

ORDINANCE NO. 3 of 2023

TO AMEND AND RESTATE THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE VILLAGE OF FRENCH SETTLEMENT, LOUISIANA CHAPTER 1, SECTION 1.2, TO UPDATE MEETING ATTENDANCE REQUIREMENTS FOR PUBLIC OFFICIALS

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Village of French Settlement, Louisiana that the Code of Ordinances, Chapter 1, Section 1.1 be hereby amended and restated to read as follows:

Section 1.2 Meetings of the Mayor and Board

- (1) Regular meetings of the Mayor and Board shall be held in the Board chambers on the second Wednesday of each month at 7:00 p.m.
- (2) Whenever any member of the Board of Aldermen or the Mayor of the Village of French Settlement fails to attend regularly scheduled meetings, without good cause, as determined by the Board, for a period of three (3) consecutive months, their respective office shall be deemed forfeited.
- (3) The Board of Aldermen may choose to allow the elected official to remain in office with a majority vote at the third (3rd) consecutively missed meeting.
- (4) This Amended and Restated Ordinance would become effective on November 1, 2023 for the current members of office and immediate for future elected or appointed officials.

Said ordinance having been introduced on August 9, 2023, at the Town Hall Regular Meeting by Mayor Pro Tem Jeremy Aydell, Public Notice having been requested to the Journal of Record on August 10, 2023, published on August 17, 2023, said Public Hearing having been held on September 13, 2023, to approve Ordinance No. 3 of 2023 said amendment. ACT No. 278

HOUSE BILL NO. 166
BY REPRESENTATIVE GREGORY MILLER
A JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing to amend Article III, Section 18 of the Constitution of Louisiana, to provide relative to gubernatorial action on a bill and matters related thereto; to provide relative to veto sessions; to provide for submission of the proposed amendment to the electors; and to provide for related matters.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of Louisiana, two-thirds of the members elected to each house concurring, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the state of Louisiana, for their approval or rejection in the manner provided by law, a proposal to amend Article III, Section 18 of the Constitution of Louisiana, to read as follows:

§18. Gubernatorial Action on Bills; Sign, Failure to Sign, Veto; Veto Session

Section 18.(A) Gubernatorial Action. If the governor does not approve a bill, he may veto it. A bill, except a joint resolution, shall become law if the governor signs it or if he fails to sign or veto it within ten days after delivery to him if the legislature is in the session in which the bill passed on the tenth day after such delivery, or within twenty days after delivery if the tenth day after delivery occurs after the legislature legislative session in which the bill passed is adjourned.

(B) Veto Message. If the governor vetoes a bill, he shall return it to the legislature, with his veto message, within twelve days after delivery to him if the legislature is in the session in which the bill passed. If the governor returns a vetoed bill after the legislature adjourns legislative session in which the bill passed is adjourned, he shall return it, with his veto message, as provided by law.

(C) Veto Session. (1) A bill vetoed and returned and subsequently approved by two-thirds of the elected members of each house shall become law. The legislature shall meet in veto session in the state capital at noon on the fortieth day following final adjournment of ~~the most recent~~ each session in which a bill that finally passed was vetoed, to consider all bills passed during that session that were vetoed by the governor and that were not reconsidered by the house of origin during the session in which the bill passed. If the fortieth day falls on Sunday, the session shall convene at noon on the succeeding Monday. No veto session shall exceed five calendar days, and

any veto session may be finally adjourned prior to the end of the fifth day upon a vote of two-thirds of the elected members of each house.

(2) No veto session shall be held if a majority of the elected members of either house declare in writing that a veto session is unnecessary. The declaration must be received by the presiding officer of the respective houses at least five days prior to the day on which the veto session is to convene.

(3) If a veto session is to be held and the time period for the conduct of the veto session occurs during a regular or extraordinary session of the legislature, the legislature may reconsider all bills vetoed by the governor and not previously reconsidered by the legislature as part of the business of the regular or extraordinary session during the time period set forth in Subparagraph (1) of this Paragraph without the necessity of convening or adjourning a separate veto session.

Section 2. Be it further resolved that if this proposed amendment is approved by a majority of the voters voting thereon in the state, it shall become effective on January 8, 2024.

Section 3. Be it further resolved that this proposed amendment shall be submitted to the electors of the state of Louisiana at the statewide election to be held on November 18, 2023.

Section 4. Be it further resolved that on the official ballot to be used at the election, there shall be printed a proposition, upon which the electors of the state shall be permitted to vote YES or NO, to amend the Constitution of Louisiana, which proposition shall read as follows:

Do you support an amendment to clarify that the timing of gubernatorial action on a bill and his return of a vetoed bill to the legislature is based upon the legislative session in which the bill passed and to authorize the legislature, if it is in session, to reconsider vetoed bills without convening a separate veto session? (Effective January 8, 2024)(Amends Article III, Section 18)

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of Louisiana, two-thirds of the members elected to each house concurring, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the state of Louisiana, for their approval or rejection in the manner provided by law, a proposal to repeal Article VII, Sections 4(D)(4)(b), 10.4, 10.10, and 10.12(B) and (C) of the Constitution of Louisiana.

