County adopts new compensation plan

Adjustments to salaries and wages designed to make it more competitive

The Monroe County Board last week approved a new compensation plan that it hopes will help retain current staff as well as recruit new employees.

In July 2021, the county commissioned a \$79,000 wage study by McGrath Human Services Group (MHSG). CEO Dr. Victoria McGrath Consultant Senior Malayna Halvorson Maes presented the firm's findings and recommendations at last week's monthly meeting.

Maes told supervisors the firm looked at comparables from other counties and municipalities as well as from the private sector. The study didn't look at health insurance, focusing solely on

It found Monroe County was significantly behind in its wage and salary scale with beginning minimum pay for 93% of positions behind the average market minimum. Another 50% of

are being compensated under the market average.

The study also found

"You are going to continue to have ongoing turnover if you don't make some adjustments," said Maes.

The recommended adjustments to wages and salaries that the county board adopted was a market average, which would make it neither the highest nor the lowest paying employer in the area.

Fire blazes in Tomah Wednesday morning

At 2:00 a.m. Wednesday morning, the Tomah fire department was paged to the 1200 block Kilbourn Ave for a structure fire. The 2 story home was used as a rental and was vacant at the time of the

Tomah Fire Chief Tim Adler said, "most of the crews departed by 8:30a.m. as most of the fire was out at that point. The Tomah Fire Department was putting out hotspots throughout the afternoon. We were there investigating until 10p.m."

There were about 35 firefighters on the scene to fight the fire. No injuries were reported. The structures to the north and south of the fire faced façade damage from the heat of the flames. The rental property is a total loss.

you to remember this," he said. "I want to avoid the fear of Cataract Elementary being on the chopping block every time the district looks at budget cuts. There are millions of dollars in all these separate funds the Sparta Area School District has, yet we're here talking about closing the Cataract Elementary School to save

\$437,915." John Hendricks suggested people vote for the upcoming referendum if they want to save the school.

"If there's a bad guy in the room, it's me. I can't speak for the whole board or administration, but from my perspective when I was the superintendent and this school was on the list of possible budget cuts; at that time there was not room in our schools to add the Cataract students, now there is," he said. "I am speaking for myself only, but I am confident that no board member or administrator wants to see Cataract School closed."

"The number one thing you can do to 'save' Cataract School is to vote for the referendum." The Sparta Area School District has an operating referendum on the ballot on Tues. April 5th. The District is asking for \$4.2 million split between the next two years to maintain current operations.

Hendricks went on to say, "It's a hard argument for most of the taxpayers in the city limits to keep the Cataract School. I'm an advocate for not using one-time funds for long-term problems. Using ESSER (Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund) funds to 'save' the Cataract school delays the problems."

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



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
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1st Community Credit Union holds 61st **Annual Meeting**

Community Credit Union held its 61st Annual Meeting on March 28, 2022 at Sparta American Legion Post 100 in Sparta, WI. The 48 member-owners attending the meeting elected two directors, Douglas Allen and Nicholas Greenwell, to threevear terms on the Board of Directors. They join board members Scott Herrman, Phil Yahnke, Doug Billings, Wendy Whitehead, and Joe Belling.

Chairman Wendy Whitehead reported on the credit union's growth in 2021, which brought assets to over \$223 million dollars. 1st CCU's new Tomah branch continues to grow, and a property in Holmen was purchased in 2021 with an eye toward expansion in future years. Overall during 2021 the credit union increased loans by 19%. 1st Community Credit Union has loaned out over \$1.5 billion dollars since it was organized in 1961. Treasurer Scott Herrman reported on the Credit Union's Financial Condition. President Brad Bauges spoke about the Credit Union's current projects, including the addition of online account opening and our upcoming enhancements to online banking, mobile banking, and online lending. He also stressed 1st CCU's commitment to volunteerism and community involvement by the employees and board members. More than 900 hours

of community involvement was logged by staff during the past fiscal year. Josh Roberts, Vice President of System Collaboration & Development for the Wisconsin Credit Union League, was the guest speaker. Mr. Roberts spoke about the current state of credit unions in Wisconsin, and he praised 1st CCU for their unprecedented growth during 2021. Roberts also spoke about all Wisconsin credit unions' dedication to meeting challenges such as cyber security, talent retention, and succession planning.

