

Father's Day not only a day to honor your father, but all men who act as a father figure. Stepfathers, Fathers-in-law, uncles, grandfathers, spiritual fathers, etc. are all honored on Father's Day. Dads do make a difference

A positive and continuous relationship to one's father has been found to be associated with a good self-concept, higher self-esteem, higher self-confidence in personal and social interaction, higher moral maturity, reduced rates of unwed teen pregnancy, greater internal control, and higher career aspirations. Fathers who are affectionate, nurturing and actively involved in child-rearing are more likely to have well-adjusted children.

Prayer in its essence is communicating with our God, our Father, going before his throne of grace, and any form of real, meaningful communication is not just one-way communication.

Jesus said we can cry out Abba- Daddy- to communicate with His Father. It always reminds me of climbing up on my Dad's lap to just sit- to listen to and enjoy his company. To just be with him. God wants us to be 'with Him" to hear Him and to know Him. In other words, praying to God isn't us just talking to him, but praying is actually listening to God. In fact, I would argue that God has done way

more when I listened to him than when I talked to him.

God is a speaking God. So, you may say, "Okay, I'm in. "I know it's dangerous, but I want to pray. "I want to hear the voice of God. "How do I hear the voice of God?"

Three spiritual thoughts to hear the voice of

- Be still before God. This goes against all of the trajectory of everything in culture, fight to be still before God, to pause and to rest in his presence.
- God speaks through His Word. He directs, guides, corrects. Hebrews 4:12. We need to read it and do what it says!
- God speaks through people. God may use a sermon to speak to you. He may use a good friend or teacher.

• God speaks through circumstances. For Jonah to get turned around God sent a storm and a fish. To help me see that drinking was wrong I woke up on a railroad track. Sometimes it is the loss of a job that will steer you a different direction or health or family situations... God can change our courses and help us to discover His plan if we are open to listening. We need to learn to thank God for those closed doors and be thankful for the future opportunities before us.

- God speaks through His Spirit. When I said I heard God- it wasn't audible- but it was a prompting from the Holy Spirit. It can happen through imagination, dreaming, a vision, feeling God's pleasure as we begin a journey with Him. The more you listen the more you recognize His voice—Be still!
- Be Willing: Often our prayers are long babblings- repetitive sentences that have lost their meaning. We need to be willing to be honest before God. We need to be willing to do what He calls us to do.

A warning: Make sure you've obeyed what He showed you last! God isn't going to show you what to do tomorrow if you haven't obeyed Him today. If you find yourself ask-

I sense God? Why ing, "why don't don't I feel His presence? It may be that you haven't done what He already told you to do in the past.

• Be Ready. When Samuel said, "Speak Lord"- he was ready to listen. When God speaks you may not like what you hear. You might not feel ready to do what He has asked. God calls us to do hard things- but with those hard things He gives us what we need to accomplish them. We had those that didn't think we could raise the funds for the addition on South Troy, but God had other plans. God may call you to move to a different state, or to change your career. He may be telling you to invite your boss to church or break up with the person you're dating. He may call you to forgive that one that hurt you.

Every time God spoke to people in the Bible- and even now- they felt unprepared, unequipped, and unqualified. God doesn't speak to those that aren't listening. He calls those that have willing hearts and faith to believe. Don't fear- You are exactly in the right place. Have Faith. Pray Speak Lord! The only thing more dangerous than praying this prayer- is not praying this prayer!

Douglas Arlyn Hanson



It is with heavy hearts we announce the passing of Douglas Arlyn Hanson, 56, on Monday, June 10th, 2024. Doug was a long-term resident of Nevis, Minnesota and most recently resided in Cannon Falls, MN.

Doug was born February 2, 1968 in Owa- and grace - a true inspiration to those around tonna, MN, to Roger and Sharon (Reynolds) Hanson of Kenyon, MN.