Section 2. Be it further resolved by the Legislature of Louisiana, two-thirds of the members elected to each house concurring, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the state of

Louisiana, for their approval or rejection in the manner provided by law, a proposal to repeal Article IX, Sections 9 and 10 of the Constitution of Louisiana.

Section 3. Be it further resolved that the state treasurer is hereby authorized and directed to transfer any remaining balances in the funds repealed by this Joint Resolution to the state general fund upon the adoption of the amendment contained in this Joint Resolution.

Section 4. Be it further resolved that this proposed amendment shall be submitted to the electors of the state of Louisiana at the statewide election to be held on November 18, 2023.

Section 5. Be it further resolved that on the official ballot to be used at the election, there shall be printed a proposition, upon which the electors of the state shall be permitted to vote YES or NO, to amend the Constitution of Louisiana, which proposition shall read as follows:

Do you support an amendment to remove provisions of the Constitution of Louisiana which created the following inactive special funds within the state treasury: Atchafalaya Basin Conservation Fund, Higher Education Louisiana Partnership Fund, Millennium Leverage Fund, Agricultural and Seafood Products Support Fund, First Use Tax Trust Fund, Louisiana Investment Fund for Enhancement and to provide for the transfer of any remaining monies in such funds to the state general fund? (Repeals Article VII, Sections 4(D)(4)(b), 10.4, 10.10, and 10.12(B) and (C) and Article IX, Sections 9 and 10)

SENATE BILL NO. 127
BY SENATOR DUPLESSIS
A JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing to add Article VII, Section 21(O) of the Constitution of Louisiana, relative to ad valorem tax exemptions; to provide for an ad valorem tax exemption for certain first responders; to require the parish governing authority to approve the ad valorem tax exemption; to provide for exemption amounts; to require the tax assessor to establish a procedure to apply for the exemption; to provide for eligibility; to require taxing authorities to absorb the loss of revenue as a result of the exemptions; to provide relative to reappraisals; to provide an effective date; to provide for applicability; and to specify an election for submission of the proposition to electors and provide a ballot proposition.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of Louisiana, two-thirds of the members elected to each house concurring, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the state, for their approval or rejection in the manner provided by law, a proposal to add Article VII, Section 21(O) of the Constitution of Louisiana, to read as follows:

§21. Other Property Exemptions

Section 21. In addition to the homestead exemption provided for in Section 20 of this Article, the following property and no other shall be exempt from ad valorem taxation:

* * *

(O)(1) In addition to the homestead exemption authorized pursuant to the provisions of Article VII, Section 20 of this constitution, which applies to the first seven thousand five hundred dollars of the assessed valuation of property, a parish governing authority may approve an ad valorem tax exemption of up to two thousand five hundred dollars of the assessed valuation of property receiving the homestead exemption that is owned and occupied by a qualified first responder.

(2) For the purposes of this Paragraph, "first responder" shall mean a volunteer firefighter who has completed within the tax year no fewer than twenty-four hours of firefighter continuing education and is an active member of the Louisiana State Firemen's Association or is on the departmental personnel roster of the Volunteer Firefighter Insurance Program of the office of state fire marshal. For the purposes of this Paragraph, "first responder" shall also mean a full-time public employee whose duties include responding rapidly to an emergency and who resides in the same parish in which their employer is located. The term includes the following:

(a) Peace officer, which means any sheriff, police officer, or other person deputized by proper authority to serve as a peace officer.

(b) Fire protection personnel.

(c) An individual certified as emergency medical services personnel.

(d) An emergency response operator or emergency services dispatcher who provides communication support services for an agency by responding to requests for assistance in emergencies.

(3) The exemption provided for in this Paragraph shall only apply in a parish if it is approved by the parish governing authority.

(4) Each tax assessor shall establish a procedure whereby a person may annually apply for the exemption which shall include the production of documents by the first responder. In the application for the exemption, the first responder shall produce documentation issued by his employer evidencing employment for the taxable period for which the exemption is being requested.

(5) Notwithstanding any provision of this constitution to the contrary, any decrease in the total amount of ad valorem tax collected by the taxing authority as a result of an ad valorem tax exemption granted pursuant to this Paragraph shall be absorbed by the taxing authority and shall not create any additional tax liability for other taxpayers in the taxing district as a result of any subsequent reappraisal and valuation or millage adjustment. Implementation of the exemption authorized in this Paragraph shall neither trigger nor be cause for a reappraisal of property or an adjustment of millages.

Section 2. Be it further resolved that this proposed amendment shall be submitted to the electors of the state of Louisiana at the statewide election to be held on November 18, 2023.

Section 3. Be it further resolved that this proposed amendment, if approved by the electors, shall become effective on January 1, 2024, and shall apply to ad valorem taxes due beginning in tax year 2024 and thereafter.

