How's your faith? It does not matter if you are an atheist, theist, new age mystic. Doesn't matter if you're religious, a church-going person, or a Christian; yes, there's a difference. You have placed faith in something or someone. You may say, "Well, I don't have faith, I have my self-reasoning and confidence in where I place my trust and hope." This would make for a longer conversation, but since this is an article, might I ask, "How can you trust your reasoning?" I would also say that the word confidence comes from the Latin words, con fide...'with faith'. So, friends, we all have faith, the question is

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whether it is set upon solid ground or shifting sands.

First, let's define "faith." The Oxford dictionary defines faith as "complete trust or confidence in someone or something." I would add details needed for those who claim to be Christian that our faith is complete trust in the Son of God, Jesus Christ, for our salvation, adoption, and future hope. Simply put, the biblical definition of faith is "trusting in something you cannot explicitly prove" (Hebrews 11:1). This definition of faith contains two aspects: intellectual assent and trust. Intellectual assent is believing something to be true. Trust is relying on the fact that the something is true. A chair is often used to help illustrate this. Intellectual assent is recognizing that a chair is a chair and agreeing that it is designed to support a person who sits on it. Trust is sitting in the chair. Understanding these two aspects of faith is crucial. Many people believe certain facts and intellectually agree with biblical facts about Jesus Christ. But knowing those facts to be true is not what the Bible means by "faith." The biblical definition of faith requires intellectual assent to the facts and trust in the facts. Honestly, we can believe certain things to be true, yet they are not, no matter how hard we believe in them. Hence, the truth of those facts and acting on that truth us crucial. Simply believing the facts that Jesus is God incarnate who died on the cross to pay the penalty for our sins and was resurrected is not enough to be saved. We must personally and fully rely on the death of Christ as the atoning sacrifice for our sins. The faith God asks of us for salvation is belief in what the Bible says about and what Jesus is accomplished and fully trusting in Jesus for that salvation (Acts 16:31). Biblical faith is always accompanied by repentance, a turning away from your sin towards Jesus (Matthew 21:32; Mark 1:15). In addition, we are to believe what the Bible says, and we are to obey it. We are to agree with the truth of God's Word, all of it, and we are to seek transformation by it (Romans 12:2). Without faith, it is impossible to please God (Hebrews 11:6). Without faith, we cannot be saved (John 3:16). Without faith, life cannot be what God intends it to be, abundant and full of joy (John 10).

I will simply say here that if your faith in grounded in anything or any person other than Jesus Christ for your hope, happiness, significance, or security, you are in trouble deep, both today and into eternity. Placing your faith, complete trust, in Jesus is the only solid ground to be assured of your needed salvation, but also to navigate through life in this broken world and into heaven (Matthew 7:24-27).

So What?

Faith matters. The question is: Does it matter to you and where is it placed? We live in an age where faith has a place, for it does in the life of every human on earth. Yet, how you answer the question above indicates whether your faith is built on something solid or whether it teeters on the wavering sands of self, culture, or ever-changing worldly ideologies, which are as secure as Jell-o hammered to the wall.

Friends, place your faith in the one place where it will make a difference, Jesus Christ as He has been revealed in scripture, and you will have life. Do not adjust Jesus to fit your life, but transform your life to follow Jesus. Just as the first disciples dropped everything, counted the cost, and followed Him, so must you consider and decide. God has revealed enough about Himself through His creation (Romans 1:18-21), through His written Word, the Bible (2 Timothy 3:16-17; 2 Peter 1:16-21), and through His Son (John 14:9), that we can enter into a meaningful and saving relationship with Him. Once you have

placed your faith in Jesus, you are saved (John 10:7-16; Acts 4:12; Romans 10:5-13). Once saved, you live your life to the glory of the God who saved you (1 Cor. 10:31). This means attending and becoming a member of a Bible preaching/believing church, setting your love upon God's people in word, deed, and prayer, and sharing the gospel (good news of Jesus) with others around you. Lastly, this means that you live your life, with all the trials, temptations, joys, and hope, looking to Jesus who is the author and perfecter of your faith (Hebrews 12:2). It is good to "examine yourselves to see whether you are in the faith; test yourselves" (2 Corinthians 13:5). If you question whether you are a Christian, then self-examination is in order. Doubts about our salvation can be troubling, but false assurances are worse. You are not saved by church attendance, being baptized, being 'good', or 'being one with nature." Thankfully, we have Scripture as our guide. There are specific things we can look for when determining the validity of our profession of faith: trust in Christ, obedience to His Word, love for God's people, and continued spiritual growth. We don't need to live in doubt about tomorrow. We can navigate our life with living hope (1 Peter 1:3-9), even as we endure wounds from those who might call themselves Christians, navigate rejection by family and friends when we proclaim that Jesus is the only way to be saved from God's wrath (John 14:6), and when your hopes for this life fall short. When you trust Jesus by faith and live to please and honor Him, you can know beyond a doubt that you are a Christian and that you have a glorious future in the life to come (John 14:15-17; Revelation 21:22-27, 22:1-5).

