Minutes of the Livingston Parish Council Livingston, Louisiana June 27, 2024

The Livingston Parish Council met in a regular session duly called, advertised, and convened at its regular meeting place, at the Governmental Building in the Parish Council Chambers, located on 20355 Government Boulevard, Livingston, Louisiana, on Thursday, June 27, 2024, at the hour of six o'clock (6:00) p.m. with the following Livingston Parish Council

The chair called the meeting to order.

The chair asked the public to please mute or turn off their cell phones

The chair announced that Public Input would be accepted from any member of the audience

wishing to address an agenda item and explained the procedure to be called upon The chair addressed agenda item number 7, "Presentations", and advised that he had received a

letter that he had been asked to read to the Council members from Livingston Parish Sheriff, Jason Ard as follows:

I would like to apologize to the Council once again for not being able to attend the last meeting. Also I want to thank the Council for being willing to seek out and listen to all facts before voting on the proposed occupational ordinance and once again, I want to assure the Council and the Parish Administration, that myself and my staff are always here to help.

The chair reiterated that the Sheriff had sent that to him and he asked if he would read that and the chair told him that he would be glad to do that.

Having no comments, the chair moved to the next agenda item.

air addressed agenda item number 7a, "Presentations: Sydney Taylor, Miss Louisiana USA

The chair called upon Councilman Lonnie Watts. Councilman Watts advised that Sydney Taylor was from his Council district, District 1, and wanted to share a little bit about who Sydney was. He explained that Sydney Taylor is twenty-three (23) years old and from Livingston, Louisiana. She is the daughter of proud parents Billy & Courtney Taylor. She graduated from LSU in 2023 with her Bachelor's Degree in Accounting, and plans to attend law school to eventually become a copporate attorney. Sydney grew up as an athlete and is now a volunteer coach, which led her to create her platform, Play With a Purpose. Using her platform, she collects sports equipment and donations to give back to young athletes in need, so they can achieve their goals. Sydney was recently crowned Miss Louisiana USA and will be competing at the Miss USA competition on August 4th in Hollywood. She's cestatic to have the opportunity to represent her home state and parish.

Councilman Watts thanked and congratulated Sydney and declared that he knew that she would "do us proud"!

The audience clapped in response and the chair asked for the Council members to have a photo opportunity as Councilman Watts presented her with a plaque of recognition and a proclamation.

Ms. Taylor thanked the Council members and stated that she was really proud to represent Livingston Parish. She advised that she has lived here her entire life and was really excited to represent on the Miss USA stage in just one (1) month.

The Council members paused for a photo opportunity and then returned to the regular order of The chair commended Councilman Watts on his presentation. Councilman Watts also wanted to recognize Parish President Randy Delatte for his participation in honoring Ms. Taylor at that

evening's meeting.

The chair addressed agenda item number 8a, "Livingston Economic Development Council – David Bennett: Adopt resolution in support of Weyerhaeuser NR Company to amend Exhibit A's of their original TIEP contracts by modifying the retained jobs and payroll to reflect 125 jobs and 6,893,000 in annual payroll".

The chair recognized Mr. David Bennett, President of the Livingston Parish Economic Development Council.

Mr. Bennett greeted the Council members and gave them a brief overview of this project for Weyerhaeuser. He invited Mr. Robert Wege of Sumit Credits, LLC to explain further the need for the proposed resolution.

Mr. Wege advised that this was basically an unavoidable error in the process of filing the application. He stated that at the time of the application they only had a partial year's worth of data, and they used that data to get the best estimate of what the number of qualified jobs were at the site. However, at the end of the year it was determined that their information was not complete and a number of those jobs did not qualify in the state's eyes as being a full time Louisiana resident qualified job for the purposes of this program. They are asking the Council to make a modification to the contract to reduce the number of jobs that are required at the site to match what was at that site in terms of a qualified eligible job as required by the state.

The chair addressed agenda item number 11, "Parish President's Report:" and called upon Parish President Randy Delatte. He advised that he would be presenting later in the meeting. The chair addressed agenda item number 12a, "Grants Department: Adopt a Resolution authorizing the parish president to execute a cooperative endeavor agreement (CEA) between the Livingston Parish Council and the Livingston Parish Sewer District (LPSD) to use ARPA funding for the Sanitary Sewer Force Main from Belmont

if not, the Parish will need to use the ARPA money.

Subdivision to Juban Parc Subdivision and the Buddy Ellis Regional Wastewater Treatment Plan expansion projects' Councilwoman Erin Sandefur questioned the ARPA funding and wanted how much and a

Mickey McMorris, Parish Finance Director, advised that it was three million dollars (\$3,000,000.00) that was set aside for the project. He stated that 1.5 million is required now. Administration is determining if the additional 1.5 million can be derived from other sources, and

Councilwoman Sandefur asked for further clarification Parish President Randy Delatte advised that it was a three million dollar (\$3,000,000.00) project that was proposed in the first budget. The Parish is facing some budget constraints and they have agreed to only accepting 1.5 million at this time and then 1.5 over another year.

Councilman John Mangus stated that it was his understanding for Buddy Ellis Regional Wastewater Treatment Plant that there was an expansion planned, but as of right now, it's over capacity. He asked if someone could address that?