Section 4. Be it further resolved that on the official ballot to be used at said election, there shall be printed a proposition, upon which the electors of the state shall be permitted to vote YES or NO, to amend the Constitution of Louisiana, which proposition shall read as follows:

Do you support an amendment to authorize the local governing authority of a parish to provide an ad valorem tax exemption for qualified first responders? (Adds Article VII, Section 21(O))

Proposing to amend Article VII, Section 10.15(E)(1) and (F) and to add Article VII, Section 10.15(G) of the Constitution of Louisiana, relative to the use of monies in the Revenue Stabilization Trust Fund; to provide for submission of the proposed amendment to the electors; and to provide for related matters.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of Louisiana, two-thirds of the members elected to each house concurring, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the state of Louisiana, for their approval or rejection in the manner provided by law, a proposal to amend Article VII, Section 10.15(E)(1) and (F) and to add Article VII, Section 10.15(G) of the Constitution of Louisiana, to read as follows:

§10.15. Revenue Stabilization Trust Fund

Section 10.15. Revenue Stabilization Trust Fund.

* * *

(E)(1) Except as provided for in Paragraph ~~(F)~~ (G) of this Section, monies deposited into the Revenue Stabilization Trust Fund shall be permanently credited to the trust fund and shall be invested by the treasurer in a manner provided for by law.

* * *

(F)~~(1)~~ Except as provided in ~~Subparagraphs (2) and (3)~~ Paragraph (G) of this Paragraph Section, no appropriations shall be made from the Revenue Stabilization Trust Fund.

~~(2)(a)~~ (G)(1) In any fiscal year in which the balance of the fund at the beginning of the year is in excess of five billion dollars, hereinafter referred to as the minimum fund balance, the legislature may appropriate an amount not to exceed ten percent, in the aggregate, of the fund balance, hereinafter referred to as the allowable percentage, for the following: for capital outlay projects in the comprehensive state capital budget, transportation infrastructure, or both.

~~(i) Capital outlay projects in the comprehensive state capital budget.~~

~~(ii) Transportation infrastructure.~~

~~(b) The minimum fund balance or the allowable percentage may be changed by a law enacted by two-thirds of the elected members of each house of the legislature.~~

~~(3) In order to ensure the money in the fund is available for appropriation in an emergency the legislature may authorize an appropriation from the fund at any time for any purpose only after the consent of two-thirds of the elected members of each house of the legislature. If the~~

~~legislature is not in session, the two-thirds requirement may be satisfied upon obtaining the written consent of two-thirds of the elected members of each house of the legislature in a manner provided by law.~~

(2) In addition to Subparagraph (1) of this Paragraph, monies in the Revenue Stabilization Trust Fund may be used as follows:

(a) If after the incorporation of the maximum allowable use of monies from the Budget Stabilization Fund into the official forecast for the next fiscal year, the official forecast for the next fiscal year is less than the official forecast money for the current fiscal year, the difference, not to exceed two hundred fifty million dollars, may be incorporated into the next fiscal year's official forecast.

(b) If after the appropriation of the maximum allowable use of monies from the Budget Stabilization Fund for the current fiscal year, a deficit for the current fiscal year is projected due to a decrease in the official forecast, an amount not to exceed two hundred fifty million dollars may be appropriated.

(c) The consent of two-thirds of the elected members of each house of the legislature shall be required prior to the utilization of any monies in the fund pursuant to the provisions of this Subparagraph. If the legislature is not in session, the two-thirds requirement may be satisfied upon obtaining the written consent of two-thirds of the elected members of each house of the legislature in a manner provided by law.

(3) Notwithstanding any other provision of this Paragraph, any of the following may be changed by law enacted by two-thirds of the elected members of each house of the legislature:

(a) The minimum fund balance, the allowable percentage that may be withdrawn, or both, as provided in Subparagraph (1) of this Paragraph.

(b) The maximum amount that may be withdrawn as provided Subparagraph (2) of this Paragraph.

Section 2. Be it further resolved that this proposed amendment shall be submitted to the electors of the state of Louisiana at the statewide election to be held on November 18, 2023.

Section 3. Be it further resolved that on the official ballot to be used at the election, there shall be printed a proposition, upon which the electors of the state shall be permitted to vote YES or NO, to amend the Constitution of Louisiana, which proposition shall read as follows:

Do you support an amendment authorizing the legislature, after securing a two-thirds vote of each house, to use up to two hundred fifty million dollars from the Revenue Stabilization Trust Fund to alleviate a budget deficit subject to conditions set forth by law and allowing the legislature to modify such conditions for accessing the monies in the fund, subject to two-thirds vote? (Amends Article VII, Section 10.15(E)(1) and (F); Adds Article VII, Section 10.15(G))



ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 1.02 OF ARTICLE ONE OF THE DENHAM SPRINGS ZONING COMMISSION ORDINANCE OF 1990, AS AMENDED, CITY ORDINANCE 1001 BY ADDING THERETO PARAGRAPH 195, FROM C-3 COMMERCIAL TO R-1 RESIDENTIAL, A 0.4431 ACRE TRACT OF LAND, LOCATED IN SECTION 37, T7S-R3E, G.L.D., CITY OF DENHAM SPRINGS, LIVINGSTON PARISH, LOUISIANA. (RZ-447)(322 TATE RD.).