He attended Kenyon High School, graduating in 1986 where he was inducted into the school's Hall of Fame in 2015 for his academic and athletic excellence in cross country and track and field. His running superiority continued in his five years at North Dakota State University (NDSU) where he graduated with honors in 1991 with a Bachelors of Science in Mechanical Engineering. His fierce dedication to running was overwhelmingly observed as Doug is still the most decorated athlete in NDSU history, in any sport. Under coach Don Larson, Doug was a 7-time National Champion: twice in cross country, three times in the 10,000meter outdoor run, and twice in the 5,000meter indoor run. He was a five-time North Central Conference (NCC) track and field champion: twice in the indoor 5,000, twice in the outdoor 5.000, and once in the outdoor 10,000. He earned Division II All-America honors 12 times: nine in track and field and three in cross country. Along with being named the NCC's most valuable indoor track and field athlete, his academic excellence was acknowledged with two CoSIDA Academic All-America College Division Awards. Doug still holds records at both the high school and collegiate levels. He valued being the President of a local Fellowship of Christian Athletes chapter and also toured Europe as a member of Athletes in Action. Doug was named to the U.S. Track/Cross Country Association Athletic Hall of Fame in 2002 and inducted into the NDSU Men's Cross Country, Men's Track & Field Hall of Fame in 2006 where he was honored to be included in the NDSU field house memorial wall.

Doug utilized his mechanical engineering degree in various ways after college, working countless hours to design his own patents on concert related spotlights - even seeing his prototype at a Pink Floyd concert. Working for companies like Tandy Computers, Vari-Lite, and eventually moving on to be a global sales manager at APW, his combined outgoing personality and engineering knowledge made him shine. His magnetic personality, quick wit, and sense of fun and adventure was contagious - a person you wanted in the

On February 4, 2004, Doug, age 36, suffered a tragic snowmobiling accident which resulted in a traumatic brain injury. In dire condition, he was hospitalized for 3 months, and became paralyzed on the left side of his body. His family was told, if he survived at all, he would never walk or gain back his quality of life. As you can imagine, Doug refused to accept his diagnosis; he surpassed everyone's expectations in gaining his mobility, life, and independence back. He experienced a setback no one could imagine, yet persevered with such integrity, tenacity, faith

As Co-Head Cross Country Coach and Assistant Distance Track and Field Coach for Nevis High School, Doug utilized his athletic expertise to coach younger generations of runners for 16 years with fellow coach Tom Stambaugh. It was said that Tom was the science behind their training program but Doug was the strategy and heart. With numerous hours on his bike, Doug loved to extract the potential out of every athlete, no matter the age or talent. Doug said his proudest coaching moment was guiding Nevis High School athlete Jade Rypkema to 7 Minnesota State Titles - matching his 7 NCAA titles.

Doug was most proud of his two children. His son Breck (30) with severe autism is currently living in a wonderful group home run by Creative Care for Reaching Independence (CCRI). Doug visited Breck nearly every week for their treasured routine of riding bikes, shooting baskets, and eating chicken tenders at Chili's. Doug was Breck's favorite person to tell him "Good Job!" after he made a basket or after he placed the right puzzle piece. Their relationship was a cherished piece of Doug's life. His daughter Riley (29) is currently a practicing dentist. Watching her achieve years of academic work to fulfill her goal of becoming a dentist was a proud and momentous occasion.

They also shared their love of athletics as Doug traveled far and wide to watch her play volleyball, and even shared in the title of 'National Champion' as Riley won two in her volleyball career. His support and love for his children was unwavering and undoubted as any chance given he would speak of being a proud father and NEVER missed an opportunity to be there in support.

Of the utmost importance to Doug was his faith. Early on, Doug accepted Jesus Christ as his Lord and Savior; striving toward the goal of living with integrity in all aspects of his life. Doug was a devoted member of Faithbridge Church in Park Rapids, MN, a committed member of Gideons International, and thoroughly enjoyed fellowship and Bible Study with multiple small groups throughout the years. He found joy in supporting various ministries including Reign Ministries where his sister, Darla, serves.




Heavy Rains Plague Community



Question: Are smoked tail lights illegal in Minnesota?

Answer: Minnesota law states that "tail lamps shall be plainly visible from a distance of 100 feet to the rear during normal sunlight and at night." The same goes for turn signals and headlights. Smoking, tinting, covering or placing any material over tail lights, brake lights, headlights or turn signals would be illegal and unsafe as they would not be plainly visible. It is illegal in all 50 states, because it is a major safety concern.