Mr. McMorris explained that this is a huge project, intended to be over forty million dollars (\$40,000,000.00) and wished to defer those questions to Mr. Eddie Aydell of Alvin Fairburn and Associates to speak on behalf of these specific items. He further explained that these specific items were just some of the things that was pulled out of a whole array of what is going on to consolidate the Sewer District.

Councilman Mangus asked if this would be under the Livingston Parish Sewer District? Mr McMorris confirmed that it would be. Councilman Mangus had other questions and Mr. McMorris wished to defer those to Mr. Eddie Aydell.

Mr. Eddie Aydell of Alvin Fairburn and Associates advised that the Sewer District took \$4.5 million of funds that they had dedicated toward \$38 million worth of construction projects to use as match to fix the issues for the Springfield project. They saw an opportunity to make an application for Louisiana Water Sector funds, but it required them to dedicate \$4.5 million worth of monies they had scheduled to go toward twelve (12) other projects. The Sewer District committed the \$4.5 million, and thankfully, that allowed the receipt of \$14 million of funding to fix all of the issues as Springfield. He explained that the Cooperative Federator Agreement will fix all of the issues at Springfield. He explained that the Cooperative Endeavor Agreement will help to make the Sewer District whole, but not completely whole, because they're in at \$4.5 million and they agreed to only accept \$3 million from the Parish to offset the \$4.5 million. He further explained that of those twelve (12) projects, two (2) of them are to increase the capacity at the Buddy Ellis plant, to run that force main from the Buddy Ellis plant all the way down south, past Bellmont to Hammock Road. He discussed upgrades to the Ward 2 substation, upgrades at the Lockhart plant main station, upgrades at Savanah Trace, four (4) odor control projects, there were many things that encompasses the \$38 million that they took the \$4.5 million from.

Mr. Aydell stated that he had all of the details for anyone that would like to look at it and he would

Councilman Ricky Goff and Mr. Aydell offered some history of the past difficulties and problems of sewer locations and how through this funding those needs would be met.

Councilman Goff stated that there were so many pieces to this and he knew the Cooperative Endeavor Agreement spells out those pieces, he questioned if it would be better for the Council to include all of those entities in the Cooperative Endeavor Agreement in case there may be issues the total drift.

Mr. Aydell advised that could certainly be done if the Council wished to amend the agreement. He stated that he had the list of the twelve (12) projects if they wanted to give the flexibility to apply to any of those twelve (12).

The list of projects included in the \$38,000,000 of construction are:

Mr. McMorris stated that Administration would certainly not have any issues to Councilman Goff's proposed amendment to the Cooperative Endeavor Agreement

The chair asked Councilman Goff if he was proposing to make those amendments, and did he want to put that in the form of a motion by adding the other entities'

Councilman Goff advised that he did and Councilman Billy Taylor wished to second that motion.

The chair asked if there were any other input or discussion. Having none, he called for the vote.

WCK Construction Alvin Fairburn & Associates Preliminary Site Plan Section 1, T86, R3E Council District 6" Walker South Road Waiver on the Fence requiremen

Public input: Chris Houston, representative of WCK Construction

Mr. Houston advised that his company currently has an office located on Walker South. They have purchased the property next door from their neighbor, who has no objections to waiving the fence requirement and has also signed the fence waiver. He explained that their business has plans to build an office next door to where they are located on Walker South. Questions were raised asking if this had been through the Planning Commission. Mr. Houston dvised that it had.

The chair called upon Ms. DeeDee Delatte, Parish Planning and Permit Director. Ms. Delatte advised that it had gone through the Planning Commission and it was approved contingent on the waiver for the fence.

Councilwoman Erin Sandefur wished to convey that out of concern for waivers, had asked for an opinion from one of their attorneys and he offered an opinion. She advised that it is not so simple to just issue a waiver and it does affect other things buggly. She called upon Mr. Steve Irving to come and address the Council members and explain the legality of waivers.

Mr. Steve Irving addressed the Council members and advised that he handles Planning and Zoning things for the Parish and is a lawyer. Mr. Irving stated that he received this request about waivers, but he did not really know what the waiver was exactly about. He stated that waivers and variances are sometimes used interchangeably even though they are not precisely. He advised that he went ahead and actually wrote an opinion, that he thought had been distributed to the Council members, discussing both the waivers and the variances and what the status of the laws are and in the ordinances in terms of making that actually work.

Mr. Irving stated that this is an Administrative decision making process. He explained that ultimately there were three (3) things needed. The first being the need for a procedure by which the decision is made, the criteria used to make the decision, and you needed to have a way to record the decision so that the next individual having the same problem is treated the same way, being equal protection. He explained that these three (3) things are called procedural due process, substantive due process and equal protection. He advised that there was some clean up that needed to be done in the waivers and variances process that is in this Parish, which he has outlined in the opinion that he had given the Council.

Mr. Irving explained that in looking at this proposed request for a fence waiver, there is a procee for this under Chapter 126 of the Code of Ordinances. That procedure is that it comes before Council as a recommendation from the Planning and Zoning Commission and ultimately Council either affirms or denies the recommendation from the Planning and Zoning Commiss

Mr. Irving offered that the one thing that needed some work in Chapter 126 was a better statement of the criteria that will be used to determine whether a waiver will be granted or not. He advised this was the result of his general review of this. He stated that he would be happy to answer any questions.

Councilman John Mangus stated that if the neighbor wanted the fence, that is quite a different thing, and is truly a waiver and going against what their ordinances are.