SECTION 1. Paragraph (195) of Section 1.02 Article 1 of the Denham Springs Zoning Ordinance of 1990, City Ordinance 1001, is hereby enacted to read as follows:

SECTION 1.2****

A CERTAIN 0.441 ACRE TRACT OF LAND, LOCATED IN SECTION 37, T7S-R3E, G.L.D., CITY OF DENHAM SPRINGS, LIVINGSTON PARISH, LOUISIANA, (322 TATE RD.)(RZ-447), ALL ACCORDING TO A MAP PREPARED BY RICHARD W. KREBS & ASSOCIATES, LLC, ATTACHED HERETO AND MADE A PART HEREOF.

SECTION 2. All ordinances or part of ordinance in conflict therewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 3. That the Clerk be and she is hereby authorized, instructed, and directed to record a certified copy of this ordinance in the conveyance records of the Parish of Livingston, State of Louisiana.

SECTION 4. Be it further ordained that the Clerk be and she is hereby instructed, authorized and directed to have said ordinance published one time in the official journal of the City of Denham Springs, and upon such publication the ordinance shall become effective.

ORDINANCE NO. 23-13

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE
CODE OF ORDINANCES FOR THE CITY OF DENHAM SPRINGS,
CHAPTER 26 BY ADDING ARTICLE IX SECTION 26-170 REGARDING HORSE
DRAWN CARRIAGES FOR HIRE

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Denham Springs, Louisiana, in regular public session convened that:

Sections 26-170 through 183 shall be added as follows:

Section 26-170 – Definitions

(A) The words, terms, and phrases, when used in this article, shall have the following meaning:

- (1) **City.** The word “city” shall mean the City of Denham Springs, Louisiana
- (2) **Company.** The holder of a license to operate a horse drawn carriage business under the provisions of this article whether a person, firm, partnership or corporation.
- (3) **Draft animal.** A horse, mule, or other beast of burden used for the pulling of a horse drawn carriage.
- (4) **Driver.** Any person who drives or operates a horse drawn carriage on the streets of the city for a licensed company.
- (5) **Horse drawn carriage.** A carriage which is operated by being drawn by a horse, mule or other beast of burden for the transportation for hire of passengers.
- (6) **Inspector.** The individual employee or organizational unit of the city charged with the responsibility for enforcing this article, except for specific responsibilities otherwise provided herein.
- (7) **License.** The right and privilege granted by the city for the operation of a business incorporating the use of horse drawn carriage(s) with the corporate limits of the city and the document evidencing the same.
- (8) **Stand.** A public or private place alongside the curb of a street or elsewhere which has been approved by the city for the use of a horse drawn carriage. Adequate water shall be provided in the stand area at all times by company.
- (9) **Street.** The word “street” shall mean and include any street, alley, lane, avenue, court or public place in the city.

Section 26-171 Licensing of horse drawn carriage companies; headquarters.

- (1) License required.
 - (a) No person, firm corporation or legal entity shall operate a business involving the use of a horse drawn carriage on the streets of the city unless a license has been granted by the city for such activity. Said license shall be effective for one calendar year, unless suspended or revoked sooner as provided by ordinance.
 - (b) Any person, firm, corporation or legal entity desiring a license required by this section shall submit an application in writing to the city on a form to be furnished by the city. The application shall be made under oath and shall contain, at a minimum, the following information:

1. The legal name of the applicant
2. The trade name, if applicable, under which the applicant is to operate.
3. All persons having a beneficial interest in the applicant greater than 50 per cent.
4. Mailing and physical address of applicant.
5. The name and address of a contact person for all purposes under this article.
6. The passenger capacity of the vehicle(s)
7. A photograph of the carriage(s) for which license is applied.
8. Hours of operation

(2) License fee. Before any license is granted under this section, an impact, enforcement and administrative fee for the licensed activity in the amount of \$100.00 shall be paid by the applicant.

(3) License to be displayed in horse drawn carriage. The license, or copy thereof, issued under the provisions of this section shall be placed on display in the horse drawn carriage or at the stand where the license will be viewable by passengers.

(4) Single license only. Only one license is allowed for each applicant and each license allows for up to 3 horse drawn carriages to be operated under said license. The city will issue a maximum of 3 licenses for any given period.

(5) License not transferable. Any license issued under this ordinance for a horse drawn carriage is not transferable, either from entity to entity, or from carriage to carriage, and is to be used solely by the applicant to whom it is issued.

(6) Duration of license. Any horse drawn carriage license shall be valid for one calendar year. License may be renewed upon application and payment of the required fee.

License may be revoked at any time without cause.

