### Pastor John Hagen

Pastor John Hagen, 88, of Faribault MN,



died peacefully at Pleasant Manor on September 25, 2021.

John Holte Hagen was born in 1933 in Crookston Minnesota to George and Evelyn Hagen. He grew up as the oldest of five children on a farm with an old caboose as his play-

house. His family moved to Tokyo after WWII where he graduated from the American High School in Japan. John returned to the US and graduated from St Olaf College in 1956. Later he graduated from George Washington University with a law degree, then worked for the federal government in that capacity.

In 1959 he met Diane Reinertson at a Luther Place event in Washington D.C. When she returned to college in Ohio, he wooed her by writing humorous letters. They married in December 1961 and would have celebrated their 60th anniversary this year. As Diane completed her degree at Capital University, John moved to Ohio to attend Trinity Lutheran seminary. After the births of son Mark and daughter Kristin, John and his family moved to Edinburgh, Scotland where he did postgraduate studies and was interim pastor at a Scottish Presbyterian church.

The family moved back to the USA and to Minnesota in 1973 where for 19 years John served as pastor at Gol Lutheran Church in Kenyon, and Grace Lutheran Church in Nerstrand. While living in Kenyon, John was active in community theater, the Lions Club and hosted AFS foreign exchange students. John and Diane moved to Faribault MN in 1992 where John worked as an interim pastor at numerous congregations around Southern Minnesota for over 15 years. John and Diane became active members at First English Lutheran Church, continued participating in local theater, and became enthusiastic members of the community.

Known for his hearty and infectious laugh and gentle kindness, John had a true generosity of spirit. Not only was he open-minded and accepting of all people no matter their differences but devoted much of his time in service to others. His volunteer projects included working with refugees from many countries,

Asked to play Santa Claus so many times due to his strong resemblance and rapport with jolly old Saint Nick, John purchased his own costume to make appearances for friends and neighbors, performing at community events, and for children of inmates at the Shakopee women's prison. It was the perfect role for John because he loved interacting with children and spreading goodwill.

No one more loved reading and collecting books more than John, and he was rarely seen without a book in hand. He had an interest in genres ranging from theology and history to science fiction and romance. His collection filled several rooms of the parsonage. John volunteered at the Talking Book Library, reading books and periodicals to create recordings for the blind.

Due to his wide range of interests and decades of reading and watching news and sports, John knew facts of all types and was unbeatable at trivia. John loved to debate. He had strong opinions and many ideas but was just as happy to learn about other people's opinions and ideas. He was fascinated by gadgets of all kinds and intrigued by technology. He especially loved animals and had dogs and cats as pets.

A lover of travel throughout his life, John, Diane and their kids crisscrossed the country on long road trips to visit friends and family—though John was somewhat notorious for not always paying close attention to the gas gauge. John and Diane also enjoyed international travel to Norway and other parts of Europe, the Holy Land, Egypt, China,

Japan, and visited their son and family in Tbilisi Georgia (the other Georgia).

In more recent years as his mobility and eyesight decreased, John continued to find pleasure in life, and enjoyed a good conversation with friends and family.

# K-W Stories from the Heart

(continued from page 1)

I will start with a story that brought a tear to my eye.

After Jordan Flom introduced his father Scott as "The greatest man I know," Scott Flom thanked the community of Kenyon for shaping him into the man he became.

Flom was a 1975 graduate of Kenyon High School (the merger of Kenyon and Wanamingo would occur in 1991). Flom excelled not only in sports but band and choir also.

He played football, basketball and participated in track. The multi-year All-Conference runner broke and assisted in breaking several school records during his six years of running. Something he said, "I hated to do because I threw up all the time."

As a sophmore he broke the 440 yard dash record and was a member of the medley relay and mIle relay teams that set school records.

The mile relay team of 1975 broke the state record and is still the Kenyon-Wanamingo record if converted to meters. His mile relay

team at Gustavus Adolphus College also set the school record.

Scott was an All-Conference football running back that led the league in rushing and played in his words, "On possibly the greatest football team in Kenyon history." The 1973 team that played in the state playoffs. They lost to eventual champion New Prague.

Flom was All-Conference in basketball and scored 32 points in a game.

In college he played all three sports and sang in the choir, eventually focusing on basketball and track.

Flom became emotional as he thanked Kenyon residents (pointing out some of them in the audience) for assisting him after his father died of a heart attack when Scott was 15 years old.

At a track meet in Northfield his freshman year he fell 6 tenths of a second short of a school record in the 440. His dad told him not to worry because he would break it the next year.

He did but his father was not there because he died from a heart attack a couple weeks after that meet.

