Fire leaves gentlemen's club a total loss

At 11:47 p.m., on Monday, May 27th, the Sparta Area Fire District (SAFD) was paged to Barons gentlemen's club, at 3986 WI-71, at Four Corners, west of Cataract.

The fire was originally on the back side of the building and quickly spread throughout the building, according to SAFD Chief, Mike Arnold. The building was unoccupied, as the business was closed for the day. The building is likely a total loss, according to Chief SAFD, along with the Monroe County Sheriff's Office, and the State Fire Marshall's Office, is investigating the cause and origin today, Tuesday, May 28th. Chief Arnold said, "The fire is suspicious in nature," which is why the State Fire Marshall's Office is involved.

The Sparta Area Fire District was assisted by the Monroe County Sherriff's Office, Sparta Ambulance, and Cataract First Responders. The Melrose, Fort McCoy, and Black River Falls Fire Departments provided extra

Tomah Reginal Rodeo continues building legacy

Local rodeo youth shine bright on big stage

The Tomah 11th Annual Reginal High School Rodeo and Junior High Rodeo took place at the Monroe County Fairgrounds, located at 1625 Butts Avenue, in Tomah, over the May 17th-19th, 2024, weekend. Performances began on Friday night, with a warmup jackpot and exhibition barrels. The first round of events began on Saturday, at 10 a.m. The second round began on Sunday, at 9 a.m. The average from the two rounds was used to score the contestants in each category,

and then there was a final all-around winner for each division: High School (HS,) Junior High (JH,) and JH

Reserves.

HS Tomah contestants included: Caylee Check, Kyan Nelson, Brady Breitspecher, and Jayden Johnson. Tomah JH division included: Aislynn Nelson, Calynn Ollendick, Riley Breitspecher, Jacey Breitspecher, and Jocey Johnson.

HS Sparta contestants were Nattlie Olson and Taylor Donskey and JH contestants were Lanie Brooks and Quinn Donskey.

These local cowboys and cowgirls compete in eight State Final Reginal Rodeos, where their two days of scores are averaged, accumulated, and then taken to the State Finals. JH finals finished up over this past weekend, May 24th – 26th, 2024, in Arcadia,

Wisconsin. HS finals will take place on the June 14th – 16th, 2024 weekend, in Richland Center, Wisconsin.

At the end of State Finals, the average scores are calculated and there are four top winners in each division. Those winners head on to Nationals. JH nationals will be held the weekend of June 23rd – 29th, 2024, at Iowa State Fairgrounds, in Des Moines, Iowa. HS nationals will be on the weekend of July 14th – 20th, 2024, at Sweetwater Events Complex, in Rock Springs, Wyoming.

The *Herald* spoke with Toni Henry, Wisconsin High School Rodeo Association committee member and founder of the Tomah Rodeo. "It's been beautiful weather," Henry said merrily. "The grounds are

Amtrak's Borealis bursts onto the scene in Wisconsin

New route runs twice daily between Chicago and Saint Paul

21st, 2024, On May Amtrak sent their newest route runner, the Borealis, on its inaugural run, from Saint Paul, Minnesota to Chicago, Illinois. The Borealis follows the same route as Amtrak's current Empire Builder but has added a couple of more stops along the way, to include Sturtevant, Wisconsin, and the Milwaukee Airport (MKA).

In all, Wisconsin has the lion's share of the Borealis stops, at eight, with Minnesota destinations set at three and Illinois garnering two pick-up and drop-off points. Coach fares start at \$41 each way, between Saint Paul and Chicago, with everyday discounts for children ages 2-12, students, seniors, veterans, military personnel and families, and others.

On May 21st, while waiting for the Governor of Wisconsin, Tony Evers, to show up on the Borealis, the Herald sat in the Tomah Amtrak station with Mac Cartee, a Vietnam Veteran and the station's attendant for 32 years. "When I started here, there were double tracks, which are no longer," Cartee informed the Herald. "Threesided-metal sheds used to be the waiting room here [Tomah, Wisconsin]."

memorable moments during his 32 years at the station. "One time, I returned from the Tomah Tractor Pull, during high winds, and all the windows had been blown out of the station," Cartee said. "We have had a lot of medical events over the years. When they happen on the train, they will radio ahead, in order to have an ambulance waiting here, at the station, when they arrive." Cartee also said that inebriated and disorderly folks would be met at the station by police officers, who would get them off the train, to ensure the safety of the other passengers.

The Herald pressed Cartee on the extra waters, soft drinks, and boxes of snacks

stacked up on the bench. "The Amtrak lady called me and said that there are a lot of people on that train today. They needed more supplies, so another train dropped all of this off for them."