(7) Operating regulations. In addition to the license requirements imposed herein, each license holder shall be responsible for the following operating regulations:

(a) Compliance with all state and federal laws and regulations governing equines and humane treatment of animals.

(b) No one animal may be worked more than eight hours per day. Each animal is required to rest 16 consecutive hours after working an eight hour shift.

(c) No animal shall be permitted to pull a horse drawn carriage when the outside temperature exceeds 92 degrees Fahrenheit or is lower than 32 degrees Fahrenheit. The temperature reading shall be conclusively presumed to be that obtained at the city police department as adjunct to the National Weather Service.

(d) A valid Louisiana Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) certification for the animal in service must be produced upon demand by the city inspector. A veterinary health check is required at least once per year for service animals.

(e) Each license holder shall require and maintain a log of the starting and ending times for each driver and animal. This log shall be available for inspection by the city inspector.

(8) Inspection: The city inspector shall be empowered to inspect all operating practices of any carriage company to ensure continuous compliance with this article.

Section 26-172 Indemnity

Any horse drawn carriage company operating under this article shall hold harmless the city, its officers, agents, servants and employees, harmless against any and all liability, loss damages or expense which may accrue to the city by reason of negligence, default or misconduct of the company in connection with the rights granted to such company hereunder. Nothing in this article shall be considered to make the city, its officers, agents, servants or employees liable for damages because of any negligent act or omission or commission by any horse drawn carriage company, its servants, agents, drivers, or other employees, during the operation by the company of a horse drawn carriage business or service, either in respect to injury to persons or with respect to damage to property which may be sustained.

Section 26-173 Insurance

- (1) Comprehensive general liability insurance. Any carriage company seeking a license to operate a horse drawn carriage business in the city shall maintain from a licensed insurance company and approved by the city comprehensive general liability insurance in the amount of \$1,000,000.00 for its undertakings associated with horse drawn carriages within the city.
- (2) Insurance for the benefit of passengers. Any horse drawn carriage company seeking a license to operate a horse drawn carriage business in the city shall maintain from a licensed insurance company and approved by the city a policy of indemnity. The minimum coverage shall be \$1,000,000.00 combined single limit per accident.
- (3) Notice when voided. Before any policy of insurance required by this article is voided for any cause, nonpayment of premium or otherwise, notice thereof shall be given, by the licensee in writing, to the city at least 10 days before the same shall take effect.

Section 26-174 Design standards and equipment.

- (1) Horse drawn carriages must be maintained in safe mechanical condition, with all safety equipment remaining intact and operative at all times when the horse drawn carriage is in service. All carriages must be equipped with at least the following:
 - (a) Two lamps displaying white light to the front of the carriage and at least two rear lamps displaying red light visible from a distance of not less than 500 feet.
 - (b) Any owner or operator of a horse drawn carriage shall provide that all horses are equipped with a diapering apparatus that prevents the droppings of such animal from being deposited or otherwise left on the city streets. It shall be the responsibility of the owner or operator utilizing such animal for the purpose of pulling a carriage to maintain the diapering apparatus in good working condition. Disposal of any diapering apparatus is prohibited in any city receptacle. If any droppings are deposited or otherwise left on any city streets, it is the responsibility of the carriage operator to remove them in a timely manner.

(c) All carriages must have a DOTD approved slow moving vehicle sign shall be attached upon the rear of the vehicle so as to be clearly visible in all lighting conditions from a rear approach.

(d) Each horse drawn carriage shall be equipped with a functional and operative friction braking system.

Section 26-175 Cleanliness of horse drawn carriage and city required.

Each vehicle operating under this article shall be kept neatly painted, and in clean and sanitary condition, free of litter and debris, and at all times suitable for public transportation of passengers.

Section 26-176 Vehicle inspections required.

Each horse drawn carriage may be inspected by the inspector for compliance with the provisions of the chapter and shall pass the inspection before the vehicle may be used in the city. Each horse drawn carriage involved in an accident, regardless of location, shall be inspected by the inspector before it may be returned to transporting passengers for hire. Should the inspection be desired outside of normal working hours, a fee of \$100 will apply. Inspections of the horse drawn carriage may be done at any time by the inspector.

Section 26- 177 Rates of fare

No license holder, driver, or any other person associated with a horse drawn carriage shall charge a greater sum for the use of the horse drawn carriage than that published and advertised as the rates for such vehicle, which shall be displayed conspicuously, so as to be in clear view of the passengers at the stand.

Section 26-178 No horse drawn carriage to be left unattended.

It is unlawful for any driver of any horse drawn carriage to, or for the license holder thereof, to permit the vehicle to be left unattended at any time while the horse is hitched to the carriage.

Section 26-179 Restriction on number of passengers.

No horse drawn carriage shall transport more persons at a single time than the seating capacity of his horse drawn carriage(excepting small children seated in passenger's lap). No passengers shall be allowed to stand while the carriage is in motion.

Section 26-180 Areas and hours of operation.

