



Day of **Victory**

Eighty years ago, a man from the small town of Abilene, Kansas, was in Southern England about to make the biggest decision of his life. As Supreme Commander of the Allied Expeditionary Forces in World War II, General Dwight D. Eisenhower had been burdened with the responsibility of deciding when the invasion of Western Europe would be launched in the summer of 1944. The day of the invasion would be a pivotal day in the war and world history. After years of careful planning and months of preparation, in consultation with the other commanding officers, he weighed this decision, knowing that it would cost many soldiers their lives. Then, with over 2.8 million troops waiting to be deployed, he made his decision and gave the official order before dawn on June 5.

On the eve of the June 6 (D-Day) invasion, a leaflet of General Eisenhower's "Order of the Day" was distributed to the soldiers about to go into battle. In it, he famously wrote, "We will accept nothing less than full Victory!" Involving approximately 160,000 Allied troops, 5,000 ships, and 11,000 airplanes, the assault that took place on the beaches of Normandy is believed to be the largest amphibious invasion in history. The bloody engagement resulted in 10,300 casualties, but the Allied troops were indeed victorious.

The Pulitzer Prize-winning war correspondent Ernie Pyle, who arrived the day after the invasion, documented the event for Americans back home. "In this column I want to tell you what the opening of the second front in this one sector entailed," he wrote, "so that you can know and appreciate and be forever humbly grateful to those both dead and alive who did it for you." Forty years later, President Ronald Reagan stood overlooking the beach of Normandy, expressing our nation's gratitude, and asking a question of those who

Why did you do it?" He went on to assert, "It was faith and belief. It was loyalty and love." The Allied victorywhich Pyle called "a pure miracle" - happened because, in Reagan's words, "The men of Normandy had faith that what they were doing was right, faith that they fought for all humanity, faith that a just God would grant them mercy on this beachhead, or on the next.'

In the Holy Scriptures, "faith" is a word that has incredible spiritual importance. More than an idle knowledge of history, faith is animating principle which "liberates from death and produces new life in hearts." Through faith, a person becomes justified, or made right with God, receiving the forgiveness of sins and eternal life. Specifi-

cally, this happens through the work of God in Jesus Christ. Without faith, human beings are a weak and sorry lot; they are unable to receive the virtues that proceed from saving faith. Jesus said to the disciples, "You believe in God; believe also in me" (John 14:1, NIV) because He wanted them to receive what He had to give them: mercy, abundant life, and eternal salvation. St. John writes, "Everyone who has been born of God overcomes the world. And this is the victory that has overcome the world—our faith" (1 John 5:4, ESV). A person with faith receives what God promises to everyone who believes in His Word.

As we mark the 80th anniversary of D-Day, the military invasion in World War II that would lead to the liberation of Europe,

let us also remember the faith that spiritually comforted and morally guided so many of the men who sacrificed their lives to win the war. For it was in AD 33, nearly 2,000 years ago, that another man from a small town in the ancient world called Nazareth made the biggest decision of His life, which was to face a battle that belonged to Him and die on a cross outside the walls of Jerusalem. This was the beachhead where Christ, the only begotten Son of God, had come to die in battle so that He could be raised triumphantly from the dead and proclaim total victory over sin, death, and the devil. "Thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ" (1 Corinthians 15:57, ESV).

Located in Mantorville, on Highway 57 across from the Courthouse, the Museum is housed in a building that was originally built and dedicated as an Episcopal church. Parking is located in the alley behind the building. It's possible to get here in spite of this season's road construction.

The Museum is home to several permanent

A wooden dugout canoe hangs on the east wall, discovered in Dodge County on the eastern shore of Rice Lake and donated to the Historical Society in the 1990s, was made by indigenous people who harvested wild rice on Rice Lake. According to carbon dating, it was created between 1790 and 1850.

A collection of machine guns, mostly from the World War I era, is in the basement.

A collection of artifacts that belonged to Col. James George, a veteran of the Mexican

American War and the Civil War, is located in the basement. Col. George was the attorney who owned the law office in Wasioja that became the Civil War Recruiting Station.

A new exhibit of community bands in our county a hundred years ago includes instruments, uniforms and photos of town bands of that era.

We have extensive records of the people

who have lived in Dodge County since the 1850s, and we welcome visitors who are doing family research.