I recommend getting into the habit of check-

ing and keeping your rear lights clear of any snow, mud, dirt, dust or anything that can obstruct your lights.

You can avoid a ticket — and a crash — if you simply buckle up, drive at safe speeds, pay attention and of course, drive sober. Help us drive Minnesota Toward Zero Deaths.

Share the Road

Summer is a great season for motorcyclists to enjoy the nice weather.

Riders:

Be properly licensed. Cars and motorcycles require different skills. If it's been a while, refresh your knowledge with Motorcycle Safety Training and continue to invest in yourself and your riding skills.

Wear a helmet (and other safety gear). These are the best options for protecting your brain and body. Look for the DOT symbol on the back of your helmet to ensure you have proper safety gear.

Stopping, curves and intersections. Must-have skills as a motorcyclist include proper cornering judgement and better stopping skills. Both are skills to practice and improve to better manage your ride. Intersections remain the most likely place to have a crash involving another motorist and corners are the most likely place for a single motorcyclist to crash.

Know before you go. Conduct a quick motorcycle inspection to check your tire pressure and tread depth, headlights, signals, and fluid levels before you set out for the open road. **Motorists:**

Watch for motorcycles. Due to the smaller size of motorcycles, their speed and distance is more difficult to judge.

Always look twice before entering a roadway, turning left or changing lanes.

Give riders room by maintaining a three-second (or more) following distance and double-check blind spots.

Pay attention and drive at safe speeds, especially on corners and unfamiliar roads.

Stay alert, be prepared for hazards on the roadway and never ride impaired. Together, we can drive Minnesota Toward Zero Deaths!

U.S. Senators Amy Klobuchar, Tina Smith, Minnesota Fire Chiefs Celebrate Passage of the Fire Grants and Safety Act

WASHINGTON, DC -U.S. Senators Amy Klobuchar (D-MN) and Tina Smith (D-MN) issued the below statements after the Senate passed the Fire Grants and Safety Act, bipartisan legislation to continue providing federal funding for the Assistance to Firefighters Grant (AFG) and the Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER) Grant programs. This bill now goes to the President's desk to be signed into law. The Assistance to Firefighters Grant program helps firefighters and other first responders obtain critically needed equipment, protective gear, emergency vehicles, training and other resources. The SAFER Grants program provides direct funding to fire departments and volunteer firefighter organizations to increase or maintain the number of trained "front line" firefighters and enhance their capacity to comply with staffing, response, and operational standards. Since 2015, fire departments across Minnesota have received over \$33 million in SAFER grants and \$59 million in AFG grants.

"Firefighters put their lives on the line every day to save lives. We need to invest in our local fire departments and ensure that they have the funding they need to hire and train firefighters and purchase life-saving equipment," said Senator Klobuchar. "That's why I worked to pass the bipartisan Fire Grants and Safety Act which will support fire departments in Minnesota and across the country."

"Firefighters do one of the most difficult jobs possible, often at the risk of immense personal injury, to keep our families and loved ones safe. This funding is our way of giving them the support they need to do their jobs as safely and effectively as possible," said Senator Smith. "This bill means better equipment to protect firefighters on the job, increased funding for departments to hire additional firefighters, and ensures departments get the staff and resources they need to be ready to go in case of an emergency. I am proud to support this legislation."

"The AFG FIRE and SAFER grant programs are vital for providing federal assistance to Fire Departments across the State of Minnesota as they struggle to provide funding for modern, safe, equipment and adequate levels of staffing to keep their communities

Reps. Finstad, Fischbach, Emmer, and Stauber Send Letter to Governor Walz Urging Request for Federal Disaster Declaration

WASHINGTON D.C. – Congressman Brad Finstad (MN-01), Congresswoman Michelle Fischbach (MN-07), Majority Whip Tom Emmer (MN-06), and Congressman Pete Stauber (MN-08) sent a letter urging Governor Tim Walz to issue a Major Disaster Declaration Request for the areas across Minnesota that have been affected by recent flooding.