Mr. Irving advised that the Council could have that in their ordinance for whether a waiver will be granted or not would be if there is objection from any of the surrounding property owners. He explained that would be a perfectly fine rule to put in as part of the decision making process. In addition, the Planning and Zoning Commission could track those decisions so that the next time that something comes up, Planning and Zoning could make a recommendation to the Council recommending the waiver to be approved because the Council has considered this issue in the past or they could recommend to do it differently because something is different. He stated that is the Administrative process.

The chair called upon Ms. Delatte who advised that they had the letters from the adjacent homeowner of no objection.

Ms. Delatte advised that the Planning Commission recommended approval, contingent upon the waiver being authorized for the fence.

Ms. Delatte read the recommendation from the Livingston Parish Planning Commission as follows Their recommendation is to approve the preliminary site plan for WCK Construction contingent on the Council approving the waiver on the fence.

Parish President Randy Delatte advised that he understood Councilwoman Sandefür's question. He stated that they haven't answered the question the way that it needs to be answered is because the ordinance did not give them authority to grant a waiver. He conveyed that the attorney, Mr. Steve Irving, was recommending that they change that and give them authority. The Planning Commission would have no problem in giving authority because they approved it. He advised that the issue is that it precisely says in the ordinance that the approval must come from the Council. If the issue is that it precisely says in the ordinance that the approval must come from the Council. If the Council chooses to amend the ordinance, it will take thirty (30) days, and it is not fair to WCK to keep them out for thirty (30) days, particularly when they have been doing the same over and over and the neighbor agrees.

Councilman Dean Coates questioned Mr. Irving about his statement that there needs to be a procedure in place and asked if there was currently a procedure in place?

thought that it was a good idea to take things like this and let them be decided by the Planning and Zoning Commission. He stated that there could potentially be an appeal to the Council if someone disagrees with their decision. He offered that if you have a situation where the neighbors are in agreement, there is no reason that it should have to come before the Council. He thought that the Planning and Zoning Commission should just be given criteria and authorized to make the decision, as well as keep track of it and be sure the next person is treated the same way, he felt that

Councilwoman Erin Sandefur continued the discussion. Mr. Irving answered her questions. She asked if Mr. Irving could draw up the criteria for them. Councilman Dean Coates stated that he would like to provide an amendment to that. The chair questioned if he wanted to make a substitute motion? Councilman Coates stated yes and the chair

The chair clarified that he would not receive his waiver if Councilman Coates's motion passes and he could not proceed with his project until he either puts up a fence or gets that waive The chair called upon Ms. Delatte who wished to clarify that there is a procedure in place and has

He stated that if there were anyone that was listening and interested in this, they had a website that you could go to for more information: becomeamedic.com. He announced that their next EMT class will begin on July 15th and in a matter of three (3) months you could be an EMT and could make thirty-six thousand dollars (356,000.00) a year for Acadian Ambulance. He encouraged everyone to visit that website he mentioned and stated that even if you want to become an EMT and help your local fire departments, Acadian can help get that certification.

The chair asked if they needed him there to talk about this? Councilman Erdey thought that everyone wants to talk to this man, that's just general opinion. He stated that it was only fair that they got to see him and meet him and ask the questions that you want to ask him. Councilman Erdey advised that the thought that was the right way to do it, and it can't make them go backwards, but it can make them go forward in this Parish as they were elected to do. He was just trying to set up the meeting next Wednesday night because that is an availability for him, he's a busy man, but he was willing to take this on, and let him present himself to all of them. And let them decide.

The chair asked what are the thoughts of the Council members for a meeting next Wednesday, which is July the $3^{\rm rd}$, the day before Independence Day.

The chair addressed agenda item number 7a, "Presentations: Recognition of Caleb Roblin and Jordan Kelly for being 2024 Louisiana Youth B.A.S.S. Nation HS Anglers of the year – Erin

The chair called upon Councilwoman Erin Sandefur who shared the accomplishments of Caleb Roblin and Jordan Kelly. She advised that they both had recently graduated from Denham Springs High School. She stated that Caleb and Jordon won the Louisiana Bass Nation State Champinoship and explained that this title is the high school equivalent of winning the Bass Master Classic. To add to that, she conveyed that they are a team and had also won the award for Anglers of the Year at the Louisianal Youth Bass Nation Series. She commended these achievements and explained how difficult and challenging that it was to receive these merits and the honed skills that were now difficult and challenging that it was to receive these ments and the noned skills that were necessary. Councilwoman Sandefur stated that it was the first time that a team had won both. She acknowledged that they would now be progressing to compete for the national win in Tennessee. She asked them to come to the front because she and the members of the Council wished to

Councilman Lonnie Watts advised that he had a family member that fishes as well and he wished to share with everyone how much this sport has grown. He explained that there were two hundred sixty-five (265) schools in the state that participate in this Bass Nation competition. He stated that he was at this state tournament and these guys fought hard under poor conditions and this is quite the honor that they have achieved. He praised their efforts and declared great job guys!

Councilwoman Erin Sandefur and John Mangus presented them with plaques of achievement and the chair allowed for photo opportunities at that time.

