasons as the Broncos starter, though he threw for fewer than 2.000 vards with 11 touchdowns and nine interceptions last season. Still, Pittman decided last spring the newcomer will be Arkansas' starter. When he isn't

passing, Green will

likely be handing the ball most often to Ja'Quinden Jackson, a transfer from Utah. Jackson led the Utes with 797 vards rushing last year while splitting duties with Javlon Glover.

Low expectations?

Even with Petrino's return and some personnel changes, the Razorbacks were picked 14th in the expanded 16-team Southeastern Conference. Pittman is embracing the pressure.

"Our expectations are as high as they've ever been for this season coming up," he said.

The schedule

The Razorbacks don't have to SEC juggernauts Alabama or Georgia on the schedule but still face seven teams ranked in preseason AP Top 25. That includes away games against No. 17 Oklahoma State (Sept. 7), No. 20 Texas A&M (Sept. 28) and No. 11 Missouri (Nov. 30) but the rest are at home: Tennessee, LSU, Ole Miss and Texas. Arkansas opens the season in Little Rock against Arkansas-Pine Bluff on Aug. 29.



Robinson ready to use size, speed for Hogs

AYETTEVILLE — Arkansas signed an outstanding recruiting class from the transfer portal after a disappointing 4-8 season.

One of the the top additions is South Alabama cornerback Marquise Robinson. At 6-foot-1, 190-pounds, Robinson has the size and speed to make an instant impact with the Hogs. Following Saturday's practice, Robinson explained where his nickname Cuddie came from.

"When I was born, my auntie and my mom... It was really two reasons," Robinson said. "So, the first reason was it was a toy at McDonald's back then, in 2002. I don't know nothing about it. And it was like it was called a whatnot. And the second reason was it was this movie and the guy was smooth as butter. So, my mom and dad was like, I was smooth as the kid. So, ever since I was a baby, everybody called me 'Cuddie.' Even my professors. So, when I heard that I was like, 'Yeah it's a wrap.'"

At South Alabama in 2023, Robinson had 36 tackles, 2.5 for loss, three interceptions, three pass breakups and a fumble recovery in 13 games. Robinson and his teammates shocked Oklahoma State 33-7 in Stillwater. In that game, Robinson had three tackles and a second-quarter interception that set up a touchdown. Robinson and the Hogs will return to Stillwater on Saturday, Sept. 14, this season. Robinson was asked what he remembers from that game? "The first thing I remember when I think about that game is I should have scored," Robinson said. "That's the first thing. But the second thing is overall just going back for another year knowing that OK, they know Cuddie's coming back. So now I've just got to do everything that I didn't do the first time. Learn from what I didn't do the first time I played them to what I think they'll do now. I feel like when we go back this time, it's going to be a domination."

> During the recruiting process, Robinson was well aware the Hogs return to Stillwater.

> "I said, 'Oh, this is two years in a row," Robinson said. "I said, 'Let's do it. I've gotta go back in there, so let's go."

Robinson talked about what he has told

his teammates about playing Oklahoma State early in the season in Stillwater.

"I was telling them all meetings earlier," Robinson said. "I was like, 'Hey, they line up and that this is going to come.' So we're looking at film and I'm like, 'I just told you they're going to do that right now.' So all the players they... And one thing I like about the DB group here, everybody is listening here and everybody got their own characteristics. So, they really stand out to me here for sure.

"Man, everybody progresses day by day," Robinson said. "Like, we learn something new every day, and our coaches do a really good job of just explaining the small thing to just make us understand, "This is how we're going to do things.' So, it's been coming along real well."

Dubinion is lone scholarship running back returning

AYETTEVILLE—Running back Rashod Dubinion is the lone scholarship running back returning from last season. Dubinion, 5-10, 201, is a junior

who is hoping for a big season. In 2023, Dubinion rushed 82 times for 260 yards and one touchdown. He also caught 14 passes for 85 yards and a touchdown. Dubinion was asked what it's like being the only returning running back in the room?