Bauges announced that Mark Mulder and Terri Lenselink are down from the Board and he recognized them for their years of service: Mulder has served on the board since 1995 and Linselink has served since 2013. Sandy Anderson, VP Human Resources, presented Cora Jothen, Accounting Manager, with the 2021 Outstanding Service Award. Anderson also recognized several staff members for their combined 110 years of service: Diana Mack-30 years, Barb Burnham-20 years, Shelly Sawvell-15 years, Scott Herrman-10 years on the board, Leianna Melde-10 years, Sue Stellick-10 years, Kyle Bahl-5 years, Jodi Lovgren-5 years, and Brad Bauges-5 years.

Following the annual meeting a re-organizational meeting was held to elect the officers of the board.

to bridge the transition into the new compensation plan for the next two years. When that funding is depleted in year three, the county has to come up with \$1.3 million to offset the impact on the budget.

According to County Administrator Tina Osterberg, that figure should begin dropping because of staff retirements and resignations. In addition, she said the new Rolling Hills senior care facility should be covering salaries and wages of its staff through its own revenue.

McGrath said her firm only recommends fiscally sustainable plans, but admitted she can't predict the future.

"The problem is I can't tell you what the economy is going to do by the end of the year, let alone what the economy is going to look like three years from now," she said. "If you had asked me on March 13, 2020, I could have given you a three-year plan. I'm sorry, the economy is very different today than it was in 2020 and who knows what it's going to be in 2025 or 2026."

Speaking to the Herald, Smudde said the alternative approving the compensation plan wasn't sustainable either. "If we don't have staff here we can't provide services, so we can't sustain the county.'

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Wisconsin Guard looks back on role in Operation Allies Welcome

The Wisconsin National Guard played an important supporting role in Operation Allies Welcome, the nearly six-month mission to resettle thousands of Afghan nationals, which ended last month at Fort McCoy, Wisconsin.

Operation Allies Welcome is an effort led by the Department of Homeland Security, supported by the U.S. State Department, the Department of Defense and U.S. Northern Command, to provide transportation, temporary housing general support for Afghan evacuees at suitable facilities in the United States.

According to the Fort McCoy public affairs office, more than 12,600 Afghan nationals arrived at Fort McCoy beginning Aug. 22, 2021. The military base provided temporary housing, food, clothing, services, and helped process immigration benefits as part of the effort to resettle the Afghans in communities across the United States.

The Wisconsin National Guard's Volk Field Combat Readiness Training Center was a key part of that process. Airfield managers, refuelers and security forces worked around the clock to receive several flights per day of evacuees heading to Fort McCoy for a total of 93 flights between August and October.

Brig. Gen. Joane Mathews, Wisconsin's deputy adjutant general for Army serving as dual-status commander, greeted arriving individuals, and Wisconsin National Guard linguists created signage in Dari and Pashto languages. Designated relief agencies used Wisconsin National Guard facilities to receive and stage supplies bound for Fort McCoy.

Additionally, Wisconsin National Guard COVID-19 teams spent 141 mission days at Fort McCoy sometimes working 14-hour days — collecting 42,076 specimens from Afghans and administering 1,451 vaccines.

"I believe that the Wisconsin National Guard provided critical COVID mitigation support to the entire Operation Allies Welcome mission," said Svea Erlandson, strategic plans and policy officer with the Wisconsin National Guard's directorate of domestic operations. 'Although COVID-19 was not the only epidemiological concern on site, the Wisconsin National Guard provided a reliable. consistent and professional capability in both the testing vaccination spheres. With regard to testing, [we] showed exemplary ability to integrate with both the active duty forces and the contractors on site to develop processes and systems to perform surveillance testing of the Afghan guests. With regard to vaccination, [we] provided a unique and critical capacity to

the disease mitigation on site." Erlandson said Wisconsin National Guard COVID-19 teams administered COVID vaccines to Afghans independent medical of screening procedures, also provided crucial support for multiple mass vaccination events. According to Fort McCoy public affairs, Afghans received approximately 87,000 vaccines besides COVID-19, these included measles, mumps, rubella, varicella, polio and the flu.

"In my opinion," Erlandson said, "being able to perform all of these functions allowed the active duty, governmental and non-governmental partners to provide the attention that these measures would have required toward other important concerns on base.'

Lt. Col. Cory Newmann spent two months at Volk Field, serving as the liaison officer for the Wisconsin National Guard Joint Staff. He also managed a team of Army and Air Force linguists who assisted with translation. "The United States had

a responsibility to help the Afghans and their families that supported our mission in Afghanistan," Newmann said. "It was an incredible honor to help with this mission."