The audience applauded and the Councilmembers then returned to their seats and the chair moved The chair addressed agenda item 7b, "Presentations: Update from DOTD on the Juban Road four (4) lane road project – Ryan Chavers/DOTD Representative", and called upon Councilman Ryan

Louisiana State Senator Valarie Hodges was present in the audience and walked to the podium to address the Councilmembers. She thanked Mr. Chavers for inviting her office to attend the Council members that evening to give an update on the DOTD road project on Juban Road. She also wished to report about the historic legislative session that just ended. She advised that they had achieved

to report adout the insolute registance session that just entered, since a varieties that they take a direct many accomplishments. She stated that it was a phenomenal experience to see Louisiana become a leader in the nation. She has been contacted by many people, including various news outlets and was receiving positive feedback from the legislation that had been adopted. She accredited Louisiana's new governor for helping with their successes. Senator Hodges explained legislation that she was successful in passing and how wonderful it had been to work with the freshman legislators from Livingston Parish. She was excited to report on the funding received for their Capital Outlay projects, and advised that they had received a historic amount of funds in the amount of fifty million dollars (\$50,000,000.00).

Senator Hodges subsequently addressed the DOTD Juban Road four (4) lane project. She stated that she had taken office on January 8th and acknowledged that this project was not something that she was very familiar with, with the exception of shopping at Juban Crossing, and questioned whis four (4) lane project had been going on for years and never saw anyone working. She praised and commended her two (2) legislative assistants for their help and hard work and how they are instrumental to her. They scheduled four (4) meetings with DOTD, Forte and Tablada, and the contractor to identify the problems. The last meeting that was scheduled was a site meeting and included the head of DOTD and the contractor She requested that they show her exactly what was going on. She was provided a timeline, and had copies with her that evening at the Council meeting and if anyone wished to have one. The project originally began in 2011, and six and a half (6 ½) years ago, the contractor defaulted. It stayed unattended until they could get a new contract. She advised that there were environmental issues, there were electricity issues, contractor issues, weather issues and there was also COVID. She explained to her legislative assistants that this was going to be her main thing that she wished to focus on. She was receiving many calls about the abandoned project as well.

Through these meetings and the timeline that they provided, during the months of January and February, they have performed drainage work and culverts, they had dug a thousand feet (1000°) of the canal, they relocated a lot of the utilities, but still have some that are ongoing. They had also performed traffic lane preparations. In March, they began relocating the utilities, more drainage and culverts, they shifted the traffic to temporary lanes, they demoed and rebuilt the inside lanes, installed signage, in addition to undertaking the striping and excavating of the shoulder areas. For the month of April, all of the issues that they had been facing were all resolved and new contracts were signed. She reported that in May, they started hauling dirt and doing the grading embankments, they poured concrete for the catch basins, and they were addressing and repairing the potholes as well as maintaining commercial driveways.

Senator Hodges declared that through all of this they have formed a great relationship Sensitos iffoges decialed una unfogen air or this with pine forming a gean relationship with one another. She advised that a constituent reported to her that there were some driveways that were falling apart on this project, and her legislative assistant called and requested if they could help with this issue. She stated that they were there within hours to do the repairs to the driveways.

She continued to report that in June, because of the amount of rain that had been received, most of their efforts were focused on drying out the dirt. They had plans scheduled to conduct the soil cement operation, which should have been completed earlier that day.

Senator Hodges wanted the Councilmembers to know that her office evaluates this road project every week. They also call and ask if they need to meet them at the site, or does the contractor need anything? She asked them what she could do as a senator to expedite their process. They advised that there was nothing at that point that they needed her help to do, because all of the hurdles had been cleared. They reported that they should be finished and functional by May of 2025 and everything should be fully completed. The contract should be finalized at the end of 2025.

She was excited to give them this report, and it was very unfortunate that there had been so many delays, but a lot of it was out of their control, including the design being bad and having to redesign

the project. Knowing all that she does at this point, she feels hopeful and confident that they will have it fully functional within a year. Councilman Ryan Chavers thanked Senator Hodges for coming to the Council meeting and giving this update herself, taking time out of her busy schedule.

this update herself, taking time out of her busy schedule.

He wished to address one of the main concerns that he had, and directed Senator Hodges to view the picture that was on the podium that she was standing at. He stated that the picture was of a truck that ran off of the highway as Mr. Chavers was traveling down Juban Road facing Highway 190. He advised that the ruck was in front of an ambulance and had nowhere to go to pull over and let the ambulance pass. He stated that he and four (4) other people that were in traffic had to get out of their vehicles and jump on the back of that man's truck to get the back tires to hit the ground. He stated that wasted potentially five (5) minutes of someone's life because of the horrible condition of Juban Road. He advised that this was not a blame game, this is to tell the Council members what is going on and what can they do as a Council to help her. He stated that in preparation for the future, he has felt as a constituent, and he had been approached by many of his constituents who also questioned, why would you allow Juban Road to happen without knowing that there was going to be that amount of traffic? How could they have prevented this? Why wouldn't the road be four (4) laned first and then the development come? Councilman Chavers asked Senator Hodges what were her thoughes to that? asked Senator Hodges what were her thoughts on that?