"It's just a respect thing," Dubinion said. "I respect everybody and everybody respects me, so we all get along pretty well. We all treat each other like family because we [are] family. "Yeah, I love him," Dubinion said. "That's my brother. His strengths are like power. He's what 6-2, 250. Come on, man. You've got to get out of his way."

Dubinion already had a relationship with Florida State transfer Rodney Hill. Dubinion and Hill are both from Georgia high schools.

"Yes sir, high school," Dubinion said. "Probably 7 on 7 camp. Like Cam Newton Camp."

In addition to Dubinion, Hill and Jackson, the Hogs have Tyrell Reed Jr. and Braylen Russell as scholarship running backs.

"I feel that we all bring something different to the table," Dubinion said. "We're a well-rounded room. Everybody's diverse."

Kolby Smith coaches the running backs and talked about what he likes most from Dubinion. "I love his initial burst," Smith said. "I love his slash ability. His quickness. His ability to get into those small seams in the offensive line that we create and the jump cut and the burst out of it."

When Dubinion and Jackson are both healthy Smith reflected back on what both bring to the room.

"Leadership and experience, because they've been out there in those games," Smith said. "They know what it feels like, and they do a great job of teaching the younger guys in the room. When we're in the meeting room or when they're in the back and watching, taking those mental reps with the guys, they're saying hey, this and that. I can hear them, and they're doing a good job. It's a good group. The chemistry in the room is good. It's a nice brotherhood that we have building and growing. A lot of them are roommates now that weren't. When I came here in the spring, nobody was roommates, but now they're becoming roommates. They live with each other, so I can tell the brotherhood is growing."



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Harrison is looking for continued success this year : : : :

t the end of the regular season, the Harrison Goblins are in the football playoffs. That is the tradition of the team. The Goblins have the weapons that are needed to continue that success.

Harrison coach Chris Keylon is expecting the squad to be successful this season and he has seen what this team brings to the field every day in practice.

"I am extremely pleased with our team's attitude and work ethic," the third year head coach said. "We have worked hard on that and our kids have bought in so well. It is absolutely a blast to coach them.

"When you don't have to coach effort you can get so much more coaching done," Keylon said. "There is one difference in coaching this team though. We have to replace some key roles this year and a lot of offensive production. We are still figuring that piece out right now. That takes some time, trial and error, etc. We didn't have that the past two years because we had Braden Long and Mason Ketterman and we knew their strengths and what we were good at. We are still figuring that out on offense right now."

When Keylon was asked about what were some off-field or on-field challenges for the team, he replied. "I am confident we won't have off the field challenges. We have really good kids and they know how to act. On the field, we have to learn early on who we are on offense. That will be a challenge in the first part of the season."

The coach praised his team for the effort in the preseason.

"Its hard to say who has impressed the most because we have seen really good things out of everybody," he stated. "That isn't coach speak either. We really have. It doesn't matter if it has been a young player that plays scout team or a seasoned veteran. I told the kids at the end of the summer that when I look at each one of them, the first thing that comes to my mind is something positive. That, I believe, is rare."

As the team enters the season, there is an attribute that Keylon likes of his squad.

"I think it is really good," he said

of the team chemistry. "Normally, there is a slight division between sophomores and seniors. This is the first year I have seen that improve drastically. That is an area we wanted to fix within the program. I attribute the improvement to our captains and upperclassmen players."

The captains for the season were picked and are the ones that the coach deems as the heart of the team.

"Our captains are Tre Turner, Caydem Long, Owen Strode, Ben Estes, Jon Bartlett and Peyton Reese. These guys were anonymously picked as captains through a structured polling process. As a result, they exemplify what our team is, which is hard working, great attitude kids/leaders."

When looking at the season, the Goblins can hang their hat on what will be a key to success.

