

We've been going through the book of Romans and as we reached chapter 10 we discovered that Moses said that to be made right with God required obedience to the law. Paul wrote that the gospel is close to us- in fact it is as close as believing in our heart and saying yes to faith in Jesus Christ. Paul wrote in Romans 10:9, "If you openly declare that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved." Pretty straight forward stuff. Everyone who calls- that includes- everyone! No one is left out- Anyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved. Jesus is inviting all people to be saved. This is more than a mumbled confession of faith- this is the time to take a stand: Jesus, I believe. We are to be bold and let the world know. It seems impossible for a Christian to remain in the closet- a Christian must be ready to share their faith from the very beginning- to let the people around them know. If you said yes- that's great! Then think about this question for a minute- If you were arrested for being a Christian, would there be enough evidence to convict you?

Jesus said that as a believer our lives will reflect our faith! And for those that aren't producing fruit in their lives- He prunes. Pruning isn't a pleasant process- it's cutting off and removing the branches that are only sucking up the nutrients but not producing anything. I do hope you also notice that that is about 5.5 billion people that don't know Jesus Christ as their Savior! That's a lot of people that don't know and many haven't heard.

Now you might be thinking that most of those people are in other parts of the worldand you'd be correct in thinking that many are in other parts of the world- but in the United States- the numbers of people that identify as Christians is less than 50%. The fastest growing 'faith' group in our country are the NONES. Nones are people with no religious affiliation at all. Many of them may are spiritual and believe there is a god of some sort out there- but have no personal relationship with the one true God and His Son Jesus Christ. According to an article published by Statista Research Department, Jan 24, 2022, "According to a 2021 survey, 31 percent of Americans never attend church or synagogue, compared to 22 percent of Americans who attend every week. And another 25% say they seldom if ever attend. If I those 2 numbers are added together that tells us that in the US 56% of the American people aren't attending church- and although it is possible to be a Christian without going to church- it is also a good indicator that many of that 56% probably do not believe in Jesus Christ as their Savior. So, let's bring these numbers closer to where we live: in the 55991 & 55956 zip codes there are approximately

Now if we take 56% of the people in these two zip codes we would have 1,888 people that seldom or never go to a place to worship.

Paul asked, "how will they know if no one tells them?" Who better to reach the 1888 people in our zip codes than you and me? We live and work with them. We see them in Walmart, on the bus, in our schools, on our walks, in the restaurants, everywhere. God is calling us to go.

It is time we obey the call of Christ to go and tell the good news. We can do that by supporting those in ministry, sharing our faith story, inviting our neighbors to church, and living out our faith daily. It is Time- who will you tell this week?

In Christ, Love Conquers Hate

Scripture Reading — Matthew 5:21-26

"Anyone who is angry with a brother or sister will be subject to judgment... Anyone who says, You fool!' will be in danger of the fire of hell." — Matthew 5:22

We have a natural tendency to hate or ignore God and our neighbor. We tell ourselves we are good people. But our selfishness and anger lie just below the surface. Anger often erupts in violent, hateful words and actions. If we don't seem angry, it may just mean that our anger has not yet reached its boiling point or had an opportunity to erupt. In fact, we may be seething with inner anger.

Strictly following the command "You shall not murder" is not enough to overcome hatred. We must address the source of that sin. If we keep our anger from boiling over, we do well. But to gain mastery over anger, we need love. And showing love, especially toward people who have hurt us, does not come naturally. In fact, only the supernatural love of Christ can overcome the hatred we may feel for our enemies.

When the Romans and the Jews hatefully killed Jesus Christ, he could have called on God's army of angels to stop and destroy them (see Matthew 26:52-53). But instead he responded in love, asking the Father to forgive them. When Jesus gave himself for us on the cross, he certainly obeyed the law—do not kill. Rural Veterinarian Who Offered to Give **Away His Practice Gets What He** Wanted: A Successor

BLUE EARTH, Minn. — A rural Minnesota veterinarian who offered to give away his practice – building and all – to help attract his replacement, now has what he wanted: a suc-

"It lifts the weight off your shoulders," Dr.

