#### Dodge Center Memorial Day Schedule

The Dodge Center American Legion Post 384 has scheduled Memorial Day services for Monday May 30th. They will begin at the Dodge Center cemetery at 9:30am with a program including the Triton high school band and special speaker Dale Wellik. Next stop is at the Dodge Center Veterans Memorial beside the Fire Hall at 10am. From there they will stop at the bridge over the Zumbro River outside of Wasioja, where they will fire over the river in honor of those servicemen who died at sea. At 10:15am they will be at the Wasioja cemetery for a short program and then on to the Wasioja Seminary site where the Dodge County Historical Society will present a program at 11am. They will fire over the seminary ruins and then head to the Ashland cemetery at noon where they will fore over the grave of one Civil War veteran. In case of inclement weather the service will be held at the Dodge Center Legion building.

## Don't Dodge Those Dodger Days!

Mark your calendars for the first annual Dodger Days celebration next month! The city of Dodge Center is proud to host a community event Father's Day weekend, Friday, June 17 through Sunday, June 19th. Everyone is encouraged to participate and take this opportunity to reconnect with neighbors with a variety of activities showcasing food, fine arts, sports and more!

I asked Dodge Center's City Administrator, Bryce Lange, to share a bit about the history of Dodger Days. Although this is the first official Dodger Days, it's not the first ever community celebration. Bryce explained, "The last time that a community event was held over Father's Day weekend was 'Center Fest' in 2002, 20 years ago. The Dodge Center Park Board wanted to establish an-

other community event to bring people together, especially after the 2-year pandemic. We really learned the value of being able to be together with our neighbors."

The city worked closely with several community partners to plan the Dodger Days' activities line-up. Bryce explained the process stating, "The Park Board worked with local organizations, businesses, and partners to create the list of events." If you have an idea for next year, Bryce said, "The events are set, but if there is interest from someone to lead an event over Dodger Days, we would be willing to help advertise for their event or help them put it into action next year."

Here are a few highlights from the activities list. Thursday, June 16th is the registration deadline for the BBQ cookoff and the city-wide garage sale. Some of Friday, June

17th events include the North Park grand reopening ceremony, swim activities, and the Fire Department cook out. On Saturday, June 18th, a few of the highlights are the sports tournaments, chalk art at North Park, the BBQ Cook Off, the Lego movie at North Park that evening, music on Main hosted by local treasure the Annadine, and fireworks. Sunday, June 19th kicks off with breakfast at the airport, followed by a 5K run and a car show.

As far as funding, Bryce said, "Dodger Days has been mostly funded by private donations or contributions with donations from McNeilus Steel and Hometown Haulers, but the city has also contributed funding towards the event as well such as the outdoor movie, liability insurance, and the use of city facilities"

As with any large event, volunteers play a crucial role. (continued on page 5)



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#### **A Life with Purpose**

In the Old Testament, Solomon expresses his dismay at life – "I have seen everything that is done under the sun, and behold, all is vanity and a striving after wind." (Ecclesiastes 1:14) His dismay becomes even more pointed when he confesses all the great things he had done. Listing his great achievements, he says: "And whatever my eyes desired I did not keep from them. I kept my heart from no pleasure, for my heart found pleasure in all my toil, and this was my reward for my toil. Then I considered all that my hands had done and the toil I had expended in doing it, and behold, all was vanity and striving after wind, and there was nothing to be gained under the sun." (Ecclesiastes 2:10-11)

Solomon had begun his kingship with great blessings from God, but he had forgotten God and tried to "do things his way." Solomon found out that trying to find meaning in life apart from God ended in emptiness and frustration. Man has only limited enjoyment from the things he does. The fact is that life without God has no real purpose or meaning. There is no ultimate significance to human life. Since man is basically an animal, he has no more value than the rocks on the moon. It is a philosophy of despair. William B. Provine, professor of Biological Sciences at Cornell University put it this way:

"There are no gods, no purposes, no goaldirected forces of any kind. There is no life after death. That's the end for me. There is no ultimate foundation for ethics, no ultimate meaning to life, and no free will for humans,

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either."

