

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Denham Springs, Louisiana, in regular public session convened that:

# Sec. 74-83. Firefighter annual leave.

(a) "Vacation leave" or "annual leave" is leave with pay granted to a full-time employee for the purpose of rehabilitation, restoration, and maintenance of work efficient, or transaction of personal affairs. Vacation leave with pay is granted for all firemen within the employ of the municipality under R.S. 33:1996. After having served one year, firefighters shall be entitled to annual vacation of 18 days (nine 24-hour shifts for 24-hour shift employees totaling 216 working hours) with full pay. This vacation period shall be increased one day for each year of service over ten years, up to a maximum vacation period of 30 days, all of which shall be with full pay. The vacation privileges herein provided shall not be forfeited by any member of the department for any cause. (b) Effective January 1, 2024 firefighters hired on or after January 1, 2017 shall accrue annual leave each pay period according to table set forth below.

- (e) Firefighters who will complete one year of service after January 1, 2024 will receive 216 hours of annual leave on their first anniversary date of hire, and thereafter will begin accruing according to the applicable table.
- (f) No employee shall be granted any vacation leave not credited to the employee's account at the time the absence occurs.

  (g) Prior to the neartement of this policy, any firefighter with frozen accrued vacation time under the previous ordinance will be paid a one-time payment to compensate him or her for any hours over the amount of 180 hours of previously earned, frozen accrued vacation time, acount for that employee will remain available in their account until January 1, 2024, at which time will be available for use as ordinary accrued vacation time.
- (h) After completion of one year of service, annual leave may be taken as earned by an employee with the approval of the employee's department head. However, annual leave is permissive and may be denied by the employee's department head or the mayor when conditions are such that the ordinary work of the municipality could not be performed adequately if annual leave were granted. (i) At no time should more than two members of a shift schedule vacation leave at one time. However, if an emergency situation arises, the Chief or his authorized representative may allow an employee to use vacation leave if other employees are available to cover that employee's shift.
- (j) The mayor, chief or authorized department head may require an employee to take annual leave whenever in his/her administrative judgment such action would be in the best interest of the municipality, the department, or the employee.
- (k) Employees should take all annual leave within the year that it is accrued. However, employees whose job responsibilities preclude their taking all their vacation accrued in a given year, may accrue a maximum of 360 hours for 24 hour shift employees, and 240 hours for 40 hour a week employees.
- Any accrued annual leaves over 360 hours for 24 hour/shift employee or 240 hours for 40 hours/week employee will be rolled over at the end of the fiscal year into the employee's major medical leave account which can be used concurrently with leave under the Family and Medical Leave Act. Hours accumulated in the employee's major medical leave account with may only be used after all other forms of leave have been exhausted. (m) No cash payment may be made in lieu of annual leave except upon separation of employment. The Livingston Parish Council met in a special session duly called, advertised, and convened at its regular meeting place, at the Governmental Building in the Parish Council Chambers, 20355 Government Boulevard, Livingston, Louisiana, on Thursday, May 11, 2023, at the hour of five o'clock (5:00) p.m. with the following Livingston Parish Council members present:

The chair addressed agenda item number 5, "To discuss suspending any activity by the Livingston Parish Planning and Zoning Commission, pending an investigation into possible improprieties or conduct in violation of the law, as established in Section 2-08, "Investigations", of the Home Rule Charter."

The chair advised that Councilwoman Erin Sandefur had requested this meeting and called her to

Councilwoman Sandefur explained what had transpired at the Planning and Zoning Commission's meeting held on Thursday, May 4, 2023 in regard to Deer Run Subdivision. She wished to adopt a resolution to suspend any activity by the Livingston Parish Planning and Zoning Commission to conduct an investigation if any wrongdoing had occurred.

ARTICLE 1

Section 1-04. General Powers.

Except as otherwise provided by this charter the parish government shall continue to have all the powers, rights, privileges, immunities, and authority heretofore possessed by Livingston Parish under the laws of the state. The government shall have and exercise such other powers, rights, privileges, immunities, authority and functions not inconsistent with this charter as may be conferred on or granted to a local governmental suddivision by the constitution and general laws of the state, and more specifically, the government shall have and is hereby granted the right and authority to exercise any power and perform any function necessary, requisite or proper for the management of its affairs, not denied by this charter, or by general state law, or inconsistent with the constitution.