"We have to play more clean football which means much less penalties and very few turnovers," the coach commented. "If we can achieve that with our team's effort I believe that will be the key to our success."

The Goblins will have three tough nonconference games this season followed by the 5A-West battles. There are three new teams in the conference this year.

Joining the league again will be Greenbrier, Morrilton and Vilonia. They were traditional members of the league. Greenbrier moved back from 6A to Class 5A. Morrilton and Vilonia moved from the 5A-Central back to the 5A-West.

> When looking at the most difficult games of the season, the coach pointed to Mountain Home and Greenbrier as being tough contests. However, he believed the game the team is most motivated to win will be the first contest.

"The first one, Branson (Mo.)," he said. "We want to start the season off on the right foot. Obviously, Mountain Home due to the rivalry and their victory last year. Alma,

our first conference opponent this year." Keylon took a look at the 5A-West and stated his expectations.

"On top," he said. "Every year I expect us to win the conference. I believe Greenbrier will be tough. But also Morrilton, they have speed in the skill positions that will be tough for us to match up with and both teams are very well coached."

When looking at the schedule Keylon picked the most important game to get a victory.

"Alma. It is our first conference game and will go a long way in getting that first conference win." Heading into season Keylon pointed to the strongest characteristic of the team.

"Our toughness and physicality is our biggest asset. That is the way we have to win games in Harrison. Our kids are tough and are not afraid of anybody or anything."

When asked what was going to be the potential weakness of the squad, he replied. "Lack of experience in key positions will be something we will have to keep an eye on. In those spots, we have to put the players in a good position to be successful until they gain more experience."

There will not be much change in the offense that Harrison will use this system. The team will execute a "run-oriented offense with an efficient passing game."

Harrison enters every season with a two-headed monster at the quarterback position. This year will not be an exception as either could be on the field.

"We have two quarterbacks competing for the job," he said. "Either one will be ready when the time comes and if we play both, then both will be ready. I have a lot of confidence in our two guys.

"Both have average arm strength but are effective," he continued. "Accuracy comes down to more things than arm strength though. They have the arm to make all of our throws and the intelligence to make the appropriate reads. Where both have to get better quickly is when live competition starts and the bullets start flying. They have to be very smart with the football and not turn it over by making good decisions."

A future bright spot for the Goblins will be in the running game. The coach was excited about the physical depth that the team has.



"Actually it is," was the coach's response when asked about the running back stable of depth. "It is not deep with experience, but we have several guys that can run the ball that we feel comfortable with."

When asked if the team could pick up three or four yards a carry, Keylon said. "Yes. I expect them to pick up three or four yards at a time and take it to the house too."

In the preseason scrimmage against Ozark, the Goblins quarterbacks hit several receivers. That will be expected in every game.

"We have some electric guys at receiver," stated the coach. "I am excited about this group. We have some serious speed and toughness at this position. We have several guys that will compete and help us this year."

An offseason weight program will help the squad this season as the team battles in the trenches.

"We have good size on our line," stated Keylon. "These guys are strong too due to our weight program." Keylon feels that the squad can protect the quarterback while opening holes for the backs.

"We practice this all the time. Obviously, not everyone is the same. Some have better skills than others and vice versa. But the overall complement of skill sets among the line will allow us to be effective."

During the preseason Keylon issued a command to the assistant coaches about the defensive line.

"I told our staff and players, I want nine guys ready to play on the defensive line," he said. "We have a lot of competition there. We also have some dominant players there too."

Usually the Goblins don't use players on both lines, but this year there is an exception for the team's three-man front.

"Ben Estes will be the one guy that will play both," he said. "We normally don't like to do that. But Ben is special. He has the endurance, toughness and strength to do both and he is very, very effective on both sides."

To be a Goblin linebacker means that an athlete can make opponents feel pain. This year is no exception.

"We are strong, aggressive," Keylon said. "To play linebacker anywhere, you have to be a good hitter. To play for the Goblins, it is a must. Every linebacker we have had in my time at Harrison whether I was defensive coordinator or head coach, were big hitters. They are not scared and set the tone with this skill."