Newmann said this mission was "incredibly meaningful" to him as it provided an

opportunity to help those in

"I have sharp memories of evacuees arriving late at night, walking off our aircraft carrying only a few belongings in plastic bags," Newmann said. "Some were injured, possibly from the dangerous escape from Afghanistan. As tired as they all appeared to be, they were appreciative as we helped them off the aircraft and onto the bus to Fort McCoy. Children were holding hands and they walked barefoot into their new life in the United "I will never forget it as long

as I live."

Though the Wisconsin National Guard's Army 107th Support Maintenance Company was deployed in Europe, its armory in Sparta, Wisconsin supported Operation Allies Welcome as the main collection and distribution point for donated items for Afghan evacuees.

"Once a donation was dropped off, it was sorted into its respective category, then sent to Fort McCoy to be distributed to the guests," said 1st Lt. Brittni Swanson, facility manager and part of the 107th Support Maintenance Company's rear detachment staff.

The armory accepted donations from Sept. 1, 2021 through Jan. 21 of this year seven days per week until December, then weekdays after that.

"For weeks, we were receiving multiple semitruckloads per day, along with several community members donating truck and trailer loads of essential items," Swanson said. "They'd finish unloading their donations and ask, 'What else is needed?' and show up again the next day with those critically needed items.

"It was amazing to witness our community come together to provide clothing, personal hygiene items, toys and books for the kids, and formula and bottles for infants," Swanson continued. "I am overwhelmingly proud to be part of this community, and thankful to have had the

with this mission."

The last group of Afghan nationals left Fort McCoy Feb. 15, according to the Department of Homeland Security.

"I would like to thank the federal staff, service members, volunteers and members of the local community whose dedication was critical to the success of our mission at Fort McCoy," said Robert Fenton, Jr., Operation Allies Welcome senior response official. "With the help of our partners across government and non-profit organizations, the 12,600

opportunity to be involved Afghan evacuees who were temporarily housed at Fort McCoy have now joined their new communities."

Angie Salazar, Department of Homeland Security lead for the Operation Allies Welcome mission at Fort McCoy, echoed that sentiment.

"With community donations, support from many organizations and close coordination with surrounding hospitals and public safety, she said, "the mission accomplished the remarkable feat of resettling nearly 13,000 at-risk Afghans — including 65 newborn U.S. citizens.'



Our District Needs New Management Analytics

our School District in the bottom 50% of School Districts in Wisconsin, according to publicschoolreview. com. For years we have been laden with



referendums to spend money, but this money has not supported our teachers and has not translated to better education. This is a management problem, not likely a money problem.

Much of this downward trend was caused by our previous administration's decision to take away a retirement benefit teachers had funded with their own money. We've lost numerous high-quality teachers that were in their mid to late careers because they lost \$50,000 to \$75,000 of monies they had negotiated to be set aside for retirement insurance, rather than taking that money in their salary compensation. Ironically, the previous administrators got their \$120,000 stipend when they retired, even though they took it away from the teachers.

The teacher's pay scale for years of service and continuing education were also thrown out by the previous administration, causing all kinds of confusion and discontent, again causing teachers to leave the district. Losing all of these seasoned experienced teachers is likely why our test scores have fallen so dramatically. Even if the referendum doesn't pass, funds should be prioritized to teachers' salaries so our district pays our teachers equitably so they remain in our district. Teachers are the most important assets in our schools, so we should focus our spending on them.

A couple of years ago before the Herrman Elementary referendum, I did a lot of research on the need for new schools and found that the data the consultant and the administration was providing the public was inaccurate in regard to how much student capacity we had available. We had way more capacity than

they told the public and now we can see that we have overbuilt. schools are currently operating at 65% to 75% of their capacity.

I was not against building a new school, but asked for budget

information that would show how this spending of nearly \$30 million would make our school district operations more efficient so as to make this investment of \$30 million pay off in reduced operational costs. When I was on the school board before Meadowview Middle School was built, we developed cost analytics for all our schools. This information was essential to allow our district to manage our costs. These types of analytics are not available today, but are essential to guiding the management of our school district and need to be implemented again.

The latest idea from the previous administrator is to close Cataract. We are the Sparta Area School District, not the Sparta School District. Cataract school should be allowed to stay open and if they need to close a building, they may need to move their administrators to a school and close Maplewood.