Senator Hodges replied that they did ask DOTD about that. DOTD's answer was that they do not control who purchases the land and what they do with it. She stated that Livingston Parish is fastest growing parish in the state of Louisiana. She added that no one expected this kind of grov

She advised that DOTD has hired a process control manager and she has been working with him. DOTD knows that they now have accountability, which they have not had. She understood and agreed with Councilman Chavers and has committed to this project's accountability. She thanked Councilman Chavers and acknowledged that he is in tune with the constituents. She advised that anytime that he calls, she answers and her office will meet him wherever the need is to be met. She indicated that the response has been better under the new State of Louisians' Administration and under this new leadership they will be following through with accountability.

and under this new leadership they will be following through with accountability. Councilman Chavers agreed that they were a great bunch of guys. He asked Senator Hodges if they could go back to consider the topic of infastructure ahead of development again. He discussed the current developments in place on Lockhart Road, which is in the vicinity of Juban, and the proposed developments that have been approved that will adding more homes to Lockhart Road's two (2) lane highway. He did not know what kind of communication was needed with DOTD to prepare for that many vehicles to travel on that road, but that it was going to be the same situation as Juban Road as far as the safety concern. He acknowledged that he knew that was not located in his Council district, but he had been approached by people questioning him with their concerns of what was going to happen. He thanked Senator Hodges for her assistance with these issues and concerns and acknowledged that she had been newly elected to her position in January and she was doing a phenomenal job and he appreciated her update. He told her that he would like to stay in touch on these issues.

She thanked him and stated that she looked forward to that. She asked for the Council members to convey their concerns because the Parish of Livingston had a lot of funding that was going to be directed to Highway 64/1019 roundabouts, the 16/42 roundabout, the 447 and 1025 roundabout, the 447 at 11-12 overpass, Cook Road, Juban Road, Demco Road, Home Depot Road and she wished to finish these projects and then begin on what Councilman Chavers was speaking about and be looking to the future. She wished for them to get together to talk about that for the next year.

Councilman Chavers stated that he felt that it also goes back to whoever is doing the traffic studies, he wasn't sure if or who performed the traffic study for Juban Road, but Juban Road could have been caught if it had a traffic study to address those issues.

The chair called upon Councilwoman Erin Sandefur who thanked Senator Hodges for jumping in when she did and the hard work that she had put into it. She also wished to thank her for the little things, such as the grass, which meant a lot to Council District 5. She invited Senator Hodges to please come back with updates.

The chair called upon Councilman John Mangus who questioned if the roundabout at Florida Boulevard and Juban Road would be finished before the end of the year. Senator Hodges was not sare and did not have any information on that project. He stated that the thought that it was a separate project from the widening of Juban Road and the reason that he was wondering was because, while it will be great when Juban is finished, the big buildup was at Florida Boulevard at the light at Juban. Senator Hodges stated that while these were two (2) different projects, the four (4) lane of Juban Road and the roundabout at Florida Boulevard and Juban Road, they really go together. She advised that the widening must be finished before the roundabout can be done and that is the next step to get that on the agenda to be done. She further advised that she would contact DOTD tomorrow and ask about a timeline and let him know.

*Agenda item number 7c, "Presentations: Abbie Comeaux with the National Youth Advo Program – Erin Sandefur", had been cancelled as Ms. Comeaux could not attend the meeting

The chair addressed agenda item 7d, "Presentations: Richard Kramer with Florida Parish's Human Services Authority – Parish President's Office", and asked if there was anyone present to speak on this item. Mr. Richard Kramer, Executive Director of Florida Parishes Human Services Authority, addressed

the Councilmembers and explained that their organization serves the public sector for behavioral health and development disabilities and provides services for the five (5) Florida Parishes, Livingston Parish is one (1) of those five (5) parishes. He stated that a new board member had been appointed from Livingston Parish. It had been suggested that now would be a good time to come and speak to the members of the Council to remind them what they do and what is available in the community, because there is a great need, especially in regard to behavioral health services for everyone.

Mr. Kramer explained that they are the single point of entry for developmental disability services, behavioral health outpatient services, mental health and substance abuse services. There are five (5) clinics across the five (5) parishes as well as an inpatient residential substance abuse program. He advised that one (1) of their clinics was located in Livingston Parish in Denham Springs on Florida Boulevard. In that clinic they provide substance abuse and mental health services. He continued to advise that they are a public sector agency and their employees are state employees, however, they do not report directly to the state, they report to a board of directors. He indicated that their board members were present in the audience that evening and shared that Livingston Parish has two (2) board members, being Ms. Stafford and recently appointed Brandon Browning.

He stated that their agency wanted to make the Council members aware of what is available in their community and how they could help. Mr. Kramer introduced Ms. Rochelle Sibley, Chief Operating Officer of the Florida Parishes Human Services Authority, who lives locally in the City of Walker and has been a lifelong resident of Livingston Parish.

She spoke about the many different roles of their professional staff, the recent expansion at the Denham Springs office and what that addition would be used for in the community, in addition to the work that they do with prevention services. While they offer outpatient services in their clinics and provide services for those that are struggling with mental health and addictions, they also do prevention services in the schools and partner with Dylan Ivey of Louisiana Youth Advisors located in Livingston Parish, who provides a great deal of the prevention services in our parish schools. Each year Mr. Ivey provides several classes with types of evidence based programs to students in our schools. She stated that they serve thousands each year with those programs and how excited that the Florida Parishes Human Services Authority was to be in that partnership. She acknowledged that it was a very successful partnership.

The chair called upon Councilman John Mangus who wanted to say thank you to Mr. Kramer and Ms. Sibley for what they do and explained that in his line of work he deals with medically homebound, and there are many times that there are students that he is familiar with who have received special education services and have been through their program. He conveyed what a blessing that it was to have them and they had a friend on the Council. Mr. Kramer advised that they were there to serve and if there was anything that they could do, they were easy to get in touch with.