West Concord Native Wins Iron Man Competition

Matt Hanson, who grew up in West Concord and graduated from Triton won the fifth race in the Iron Man Pro Series at the 2024 Qatar Airways triathlon in Chattanooga, Tennessee last month. Hanson, who started competing in the Iron Man won his first pro series triathlon beating the course record by four minutes. The next two closest finishers were a minute behind his time. Hanson slipped

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back in the bicycle riding event and overcame a four-minute deficit to clinch the victory.

Hanson wrestled in High School and college, but ran all of his life. He commented that he took up running as a kid, to spend time with his father, who also ran. At the age of 16, Matt set a goal to compete in an Iron Man competition and bought a used bike at the age of twenty-five to begin training.

Hanson was a former professor of Exercise Science, but retired to coach other triathletes. At thirty-nine years old he has been competing in the Iron Man races for ten years and has a goal to win a national title.

The Iron Man is a combination of swimming, cycling and running for a total of 140.6 miles. The swim course is 2.4 miles, the cycle course is 112 miles and the running course is 26.2 miles. A good athlete could finish the course in 12 to 14 hours. Hansons final time was three hours and 41 minutes. His time for the swim portion was 24 minutes, the cycling was two hours and 4 minutes and the running time was one hour and 9 minutes.

Aspelund Peony Gardens

One of the things I like to do is take drives around the land surrounding Wanamingo, and not only take in the beauty of the landscapes, but learn things about the people who live here. On one of my day trips, I saw a sign that said Aspelund Winery, and being a woman who enjoys her wine, I pulled in the driveway. The land was so beautiful, with the fruit trees, and landscaping using all kinds of interesting plants, but nobody was home. I looked around for a moment, just enjoying the peaceful setting, and went on my way.

Come to find out, the winery was no longer operating, but the farm was still operational.... with prize winning peonies! Located at 9204 425th street outside of Kenyon, it is a site to behold!

Bruce and Dawn Rohl moved to this idyllic farm in 1992, and literally cleared the land for what was to become their home. They bought the land in 1992, and lived in a mobile home until they built their house in 1996, all the while tearing down old buildings, and making room for flowers and trees! One interesting point I learned while visiting the farm is

that their home was the last one built in Goodhue County using trees taken from their own land!

One of Bruce's interests is peonies, so the couple planned and cultivated space to start growing them. As they were getting settled into their home, in 1996 they purchased 13 root bundles of different peonies from Tischler Gardens in Faribault, and that was to be the beginning of Aspelund Peony Gardens.

With their children, Ben and Samantha, they began the process of dividing the plants and making new beds until they ended up with over 2,000 plants with several species, including some very rare ones. As we chatted about the history of the enterprise, I learned so much about the curation of the flowers, and the specialization of hybrids, and cultivating the new varieties. It takes years to come up with new varieties, and you can learn more about this process at the talks they occasionally give, or on some of the websites dedicated to the craft. Or pop in for a visit, and ask away!

Ben worked on the farm and raised the flowers for a 4H project, and entered his flowers in the County Fair. His project was to raise them from seed, and as I learned, there is a lot to doing so. As the gardens grew, people started wanting peonies for their own enjoyment, so in 2007, they decided to sell root stock.

So, here's how it works.... The first 3 weekends in June, you will come out to the farm between 10 am and 5 pm to walk the beds and write down which varieties you are drawn to. Once you have made that difficult



decision from 140 varieties currently in the beds, you purchase the root stock which will be ready in the fall. Fall is the best time to transplant, so you pick them up, take them home, and pop them in a hole. You will water well to get the air pockets out, and let them hibernate for the winter. In the spring, they will come up as one of the first periennials, and your garden has begun! About 34 of them will bloom the first year. However, the different species bloom in a succession, so you may want to come out more than just one weekend! When you come back to pick up your plants, you will be shown how to plant, and given an instruction sheet on what you need to know to be successful in growing your own. To schedule a group tour, or a specific time to come out, call (507) 824-2935.

The flowers will bloom from around Memorial Day until Father's Day, with slight variations due to the weather that year. I saw

some blooming on May 6th! All the varieties on the farm stay standing up, not falling over during bloom time like many that you see. The one question I had to ask was "Why do the ants have to open the petals?". Bruce laughed and said that was a frequently asked question. Dawn answered that the ants do not open the petals, but are harvesting the nectar from the buds. There you have it! Another wives tale dispelled!

So, I encourage you to make a day plan to come out to the garden and enjoy nature's beauty. Talk to Bruce and Dawn, and learn something new. Take pictures with your family, and relax in the beauty the Rohl's have created. For more information on the flowers themselves, you can go to Americanpeonysociety.org, or Mnpeony.org. Ask **A Trooper**

Question: Can you talk about drug use and impaired driving. It seems like I am seeing more and more of this.

