If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. TOWN OF ALBANY WATER SYSTEM is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. Such adjustment shall be made only once during a calendar year. Adjustments/rebates shall be made only for amounts of 10.000 adjusts or greater. 10,000 gallons or greater.
- (c) Notice to town required. The property owner must notify the town hall prior (d) Documentation and application of exemption. Upon notification, customer shall
- document his water meter reading by photo before and after filling of pool. Photos of the water meter reading before and after filling, as well as a photograph of the pool, shall be provided to the town to be attached to utility customer's file.
- Town not responsible for discolored water. The town shall not be held responsible for any discolored (rusty) water discharged into the pool. (g) Using hydrants to fill pools. The town does not allow swimming pools to be filled from fire hydrants.

(h) Town personnel prohibited to fill pools. All town personnel are hereby prohibited from filling privately owned swimming pools while on duty or using unmetered water.

in regard to new development within our parish. Our group has worked diligently to establish a baseline for the fee, supported by specific data related to the cost of

educating a student on a per-pupil basis. Since our system is allocated money from the state and the MFP program, the basis of our data resides in the baseline Level 1 allocation per pupil required to appropriately educate a student. Included in the calculation are the following comp a. Baseline allocation per pupil derived from Level 1-2 MFP 22-23 Budget letter from BESE. (\$4015)

b. Related transportation cost - percentage increase in bus cost (33%) over the last three years and the percentage of fuel cost increase (16%) from 2018-19 to 2021/22 c. Percentage construction cost increase for three calendar years (15%)

While we support the concept of an impact fee, we have repeatedly said, it is unacceptable for our school system to say we cannot educate the children who reside in our district. We are bound by Federal law to provide a Free and Appropriate

Education (FAPE) to any child who resides in our parish. Lastly, since this is an ordinance that could be passed by the Livingston Parish Council and adopted by the council, we request that the burden of assessing, and collecting of the possible expressed fee be the responsibility of the council. While this is an LPPS fee and not a sales tax, our sales tax collection office, should not be encumbered with this responsibility.

Our office provides the planning council with the estimated impact of each development that comes before the planning council. The formula is based on the expected impact of elementary, middle and high school students for each proposed development.

Additionally, Livingston Parish schools are primarily supported through sales tax collection, without the benefit of Ad Valorem support through corporate entities. Currently, LPPS millages are dedicated to facilities which are used for renovation, remodeling and maintenance of approximately fifty facilities. This leaves our system with the unenviable task of seeking extensions to existing sales tax bonds to support

new facilities and improvements. Considering the factors of capacity, the increasing cost of educating children, the rising cost of constructing adequate facilities and the limited existing funding mechanisms LPPS would be in favor of establishing a one-time impact fee of all new developments of \$6600 per housing unit. We recommend a 5% increase be added to the initial impact fee each year for three consecutive years with a reevaluation of the Consumer Price index to take place in the fourth year of implementation of the



He declared that was not what this was about, banning Tic Tok from the library because you can access pornography through which we have shown through a report from a private detective, but in essence it was owned by Livingston Parish Government, the library is a subdivision of the government and all we're saying is all material, it's been proven that all material accessed through Tic Toe is being monitored by the company that is owned that owns it, which is a Chinese company, and for a Chinese company to exist, they have to allow the Chinese government access to anything that they want, at any point and time. Councilman Jeff Ard countered these statements and advised that he felt that it was no different than an ordinance, the Council had a Library Board committee that should be looking into this and making that decision for the library. He stated that the Council members have had no feedback from the Library Board members on this issue. Councilman Ard explained that he had spoken with some of the individuals at the library and the employees already have it removed from their computers, they do not have it in their networking system, it was just the public computer that had it. He further acknowledged that it had already been restricted on Administration and everyone that works for the library. Councilman Mack agreed with Councilman Ard's statements and advised that many people go and they do research in the library and may use Tic Tok for research. He offered that the majority of the Tic Tok programming that he had witnessed is not good, but there is some stuff on there that people do use for research and things of that nature. He further stated that it was his understanding that it was not linked and you cannot view pornography in the library. Councilman Mack stated that he knew that Councilman Talbert had hired investigators to go in and be able to access it, but he understood that they were highly trained individuals that were able to break through fire walls and things of that nature. He believed that there needed to be some responsibility placed on the Livingston Parish Library Board to step up and to take action and run their operation correctly. He stated that he would like to give them that opportunity to do that and he stood by his amendment that he had made earlier to the proposed ordinance.