Councilman Ricky Goff requested if Mr. Kramer and Ms. Sibley could share exactly where they were located. He also wished to ask if they just do walk-ins and was there a phone number that if someone needed help they could call? He asked for any direction that they may be able to give. Mr. Kramer stated that their clinic was located at 1951 Florida Boulevard in Denham Spr Sibley added that their location was before you get to the bridge on Florida Boulevard towards Baton Rouge, just past Veteran's Boulevard.

Councilman Goff asked if there was a phone number that they could provide. Mr. Kramer advised that the best way to access services would be to go to their website "fights.org." There, they will find a list with the services that they provide as well as phone numbers and locations. He addressed Councilman Goff's question about walk-ins and advised that they do accept walk-ins. If someone feels like they need their services, they will be seen and assessed and placed into the correct program to meet their needs or they may be referred to a different office to provide the help that they need. Councilman Goff asked Mr. Kramer if he could provide that information to the gentleman in the back of the chambers who is providing their video and audio services that evening in hopes that he could tag that information on the meeting's replay video so that information may be televised.

The chair stated that everyone had received the updated list and requested for a motion to adopt.

Councilman Billy Taylor advised that he wished to make the motion and Councilman Dean Coates stated that he would duly second that motion. The chair asked if there were any discussion and called upon Councilman John Mangus who asked if the list presented was the definitive list? Are any more roads being added to this?

Mr. Dugas stated that this was the list that they came up with based off of the funding that is available. He advised that roads may be added. Councilman Lonnie Watts asked Mr. Dugas, how many off of this list do you think could possibly

Mr. Dugas advised that he had spoken to many of the Council members and stated that this would has looked at as doing it as a program, versus an overlay or outlay project. He explained that the numbers on the list that they used are from the engineer's scoring of the roads and they were placed in those areas that they were looking at, and according to the engineer's recommendations, all of the roads on that list are based on what they had come up with.

Mr. Dugas explained that some roads will be totally reconstructed, but there are some roads that will not be a total reconstruction and just an area done and then some preservation done to make the road last longer. Mr. Dugas further explained that in the past, they had completely redone the whole road, but a third (1/3) of the road doesn't need to be done. He advised that they would be fixing what needed to be fixed that had a base failure, and then do preservation on the rest.

Councilman Dean Coates asked Mr. Dugas if that was completely redoing the road or is some of that patchwork?

Councilman Dean Coates stated that he just wanted to get that on the record so that people did not think that all of these roads are going to be resurfaced. Councilman Ricky Goff was called upon. He advised that Councilman Coates had asked the questions that Councilman Goff wished Mr. Dugas to explain and elaborate upon. He added that by using this procedure that Mr. Dugas had explained, they will be able to get more work done.

Mr. Dugas advised that the goal is to fix the base failures whereby eradicating the pot holes and then it will be less expensive to go and just overlay versus letting the road go longer and longer without fixing their base failures. Councilman Goff wished to reiterate Mr. Dugas's statements. He advised that there will be some roads that you are going to reseal that are in pretty decent condition and this will make them look new and also protect them from a water penetration base going into the base. He stated that the second part of that will be roads that have patching will be addressed in sections. Mr. Dugas agreed and stated that they will be going down in the base and repairing that base because therein lies what the problem is, and instead of adding bits of patches on larger sections, those patches will be removed and it will be repaired to allow that section to get better, and as the road ages they will at some point do the entire road.

Mr. Dugas advised that the idea and goal is to get the roads to last longer.

Councilman Ryan Chavers wished to ask questions about the roads listed in his district. He advised that these are fairly new roads with fairly new houses on them and the roads have always been in poor quality. He asked Mr. Dugas if there was a warranty phase? Could they hold the contractor accountable?

Mr. Dugas was not sure when the roads were done and that could possibly be the ones that they will be doing preservation on. Councilman Chavers had seen the road and advised that it had been within a year. Mr. Dugas stated that the life expectancy of that road is twenty (20-25) to twenty-five years and when the preservation seal is applied, it gives that road another five (5-7) to seven years, maybe even ten (10) years. He explained that the life of the road could be thirty (30) years. That was the goal. LPR NO. 24-221

The chair called upon Councilman Ryan Chavers and asked if he had someone at the meeting that wanted to speak on this item? Councilman Chavers indicated that he placed this on the agenda to see what the Council's were on this waiver request. He advised that Mr. Anthony Feduccia's real estate agent was

Public input: Mr. Justin England, real estate agent for Anthony Feduccia Mr. England greeted the Council members and explained that Mr. Feduccia was trying to re-subdivide this property back to how he had it originally. He advised that the size of the lot was 1.84 acreage. He questioned if the Council members had the email that he sent with the attachments. The chair asked if they were trying to go back to what it was?

Mr. England advised that they were trying to take that to back into two (2). He stated that it also runs into Nan Wesley Road and they were essentially trying to remove that so they did not have to clear the woods to add a second entrance way because it is a minor subdivision. He indicated that if they did not get the waiver to re-subdivide that lot, Mr. Feduccia is going to clear the woods in order to add a second access point. They wanted to avoid that if they could and just keep one (1) private servitude. Mr. England advised that they currently only have three (3) lots off of that servitude so they would be able to add a fourth without needing a waiver, however, he re-subbed it less than twenty-four (24) months ago, therefore, they would need a waiver. Mr. Feduccia will have eight (8) lots total because of that little strip that goes to Nan Wesley instead of seven (7). He stated that the waiver request was for Section (125-371(18)).