The linebacking crew also possesses another strength.

"They they are very fast," Keylon commented. "We blitz one of them every play and their timing is really good. They read well too and react. All of them are high effort guys. I expect them to set the tone every game we play and instill fear in the opponent on every single play in our games."

Summer play brought out proud coaching moments for Keylon with the secondary.

"I am very pleased with our secondary this summer," Keylon said. "I was not pleased at all with our secondary last year. The difference is a couple of things. One is our secondary coach Coach Cameron Jones has done an unbelievable job in improving this group. Secondly, the kids have responded well to Coach Jones and doing what they are coached to do as opposed to doing their own thing. We should be much better this year on the back end."

In a pass-happy league, the Goblins will be ready to defend their turf.

"We have good speed in the secondary," said the coach. "However, we have to do

the little things correctly to be successful, which is good feet, fundamental backpedaling and coming out of your break, eye discipline in reading your keys every time. If we will do what we did all summer, this combined with our speed should make us good in the secondary."

The special teams got the attention of the coaches this summer.

"We never really know until we start playing games," commented the coach. "But we have put an extra focus and emphasis on that this summer. We have worked on special teams more this summer than anytime before. I expect great things out of them this year."

Harrison has two kickers that are both effective within the 35-yard line. Two men are competing for the punting position while the return men will be quick.

Serving with Keylon this season are several coaches. Kyle Wood is the defensive coordinator; Doug Cross, defensive line, special teams coordinator; Cameron Jones, defensive backs; Ben Johnson, outside linebackers; Matt Rodden, linebackers; Greg Cross, offensive line; Bruce Humphrey, quarterbacks, running backs; Jerry Ewing, pass game coordinator, wide receivers; and Skylar Fowler, tight ends.

Central Missouri's QB among 2024 small-college stars

ach Zebrowski more than made up for lost time in his first season at Central Missouri. After spending three years mostly on the bench at Southern Illinois in the Football Championship Subdivision, Zebrowski turned in one of the greatest seasons by a college quarterback in any division.

He passed for at least five touchdowns in nine of the Mules' 13 games and finished with a Division II record 61, making him only the sixth player at any level to throw for at least 60.

The fifth-year senior goes into 2024 as the reigning Harlon Hill Trophy winner as Division II's player of the year and motivated to make a deeper playoff run after a late blocked extra point ended the Mules' season in the second round.

The 6-foot-2, 208-pound Zebrowski was undersized for most of his career at East Ridge High in Woodbury, Minnesota. He grew 6 inches after his junior year and was one of the top quarterbacks in the Twin Cities area as a senior, but he didn't attract much Division I recruiting attention. He walked on at Southern Illinois, appeared in only seven games over three years and, with the Salukis' starter returning, his prospects for playing time last season were dim. At Central Missouri, he was co-No. 1 quarterback entering the opener at Missouri Western and spent the first quarter on the bench. He took over on the fourth possession, passed for 390 yards and five touchdowns and ended the quarterback competition then and there.

"I don't know if I would have believed it if you told me it would happen," Zebrowski said. "I've always had confidence in myself and thought I would be able to do it if I got the chance. Getting the chance and being able to run with it was pretty damn cool."

In addition to his prodigious TD numbers, Zebrowksi finished with a Division II-record 5,690 yards of total offense, threw only five interceptions and ranked second in the country in passing efficiency.

Zebrowski said he explored transferring to a higher-division school for his final season. His dad, Jim Zebrowski, is quarterbacks coach at Kansas, but he never seriously considered that an option because the Jayhawks have an established starter in Jalon Daniels.

ELLVILLE—Even with most of Yellville-Summit's football players returning from last season, the Panthers should look a whole lot different this fall.

The Panthers are having fun with the Spread offense installed by first-year head coach Chaseton McCarthy.