What a tragic view of humanity. Secularism (or humanism) is rampant in our country today. This teaches that man is basically good and is able to determine his own values; therefore, there is no real "right" and "wrong." Evil does not exist – Sin does not exist - Therefore, there is no need for forgiveness and repentance. This philosophy has consequences: Some of the results are an increased use of drugs and alcohol, the killing of old people and sick people, rampant abortions, the acceptance of extreme profanity especially in the movies, the acceptance of pre-marital sexual relations, etc. In addition, secularism leaves people without real meaning; everything we do in our relationships is judged by whether or not we have built someone's "self-esteem." fact is that if I came into this world as an evolved part of nature without the hand of a creator, and when I die, I go nowhere (that is the end); then why would I not have trouble with "self-esteem"?

Rick Warren in his book The Purpose Driven Life says: "...your life has profound meaning! We discover that meaning and purpose only when we make God the reference point of our lives." He goes on to say, "Nothing matters more than knowing God's purposes for your life, and nothing can compensate for not knowing them." Whatever our profession or our calling in life, the only way we can find meaning in life is to allow the Lord Jesus Christ to be at the center of all we do. There is no real ultimate meaning in earning a lot of money and gaining a powerful position without the Lord. Someday we will all pass out of this life, and we will leave all our money and whatever

else we have gained in life to someone else. It will be of no benefit if our loved ones bury our treasures in the casket with us. It is a wonderful thing that the Lord has created

every one of us for a purpose. Until we realize that, there is no peace, no joy and no ultimate significance to our lives.

Dear Jesus, fill our hearts with the hope of living life fully with you in eternity, so that in all things we may reflect and give glory to God! Thank you. Amen.

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



The word Equity is an important consideration when it comes to learning and education. Lately, it seems that this word in some circles has been given a bad connotation. I realize that the political climate today is charged with a variety of extremes, but I wanted to share why the word equity is important as it relates to education and why I think it is important for the schools to continue to focus on being equitable. When I hear someone say we should just treat all students the same, I shudder at the thought. The first thing that comes to my mind is this picture on the right. The picture does a great job of showing the difference between treating everyone the same (equality) and treating them equitably (equity). Each student in the picture has a different need when it comes to being able to see over the fence. The students that walk through

our doors are also unique, and all have different needs. Schools need to be aware of those needs because without addressing them it will create barriers to learning. The role of the school is to create opportunities of learning for ALL students. To do that, we need to make sure that we are being equitable which helps to provide learning opportunities for all our students.

A quick example of an individual need that students have would be vision and hearing. We try to identify students that have difficulty hearing or with vision impairment in the elementary every year with vision and hearing screening. Why do we do that? Because if a student has an unidentified hearing or vision impairment, it will make it more difficult for them to learn. To make things equitable, they may need glasses or hearing aids, or they might just need to sit closer to the front of the room. This is an example of being equitable. If we just treated everyone the same, or equally, we would not address this need and leave the student to struggle with a hearing or vision impairment. Helping students with vision and hearing are simple examples of being equitable, and I don't think anyone would disagree with allowing students to use glasses if it would help them learn. How about a student that has difficulty writing, reading, or processing the letters they see? There are a variety of different needs that students have, and some are easy to understand, and some are only able to be diagnosed with specialized testing. The needs that students have can be unique. The challenge we have as a school is to find accom-



modations and/or make modifications to help the student learn by providing supports that make the opportunity to learn equitable. Learning is not a competition; we want everyone to be successful! It would seem logical that those needs should be supported to help students learn. Being equitable in a school means that we are doing what we can to help students be successful in their learning.