Councilman Billy Taylor wished to be sure that the documents that he was looking at were correct He stated that the map that he had indicates that the property was subdivided on December 5, 2023 Councilman Taylor asked if Mr. England's client had two (2) issues, are you trying to subdivide within four (4) months of the last division of property and you cannot subdivide within twenty-four (24) months and the other is putting an extra lot on a servitude?

Mr. England stated that the first was correct, they wished to subdivide within twenty-four (24) months of the last division. The second requested waiver is to have more than seven (7) lots on a servitude that are less than one (1) acre per lot located in a minor subdivision. He further explained that there are currently three (3) lots off of that servitude not four (4) that is allowed per the ordinance, so they would not need a waiver for that.

Councilman John Mangus questioned where the eighth (8th) lot was located on the plat map. Mr. England advised the eighth (8th) lot would come if the waiver is granted. It will take 6-A back into lot six (6) and lot (7).

The chair asked if they were combining six (6) and (7)? Mr. England stated that his client had combined those lots to cut off Nan Wesley. He explained that when this was originally done in combined those lots to cut off Nan Wesley. He explained that when this was originally done in December, he was going to have a road going to Nan Wesley and also to Sims Road. When Mr. England met with Mr. Feducaic, Mr. England advised him not to do that because it was best to leave the woods intact. In addition, it would create a lot of through traffic on a private servitude. He further explained that his client re-subbed it in March of this year and he made 6A and 7A. The lot identified as 6A is a 1.826 acre lot and that is why Mr. England was there at their meeting, to request if they may receive a waiver to split back into Lot 6 and 7, both having physical addresses assigned. Lot 7A would remain part of this subdivision as well and would be a little narrow strip that would run to Nan Wesley Road.

Councilman Ryan Chavers asked Mr. England if there was a reason why the developer was not there that evening requesting the waiver?

Mr. England advised that as far as that goes, he was his authorized representation and he was

Councilman Ricky Goff wished to make a comment. He advised that the Council as a whole have always wanted to try to continue to have larger lots. He further advised that their request was to go back a lot, which would require a waiver. Councilman Goff felt, that in his eyes, that would be setting a bad precedence. Councilman Mangus advised that the committee had not met and did not have a report at that time.

The Council clerk wished to clarify the expiration date of Master Plan Review committee members in regard to agenda item number 24b, "Board (re)appointment(s)/Resignation(s): Appoint a member to the Master Plan Review Committee – Dean Coates". The chair addressed agenda item number 25b, "Committee Report(s): Ordinance Committee: Recommendation(s) of ordinance introduction(s)", and called upon Councilman Dean Coates,

committee chairman. Councilman Coates advised that the Ordinance committee would be meeting on the second and

fourth Tuesday of each month at five o'clock (5:00) p.m., being the same week as the regular meetings of the Livingston Parish Council.

The chair addressed proposed ordinances that were submitted at the Ordinance committee meeting by the Parish President in regard to occupational licenses. He invited the Parish President to further explain what was being recommended.

Parish President Randy Delatte advised that Administration approached the Ordinance committee to discuss the fees associated with occupational licenses that are currently being collected by the Livingston Parish Sheriff's office. He explained that there are currently twenty-eight (28) parishes that collect their occupational license fees. Administration had presented the committee with amendments to the occupational license ordinances that would designate the Livingston Parish

Council to collect their own license fees. He further explained that the Parish is currently paying two hundred sixty thousand dollars (\$260,000.00) per year for the Sheriff to collect these fees.

The Parish President advised that he had requested an Attorney General's Opinion and they had received a response that he wished to read aloud to the Council members as follows While LA R.S. 47:341(B) permits the collection of occupational license taxes by multiple persons, only the Livingston Parish Sheriff is entitled to collect occupational license taxes on behalf of the Livingston Parish if the Sheriff so

The Parish President stated that Sheriff Ard was a great friend of his, but he disagreed with the Opinion rendered. Even though the Opinion is not law, he wished to defer the proposed ordinance amendments and they would do more research and he wished to come back and revisit this with the Ordinance committee if those results warranted so. If no new avenues could be found from their research, he would not return to discuss this subject. Councilman Ryan Chavers commended the Parish President and recognized that his heart was in

the right spot looking for funding to provide services to their constituency.

Public input: Eric Pittman, Special Counsel to Sheriff Ard

Mr. Pittman advised that he had been involved in consulting with the Sheriff when this issue first came about that year. He had given his opinion and some materials to the Sheriff that it was his view that it is the Sheriff's obligation to collect those taxes and his legislative, statutory constitutional duty. Mr. Pittman further instructed that there was a Louisiana Supreme Court case that came from St. Landry Parish against their sheriff several years ago and it was right on point, and while the state of and while they can appreciate the Parish looking for more funding, they do not have the right to adopt an ordinance that designates the Parish to collect those fees. He stated that the Sheriff wanted to be there that evening, but he had another commitment and had requested that Mr. Pittman attend the Council meeting knowing that he was aware of some of the backstory because they were aware that an Attorney General's Opinion had been requested.

Mr. Pittman read the question presented to the Attorney General's office as follows:

Is it permissible for the Parish President's office to collect occupati taxes within Livingston Parish instead of the Sheriff?