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
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Kent M. Johnson

Robert Duayne Noah

They say a real newspaperman has ink in his



blood, and that was true for Robert Duayne Noah who left this mortal earth on February 20, 2024, to join the great newsroom in the sky after a three-year battle with cancer. He was 85 years old.

Born in Salem, Nebraska, in 1938, he

was one of six children of Thomas and Beulah Noah who enjoyed the Good Life of Nebraska, where he relished the outdoors and excelled at high school sports. It was during this time he got a job as a printer's devil at the Nemaha County Herald newspaper in Auburn, Nebraska, and began his love of the newspaper business.

After high school, Bob spent a year at Peru State College in Peru, Nebraska, before transferring to and graduating from Kearney State University (now known as the University of Nebraska at Kearney) with a degree in math. In his senior year at Kearney, he met Carol

Martin. She had completed her education at Doane College and was teaching in the elementary school in Kearney.

Bob's post-graduate career began in the classroom where he taught English, journalism, and media relations at York Community High School in York, Nebraska, while Carol was still teaching in Kearney. They were engaged and then married December 28, 1960, during Christmas break. Carol resigned her position at Kearney and was able to get a teaching job in York as well. They were married for almost 55 years and raised three children, David, Nancy and Doug.

After a short teaching career, Bob became news editor at the Aurora News-Register working for publisher Gerald Bremer, a stereotypical newspaper editor with a bottle stashed in the bottom drawer of his desk. It was the glorious chaos of this newsroom where he continued to grow his passion for newspapers.

But newspaper editors earned only slightly more than teachers in those days, so in 1964, Bob took a job in public relations at Northern Natural Gas in Omaha before he and his family were transferred to the company's Minnesota office where he worked for four years.

When Bob saw a notice that the weekly newspaper in Kenyon, Minnesota, was for sale, he convinced Carol to pack up the family and resume his passion as a newspaperman. Bob published The Kenyon Leader from 1971 until 2001 when he sold the newspaper to his son, Doug. During those 30 years he worked many nights and weekends re-

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porting on city council and school board meetings, high school sporting events, community celebrations and occasional tragedies. He also wrote his weekly column, the Ark-Ives, that often chronicled the sometimesembarrassing moments of his children's lives.

Bob made sure the paper was published every single Wednesday during his 30-year career come hell or high water. It's no wonder that one of his favorite songs was Johnny Cash's How High's the Water, Momma!

In 1992, Bob decided to serve his community in an additional role by winning a seat as a Goodhue County Commissioner and serving a total of 12 years at the post during which time he helped oversee the improved delivery of county services and the construction of a new county jail, law enforcement center, and courts facility.


Bob loved his family and enjoyed spending time with his children and grandchildren. After retirement he and Carol loved to drive around the country with Carol's sister and brother-in-law, Dianne and Dave Barker, seeing new sites, playing golf, and enjoying a cocktail. After Carol's passing in 2015, he spent time with his good friends in Kenyon and indulged his love of reading with the help of the wonderful librarians at the

Kenyon Public Library who always had his next book waiting for him to read.

Bob was proceeded in death by his wife Carol, parents Tom and Beulah, brothers Don and Dennis, sister Mavis, and brothers-in-law Bob Metzel, Les Martin, Lanny Martin, and Dale Benson. He is survived by his three children, David (Lisa), Nancy (Jay) Wobig, and Douglas (Jena); seven grandchildren, Josh (Kelsey), Becky, Nick (Tina) Wobig, Sara (Arik) Jacquart, Ryan (Samantha), Kelsey (Chaz) Stuve, and Shelby; three great grandchildren, Jameson Wobig, Elliot Noah, and Braylin Stuve; his sister Jean and brother Dean; sisters-in-law, Karen Noah, Pam Noah. Vera Martin, Sharon Martin, Dianne Barker, Kathy Martin, Rachel Noah and Janet Benson; and brothers-in-law, Dave Barker and Tom Martin.