Councilman Tracy Girlinghouse stated that he thought that this could also be applied to Parish Government. He discussed the establishment of Administrative policy implementing prohibition that could be put in place, or you could also argue that for the Council to ban it on all Parish property is over reach when as Councilman Mack had stated, the Library could make a decree and it would be implemented.

Councilwoman Erin Sandefur wished to make the point that if the Council adopts this, then it would then have to be policed. She stated that then it would lead to Facebook and Meta, and Snap Chat and so many other apps. She indicated that as a mother, she hated all of these apps and did not allow them on her children's phones that live in her home. Councilwoman Sandefur asked Councilman Talbert where this came from, and his persistence to

Councilman Talbert replied that it was his feeling that this country as a whole is under attack by the Chinese government and for us to continue to allow them to monitor our activities is crazy and he has no control over what individuals do in their own home or whatever, we as a Council can absolutely make this against the rules on Parish devices. He advised Councilwoman Sandefur that was it, plain and simple. He stated that he could go through the list of people who use Facebook in an effort to get public service information out during different times that have tremendous value. Councilwoman Sandefur stated that you could do the same thing on Facebook, so her point was

that you are going to have to ban Facebook as well

Councilman Talbert made his argument as to why he considered Facebook and Tic Tok two Councilinan Taibert inade his argument as town in econsidered racebook and the Tok tow different things, one being a relations deal utilized by the Parish and Tik Tok was not being used for public safety within the Parish, so what is the purpose of having it on Parish computers. He stated that it would be Administration's responsibility on how to implement it.

anyone in Parish government that had Tik Tok or WeChat on their computer? He did not monitor anyone's computer, he was just asking that we make it policy that we don't have it. The chair stated that there had been a motion made by Councilman Talbert to ban Tik Tok on all government computers in the Parish, and a substitute motion made by Councilman Shane Mack to ban it on all except the Library.

The chair wished to offer a third consideration to the Council members. He stated that it was not

a motion, it was just an option. He indicated that he was against a ban for Tik Tok, and he wished to explain to them why. He conveyed that this started with federal government when they did what was called the Restrict Act. He explained that the Restrict Act was passed to stop the Chinese

Councilwoman Sandefur questioned Councilman Talbert if he knew of any Parish officials or

from spying, but it was so far-reaching that they actually gave power to the commerce department in the federal government to have complete authority to take people's phones, monitor and set and make laws that they are not even elected people to take away everyone's phones. He further stated that part of the power gave them the right to stop you from having a VPN on your computer oyour phone. This let them over reach into people's lives. He thought that they could easily pass this with a resolution asking the Parish President to administrate his employees and the Council members could have an in-house policy for our office. He surmised that they did not need to adopt an ordinance and the reason that an ordinance was put in place is because it is enforceable by law. He further construed that the Sheriff's Department could then go out and confiscate your phone if he suspects that there is a Tik Tok app installed and he could arrest you or the Council could set fines on someone.

The chair clarified that a vote no would put the control back into the Administration, being Parish President Layton Ricks, and the Councilmembers, and the Library Board could each run their own policy. He felt that setting a law was drawing too hard of a line and it is too much over reach from The chair's comments were met with applause from the audience members

He then called upon Councilman Shane Mack to address the substitute motion that he had made to amend the proposed ordinance by removing the Library ban of Tik Tok and prohibiting it on all other Parish devices.

He also wished to point out that there were a lot of single women out there in the audience that have children or whatever, and he didn't know if the Councilmembers were aware of how expensive that diapers were. He stated that all he was asking was for the parish consider the pink tax exemption to carry on what the state allows you to do at the local level for women in this particular environment.

The chair wished to clarify that this was to just exempt feminine products? Councilman Talbert wished to make sure that he stated as well as diapers. Councilman Keen stated that there was a blank snot on the ordinance. Councilman Talbert stated