Bryce gave a shout out to all the people, business and organizations that have made this event possible stating, "We appreciate everyone who has either volunteered to help run events or donate funding or items in order to do so. McNeilus Steel has donated the cost of the fireworks on Saturday evening, Hometown Haulers has donated the use of trash bins, and Triton Community Education has helped out a great deal with leading the 5K fun run and beanbag tournament."

In an effort to keep the activities available to all, event planners strove to keep costs down. Bryce explained, "Many of the events are completely free to participate and that has been a priority of the city in order to remove any barriers that might exist for families to partake. However, there are a few events that do have charges in order to participate such as the BBQ contest, the fun run, and the bean-bag tournament. In order to participate in those events, people need to register and pay in advance. Otherwise, those events will be fun for people to spectate as well."

Overall safety and wellness have been important considerations for event planners. Bryce mentioned, "We will be working with Dodge County Sherriff's office, the Dodge Center Ambulance, and Dodge Center Fire Department to ensure that emergency services are available if needed. Hometown Haulers graciously donated the use of nine trash bins over the weekend to be used, so that trash can be thrown away. The city has a great maintenance department and facility at North Park with bathrooms."

In the case of inclement weather, Bryce encouraged folks to stay connected to the latest updates on Facebook. "We will play bad weather by ear. Some events may still be able to occur while others may need to be cancelled or rescheduled. People will need to monitor Facebook for the most recent information on events."

I ended our questions by asking Bryce what his hopes are for the future of the event. He concluded, "The goals of the event are to make a sustainable community celebration year after year over Father's Day weekend. We would like to see it grow and offer even more events in the future. Ultimately, we would like to have a weekend where we can all come together as a community."

# The Gear Daddies To Headline the 2022 All Saints Music Festival May 20th

Opening Act will be Chris Kroese, Runner Up on NBC's THE VOICE.

Growing up, there was a guitar in the corner of the family basement that no one was supposed to touch. When no one was looking, a young Chris Kroeze (pronounced Cruise-E) would sneak down and find it. On his 6th birthday, Chris got a guitar of his own and hasn't put it down since.

Sitting around the campfire on warm summer nights as a child, Chris fell in love with the guitar. His dad would put small stickers on the strings to show him how to play and he listened and learned under the stars in Northwest Wisconsin. Before long, the instrument became the most important thing in his life.

Biking around his hometown of Barron, Wisconsin, he would listen to a tape of Chuck Berry on his Walkman over and over, stopping every three and a half minutes to rewind.

When he was in middle school, his dad told him every band needed a singer, and the only way to tell if that would be Chris was to give it a try. He was a natural.

The pull of small town life and the passion for music never left as Kroeze turned into one of the top country musicians in the Midwest. The power of small town community showed as family and friends in Barron helped him get started on his journey to Nashville in 2014, holding a fundraiser that would lead to him recording his first single "Four Letter Words," which received strong radio play and kick started his career.

In 2015, he began a busy stretch of playing over 175 shows a year, and creating a large and loyal fan following. That popularity soared in 2018, when he appeared on NBC's hit TV show "The Voice," making it all the way to the finals in a runner-up finish. In the finale, Kroeze sang the original song "Human," which was TOP 10 on the Billboard HOT 100 and TOP 5 on the iTunes TOP 100. His vocal and guitar skills, combined with a small-town charm, led to Kroeze to become the most streamed artist in the show's history.

A popular live performer, Chris continued to perform at a frantic pace maintaining an average of over 175 shows a year through 2019, and the crowds have gotten bigger and bigger. He headlined a show at Aquafest for over 5,500 fans and has had a number of stops in which he has sold out multiple nights in a row, yet he still returns for pop-up shows at local bars he used to play at early in his career.

A small town boy who loves the outdoors through and through, Kroeze still lives in Barron, Wisconsin with his wife and can't imagine raising his two children anywhere else.