(1) Applicant must designate desired locations of stands, routes, and number of carriages to be placed into service in their application, to be approved by the Mayor and police department.

(1) Applicant must designate for each desired stand location the maximum number of carriages to be present at that stand at any given time. At any time the city shall set or amend a repetitive route or routes for horse drawn carriages, however, such election shall not prohibit pick up and transport of prearranged passengers for hire who request transport deviating from established routes as per special events permit.

(2) Horse drawn carriages shall be authorized to operate only during the hours specified in the application and approved by the mayor, fire chief and police chief.

(3) Should the mayor, fire chief, or police chief determine that special circumstances exist which would jeopardize the safety of operation of such carriages or threaten the

safety of the general public, the temporary suspension of the operation of such horse drawn carriages may be ordered until such time as the special circumstance abates.

- (4) It is the responsibility of the owner or operator to make inquiry with the mayor's office regarding any restriction on hours of operation other than those specified in this section.

Section 26-181 Traffic violations.

- (1) Horse drawn carriages shall be prohibited from stopping in traffic or delaying any on-street traffic for the purposes of loading or unloading passengers.
- (2) All vehicles subject to this article shall operate the vehicles in accordance with the traffic laws of the city, as well as the state, including, but not limited to, state licensing requirements for carriages, operators, and drivers.
- (3) It shall be unlawful for any horse drawn carriage to willfully impede the normal flow of traffic on any city street, alley or thoroughfare.

Section 26-182 Violations; penalty.

Any person violating the provisions of this article shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable as provided for by law. In addition, violation of this article shall also be grounds for suspension or revocation of the license issued under this article.

Section 26-183 Effective date.

The ordinance from which this article derives shall become effective and enforceable at the expiration of seven days after publication in the official journal.

The Livingston Parish Council met in a regular session duly called, advertised, and convened at its regular meeting place, at the Governmental Building in the Parish Council Chambers, located on 20355 Government Boulevard, Livingston, Louisiana, on Thursday, September 14, 2023, at the hour of six o'clock (6:00) p.m. with the following Livingston Parish Council members present:

***Councilman Randy Delatte entered the Council chambers at 6:09 p.m.*

The chair called the meeting to order.

The chair asked the public to please mute or turn off their cell phones.

The chair announced that Public Input would be accepted from any member of the audience wishing to address an agenda item and explained the procedure to be called upon.

The chair addressed agenda item number 7a, "Presentations: Introduction of Roger Wilder, candidate for Louisiana State Representative: House District 71- Erin Sandefur".

Mr. Roger Wilder explained what motivated him to run for this office. After doing research, he felt that it was obvious that he could contribute if elected to this position.

He stated that he has been a member of the Parish as a resident and also a business owner. He advised that he has done a lot of work with the parks, the schools, the churches, and not to pat himself on the back, he has been able to get across the parish through his business and meet a lot of people and kind of understand the vibe. He continued and stated that he had served our Parish in a business sense and he wants to serve on a higher level. Mr. Wilder presented the issues that he wished to address if elected.

The chair addressed agenda item number 7b:

- a. Discussion of proposed resolution to be presented at the September 28, 2023 regular meeting of the Council from the Capital Area Finance Authority in regard to revenue bonds to finance loans to first-time homebuyers – Randy Delatte/Bridgette Homer, Lender Program Manager-Capital Area Finance Authority

The chair called upon Ms. Bridgette Homer, Lending Program Manager with the Capital Area Finance Authority. Ms. Homer explained that her company provides down payment assistance to those borrowers who are in need of help who may not be able to be a homeowner without it. She stated that in 2014, the Livingston Parish government entered into a Trust Indenture with the Capital Area Finance Authority that encompassed the Capital Area, and now what they are asking for is a resolution, because the market is so volatile and interest rates are going up, it is a little bit harder for them to produce a solid rate, so by issuing a bond they will be able to combat that, but they cannot do that without having a resolution.

The chairman stated that the Council would be reaching out to their financial advisor and requested that Ms. Homer reach out to the Council clerk to confirm that the resolution is ready.

The chair addressed agenda item number 8a and b, "Adopt the Minutes:

- a) August 10, 2023, regular meeting of the Livingston Parish Council
- b) August 24, 2023, regular meeting of the Livingston Parish Council”

MOTION was made by Randy Delatte and duly seconded by Tracy Girlinghouse to dispense with the reading of the minutes from the August 10, 2024 and August 24, 2024 regular meetings of the Livingston Parish Council and adopt as written.

Thereupon the chair declared that the Motion had carried and was adopted.

The chair addressed agenda addendum item number A-1: “Adopt a resolution to authorize the Livingston Parish Grants Department to pursue using ARPA funding for a detention pond to serve Colyell Creek – Grants Department”, and called upon Mr. Mark Harrell, Livingston Parish Office of Homeland Security and Emergency Preparedness and Grants Department representative.