There and Back

With the train running a bit behind schedule, the Herald had a chance to interview Paul and Cindy Wolf, two frequent travelers on Amtrak. The Wolfs' hop on one train, going East, and deboard at the Wisconsin Dells depot, where they will walk a few blocks and have dinner. After a few hours, they will catch a Westbound train, to return home. "Tonight, we are going to look at Monk's Bar and Grill and The Keg," Paul Wolf stated. "We have a bit of time to walk around, then we hop back on the train to come home." The Wolf's said that their cost, for a roundtrip ticket was only

As the Borealis came to a halt, several passengers stepped off the train, as others waited for permission to board. One of the people whose ride had concluded at the Tomah stop, was Governor Tony Evers. Standing by to greet the governor was Tina Thompson and Berta Downs, from the Tomah Chamber of Commerce. While they and several media were hoping to get a few words with Governor Evers, a healthy exchange from high office to constituent was not to take place.

The governor and his crew all jumped into black SUVs, and were escorted away by the Wisconsin State Patrol.

Van Orden backs 2024 Farm Bill, champions provisions for Wisconsin's farmers

On May 23rd, Congressman Derrick Van Orden (WI-03) voted in support of the House Committee on Agriculture's advancement of the Farm, Food, and National Security Act of 2024, commonly known as the Farm Bill. Help protect turtles during nesting season

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) encourages the public to help nesting turtles by following a few easy actions throughout the nesting season. This time of year, turtles emerge from rivers, lakes and wetlands to find a spot for their nests. Wisconsin's 11 turtle species lay eggs in shallow, buried nests from late May through June, where they are often along roads and in residential yards. Drivers can help reduce turtle road mortality — a leading cause of turtle decline throughout Wisconsin — by being mindful when driving near swamps, lakes and rivers.

"When turtles are more active during nesting season, face added risks," said Andrew Badje, DNR conservation biologist. "Some are run over by vehicles, while others face predation from raccoons, skunks and coyotes. Some protected species are also taken illegally from the wild and sold in the illegal pet trade. Protecting adult females

Challenge Academy joins forces with MCISWG

Destroying invasive plants at forefront of habitat restoration

In 2024, the Monroe County Invasive Species Working Group (MCISWG) continues to remain busy, restoring habitat, educating the community, and providing interactive field days for landowners and other conservation-minded people in Monroe County. Earlier this spring, MCISWG had a workday, with the Fort McCoy-based Wisconsin Challenge Academy joining forces with them, which provided impressive results. They are hoping to keep the momentum going, with an upcoming event at the West Salem School Forest, in Sparta, with additional events on the horizon for this

The public is welcome to attend these events, which aim to educate people about how ornamental landscaping can lead to the uncontrolled spread of plants from other countries, even in unexpected growth and spread of seeds by wind, wildlife, and other means of transport.

When plants, such as invasive honeysuckle, multi flora rose, buckthorn, amur mustard, maple, garlic Japanese knotweed, and purple loosestrife become established in an area, native wildflowers, trees, and shrubs simply can't compete. Monroe County residents are encouraged to RSVP, and join the effort to restore our precious habitat, so that we can all continue to enjoy our unique plants, animals, and landscape. Following is information about upcoming meetings, how to join MCISWG, and an exclusive report on the recent outing with Ft McCoy's Challenge Academy.

Challenge Academy and Volunteers make a Difference

Mic Armstrong, of the MCISWG, shared that earlier this spring, the Challenge Academy, based out of Fort McCoy, helped tackle invasive honeysuckle, at The Elroy Sparta Bike Trail. MCISWG needed help cutting one remaining species of invasive plant, after having spent several years cutting out Amur Maple and Buckthorn from a large area in the campground of the Elroy Sparta State Trail.

This time, the target plant was Eurasian Honeysuckle (Lonicera species), nonnative, exotic plant, sold for many years as an ornamental plant. Although it does have pretty flowers and was very popular in personalhome landscapes, when it escapes into natural areas it outcompetes the native shrubs in woodland understories. Once established, it can take moisture away from native

of forest trees. Birds that nest in them are more prone to predators than birds that nest in native shrubs. Birds will also eat the berries and spread seed to new areas, where it can form impenetrable thickets.

A bus full of eager cadets arrived at 9 a.m. and proceeded to the parking lot of the campground off Igloo Road, in Sparta. They quickly lined up in two formations, in front of two leaders. Cadets were dressed for the outdoors, outfitted in heavy camo uniforms, all of them donning their signature red hats. They were greeted by volunteers from the MCISWG. They were attentive, as some safety precautions, about working in woodland were explained.