Spending more money is fine if you know what you are spending it on. At the annual meeting of the school district, I asked for simple information on how much we are spending on each type and grade level of school and they could not answer this simple question. I have waited 5 months since the annual meeting and that information is still not available. This type of information is essential for an administration to manage its expenditures and to help the board set priorities for where our money should be spent. I'm not sure anyone in management really knows where the money is going if they can't answer these simple analytical questions.

In the recent budget exercise, the district has based

their total budget needs on an inflated enrollment number which makes it look like they need more total budget dollars than they actually need. If they were to use actual enrollments, their budget estimates would be lower and they wouldn't need to try sell you on a \$2.1 million referendum.

Administrators misleading the public with the statement we are moving money from one bucket to another bucket and not raising taxes. The bottom line is they are spending more tax dollars, otherwise they wouldn't have to go to referendum to ask for approval to spend more money. They will be spending more money annually and deferring the payment of debt so you will be paying longer.

All these issues have come from the current and previous administration, so it's definitely time for change of management and new board members that will hold the administration accountable. Our school district needs to learn how to analyze how it spends our money and the Board needs to ask probing questions to really understand where monies are being spent.

This does not mean lowering teachers' salaries or closing Cataract, it means operating our district with proper student/ teacher ratios and paying our teachers competitively to other districts. We may need to reduce the number of administrators and unessential budget items or simply budget more accurately by asking more probing questions to make better decisions.

It's time to be fiscally responsible, especially with the ridiculous inflation that our taxpayers are facing. should be able to operate more efficiently with our new buildings and not expect our community to come up with more money anytime things are mismanaged.

It's time for new leadership in the Sparta Area School District

Dear Editor:

From the Department of Education, (DPI), "it's best to have transparency on school operations finance". Here is finance 101:

A superintendent and school board approve operational budgets. This money is put into "Fund 10". At the end of the year, Fund 10 is emptied to spend down to zero because it is beneficial for getting more state aid next year. In January 2016, per Leah Hauser, (Director of Business Services at SASD), Fund 46 is started by then Superintendent, John Hendricks ... The contribution from left over budget money in Fund 10 to Fund 46 (Long Term Capital Improvement Trust Fund) is recorded as the expenditure for shared cost and equalization aid purposes. But Ms. Hauser says it was only about \$100. Future expenditures from Fund 46 are not part of shared costs. A school board is prohibited from removing money deposited into Fund 46 for a period of five years. After the initial five year wait period is over, funds may only be used for the purposes identified in plan. One can learn more through Open Records Act.

The sale of older school properties is about 1.4 million dollars. It could have been used to pay some principal of school debt that was at \$27,749,324--(millions). Our Monroe County Herald (Jan 2022) states the now \$3.25 million Memorial field project gets Sparta Gridiron Club support of roughly \$350,000. The city of Sparta has voted to give \$82,436 in Federal American Rescue Plan Act money. I firmly believe that an expense of a 3.25 million dollar project should have been a tax payer referendum. My property tax bill is 52% designated for local schools. Even if you rent, you pay toward your landlord's tax.

Dr. Van Deuren takes over in July 2017 as superintendent . In July 2017, Mr. Hendricks becomes Sparta Chamber Director. He quits in 2020 and Heidi Prestwood becomes Sparta Area Chamber Director. Ms. Prestwood stated, "the Memorial Field renovation project is at the top of the communities wish list."

Two vacant school board seats are quickly filled by Hendricks and Scholze ,voted in by other school board members. The Forward Facilities Committee (membership?) want to prioritize improvements to the field. (Oct. 21,2021).

It takes courage, conviction and time to stand up for our school. Our teachers are the heart and soul of our students success. The current school board puts us in this situation of referendum We need change for the future. I want less fear-mongering that puts staff on edge. Do you want honest teacher and staff support? Vote Yes on the referendum

Thursday night, I attended the school board candidate forum put on by the High Point Charter School. It was my first such event since I retired from the board in 2003. Given the yard signs and social media posts about the two "sides" of the upcoming election and referendum, I wanted to hear what each group stands for.

After listening for 90 minutes, I found that all eight candidates want to continue successful programs and schools like Montessori, charter schools and the Cataract school. They all want to encourage teachers and families with school-age children to stay in our district. The primary dispute between the so-called Vote4 and their opponents seemed to be whether they support the referendum or not. The referendum proposes to transfer \$2 million annually from the district's debt service budget to the operating budget. This latter budget pays teacher and staff salaries and benefits, buys books and supplies, maintains our facilities, and pays for services like bussing and lunches.