"I have been traveling around southern Minnesota to meet with local officials and assess the damage caused by the recent catastrophic flooding. As I talk with community members across the First District, it is clear that the extent of the damage is severe and has significantly affected the lives and livelihoods of thousands across southern Minnesota," said Rep. Finstad. "My Republican colleagues and I are urging Governor Walz to act swiftly and request a Federal Disaster Declaration, which will provide our communities with the resources they need to recover and rebuild."

In part, the letter reads:

"The damage from this flooding has impacted many Minnesotan families. Homes, businesses, community buildings, and public areas are under water. We ask that you immediately request a Major Disaster Declaration to help unlock federal resources for these people," the letter reads. "Once your request is submitted, we will also call on President Biden and the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to act swiftly to approve your request and get these resources to our state."

Five Years of Data Reveal Higher Profitability for Ag Water Quality Certified Farms

Farmers also saw other improved financial metrics compared to non-certified farms

Farmers enrolled in the Minnesota Agricultural Water Quality Certification Program (MAWQCP) have higher profits than noncertified farms, according to five years of data from the Minnesota State Agricultural Centers of Excellence.

The "Influence of Intensified Environmental Practices on Farm Profitability" study examines financial and crop and livestock production information from farmers enrolled in the Minnesota State Farm Business Management education program. The 126

MAWQCP farms in the study saw more gross cash farm income and net farm income in 2023 than non-certified farms. Looking at five-year average data, the average net cash income for MAWQCP farms was over \$213,600 compared to nearly \$163,000 for non-MAWOCP farms. Other key financial metrics are also better for those enrolled in the MAWQCP, such as debt-to-asset ratios and operating expense ratios.

The five years of data serve as an indicator of a positive return on investment for wholefarm conservation management that farmers implement to become certified.

"We now have continuous data that shows the Minnesota Ag Water Quality Certification Program provides better economic outcomes on top of the benefits to our water and soil resources," said Agriculture Commissioner Thom Petersen. "With so many advantages to the MAWQCP, I encourage all farmers and landowners to look into certifying their land and contact their local Soil and Water Conservation District for more information.'

"The MAWQCP producers participating in Farm Business Management can enhance farm profitability by benchmarking various aspects of their farm operations," said Keith Olander, Executive Director of AgCentric, and Agricultural Partnerships. "This study shows that these producers operate with a higher level of efficiency compared to their

The MAWQCP puts farmers in touch with

local conservation district experts to identify and mitigate any risks their farms pose to water quality on a field-by-field basis. Producers going through the certification process have priority access to financial assistance. After being certified, each farm is deemed in compliance with new water quality laws and regulations for 10 years.

Since the program's statewide launch in 2016, the 1,500 Minnesota Agricultural Water Quality certified farms have added more than 2,915 new conservation practices that protect Minnesota's waters. Those new practices have kept over 48,250 tons of sediment out of Minnesota rivers while saving 144,125 tons of soil and nearly 60,375 pounds of phosphorous on farms each year. The conservation practices have also reduced nitrogen loss up to 49% and cut greenhouse gas emissions by over 58,250 tons per year.

Top MN Dairy Farms Recognized for Superior Cow Care MDA honors 90 herds with lowest somatic cell count

Minnesota Agriculture Commissioner Thom Petersen today released the annual list of top Minnesota dairy herds with low somatic cell counts (SCC). Somatic cell count is a key indicator of milk quality – a lower SCC count is better for cheese production and a longer shelf life for bottled milk.

In honor of National Dairy Month, 90 Minnesota dairy farms are being recognized for their superior herd management skills by achieving an average SCC of under 100,000.

We applaud these farmers' efforts to maintain high milk quality standards, especially in the face of new and ongoing challenges," Petersen said. "Their success is a testament to these farms' resilience, and a major accomplishment."


Although somatic cells occur naturally and are not a food safety concern, dairy farmers monitor them because they can be used as a measure of the health of their cows. Processors also pay a premium for milk with low counts. A farmer whose herd has a very low count can receive a higher price per hundredweight compared to a farmer whose herd average is high.

Minnesota Department of Agriculture and University of Minnesota dairy experts have worked with the state's dairy farmers for 20 years to lower somatic cell counts. When the initiative began in 2003, the herds honored that year included those with SCC averages as high as 144,000, compared to the current goal of obtaining a SCC under 100,000.