Next, the cadets did their best to learn a little twig identification, from United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Biologist, Luke Romance. Amur Maple, buckthorn, and honeysuckle twigs were passed around. Knowing that such a crash course would be wild areas, due to the ease of tricky, volunteers had flagged hundreds of honeysuckles with little pieces of pink ribbon, to make things easier in the plant identification portion of the project.

On signals from their leaders, they trooped into the campground with several coolers filled with the day's provisions, as well as a heavy tote of bow saws and loppers, on loan, through the Natural Resources Department, at Fort McCoy. Volunteers worked with the cadets, to make sure every stem of the honeysuckle shrubs were cut close to the ground, before moving on to another plant. By lunchtime, volunteers needed to flag more plants. Cadets took the time to collect every piece of trash they could find and placed it all in trash bags, which volunteers disposed of at the end of the day.

In the afternoon, while one troop worked, the other was led on a hike down the bike trail. While the second troop hiked, the newly invigorated cadets lined up along the trail and on a signal, they spread out through an area of thick brush, cutting honeysuckle like professionals. Meanwhile, experienced and certified volunteers zigzagged with herbicide application devices. One such device was a modified paint roller. They treated each cut stump with a small amount of an oil-mixed herbicide, which should stop the invasives from resprouting.

Next winter MCISWG volunteers will tackle new areas of the roughly 100 acres, in and around the campground, which is infested with invasive amur maple, buckthorn and honeysuckle. The group is hoping for another strong showing by the Challenge Academy and the dedicated and hard-working cadets, who are helping in

plants and slow down growth the process of restoring these woods to their natural state, where oaks, black cherry, and native shrubs - such as hazel, winterberry and elderberry will flourish again, without the impediment of invasive plant



Henry explained a bit about what makes the rodeo unique from other sports. "Rodeo is a whole different sport when it comes to competition," Henry explained. "You must condition your horse yearround and get yourself in sync with your equine partner, and once you click - it's game

Weekend Rodeo Results

According to Henry, the rodeo was a success, and so were the local contestants. "All the kids did a great job and should be proud of themselves, even if it didn't go the way they wanted," Henry told the Herald. "But just like anything else, you dust your boots off, get back into the saddle and keep moving forward."

Tomah High School senior, Caylee Check, placed 4th in HS pole bending. Sparta's Laine Brooks placed 3rd in JH girls pole bending. Pole bending is where the mounted rider weaves the horse through a path of six poles,

without knocking them over.
Tomah's Check placed 2nd in HS breakaway. In JH breakaway, two Tomah students placed in the top 4. Riley Breitspecher placed 1st among boys and Jocey Johnson placed 4th among girls. Breakaway is where one mounted rider attempts to rope a calf running down a narrow run.

Goat Tying

Tomah's JH girls dominated the goat tying category, placing 3 out of 4 in the top four. Calynn Ollendick placed 1st, while Aislynn Nelson placed 2nd, and Jocey Johnson placed 3rd. Goat tying is where a rider races to a tethered goat, dismounts, and catches, throws, and ties three of the goat's legs together. It is a timed event.

Barrel Event

Sparta's JH girls dominated the barrel event. Both girls fought one another for the

number one spot, but Lanie Brooks prevailed for 1st and Quinn Donskey placed an honorable 2nd. Tomah's Check placed 2nd in HS barrels. Barrel racing is where the mounted rider weaves between three upright barrels, in a cloverleaf pattern, without knocking over the barrels.

Ribbon Roping

Tomah's Ollendick teamed up with Ronnie Ragatz for JH ribbon roping. They placed 1st in the event. Ribbon roping is where a mounted rider races to rope a calf, with several loops around the horns. The teammate is then able to grab the ribbon on the calf's tail and race on foot, back to the

Team Roping

Tomah's Breitsprecher teamed up with Treyton Carlson, to take 1st in HS team roping, and Riley Breitsprecher teamed up with Ronnie Ragatz, to place 1st in JH team roping. Team roping is when two mounted riders work together, one at the head and one at the heel, to catch a calf by the horn or neck and the other around a foot.

For the rodeo shooting component, Tomah's JH Ollendick placed 3rd for small bore, small caliber rifle.

All Around Winners

Tomah's Laine Brooks was awarded the JH Reserve All-Around title in the girls' division. Her score was 48. To help put it into perspective, she was 1 point behind the 49 score that the HS and JH All-Around earned. Brooks will be one to watch at the State Finals and as she continues her rodeo journey.