AND WHEREAS the Livingston Parish Home Rule Charter further provides in part:

ARTICLE II

ARTICLE II
Section 2-08. Investigations.
The council may make investigations into the affairs of the parish government and the related conduct of any parish official, officer, employee, department, office, or agency.
For this purpose, the council may subpoena witnesses, administer oaths, take testimony, and require the production of evidence. Investigations shall be for a specified purpose and may be undertaken only by the affirmative vote of a majority of the authorized membership of the council. Any person who fails or refuses to obey any lawful order of the council may be cited for contempt.

AND WHEREAS the Livingston Parish Home Rule Charter further provides in part:

ARTICLE II

He also wished to report on the Juban Road Extension. He advised that Representative Buddy Mincey and Senator Rogers Pope, through Capital Outlay, have successfully allocated 1.6 million to start the environmental studies and right of way design. He discussed other funding through the state and answered questions from the Council members.

Councilman Shane Mack stated that this was a resolution to declare May 9, 2023 as Fentanyl Awareness Day in Livingston Parish. He explained known expectations of adults to mentor our youth, so that they can make good decisions in life that do not destroy families.

He commended when students step up to the plate to mentor the people about their friends and

Councilman Mack advised that Mr. Dylan Ivy contacted him through email requesting that he would sponsor this proposed resolution and described it as an honor to have his name attached to this agenda item. He identified how dangerous a drug that fentanyl was and how it has destroyed many, many families in Livingston Parish. He stated that everyone needs to do everything that they can to educate both the younger and older generation on the perils of this fatal drug.

Councilman Mack invited representatives of Students Against Destructive Decisions (SADD) that were in the audience to come and address the Council members to convey what their organization does to educate and the ways that they raise awareness in our community about the fentanyl crisis. He encouraged everyone to support these efforts.

Mr. Michael Dunlap came to the podium to address the Council members. He advised that he was designated as the Livingston Parish SADD student of the year. He thanked the Council members for their time and openness to support this cause and creating awareness in our community. Mr. Dunlap explained that Livingston Parish SADD was Students Against Destructive Decisions and is a community based non-profit organization dedicated to young people's health and safety. He stated that their organization empowers teens, engages parents, mobilizes communities and changes lives. He further explained that they accomplish this by educating their peers on the dangers of making destructive decisions such as using illicit drugs, drinking alcohol underage and vaping. Their organization host community outreach events that contribute to the development of leadership and decision making skills. It serves students and their families through evidence based programs and awareness events that promote safety and wellness.

Mr. Dunlap illustrated a trip that some of their students traveled to Washington, D.C. to attend the National Drug Prevention Youth Conference. He stated that these students were compelled by research and information presented by the DEA regarding the fentanyl crisis our country is dealing with and its exponentially increasing rates. Councilman Talbert advised that it was a pre-filed bill, when it was presented again, it was presented under the old ad, but it now has a new legislative number and it has a new House Bill. However, when Ms. Sandefur put the item on the agenda, the House Bill had not been finalized, so he advised that they had jumped the gun, and they do not have a final House Bill that they were supporting a resolution that they don't know what the outcome is going to be which it could ultimately restructure it like it was before. He stated that all they wanted to do was add two (2)

members, they did not want to make anyone resign, they did not want to have to reappoint anyone to the Library Board, they wanted to add two (2) members and that was all.

The co-chair asked Councilman Talbert if he felt that it was a conflict with the other resolutions. Councilman Talbert advised that until they know what the final resolution and House Bill looks like, they don't need to support a draft resolution. He stated that in two (2) weeks when the item is on the agenda correctly and they have the correct House Bill as it is filed at the Legislature, then they can vote on the House Bill.

Councilwoman Erin Sandefur wished to reply to Councilman Talbert's statements and advised that the intent of the Council adopting a resolution to support it, is to say to the state that the Council supports this and they were asking for this legislation. She advised that the previous one that was stilled, caused too much controversy, because the way that it was worded indicated that the entire board had to be reset, and that was the only way to make it work. Representative Hodges did not wish to reset the whole board, and the Council did not wish to reset the whole board, therefore the proposed legislation had to be reworded. This new proposed legislation presented was adding two (2) members to the seven (7) member board that they currently have.

Councilwoman Sandefur reiterated that the Council's intent is to support Representative Hodges' draft resolution to indicate to the State of Louisiana that the Livingston Parish Council is in favor of this to add two (2) members to the Library Board.

Councilman Mack agreed with Councilwoman Sandefur's intent.