At that point Scott stated, "That's when I found out what Kenyon was like because I lost a dad but I think I inherited about 15 dads, about 18 moms, countless classmates and loads brothers and sisters."

"I found out there was only unique and special people in Kenyon. Every person in this room I know I can tell stories about how God

used you to put your fingerprint on my life and changed me forever."

He learned from Kenyon coaches, "It's how you win that defines you not if you win. They also taught me to believe in myself. Wow, that's a big deal. Because how you feel determines how you act."

"So when I left Kenyon I wanted to do everything possible to thank the God who created me. If I could sprinkle little splashes of Kenyon encouragement on everyone I met. God put giants in my life to raise me up. It's contagious. This believing in yourself is contagious."

Flom cited Ephesians in the Bible where he says, "God promises to provide immeasur-

ably more than we need."

He went on to comment, "I have no idea why God made me run fast because I hated it. I really did. I thought it was boring and I threw up all the time."

About that 1973 state playoff football team Flom told those in attendance, "I was fortunate to be on one of Ralph's (Hagberg) best football teams. Maybe your best. (he was in attendance). My junior year we went 8-0 in the Hiawatha Valley. We beat Lake City and Stewartville. They were good teams. John Held kicked the field goal at the end of the game to defeat Stewartville.





"So we go on to the state playoffs and we went to New Prague and it's freezing. The first play of the game I tackled the kick returner and broke my hand. I said to John Held. 'I think I broke my hand.' He goes, 'Wow, you did. You better not tell anybody.' I said, 'You're right nobody needs to know.' didn't tell any Stewartville guys coach. I played every snap of that game.'

I found out you can't be successful without good people around you. The next year we didn't have all the pieces so they had this MVP Banquet over in Faribault. Ralph is a tough guy and all the surrounding towns are there so he says, 'Well, we didn't have quite as good a year as I had hoped so I brought the MVP of the band and the choir.'

"You were a funny man Ralph. A funny man. It was funny. We did have some great people on that team. In closing it's been an honor to be back here. I had a great Mom. She taught me the gift of appreciation. So this is really an honor to be up here with you (pointed to those on stage) and all of you (pointing to audience) here today. I can't say enough how you lifted me on your shoulders and you carried me around and when people ask where are you from, where's your hometown, I say Kenyon. It's not Heaven but you can see it from there."

#### Letter to the Editor

Here is an excerpt from the United States Dept of Education Covid-19 Handbook:

CDC issued an order requiring wearing masks on all public conveyances, including on school buses. Accordingly, regardless of the mask policy at school, passengers and drivers must wear a mask on school buses, including on buses operated by public and private school systems, regardless of vaccination status, subject to the exclusions and exemptions in CDC's order.

As the school bus contractor for Kenyon-Wanamingo Schools, we want to reach out to parents in our community to explain our school bus mask policy — and urge them to please provide a mask for their children and instruct them to wear it while riding the bus.

Parents may not realize that even if your child isn't required to wear a mask in school, they still need to wear one on the bus. The federal government requires passengers and drivers to wear masks on all modes of public transportation, including school buses. This rule has been in effect since 2020 and applies to everyone across the nation, whether you are in Minnesota, South Dakota or Texas. Local contractors, school districts, cities and even the state have no say in this matter.

We are finding that many children are not wearing masks on the bus, and oftentimes do not even have a mask with them when they board. Aside from the cost of having to provide masks to students — which many bus companies are spending their own money to do, with no help from school districts or the state — this puts bus drivers and operators in a legal predicament. If we do not enforce the mask policy, we could potentially be held legally liable.

Further, the Department of Homeland Security recently announced that any passengerincluding passengers on a school bus—who does not comply with the mask requirement on public transportation may be fined \$500-\$1,000 for their first offense and up to \$3,000 for their second offense.

School bus drivers are doing our best to adhere to the law and working hard to make sure your children get to and from school safely. Please help ease the stress and burden on bus drivers by making sure your children have a mask and wear it whenever they ride the bus.

#### **Letter to the Editor: Kenyon-Wanamingo Referendum:** A Matter of Trust

It has been described as the "Mortar that binds leader to follower" (Nanus, 1989). "It is the expectancy that the words, actions, and promises of another individual, group, or organization can be relied on" (Goddard, Tschannen-Moran & Hoy (2001). "If schools are to prosper and succeed, trust is crucial" (Hoy, 2002).