Chuck DeMann's Housing Development Nears the Finish Line



Former Benson & Langehough Funeral Home Holds Significant Memories for Many

With the consolidation of the Bierman, Benson & Langehough Funeral Home operation into one building on the south end of Division Street, the former Benson & Langehough facility has been closed and sold.

This is a common procedure in virtually every business, but perhaps a more sensitive one for a building that holds so many emotional memories for so many people in the Northfield community.

As a recognition of the building's significance, something likened to a visitation will be held for the building on March 14th.

St. John's Lutheran Church Associate Pastor Jonathan Davis said after conversations with people who became quite emotional when discussing the closing, it was suggested that a formal recognition of the building's significance was in order.

"In the church world, if a church closes or changes purposes, we talk about decommissioning the church. And so, we wanted to do something similar. I'm mindful that not everyone in our community is maybe a person of faith or a churchgoer, but this place still holds lots of meaning for the people of Northfield."

Built in 1955 by the Anderson family who operated the Anderson Funeral Home, it was purchased by Duane Benson in 1971, and became the Benson & Langehough Funeral Home in 2001, when the business was purchased by Andy and

Suzanne Langehough. In 2015, Langehough partnered with Jim Bierman and the Bierman funeral home. Both Duane Benson and Jim Bierman passed away in 2022. While Langehough continues his work as a full-time funeral director, Bryce Beckstrand has now purchased a controlling interest in the business, and the decision has been made to operate out of one facility.

Langehough said he will miss the building. Not for the bricks and mortar, but for the memories.

"For me, it's not so much the representation of the building. It's the sharing that went on in that building at the time. The sharing of the grief and the love and the happiness and the things that I was privileged to see, which are really represented by the physical structure of that building."

The Celebration of Thanksgiving will be held on March 14th from 4:30-6pm at the former Benson & Langehough Funeral home at the intersection of 4th and Washington Streets. Langehough said there will be a brief ceremony at 5pm. All members of the community will be welcome.



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City of Dennison Regular Council Meeting January 4, 2024

The January Dennison City Council meeting was called to order by Mayor Jeff Flaten on Thursday, January 4th, 2024 at 7:00 pm. Present were Councilors Heidi Cooke, Diane Ruddle, Nichole Schloesser and clerk Jessica Page. Councilor Nygaard was unable to attend.

Councilor Cooke move to approve the regular meeting minutes for the regular December meeting and the December special meeting. Mayor Flaten pointed out that there was an extra 5 in a figure in #4. Correction was made. Councilor Schloesser second. Motion passed 4:0. Councilor Schloesser move to approve the Treasurer's report. Councilor Cooke second. Motion passed 4:0.

Old Business/Committee Reports/Building Permits:

Mayor Flaten presented a framed letter to Charlie for the donations for the windows. A small plaque was installed on the window for Charlie.

Administrative Issues:

1. Josh Ramaker from Rice County, SHIP coordinator, and Sarah Dawson from Goodhue County, Goodhue County Health and Human Services, spoke about making the intersection at Goodhue Avenue and County Road 9 safer for pedestrians and bicycles. Before making any improvements in the intersection, the Goodhue County Engineer is requiring a receiving facility, a new sidewalk be built on the north side of the block, by the bank's property. An estimate to build a new sidewalk was presented to the council. To be included in the 2024 Goodhue County construction calendar, the County Engineer, Jess Greenwood, will need to have the project in the County's 5-year CIP. Jess will make his presentation to the County Board in mid-Jan-

Mayor Flaten has a verbal ok with the bank to assist with the cost of the sidewalk and shoveling. It would go from the street to the entrance of the parking lot.

Josh is working on making this safer for pedestrians. Demonstration projects help to determine the best option for an area. Bump outs makes the road feel narrower so people slow down. Getting Goodhue County on board helps to make the case for more funding. Rice County asks for 10% match. Lincoln Elementary in Faribault was a testing spot. MNDOT has a demo project.

Sarah's focus is creating "safe routes to school".