75-year-old Bogan was Faribault County's only vet. He made the offer after five years of searching for someone to take his place.

A story last summer about Bogan's offer, featured in a KARE 11 Land of 10,000 Stories segment, was shared more than 8,000 times on Facebook.

"This story spread far and wide and the message got to where it needed to go," Blue Earth City Administrator Mary Kennedy says.

In the days that followed, 10 young vets and vet students expressed interest. Eight of them made the trip to Blue Earth to meet with Bogan and tour the town. Five of those submitted formal applications.

From the applicants, Bogan selected Dr. Zach Adams, a 2021 graduate of the vet school at Iowa State University.

"It's a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity," Adams says. "I came here and realized it was

The opportunity checked another box.


"I'm a die-hard Vikings fan and I've always wanted to live in Minnesota so that kind of helped push the way too," Adams

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



Adams started working alongside Bogan in January with an ownership transition planned over the next year or so.

"I think he's going to fit in very well in Blue Earth," Bill Rosenau, a Faribault County farmer and banker said.

A shortage of rural vets has plagued, small, rural communities across the country.

As a member of the county economic development authority, Rosenau was among those working to recruit a new vet to Blue

Like many Faribault County farmers, he'd feared Bogan eventually retiring without a replacement.

"To get somebody to come out and do onsite work would have been almost impossible because they would have been over an hour away," Rosenau says.

Since moving to Blue Earth, Adams has felt the love, including a welcome from a pizza delivery person his first week in town.

"I think most people know what house he bought, are excited to see him, are excited to meet him," Kennedy says.

Bogan's offer to give away his practice included his clinic building in Blue Earth, the furnishings and equipment, his pickup truck and even Annie, the office cat - who is written into the agreement Adams signed.

"I had a lawyer take a look at my contract," Adams says with a laugh. "He called me and was like, 'You know you're getting a cat with this, right?'

Leyton Becker, a second-year vet student who interned with Bogan last summer and was featured in the KARE 11 story, had initially expressed interest in taking over the practice, but decided it was too early in his schooling to commit.

The University of Minnesota vet student says he met Adams during his visit to Blue Earth and holds open the possibility of joining him later in the practice.

"He's a great guy and I could totally see myself working with him," Becker said.

- 2 cups flour
- 1/2 cup oatmeal
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. baking soda
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 1 cup softened butter

Mix these 6 ingredients and reserve one cup for topping. Pat the rest in greased 9x13 pan and bake at 350 degrees for 10 to 15 minutes.

Slow Cooker Chicken Tortilla Soup Submitted by Andrea Dawson

- 1 Cup Pace Picante Sauce
- 2 cans (10 1/2 ounces each) Campbells Condensed Cream of Chicken Soup
- 1 1/4 pounds skinless, boneless chicken breast halves,
- cut into 1/2" pieces
- 2 Cups frozen whole kernel corn
- 1 can (15 ounces) black beans, rinsed and drained
- 1 1/3 Cup water
- 1 teaspoon ground cumin
- 4 corn tortillas (6") cut into strips
- 1 Cup shredded Cheddar cheese
- 1/3 Cup chopped cilantro

Stir the picante sauce, soup, chicken, corn, beans, water and cumin in a 4 quart slow cooker. Cover and cook on LOW for 4-5 hours or until the chicken is cooked through. Stir the tortillas, cheese and cilantro into the cooker. Cover and cook for 15 minutes. Serve with additional cheese and avocado if desired.

City of Randolph Regular Council Meeting February 9, 2022

The regular Randolph City Council meeting was called to order at 7:01 p.m. by Mayor Robert Appelgren. Roll Call Present were Mayor Robert Appelgren, Council Members Sarah Podritz, Jacob Friedrich and Todd Carlock, Treasurer Sandy Nicolai and Clerk Mary Haro.

Public Comments None.

Minutes

A motion to approve the January 12, 2022 regular council meeting minutes was made by Friedrich, seconded by Podritz. All voting in favor, none opposed, motion passed 5:0.