The 2022-23 operating budget is about \$41 million. This is identical to last year's budget. The need for the additional \$2 million annually comes from the failure of the state aids formula and levy limits to keep up with the cost of running our schools. Rather than propose to increase our local taxes, the board has asked us to approve a referendum which would transfer \$2 million annually from the debt service budget to the operating budget, thereby avoiding a tax increase.

The committee that put up the "Vote No" yard signs and the Vote4 group basically want to remove \$2 million a year from our school operating fund. The Vote No committee doesn't say which staff, programs and services they want to cut so that we can run our schools on \$2 million less than we are doing right now. Neither do the Vote4 candidates. Their general response seemed to be, "the administration is smart. They'll figure something out."

That's true, they will. But it won't be something consistent with their professed goals of continuing our successful programs, encouraging teachers and families with students to stay in the Sparta district, and keeping Cataract School open. If the Vote No group and the Vote4 have their way, we will spend the next year arguing about whose programs, teachers and schools get cancelled and whose don't.

When I became a board member in 1994. I was shocked to learn that 51% of our students qualify for free and reduced lunches. That is still true today. This means that their families live at or very near the federal poverty level. These are the children who most need the support of the school community if they are to have the opportunity for financial success in our modern economy. They are the children who will be hurt most by cutting two million dollars from our schools. They are more than half of the children we are morally and legally obligated to educate.

At the forum, a Vote4 candidate said that we in Sparta cannot aspire to have schools "like Onalaska," a more prosperous district. I disagree profoundly with that attitude. Because over half of our student population lives below the poverty level, we need better staff, better services and better facilities to put our students on par with those from more prosperous districts. That's why I will be voting "yes" on the referendum, and I will be voting for candidates who support it.

Sparta Area School District report card

Dear Editor:

The Wisconsin Institute for Law and Liberty has developed a scorecard {source listed below} for all the school districts in Wisconsin using data provided by the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction. Being curious, I checked out the information on the Sparta Area School District and would like to share a couple of observations.

Academic proficiency peaked in 2016-2017 at less than 40%, and has been on the decline ever since. Enrollment peaked in 2018-2019 and has declined both years since. This past year Sparta had a net deficit of 220 students on the open enrollment program. Spending was up 9.74% from 2015-2016 to 2020-2021. The average ACT score was 17.50 for Sparta compared to 20.1 statewide.

On a more positive note, Sparta has a graduation rate of 98.0%, while the state average is only 90.0%. But, when you look at the academic proficiency information, one has to ask questions.

There is enough evidence of need for a significant change in leadership and that means voting for the "VOTE 4" candidates for the SASD School Board on April 5th. Vote for Amy Lopez, Pat McKenna, Marla Leverich, and Jason Perry; and allow them to effect actual, positive district change for the students, the teachers, and the community. Join me in voting for Lopez, McKenna, Leverich, and Perry on April 5th and in voting NO on the referendum. Spending alone will not guarantee better results.



Wilton couple's lives enriched by art

Gary "W.D." Finke and his wife Rochelle met over a butcher block at a meat processing plant in Phoenix. AZ back in the 1980s. The two complemented each other – Rochelle was a wrapper and W.D. was a cutter.

Fast forward four decades and that mutual bond still exists between the couple. Only now they use their talents to create art in the basement studios of their home in the Arrowhead Subdivision in Wilton.

The Finkes moved to the area in 2003, to be closer to their children who lived in La Farge and Viroqua. "Our children started having grandkids and we didn't want to miss out on that," said Rochelle.

The children have moved away but the Finkes have ties to the community and W.D. still works as a meat cutter for Hansen's IGAs around the area.

Instead of wrapping meat

Instead of wrapping meat with paper, Rochelle now wiles away the hours making paper into works of art, while W.D. temporarily replaces his knife and butcher block with a paintbrush and canvas.

Rochelle, a native of Arizona, calls herself a mixed-media artist but the bulk of her work involves paper. She attributes her affinity for the medium to her father's occupation as a paper representative of the Zellerbach Paper Company.

She said she always had paper samples in her hands as a youngster, creating her own "childish masterpieces". She later studied art in Glendale, AZ and has since gone on to create hundreds of pieces, including framed works, note cards and hievele cards

of Wilton.