Council needs to approve building a sidewalk before any improvements are made through the county. Demonstration projects can increase funding chances. Jess Greenwood is presenting his plan for the year and the overall 5 Year Plan for the County Public Works Dept. that he is presenting to the County Commissioners.

Councilor Ruddle move to pursue more pedestrian safe efforts on the corner of County Road 9 and Goodhue Ave (painting, bollards, or other demonstration projects) and moving towards more permanent solutions as funding can be obtained. Councilor Schloesser second. Motion passed 4:0.

City will need permission from the County to do the demo projects.

Todd Greseth: The County has set policing costs for this year for Goodhue, Pine Island, Wanamingo. Still working to figure on final costs for policing.

Deputy Dan Englund from the Sheriff's Department. Mayor Flaten noted that there are semi's jakebraking in the middle of the night through town. The City had a sign on County Road 9 on the east side of town that disappeared about 6 months ago. Need to get sign back up.

2. Bryan Caffin, Mark Klema and Kris Ambuehl from Bollig Engineering were present to discuss infrastructure needs and funding possibilities for the City.

Needs assessment results and options. Bryan is a project manager, who will probably be working with the City on any upcoming projects.

Reviewed sanitary sewer system. Items in red on the presentation are fundable. Clay pipe in the older sections of town has reached the end of it's life. Bollig will look at overlapping opportunities. For example, Riprap condition, lack of ability to build more homes in the City, damage to the liner as well as age of the liner for the pond. Lining is not recommended for the clay piping as it doesn't have enough structural integrity to support the relining materials. This would make relining a temporary and not a permanent solution. Better to replace it than to put a liner in.

Well house and well. Well house needs repainting and concrete is settling. Reviewed water main looping (MDH wants it to be done and it improves water quality) Couple areas in the newer parts of town that could benefit from looping.

Storm water system is functioning well. The church has the sump pump running into the street. Maybe run it into storm sewer so ice doesn't build up in the street?

Streets. Can work with the county engineer in regards to County Rd 9.

Comprehensive plan update is outdated. Keep the lines open to communicate regarding this. Limited grant opportunities for that.

Waterways that prevent a road from being built. Need to look at this for future roads and planning.

Recommendations: I and I needs to be reduced to correct current situation. Look at options for expanding pond capacity. Wellhouse rehab. Minor water tower improvements. Street maintenance. Other misc.

Preliminary Engineering report is needed to start funding. USDA is primary source to look at. Will look at up to 17 different funding sources. \$45,000 to complete the report. Will take a down payment and carry the balance until we are funded. They will continue to work on other funding. City will need to decide on what to do so the Preliminary report can be started.

3. Reorganization meeting: (motion to accept all designations when finished reviewing needed)

Designate a newspaper of general circulation as the official newspaper of the city. Has been the Cannon Falls Beacon.

Posting locations for announcements. Dennison Depot, the public bulletin board,

Elect an acting mayor from the councilmembers to perform the mayor's duties if the mayor unable to fulfill his duties. Heidi Cooke was the previous year's acting Mayor. She is willing to it again.

Rice County Making Information About Highway 19 Project Readily Available

With about two months until construction is set to begin on the six-legged roundabout at the Highway 19 and I-35 interchange, Rice County has announced an informational open house for March 19th.

A statement released by the county said there will not be any formal presentations made at the meeting. Instead, attendees will be encouraged to look over the project and ask questions. As this is an open house format, attendees will be free to arrive or to leave at any time.

In October, the Board of Commissioners unanimously approved construction of the roundshout on the cost side of Highway 10 et

roundabout on the east side of Highway 19 at I-35. The project will connect the north-bound I-35 on and off ramps with the highway. County Roads 46 and 59 will connect on either side of the highway as well.

Work is set to start in late April and is expected to be complete by fall 2024.

A temporary road is planned underneath I-35 during the construction.

The county has no intention of closing Highway 19 during the project, however County Roads 46 and 59 will be closed, and the northbound I-35 ramp will be closed at times.

A project page has been set up on the Rice County website. Throughout construction, motorists will be encouraged to visit the page frequently for updates.

While roundabouts can be unpopular with many people, as more have been built on state roadways, an understanding and acceptance of their usefulness has become more common.

According to County Engineer Dennis Luebbe, roundabouts help maintain good traffic flow, and diminish the likelihood of side-impact collisions. In fact, MnDot estimates that roundabouts bring an 86% decrease in fatal crashes, an 83% decrease in life-altering injury crashes and a 42% overall decrease in the injury crash rate at an intersection.