"I'm not sure there could be more drastic of a change for them," McCarthy said. "I tell our guys all the time that it's not about what you're doing, but how you do it. It's different, but we try to tailor things to fit the strengths of our players. It's coming along really well, but we still have a ways to go in certain aspects."

"We have some really good skill kids," he said. "Depth is going to hurt us up front. We just don't have very many linemen right now. We have to make sure we stay healthy up there and keep those guys fresh."

B ot h Newport and Perryville have left Yellville-Summit's 3A-2 Conference, but they have been replaced by powerhouse Mayflower, Episcopal Collegiate, and Mountain View, which is moving back to 11-man football after a stint in the eight-man game.

Salem, Quitman, Melbourne and Atkins all remain in the league. The Panthers started 4-0 last season before going winless in conference play. "We don't overlook anybody, and we don't put anybody on a pedestal," McCarthy said. "Salem has obviously been good the past few years. I think they're the team to beat in the conference. We just try to treat each team like we're playing the New York Giants or someone. We want to focus on each single week. We try not to think long-term."

After the Panthers' opener at Izard County, they have an open week to prepare for their final two non-league games at Hector and at home against Berryville.

"Izard County had a lot of success in eight-man, and they're going through quite a transition as well," McCarthy said. "Hector is always solid, and Berryville, being a 4A school, will present some challenges.

"I didn't make the schedule, but you always want to have your nonconference prepare you for conference," he added. "We do get to play a larger school each week, so that's a nice way to build up to our conference opponents."

Farmington has a stable of running backs that will be counted on for offense. The Cardinals scored 29 or more points in all but one game last season when Rogers held them to only three.

Two of the 5A-West teams that left the league this season have turned up on the Farmington non-conference schedule. Shiloh Christian is the first opponent and Prairie Grove is the last non-conference matchup.

The Cardinals will be using a version of the Spread offense. They will be playing a 4-3 defense. Cardinal linebackers will be a key for the defense.

Greenbrier

Elkins

Other players to watch at smaller schools this season:

QB Luke Lehnen,

North Central (Illinois)

Lehnen threw for 48 touchdowns and ran for 13, completed 73% of his passes and was intercepted just twice. He finished with 3,407 yards passing and 850 rushing. He led North Central to national titles in 2021 and '22 and to the championship game last year. He enters his fourth year as the starter favored to become the first player in 10 seasons to be a back-to-back winner of the Gagliardi Trophy as the Division III player of the year.

S Tanner Volk, Central Washington

> Volk won the Cliff Harris Award as the best small-college defensive player and was a Harlon Hill finalist. His 13 interceptions were most in any NCAA division and his 124 tackles led Division II. He picked off two passes in four games and had at least one in nine of 13 games. He enters his senior season with 18 interceptions in 34 games.

DL Anthony Cikauskas, Monmouth (Illinois)

Cikauskas was the most dominant defensive lineman in Division III as a sophomore with 26 tackles for loss and a nationleading 17 sacks. He had at least one sack in every game but the opener; he had a career-high 3.5 against Illinois College. The 6-3, 240-pounder also forced five fumbles, broke up two passes and blocked a kick.

RB Rontavious Farmer, St. Thomas (Florida)

Farmer's 3,326 yards rushing the last two seasons are most in the NAIA. Last year he carried 280 times for 1,773 yards (6.3 per attempt) and 26 touchdowns. He went over 200 yards in three games, including 236 in a playoff loss at Keiser (Florida). The 5-9, 185-pound Farmer had 254 carries for 1,553 yards (6.1) and 14 TDs in 2022.

WR Austin Jablonski, Concordia (Nebraska)

Jablonski transferred to Concordia after spending two seasons at Nebraska. He moved from quarterback to receiver early in the 2022 season, and last year his 91 catches and 113.4 yards receiving per game led the NAIA. He had 11 catches for 162 yards and two touchdowns and also ran for a score against Hastings.

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