Rochelle describes her technique as "an assemblage of deliberative structure to increase the status of a textured surface." She cuts, tears or sorts paper, often embellishing it with flower petals or other natural world media, and turns it into works of art

W.D. originally hails from Creighton, Neb. While he inherited his nickname from his father, he developed his zeal for oil painting from his good friend the late Patrick Cunningham, a master painter of Western art he took lessons from in Sun City. W.D. said he

and Cunningham often would go into the desert to paint landscapes.

One can see Cunningham's influence in W.D.'s work, which includes Western landscapes, horses, cattle and wildlife. His collection also has a few depictions of the

bike trail and Kickapoo River Valley. He says his "hogwashlike technique" gives his work a very recognizable style.

Much of W.D.'s work these days is commissioned. However, he displays and sells pieces from his collection, including signed and numbered prints, in the Dorset Valley Schoolhouse Restaurant & Mercantile east of Wilton on Hwy. 71.

Sparta football looking for new home after DNR study

All those excited about the upcoming changes to Sparta's Memorial Field have been dealt a



major setback in the project's completion.

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources did a study recently of Sparta's Memorial Park in preparation for the renovation to the football field area of the park and found that the space is part of the necessary natural habitat for water fowl that live in the Perch Lake area and therefore needs to remain as close to its current state as possible.

That has led to the renovation project, which includes new bleachers, new lights and a turf field for both Sparta football and soccer, to be halted indefinitely.

Furthermore, the study by the DNR has concluded that football games in that area have been detrimental to local animal life and will have to be played elsewhere next year and beyond.

So, essentially, Sparta football will be homeless in 2022 as the team looks for alternative sites for competition. There are several solutions that have been proposed to remedy the situation, however, with ideas ranging from the plausible to the outlandish.

Most reports indicate Sparta will just play its schedule entirely on the road.

One of the more outlandish ideas was to suspend the season altogether and push current football athletes to play soccer or run cross country or to focus on academics.

Another was to combine with Tomah to create a super team of sorts and make playoff qualification easier for both programs.

A third notion was offered to build a floating island of sorts on Perch Lake that would be large enough for a football field. The idea gained some traction when it was suggested that fans would be forced sit on the banks of the lake so coaches and officials wouldn't have to hear dissenting comments from the crowd during game play.

Hilden turns heads in TRIUMPHANT RETURN

When Jack Hilden started his high school track career, he had no idea what a story he'd encounter along the way.

Hilden, who began his high school track and field career at Cashton in 2019, has had a wild and unique ride just to get to competition in 2022. The senior dealt with the loss of a sophomore season due to the COVID-19 pandemic, then was extremely limited last year due to injuries sustained in the basketball season. Still, despite all the setbacks and time away from the sport, Hilden has still managed to do what every high school athlete in his

position works for - the chance to come back better than before.

"After dislocating my knee last year, it's been a long journey and it feels good just to be able to compete again, especially at the level I'm competing at," said Hilden after finishing third in high jump and setting his second personal record of the season at last weekend's indoor meet at UW La Crosse.

"I was a little worried about how it was going to go, worried if my knee would hold up but so far it's going really well. I'm excited to see where I can go from here."

Hilden, along with sophomore teammate Jack Schlesner, have been raising eyebrows with their performances in the vertical jumps. The duo have packed a 1-2 wallop in the event with Schlesner winning the event in both outings and Hilden trailing closely behind, finishing second and third in the first two meets. Both meets, however, yielded personal bests for Hilden.

A year ago, that reality seemed far-fetched. Hilden's injury - a dislocated knee in that occurred in the second half of the 2020-21 basketball season - severely limited his oppor

21 basketball season - severely limited his opportunities on track and field. As a junior he participated in some running events, but high jump was out of the question.

His road to recovery took 5-6 months to get back in the gym for basketball. As a junior he competed in a couple track meets and recalled trying the 100 meter dash, but said he could tell he wasn't anywhere near being a complete athlete at that time. Hilden said that



event with a height of 5-10. Schlesner said the coaching provided by first year head coach Beth Lee has been instrumental in his growth in high jump this season. As a freshman, Schlesner

"It feels great to see what he can do and what he can accomplish at such a young age still," said Hilden about his younger counterpart. He went on to acknowledge the state berth Schlesner had last year and said that success is something both can piggy back off of this year as they try to reach their zenith in the event.

The early-season success has been good to both Hilden and Schlesner. The pair have pushed each other early on this season and have created what some may call a dominating jumping force as they play off of each others' success in the