Approval of Treasurer Report

Sandy indicated that the CD's are no longer on hold as the water tower loan has been paid. We took in approximately \$7,500 this month from water bills. There was a question of why

the general fund balance was so much lower from January to February. Sandy will look into this and get back to us. The water meter payment is being sent out and are being ordered. A motion to approve the Treasurer's Report was made by Podritz, seconded by Friedrich. All voting in favor, none opposed, motion passed 5:0.

There was a question regarding the setbacks. Our newest ordinance does indicate a setback of 5 feet so they are good there. They are planning to add a covered porch in the back. The garage is 1500 sq. ft. and the covered porch will be 2 1002\310120543.v1 300 sq. ft. It was noted to them that the covered porch can never be enclosed. They are all good with Dakota County regarding setbacks on their septic. Motion by Friedrich to approve the building permit for the Groenke's to build a garage, noting that the covered porch must not be enclosed, seconded by Carlock. All voting in favor, none opposed, motion pass 4:0, Council member Podritz abstained from the vote.

New Business: Tyler Kirstner

Tyler Kirstner introduced himself as he is running for U.S. Congress in the 2nd District. He is a Republican that has served 9 years in active duty in the Marine Corps.

Dakota County Deputies

Two Dakota County deputies stopped in to see if there was anything to discuss. They had mentioned that catalytic converters were still being stolen and if your cars are parked outside you should lock them as there has been calls on people going through cars. They did mention that if you see something that is not right give them a call and they can check it out. There was a discussion regarding the boat on Dickman. Clerk Haro noted that she asked for an update from Sergeant Samuelson and has not heard anything yet.

Fire Department

Chief Firemen Kevin Whitson came before the council to ask for an increase from \$2,000 to \$2,250 per year of service for the Fireman's Retirement Fund to be effective this year. Motion by Friedrich to raise the Fireman's Relief Association Retirement Fund from \$2,000 to \$2,250 per year of service, seconded by Podritz. All voting in favor, none opposed, motion passed 5:0. Kevin also indicated that the deferred interest rate will stay at 1.25%. Motion by Appelgren, seconded by Friedrich that the deferred interest rate will stay at 1.25%. All voting in favor, none opposed, motion passed 5:0.

Mike Slavik, Dakota County Commissioner

Mike noted that the county board approved an additional \$375,000 for septic or sewer replacement to low income households. With the \$25,000 already approved the total amount available would be \$400,000 for this program. Amounts of \$5,000 to \$20,000 would be approved as a cost to connect to city sewer if they have income requirements that qualify for the assistance. The amount of \$10,000 would be a grant that does not have to be paid back and the remaining could be put on their property taxes spread out 3 1002\310120543.v1 over several years. The County handles the work for this program. This money must be spent by 2024 which could fall within our sewer project when the time comes. He also noted that AARP money can be entirely listed as lost revenue for small cities and townships. He noted that Dakota County is putting \$17,000,000 toward the hydroelectrical plant at Lake Byllesby. This will prevent them from taking out a loan to repay the amount. He indicated that Dakota County is taking their time to spend to money so that they do it right. He also noted that road construction will be happening in Dakota County on County Road 88 and 96 He did note that the Spring Township Meeting is scheduled for March 19th in Empire Township and we are all invited to attend. The meeting starts at 8;30 and concludes around 11:30. We discussed the boat on Dickman Avenue that is parked and he indicated that they are looking into it and seeing what can be

Bolton & Menk Sewer Update

Matt Blazer of Bolton & Menk discussed holding an open house in late March or early April to update citizens on the project. They will discuss it with the school district to hold it there and they will take care of everything. They will send out a letter like they did for the questionnaire to the citizens to notify them of the meeting. They want to conduct the meeting to get the public's input on the project. He noted that they talked to the property owners regarding the spraying and has a meeting schedule in the new couple of weeks to discuss further. The spraying part needs to be finalized before moving on to the ponds portion of the project. They will not be disclosing the names of the property owners because of confidentiality at this time.