He then proceeded to read the opinion that had been given

It is the opinion of this office that a sheriff is entitled to collect such local taxes,

parish governing body lacks any legislative authority to divest a sheriff of that right. He reiterated that the issue was whether or not the Parish had the legal authority to divest or deny

Mr. Pittman stated that the Sheriff wished to appear at the next Council meeting in two (2) weeks because he wanted to share with the Council the efforts that his office goes through for the collection of this occupational license that will include: what his staff does, how they do it, and they how they monitor. He also would like the Council to become aware of some of the things that he absorbs out of his budget that are financial obligations of the Parish, such as security at the

Mr. Pittman had packets that he presented to the Council members that cited case law and also a copy of the Atto

Councilman Billy Taylor asked Mr. Pittman how much percentage the Sheriff takes off of this tax. Mr. Pittman advised that it was fifteen percent (15%) and that is the statutory amount that he is to

The Parish President stated that he wished to clarify some of things that had been mentioned. First, he advised that the Sheriff had come to the Parish President and said that he was going to give up this tax, that is how the Parish got involved. The second thing he wished to state was to correct the reporting of twenty-eight (28) parishes that are currently collecting their own occupational license fees, it was twenty-four (24) parishes. He also wanted to add that all municipalities, which include municipalities located in Livingston Parish, collect this tax. The Parish President advised that the Parish could legally collect this tax and would need to obtain legislative approval because the Sheriff does not want to stop his collection.

The chair advised that after speaking with the Parish President, the proposed ordinance amendments were going to be deferred at this time. He indicated that this had been presented to the Council as an introduction of the ordinance and he asked if a motion for clarification could be the Council as an introduction of the ordinance and he asked if a motion for clarification could be made that the proposed ordinance not be introduced and it be postponed or deferred until more information has been received. He explained that this would be clarification that this was not the introduction of an ordinance, then there would be no need for the Sheriff to come to the next Council meeting in two (2) weeks. The chair stated that if it would ever come up again, then it would have to go back through the process.

Grant presentation by the Pilot Club of Denham Springs

Board Member Cecil Harris introduced Amanda McMorris with the Pilot Club of Denham

Springs and thanked the organization's support for our schools. Amanda McMorris also introduced Ms. Terry Gordy, President of the Pilot Club of Denham Springs, and gave an explanation of the Pilot International Matching Grant and how the students are already benefiting from the materials and equipment. At the end of last summer, we met with Dr. Penalber, because we wanted to write a matching grant with our International Association. We needed some ideas and we wanted to help kids

with disabilities. Our focus is helping people with brain related disabilities so Dr. Penalber put us in touch with Dr. Trent Herring at CABS in Holden who has a need for some materials. We were awarded a grant from our International Foundation. We matched the \$1,000.00 plus a little bit more and purchased materials for them to use to teach behaviors to reduce aggression and to help the kids with their self-management skills, to improve safety for the teachers and the students, and all of that will lead to increased instructional time. These kids have behavior challenges that are a result of trauma and brain-related disorders. They received all the nt and Ms. Jessica Clark has been working with us since Dr. Herring retired and she is in charge. We are also going to complete some volunteer work at the Center to help with some cleaning, and some gardening that the kids can in turn use as an instructional activity. We will continue our pen pals with the kids, and we are also going to be reading and helping them with instructional materials. If they have things they want to laminate, we have about 40 members in our club and we can cut those things out. We are very excited to provide this service for the school system. This project also sparked our biggest endeavor. We saw the playground at Holden and Dr. Herring said their kids weren't able to get over there because it was wet. We looked and realized the playground at Holden needed some spiffing up. So, our biggest project yet, we are working with two elementary schools in the parish to build accessible playgrounds. The one at Holden School was completed in April, and the other at Seventh Ward Elementary will be ready in time for school to start. We are seeking our next two playgrounds

to benefit. We have a budget of about \$50,000.00 and we are hoping the schools have some money that they can contribute towards the playground equipment. We would like to come to a principal's meeting to share this information or if you know of a need please let us know. We are glad to give back to our community and we appreciate your support. Thank you for this Superintendent Purvis and several other board members thanked the Pilot Club of Denham

Springs and expressed appreciation for all they are doing. We will get you set up to speak at one of our principal meetings in one of our group meetings, so you are able to meet with elementary principals and have that discussion. We really appreciate y'all for being here! ADDENDUM: Recognition of Jon Hollier elected as Louisiana FFA State Vice President at State

Board member Katelyn Cockerham introduced Walker High School Agriculture Teacher, Trevor Rushing, who then introduced Jon Hollier, a graduating senior at Walker High School who was

elected this year as the State Vice-President for our FFA organization. They have 10 officers every year that represent the entire State of Louisiana and he was elected as one of those among his peers. We're very excited for him. It's the first one we've had in our school and in our parish since 2018. Superintendent Purvis congratulated Jon. I'm incredibly impressed and excited to have a

student in our district representing us. I'm a little bit partial because I was an Ag Teacher and totally dedicated to FFA, so I know how much that helps you grow as a leader and a person. So, we are incredibly excited. Would you explain a little bit about your summer? Most people here may not realize exactly how much you're sacrificing to do this position.

Jon stated that about a week ago my summer was completely clear, but after I got elected my Journal of the Committee of the Committe not familiar, FFA splits Louisiana into four areas and each area has a Leadership Camp.