The open house will run from 4-6pm on March 19th at the Rice County Highway Building in Faribault. There will also be a virtual option for those unable to attend in person. (Use Meeting ID 342 117 0614 and 1234 as the passcode.)

Water Tower: The water tower was built in 1957 and is a 50,000 gallon tank. They mentioned a Small Cities grant for the water tower. KLM had done a report on the tower and that would be included in the application for a grant.

Water Distribution System: The system seems to be working but there are many areas need replacement. The water breaks that have happened would make it more eligible for grant funding. The MN Department of Health would like the city to have at least 2 wells.

Sewer System: The city is looking at phasing out City assured contract for the E-1 pumps and grinding pumps. The city would make the home owners responsible for the pumps.

Mr. Caffin's recommendation would be to encompass all of the needs into one grant and then if needed scale back the project.

Street Pavement: Recommendation that the street repairs would be tied to the utility repairs.

Potential Needs: Storm sewers, trails to school

Mr. Caffin mentioned that to search for funding the city would need to do a Preliminary Engineering Report and Environmental Report in accordance with Rural Develop-

ment requirements for infrastructure improvements.

Payment to the Engineer would be \$10,000 down, and \$35,000 after the funding is secured. They would be willing to work with the city regarding the down payment.

The council wanted to check references before proceeding.

Changes in Latitudes, Changes in Attitudes Power Outages and Why

Terry now splits his time between Minnesota when its warm here and Tennessee when it's cold here.

Power outages can be frequent in Western Tennessee. Virtually everyone has a generator. I had a generator at the construction site because I built for the first year without service to the address. I just always keep it fueled up and plenty of gas in reserve. Windstorms or tornadoes seem to happen about 12 months out of the year down here.

We have had a number of close calls with windstorms but they always just missed us. One night about five years ago, we had just arrived at out cabin in Big Sandy to do some maintenance. I hadn't even got the tools out of the truck when the rain struck. It usually rains with a vengeance, and wind. We retreated to the house and shortly after the power went out. When the storm passed, we headed back home, only to find a big tree

over the road, blocking our path.

In 2020 we went to Nashville on March 2nd to see Collective Soul at the Ryman. After the concert we discussed stopping at one of the restaurants on Broadway for dessert but decided to head home. On the drive home I could see an angry lightning storm behind us. When we turned on the news at home, we saw that a tornado had struck about two blocks from the concert venue we attended.

Three years ago, while we still lived on the Cumberland River and had just started building our new house on the Tennessee River, a big storm came through. The tornado passed within a mile of our home under construction, jumped the river and tore up a path heading east, destroying homes within in a couple miles of where we lived twenty miles away. We were in Minnesota at the time and were quite surprised at the devastation when we returned. I recall driving down Cypress Road and observing the trees flattened out across the landscape, thinking I was going to be cleaning up debris instead of building a house.

Last winter we were in the yard putting



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chairs away because wind gusts were forecast within the hour. We stood and watched as one tree toppled over in the woods across the road. Then we heard a crash about a quarter mile down the road. We could see the power line on the ground and knew what the outcome would be. I pulled the generator up from the garage and plugged it in and fired it up.

So, this December when I arrived, I had to reset all the digital clocks in the house. It is just a fact of life. I had only been home one day, when the following evening the lights flickered and went off. After lighting a couple candles, I decided to go to bed rather than start the generator. I woke up a couple hours later and the power was back on. The next day I was talking to my neighbor Harry, who lives about a mile down the road. Since there was no wind that night, we supposed it was one of the local boys with too much beer and

too little common sense behind the wheel of his pickup who had run into a power pole somewhere.

A couple days later I was walking my dog and I stopped to visit with my neighbor, the mayor. Before he retired, he was the mayor in Pulaski, Tennessee, so everyone calls him the mayor. He asked me if I saw what caused the electrical outage. He had the pictures on his phone. He was coming home that Friday evening and a guy had just hit a power pole in the ditch. It sheared off the pole and he continued down the ditch a hundred yards before crashing into a house and the vehicle was lodged in the living room. All that was visible was the rear end of the car framed by the red bricks of the house. Was a Friday night so I guess one could expect it. The funny part of all these intoxicated mishaps is that after living in Stewart County for five years I learned it was a dry county.