#### The Gear Daddies will headline this years event

Gear Daddies is an Americana/Rock band originally from Austin, Minnesota. Members Martin Zellar (electric and acoustic guitar, harmonica and vocals), Nick Ciola (bass), Randy Broughten (electric and pedal steel guitar) and James "Billy" Dankert (drums and vocals), played their first shows together in 1984. Between 1986 and 1992, the band released three popular albums and became an important part of the Twin Cities music scene.

Many of the fan's favorite songs ("Stupid Boy", "Color of Her Eyes", "She's Happy", "Drank So Much" and many others) are cred-

ited to the exceptionally passionate writing skills possessed by Zellar, however Dankert has also contributed some of the compositions , including "Time Heals", and "Blues Mary".

Their most notable mainstream success was when they played "Stupid Boy" on Late Night with David Letterman in 1991. Zellar had this to say of the experience: "I was so nervous, and it all happened so quickly. I couldn't tell you what the hell happened. I got done, and I was walking back and said to Randy (Broughten), 'Did I sing all the words? Did I do that?' When I watched it that night in the hotel room I had no recollection of having lived it."

Arguably, Zellar's "I Wanna Drive the Zamboni" is the band's best-known song, having been featured in the movies D2: The Mighty Ducks and Mystery, Alaska, as well as on the television program Malcolm in the Middle. It's also a staple at hockey games throughout North America and Europe.

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#### **How Medicare Covers Alzheimer's Disease**

Dear Savvy Senior,

What exactly does Medicare cover when it comes to Alzheimer's disease? My husband was recently diagnosed with early-stage Alzheimer's, and we would like to find out what's covered and what isn't. --Planning Áhead

Dear Planning, I'm very sorry to hear about your husband's diagnosis, but you'll be happy to know that most medical costs to treat beneficiaries with Alzheimer's disease are covered by Medicare. Unfortunately, long-term custodial care costs that most patients eventually need are not. Here's a breakdown of what Medicare does and doesn't cover when it comes to Alzheimer's disease, along with some tips that can help you plan ahead.

Medical care: For the most part, ongoing medical care to diagnose and treat Alzheimer's disease is covered by Medicare Part B, including visits to primary care doctors and specialists, lab tests, speech and occupational therapy, home health care and outpatient counseling services. Medicare pays 80 percent of these costs, and you will be responsible for the remaining 20 percent after you've met your annual \$233 Part B deductible.

Sixty days of inpatient hospital care is also covered under Medicare Part A after you pay a \$1,556 deductible. Beyond 60 days, a daily coinsurance fee is added.

Medications: Most Alzheimer's medications are covered under Medicare's Part D prescription drug plans, but coverage varies so check his plan's formulary. The only exception is Aduhelm, the controversial new drug that is estimated to cost \$28,200 per year. Medicare Part B will only cover this drug if your husband is enrolled in a clinical trial.

Long-term custodial care: It's important to understand that original Medicare does not cover long-term custodial care. This includes nursing home care, the costs of assisted living facilities and adult day care. Medicare does, however, pay for some shorter-term nursing home care, but only up to 100 days following a three-day inpatient hospital stay.

Hiring home help for bathing, toileting and dressing (this is known as custodial care) is not covered by Medicare either unless your husband is also receiving skilled-nursing care or physical or occupational therapy.

To help with these costs, you may want to look into getting a long-term care insurance policy or short-term care plan (see aaltci.org/stc) if possible, or if your income and assets are very limited, you may qualify for Medicaid. To investigate your financial options for long-term care, go to PayingForSeniorCare.com.

Hospice: In the final stages of the disease, Medicare Part A covers nearly all aspects of hospice care, including doctor services, nursing care, drugs, medical equipment and supplies, physical and occupational therapy, homemaker services, counseling and respite care. To qualify, a doctor must certify that a patient has six months or less to live.

#### Other Insurance and Assistance

If your husband is enrolled in original Medicare and he doesn't have a supplemental insurance (Medigap) policy, you should consider getting him one. A Medigap plan will help pay for things that aren't covered by Medicare like copayments, coinsurance and deductibles. To search for plans in your area, go to Medicare.gov/plan-compare and click on "Medigap policy only."