With the aforementioned in mind, I would like to begin with two paragraphs from a letter I sent on August 12, 2020, to the current Kenyon-Wanamingo Superintendent of Schools. Due to the fact that I was concerned about the direction the school district was going, I agreed to set up a meeting with him and a group of retired school board members,

businessmen, educators, and farmers from our local community. Unfortunately, not only was my letter never answered, but it would take almost a year before he would meet with us. Could this be why a local farmer recently said, "I would not know him from a bale of hay?"Please note the following:

Dear Mr. Boysen:

Let us begin with the basic condition that you are the school district's superintendent and I am just one of its resident tax payers. Moreover, you have indicated that you want to address declining enrollment and an upcoming referendum; I want the school district to focus on student achievement and a restoration of its "high" standing in the educational community. Furthermore, you and the school board want to increase my property taxes by \$300.00 per year; I want to know why I would be willing to add this amount to a recent property tax increase (payable in 2020) of \$600.00 per year.

As you move forward, you want to spend time completing a dissertation that will take you elsewhere; I want you to spend time showing us the kind of leadership qualities we have not seen in a longtime. You want to thread the needle by living in Austin, attending Winona State University, taking on the responsibilities of being both superintendent/elementary principal, and promising us that you can find the balance; I want you to stand before the community and tell us how you are going to take us from where we are today...to where we will go tomorrow...and beyond. It is the least we can expect from our traveling CEO.

As I reflect on what has transpired over the past year, I now realize that a great deal of time was wasted due to the superintendent's on-going delay in meeting with us. While I appreciate the fact that he was new to his job, the chance to meet with a group of learned citizens would have given him a wonderful opportunity to discuss the kind of issues our school district is currently facing. It has been my experience that these are the kind of events whereby leadership and trust are oftentimes born. Once lost, they are hard to re-

In preparation for a special election that will be seeking general education revenue in the

amount of \$950.00 per pupil unit, I would like to remind the public that school boards are meant to play an important part in providing quality education at the local level. The Fireside Will Be Closed

When this does not happen, you start seeing decisions that diminish rather than enhance a program. For instance, you see a decision whereby funds from a recently passed building referendum were used to pay part of a previous superintendent's salary. This is not what the patrons of the school district had in mind when they voted for building upgrades to the Kenyon and Wanamingo sites.

Secondly, we have seen a recent decision that denied the school district much needed revenue even though the school board promised the voters that the use of our new athletic complex could generate thousands of dollars in general operating funds. Could this misguided decision of putting the Booster Clubs before the patrons be part of the reason that the school district is facing deficit spending for the third time in recent mem-

Thirdly, we have seen a decision that allows the superintendent to live 60 miles from a school district that he claims to represent. Could this be why he is not only unable to meet with patrons who could/would give him valuable insights on who we are and what is important to the community, but after over a vear in his current assignment, he has vet to provide us with his plan for the future?

Fourthly, we have seen decisions that continue to allow substandard academic achievement to go unchallenged in spite of the fact that, under the right learning environment, our students are the equal to students anywhere. Could this be why the Minnesota Department of Education continues to report over a decade old concern with Student Pro**ficiency** or why a local newspaper reporter noted, "There was a time when you were at or near the top of the list." He would go on to say, "What happened?"

Finally, and in what began as a question of leadership and trust, has suddenly evolved into a "bale of hay" and the question that should bring shudders to the school board and its administration: What has happened to Kenyon-Wanamingo Public Schools? Sadly, if our leadership is unable to find the right answers to our problems, they had better prepare themselves for an outflow of students who will be looking for schools and programs that will do a better job of meeting their respective needs.

A number of years ago I had the privilege to write a position paper for a Regional High

School in rural Alaska. During my research, I came across a quotation from the Alaska Commissioner of Education, Dr. Shirley Holloway. In a speech used to confirm her commitment to excellence and in what would become the Quality Schools Initiative, she said, "Nothing is more important for families in our state, and the future of Alaska, than education. The hopes and dreams we have for our children and our communities begins with quality education." Her goal: "To create high standards, academic achievement, excellent teaching, and new partnerships between families and schools." It sure sounds

Before I conclude my thoughts, let me remind the public that schools are in the business of student readiness. Whether or not their students choose to pursue College, Vocational Education, OJT, the Military, or some other form of higher learning, much of their success will be predicated on what happens between Kindergarten and high school graduation. This cannot be accomplished when their Minnesota Comprehensive Assessments (MCA) show a mathematics proficiency score of 33%; a reading proficiency score of 41%; a college readiness score of 17.5%; and a ranking that places Kenyon-Wanamingo worse than 57.9% of high schools in Minnesota. Is there any wonder why some of our top graduates (3.5 to 4.3 GPAs) are reporting that they are not being prepared for the next level?