Answer: Drug-impaired driving is as dangerous as al-

cohol-impaired driving. Minnesota law prohibits driving while impaired by controlled or intoxicating substances. These substances include illegal drugs, prescription drugs, and over the counter drugs (cold medicines), as well as household products. These substances can cause drowsiness and impair a driver's mental and physical ability to safely operate a vehicle and to respond to driving conditions.

Legal drugs that may not cause impairment alone can produce powerful intoxicating effects when mixed with alcohol. The safest rule is do not mix drugs with driving at all. Use of drugs can lead to traffic crashes resulting in death, injury and property damage. It can lead to arrest, fines and jail sentences.

Pay attention to warning labels for legitimate drugs and medicines and to doctor's orders regarding possible effects. Stay away from illegal drugs. Don't use any drug that hides fatigue - the only cure for fatigue is





Concern: My seat belt can hurt me in a crash.

What you need to know: Everything in your car can potentially hurt you in a crash, but your seat belt is one of the few things that can save you. It is your first line of defense and last line of defense when something bad happens.

No matter the excuse, not wearing a seat belt is never worth the risk. Protect yourself and your loved ones. Buckle up, every trip, every time. Together, we can drive Minnesota Toward Zero Deaths.

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

U.S. Senator Tina Smith Leads 29 Colleagues in Push for Robust Rural Housing Funding

WASHINGTON, DC - U.S. Senator Tina Smith (D-Minn.) led 29 of her Senate colleagues in a push for more funding for rural housing programs in the FY2025 Appropriations bill. In their letter, the Senators noted that rural communities saw only a 1.7% increase in the number of housing units between 2010 and 2020, with almost half of states seeing a decrease in the number of rural units. According to Minnesota Housing Partnership, every county in Minnesota has a shortage of affordable and available rental homes for extremely low-income households. 79% of counties have a shortage that exceeds

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"Without a safe, decent, affordable place to call home, nothing in your life works – not your job, your health, your education or your family," said Senator Smith. "While the housing crisis is hurting communities across the country, the burden has been especially hard on small towns and rural communities. The severe shortage of affordable housing is hurting rural America's ability to prosper, and it is imperative we direct more funding to ad-

dress this housing shortage and finally bring our communities some relief.

ceeding 500 homes.

"Against this backdrop, federal rural housing programs have shrunk to the point that only about 3,500 direct loans are available for low-income families to purchase or build their own home, the lowest level since 1957. Funding to preserve rental and farm labor housing is meager by any standard and by no means adequate to provide new housing opportunities or preserve existing housing resources," wrote the Senators. "In the coming years, the number of maturing Section 515 mortgages will only accelerate, resulting in an even worse state of rental housing in rural America as some rural communities' only source of affordable housing is lost.'

"In Minnesota, rural residents are desperate for homes they can afford and many of our affordable homes are substandard or ready to exit affordability terms. We need all hands on deck to provide more affordable homes to rural residents and preserve the ones we have to be healthy and stable," said Elizabeth

Glidden, Deputy Executive Director for Minnesota Housing Partnership. "Increasing resources for rural housing and rural development is a practical solution that works to keep residents in their homes and rural communities thriving - we applaud these efforts to focus on the needs of rural communities across the U.S."

"There is ample evidence that Senator Smith's efforts are sorely needed. Over 1.5 million occupied substandard housing units in rural areas, and over 750,000 units lack piped water. A rising tide of maturing U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) rural rental housing loans threatens the availability of affordable housing. The number of USDA rural home mortgages for low and moderateincome households is at its lowest level since the mid-1950s," said Bob Rapoza, Executive Secretary of the National Rural Housing Coalition. "We very much appreciate the Senator's leadership and good work on rural housing."

The letter specifically requests:

\$1.585 billion for section 502 direct homeownership loans, including \$20.8 million for the Native American Relending Pilot Program;

\$40 million for section 523 Mutual and Self-Help Housing;

\$76 million for home repair through section 504 and section 533;

\$200 million for Section 515 rural rental housing loans;

\$90 million for multi-family preservation; \$1.69 billion for Section 521 rural rental as-

\$68 million for farm labor housing loans and grants authorized under section 514 and 516:

\$1.61 billion Rural Water and Waste Disposal Program loans and \$726 million in grants: and

\$22.745 million for the Rural Community Development Initiative.