Or, if you're enrolled in a Medicare Advantage plan (like an HMO or PPO), his plan must provide him at least the same coverage as original Medicare does. Some advantage plans may also offer additional coverage for home

If you can't afford your Medicare out-of-pocket costs or need help with medication expenses, there are Medicare Savings Programs and the Extra Help program that provide financial assistance for medications. To learn more, see Medicare.gov/your-medicare-costs/get-help-paying-costs.

You can also get help through your State Health Insurance Assistance Program (see ShipHelp.org or call 877-839-2675), which provides free Medicare and long-term care counseling.



I am about 1/4 mile away from the bridge, going about 80mph. It's dark. I have the music at full blast. The windows are open. My hair is a halo of competency flying around me. I am illuminated by the lights from the dash. Hard pounding rock thumps out the car as I speed down the road through the Bayou. Cannot wait to get home and take a shower after a day of dirty yardwork at the cabin. I see some type of reflective fabric on the bridge. Uh oh. Police? No. Not Police. Oh, Good. 'Cuz we're doin' 80. Yeah, I know. This is a 50 zone. I know. I am so tired and dehydrated and strung out from the recent days I think I may be hallucinating. I'm definitely talking to myself. I blink and shake my head. Nope. Still reflective and moving around. A mylar balloon caught in the road? Closing fast, whatever it is. Still doing 80. Oh, right. Bridge has only one lane. I remember. Right-o. Adjust to 50. Music is still driving at a mad pace. I switch on high beams. A single high wattage bulb responds right back at me. Oh #@\$% it IS cops. No. Not cops, would already been lit up. Ok, no idea. Slow to 50. Low beams. The light goes away.

I turn the music down. I see a dog in the road. OK, I see now. That's no problem. Someone let their dog out for a potty break on a lonely stretch of road and the dog won't get back in the car. All good. Crazy dogs. Aren't they something? But the dog is running from one spot to another on the bridge. Barking. At the reflective fabric. I bet the owner is irritated. I laugh. Dumb dog.

He's a purebred bloodhound. All floppy ears, droopy eyes and long goofy legs. He is havin' a good ol' time. I watch him, still trying to determine what he's doing. I imagine his name is Beau. ROLF ROFL ROLF he howls at the fabric. I have slowed down to a crawl to allow the owners to catch their dog. But no one is trying to catch him. Then I realize the fabric on the road is actually my headlights reflecting off about 8 or 10 big fish. Ten 15 pound live fish are in the middle of this bridge, flopping around and this dog is going crazy. Complete stop. Eyes straight ahead.

FWAPP! The sound startles me. It's another fish. It's fallen from above the windshield of my vehicle onto the bridge. For all intents and purposes it is raining fish on this bridge. Beau or Rufus or whatever his name is howls mournfully and bows down playfully at the new arrival. I'm right there with ya, Beau. I feel like howling a bit, too, Buddy. The light comes back. "Yep." They eye my license plate skeptically. Out of the corner of my eye, I detect movement. I turn my head slightly to the left, still keeping Rufus and his finned friends in sight, a nod to the rearview mirror, because, let's face it, I am still in Tennessee. A bright white T-shirt straightens up from leaning over the bridge. He's maybe 13. In his left hand he has a compound crossbow. A weapon. Capable of travelling 100 yards at 430 feet per second. He is holding a weapon, just as sure as I am sitting there. That is a full-on weapon. He is not yet old enough to shave. He looks unconcerned. In his right hand he is holding a spear. On the end of the spear is a 20 pound piece of reflective muscle. The reflective muscle gives a half-hearted twitch in response.

He tosses a reply over his shoulder without breaking stride, "Nah, they supposed to throw em' in the bushes, they not supposed to leave them on the bridge."