Mark Ceminsky - Historical Society Building

Mark mentioned that he had to renew Stop Savers permit as it expired so there will be a renewal fee. He also discussed a building on Dickman Avenue. He indicated that they did some work with no permit so he put a stop work order on the building and they have not contacted him. He indicated they would need a permit to do the floor, the doors, and windows. They have to get him plans and have the property available for inspection. If not, the city will have to send a letter to them from the city's attorney. Mark indicated that if they contact him he will let Clerk Haro know so we will not have to send a letter to them. They have to submit a permit and they will be penalized for not obtaining a permit before the work was done. He was also checking on some buildings that were falling apart and appear to be vacant. The mobile home appears that something fell on it. It appears to be abandoned and it 4 1002\310120543.v1 becomes a safety issue for the city. The mayor indicated he was told it would be gone by June but he didn't indicate what year. He indicated that buildings that seem to be an safety issue should be removed or destroyed because they could collapse. Regular Meeting called to Order - Mayor Knetter called the Regular Scheduled Meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

Disclosure of Interest – None. Approval of January 11, 2022 Special and Regular Scheduled Meeting Minutes – Motion by Russell seconded by Luhring to approve the January 11, 2022 regular scheduled meeting minutes. All voted in favor. None opposed. Motion passed 5:0.

Approval of Disbursements – Motion by Luhring seconded by Flodeen to approve the February disbursements. All voted in favor. None opposed. Motion passed 5:0.

Public Comment – None.

Petitions, Requests, and Communications: 2021 Treasurer Year-End Financial Summary – Chris Meyer

Chris Meyer, City Treasurer, reviewed the 2021 Year-End Financial Summary. Meyer stated that this is a required annual financial report that lists month-end balances for the year of the City's bank accounts.

2021 City of Hampton Financial Statements – Chris Meyer – Meyer stated that the 2021 City of Hampton Financial Statements must be prepared within 45 days after the close of the fiscal year. Summary Letter Concerning Legal Representation for 2022 Prosecution Matters –



Dougherty Molenda, Solfest, Hills & Bauer – Mayor Knetter stated this is in regard to the law firm that will be handling the City's criminal cases. He expressed concern about meeting the Agreement term mentioned in item #1 of the letter regarding bills being paid within 20 days of the statement, being bills are paid only once per month. He asked the Clerk to follow up with the firm about that.

Reports of Officers, Boards, and Committees:

Engineer Report – Brad Fisher with Bolton and Menk reported that he had a meeting with MnDOT the previous week to discuss the Hwy 52 construction project and provide them with utility information for the frontage road that they were missing. Additionally, he and Cory Bienfang met with representatives from MnDOT that same day to discuss improvements to the ballfield drainage. What is proposed is to angle the culvert outlet to the southwest and install rip rap at the outlet. The rip rap will be installed in the ditch as far as the end of the ballfield fence to improve water flow and control erosion. Fisher also informed Council that MnDOT representatives met with Hampton Township to discuss the possibility of the City annexing the portion of the frontage road property up to Northfield Boulevard. He was told by MnDOT that Hampton Township was open to the possibility. This would facilitate a proposed turnback of the frontage road from MnDOT to the City. MnDOT will work on the details for a turnback agreement and will present final information to the City when that process is complete.

Water / Sewer Report -

Mayor Knetter stated that there is nothing to report and that things are going fine.

Park Report – Councilor Russell reported that the hockey rink is getting a lot of use. He suggested replacing the basketball hoops. He stated that a city resident is clearing the rink gratis and feels that the City should provide him with some sort of compensation. Discussion by Councilors to formalize an agreement with the individual and have them submit a bill.

Street Report – Luhring stated that there is nothing to report. Discussion among Councilors about the number of vehicles that remain parked on the street in violation of City Ordinance.

Ordinances and Resolutions – None.

New Business - None.

Mayor Knetter acknowledged a Dakota County deputy in attendance and asked if she would like to address Council. She introduced herself as Nicole Young. She stated that vehicle thefts in Dakota County are on the rise. There have been some noise complaints, but deputies have been able to keep them under control. Mayor Knetter thanked Officer Young for her report. Knetter made a brief mention to Councilors that he is aware of an individual that is interested in purchasing the municipal lot, and that more information would be forthcoming on this issue.