Mr. Harrell advised that this funding had been set aside several years ago with ARPA and it had taken this long to get the Corps of Engineers to make a decision on what the Parish could do. He explained that this was some of the “Garry Lewis property” that was donated to the airport, and that by purchasing the mitigation, it would allow them to build several retention ponds that should, after Phase II, be up to around forty (40) acres. Mr. Harrell further explained that it will serve Colyell Creek and mainly downstream from Colyell.

The chair reiterated that it will catch the water before it gets to the canals and creeks, hold it back, give the canals and creeks time to drain and then slowly release that at a drier time. Mr. Harrell concurred and stated that this will be a dry retention pond that will catch the water and ease it out a bit slower than normal.

Councilman Tracy Girlinghouse asked if this was in regard to Middle Colyell Creek? Mr. Harrell advised that this was Colyell.

LPR NO. 23-381

MOTION was made by Tracy Girlinghouse and duly seconded by Shane Mack to authorize the Livingston Parish Grants Department to pursue using ARPA funding for a detention pond to serve Colyell Creek.

Upon being submitted to a vote, the vote thereon was as follows:

- YEAS: MR. MCMORRIS, MR. GIRLINGHOUSE, MR. WASCOM, MR. ARD, MR. MACK, MS. SANDEFUR, MR. DELATTE
- NAYS: NONE

Thereupon the chair declared that the Motion had been carried and was adopted on the 14th day of September, 2023.

The chair wished to address agenda item number 21, “Discuss dredging status of the Amite River, Blind River, and Dutch Bayou – Randy Delatte” and requested if Mr. Harrell could remain and called upon Councilman Randy Delatte.

Councilman Delatte asked what was the status?

Mr. Harrell advised that as of now, Dutch Creek Bayou is complete. The work has now progressed into Blind River. He reported that in Dutch Bayou alone, they removed over a hundred (100) cubic

yards of vegetative and woody debris and forty thousand (40,000) yards of river silt which had been pumped onto Parish land.

Councilman Delatte questioned the length of the dredging and if this project would be completed this year?

Mr. Harrell advised that yes, it was supposed to be. He advised that they had a hydraulic pump and could not use it because of all of the woody debris that clogged it constantly. He stated that a long arm excavator was necessitated, then the debris was placed into a hopper, then it was required to remove all of the woody debris and then pump it. He hoped that once the work traveled to the Amite River, there may not be as much woody debris, but that was undetermined.

Councilman Delatte asked if Mr. Harrell thought that they may bring the dredging apparatus to Amite River? Or were they just going to try with the drag line? Mr. Harrell advised that they would bring everything with them, and if it happened that there was less woody debris, they would try to pump. He explained that they gain so much from pumping.

Councilman Delatte stated that he had met with Forte and Tablada and he wanted to make sure of this status because of the way that it was permitted. He thought that it was permitted for navigable waters, which meant there's only a certain area and would not be able to go way up into the river, they would only be allowed to go around the mouth.

Mr. Harrell concurred. He further advised that it had taken almost two (2) years to negotiate with all of the state and federal agencies and Indian tribes to obtain permitting to move forward with the project. He explained the process and admitted that it was a slow process because of the extreme amount of woody debris.

The chair asked if Councilman Delatte had any other questions. He advised that he did not.

The chair inquired if there was anyone in the audience who wished to have public input on this agenda item.

Public input: Bobbette Larkey, resident of Livingston, Louisiana; advised that she was there basically representing some of the constituents of District 8, and she guessed all of the Parish

The chair allowed comment from the Councilmembers and Ms. Larkey.

Mr. Harrell was called upon and he wished to explain that this was a coastal restoration project and asked for everyone to keep that in mind. He further explained the benefits of this project and how it would help navigation.

Councilman Gerald McMorris advised that he had done some research from his family tree on the AI tribe that they were looking for, and they still had not found where it was said that they were buried underneath where the camps are located. He stated that he would still like to get that information from the state or whoever, and asked if Mr. Harrell could do that if he didn't mind.

Mr. Harrell obliged to his request.

The chair addressed agenda item number 22, "Discuss the progress of the Watershed Initiative Application – Randy Delatte".

Councilman Delatte stated that he had a meeting scheduled and had to cancel it, but it had been rescheduled for the following week. He advised that he was okay with pulling this off of the agenda unless someone wished to have comment.

The chair advised Mr. Harrell that the Councilmembers did not have any more questions for him and thanked him for his input.

The chair addressed agenda item number 9 a, "Adopt a resolution to make September 18th through September 24th , 2023 National Rail Safety Week" and asked the Council clerk to read the proclamation aloud.

WHEREAS, 1,208 pedestrian trespassing casualties have occurred in the United States resulting in 658 pedestrians being killed and another 550 injured while trespassing on railroad property rights of way during 2022; and

The chair addressed agenda item number 20, “Discuss complaints about trash/debris at Dollar General address 31186 LA Highway 16, Denham Springs, LA 70726 – Randy Delatte”.

The chair called upon Councilman Randy Delatte. Councilman Delatte looked to the audience and asked if there was anyone there to speak on this item?