In conclusion, permit me to end with two thoughts. First and foremost, I know of no Kenyon or Wanamingo resident who is unwilling to provide our children and/or grandchildren with a quality education. Unfortunately, past practice would seem to indicated that additional operating funds did not solve what has now become an ongoing problem: Low Student Proficiency. And second, a close look at the numbers from the Minnesota Department of Education indicate that the problems we are facing were there long before the China virus came down the pike. Just remember an old adage that says, "When there is no accountability...there is no performance." It is time for a major overhaul

#### **Booster Shots and 3rd Dose Shots** Moderna

At this time Moderna has not been approved for booster shots but has been approved for third doses shots.

Third dose shots have been approved only for adults 18+ who have undergone solid organ transplantation, or who are diagnosed with conditions that are considered to have an equivalent level of immunocompromise.

If you fall into that category, please contact your health provider.

#### **Pfizer**

Pfizer has been approved for third doses shots for those who are immunocompromised and booster shots. Adults who received the complete two dose series of the Pfizer vaccine can receive a booster shot at least six months after their initial series based on the following Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) guidance:

Adults 65 years and older and residents in long-term care settings should receive a booster;

Adults aged 50–64 years with underlying medical conditions should receive a booster; Adults aged 18-49 years with underlying medical conditions may receive a booster;

Adults aged 18-64 years who are at increased risk for COVID-19 exposure and transmission because of occupational or institutional setting (e.g., frontline medical workers, teachers, and first responders) may receive a booster.

Goodhue County Health and Human is not administering COVID Vaccine booster shots or 3rd dose vaccine shots at this time. ### Changes in Latitudes, Changes in Attitudes **End of an Era**

This column is written by Messenger editor and Minnesota native Terry Campbell. Terry now splits his time between Minnesota when its warm here and Tennessee when it's cold here.

Twenty-one years ago, I began my life in the newspaper business. It was actually quite by accident. I wasn't intending to help out for more than a few months but ended up buying the paper and the rest is history.

One of the first acquaintances I made were the folks who printed the newspaper each week. In those days we would layout the pages by pasting printed copies on a large sheet and then deliver them to the printer. After printing, the bundled papers would be hauled back to the post office and distributed to retail locations.

Leonard, Margaret and Jeff Bauman owned the press, a business called Country Impressions near Waseca, where we printed each week. I would drop the pages off at 8am and return in the afternoon to pick up the newspapers. The smell of printer's ink and the hum of the big machinery rolling newspapers fresh off the press was exciting. Johannes Gutenberg would have been so proud. At one time they printed nearly every small-town newspaper in this area, about twenty-eight by our recollection.

Early on we had a mishap. One week somehow a page was omitted and the press spit out all copies of our West Concord Enterprise with one blank page in the middle. I didn't notice it until I was back at the office with all copies printed and distributed. The next week I pulled out a copy at the printer and paged through it to see if any were missing. I looked up and there was Leonard, Margaret and Jeff looking at me, rather concerned from around the office door. I never found out whose fault the missing page was.

Being an ambitious young man back then I would spend hours doing sales calls in Owatonna. It was a lucrative market back then and I made lots of ad sales. Actually, too many sales for one certain person. Elsie Slinger was the owner of the Blooming Prairie Times and she took offense at the number of Owatonna businesses I was selling ads to. She called me up and informed me I was to lay off Owatonna sales calls and I should sit in my office like a good sales person and wait for the businesses to call me. I guess that way she could get those sales. Naturally being a farm boy who always took the bull by the horns and made my own way in life, I couldn't believe someone would have the gall to feed me this line of bull. Needless to say, the phone conversation degenerated rapidly and I informed her that we lived in a free country and I could sell to anyone I pleased.

Maybe that would have been the end of the issue, except that when I dropped off the paste up sheets that next Tuesday morning, who should I see but Elsie Slinger, there picking up her Blooming Prairie Times. She was still steaming from our phone call earlier and launched into a tirade at me. This was better, now we had an audience for the fight. It is amazing at how calm and articulate one can be when they are right and the other person is crazy. When Elsie stormed out, I looked up and saw Leonard, Margaret and Jeff looking cautiously at me from around the office door. I am fairly certain they were expecting some kind of bloodshed from this confrontation. From then on Elsie picked up her papers later, I sold ads to every business in Owatonna as well as some in Blooming Prairie and I never crossed paths with her again.

Over the years I became great friends with the Bauman's and enjoyed visiting with them every week. The number of newspapers they were printing dwindled down to ours and a couple others and they ceased printing newspapers and retired at the end of September. I am going to miss those guys. As for Elsie, she wrote a murder mystery book.