The chair called upon Ms. Brenda Myers, resident of Curry Davis Road in Denham Springs.

Ms. Myers addressed the Councilmembers and advised that she had a flash drive with at least seventy-five (75) pictures that were taken since March 1st with the trash that keeps piling up at the Dollar General store located across the street from her house. She advised that they lived on a one-lane road located off of Louisiana Highway 16. She stated that this trash flows in her yard that is stored in open cart containers. Ms. Myers further stated that the Permit Office had been called to the location, cited them, and gave them fifteen (15) days to clean it up. She complained that the store would then clean the property up within those fifteen (15) days, and when the Permit Office inspectors come back to assess if they are in compliance, Ms. Myers advised that five (5) days later, the property is in violation once again.

Ms. Myers stated that something has got to be done.

Councilman Delatte addressed the Council members and stated that he proposed to send a letter to the owner, citing the Parish’s ordinances that they are in violation of and tell them that there will be legal action taken pertaining to the ordinance that the Parish cites if they do not continue to keep it clean.

Councilman Delatte further explained that in other words, our ordinance does not allow the contractor or business to dump trash or let trash flow into a neighbor’s yard or to have containers on the side of the road that impedes traffic or any of those things. He stated that they had to make sure that they were abiding by all of the laws. He advised that he was asking that they pass a resolution that they abide by all Parish ordinances that pertain with them having their trash.

The chair stated that he would like to add to that comment, and advised that this was in his Council district, and he had been there on numerous times and concurred that they continually violate the Parish's ordinances that are in place.

The chair asked Mr. Chris Moody, Parish legal advisor, if he would be able to help with this by sending letters to Dollar General that would put a stop to these violations that the neighbors have been experiencing for years.

The chair declared that there was a motion by Mr. Delatte and it had been seconded by Mr. Shane Mack.

Councilman Tracy Girlinghouse requested to make a comment on this agenda item. Councilman Girlinghouse recalled that it had been four or five years ago that they had faced this same problem. He stated that there was a similar incident with the same problem having trash at the fence line of the bordering properties in his Council district.

Councilman Gerald McMorris stated that he would like to make the motion to add the inside of Colyell Dollar General, because it was a mess, further stating that they could ask all of the people down there.

He stated that he did not know the way that they operated, and questioned Mr. Chris Moody if this was a franchise?

Councilman Jeff Ard stated that it should be sent to corporate.

The chair asked what were Mr. Moody's thoughts on this?

Mr. Moody instructed the Council members that they had a process to follow, which in the Parish's ordinance, they can be cited, and through the process by giving them notice and etcetera. He indicated that Administration typically takes this up. If it has been found that there has been no satisfaction using these methods, the Parish could file a lawsuit, then rule them into court, and it may have their business shut down. He advised that there are Dollar Stores all over with this same problem, and it is a continuing problem.

Councilman Delatte addressed Mr. Moody and stated that he agreed. He advised that Administration has been on top of it and it is time consuming by giving them every day a certain amount of time to pick it up, and then as soon as they pick it up, it returns back like it was again. Councilman Delatte asserted that Administration cannot keep sending their inspectors over every other day and something must be done.

Ms. Myers requested to make another comment about the Dollar General located across from her home.

She wished to also advise the Council members that at back of the location where Dollar General had placed their retention pond, she had noticed there was some trash there, and concluded that the retention pond has trash now going in to it in addition to the pond being overgrown. She stated that she was not sure what the rules were on retention ponds and she wondered how this would then impact any flooding if that should occur.

Councilman Gerald McMorris asked Ms. Myers if they could accept her flash drive and put it on record that they had it.

The chair approved Councilman McMorris's request and advised that he wished for the flash drive to be given to Mr. Moody for the reason that he would be the one that would be building this case for the Parish. The chair recommended that the Parish's legal team handle these persisting violations.

Mr. Moody stated that if the Council members gave him such authorization, he could pursue it.

Ms. Myers handed her flash drive to the Deputy clerk and the Deputy clerk delivered it to Mr. Moody at that time.

Mr. Moody advised that they could authorize him to file a lawsuit if Administration's efforts did not move forward. He stated that he could send them a letter.

The chair questioned the others if this is what they should pursue? Councilman Delatte concurred and stated that they should start with Mr. Moody composing a letter to them.

The chair thanked Ms. Myers for her appearance and testimony.

The chair called upon Mr. Wade Holden who requested to have public input on this matter.

Mr. Holden stated that he believed that there was an established code enforcement officer, but he questioned if this situation could be considered as littering and thereby should involve the Sheriff's office?

Councilman Girlinghouse stated that by involving the Sheriff's office, you would actually have to find out who littered which would be difficult.

The chair called upon Mr. Moody who stated that had was an excellent point that had been made. He advised that sometimes there are ordinances that are difficult to enforce. He confirmed that he would be happy to look into this particular situation.

The chair thanked Ms. Myers once again and requested that she keep the Council members abreast of this matter.