Henry wishes luck to the contestants, and to "reach for the stars" as they compete at the State Finals and potentially Nationals.

Wisconsin Legends and Lore: World War 3 Averted

The time frame was October 1962, and the world was teetering on the brink of a Nuclear War. The Russians were

placing nuclear missiles in Soviet Union. To prevent Rus-Cuba, 90 miles off the coast of Florida — within striking range of the continental United States. The US had nuclear missiles based in Turkey, within striking distance of the

sia from delivering their full complement of nuclear missiles to Cuba, a naval blockade was placed around the island, preventing the Soviets from sending more nuclear

missiles. This may have been the closest the world has ever come to full-scale nuclear war. Fortunately, cooler heads prevailed, but even the threat of responding to and preventing a nuclear attack must be swift

and accurate.

There were several strategic nuclear response bases in Minnesota and Wisconsin, fearing the Russians may launch a nuclear bomber strike over the north pole. The two largest air bases were in Duluth and right here at Volk Field. The two bases were tied together with an immediate warning system that put both bases on alert. Volk had at least two aircraft always loaded with nuclear weapons, so they could be deployed at moment's notice.

The United States believed that prior to a Russian attack, they would attempt to use special forces troops to disrupt and disable our nuclear response - so security was tight and on edge. This was when a black bear entered the picture,

nearly triggering World War 3. On the evening of October 25th, 1962, there was an intrusion at the Duluth air base. At the time, Duluth had 130 nuclear weapons in its weapons storage bunkers. A security

guard saw a shadowy figure in

a fur coat attempting to climb

the perimeter fence. He fired

at the figure and sounded the sabotage alarm. The guard investigated and determined that the infiltrator was not a Russin in a fur coat, but actually a black bear — the alarm was

cancelled. However, the alarm in turn notified Volk Field, where interceptor aircraft were scrambled, and within minutes of moving to the runway. The F-106 aircraft were armed with nuclear-tipped missiles capable of wiping out an entire squadron of Soviet bombers. As a precaution, the duty officer at Volk Field called Duluth to verify the alarm and found out the real story. Planes at Volk Field were already taxiing down the field. A jeep had to be sent out with lights flashing to prevent the aircraft from taking off. And that's the story of the bear that almost triggered World War 3.

Beautiful Bird's-eye Primrose

from anemones to bell heathers to avens, taking photos of delightful tundra wildflowers I'd never seen before. The late-June sky was overcast, as it was during much of that trip to Alaska in the summer of 2018, but the blossoms were plenty radiant on their own. That wildflower-lined walk up Flattop Mountain – an extremely popular hiking trail right in Anchorage – is one of my favorite memories of the

When I uploaded photos of one particularly flashy hot pink flower with a sunny yellow center, I discovered that Bird's-eye Primrose (Primula mistassinica) is a Species of Special Concern in Wisconsin, and also occurs along the shores of Lake Superior in Minnesota. Since one of my favorite things is finding old friends in a new place – or new friends in a familiar place - I added "see Bird's-eye Primrose near home" to my mental bucket list.

Well, life's been busy since I returned from Alaska, especially during the May-June window when Bird's-eye Primrose blooms in the Upper Midwest. At the Museum, we

dive straight from exhibit construction headlong into school field trip season, and then get the summer started by hosting a Wisconsin Master Naturalist Training. Plus, as far as I can tell, you need a boat to see this flower in northern Wisconsin, since they cling to sandstone cliffs on the Bayfield Peninsula and in the Apostle Islands.

But last week, with evening sunshine glinting off the riffled waters of Lake Superior's North Shore, and a surprisingly warm breeze wafting over the spit of wave-washed bedrock, a flower once again caught my eye. Rock-hopping over, I discovered the pink petals and yellow centers I'd been looking for. Notches in each of the five petals gave them a lovely heart shape. At the base of the flower's wiry stem was a little rosette of bright green leaves with wavy edges.

This flower was one of dozens all sprouting from the cushion of moss in a little bedrock nook. Besides the Bird'seye Primrose, quite a diversity of plants crowded together in this island of habitat surrounded by a sea of bedrock.

Looking up and across the shore, I was delighted to discover a haze of pink covering a much larger area than I'd first realized. A gravely rock bar hidden behind a breakwater hosted many clusters of primrose tucked up against protective bushes and finding footholds in water-loving moss.

These two habitats are representative of where you'll Bird's-eye Primrose find across their range. In Vermont; Door County, Wisconsin; and Banning State Park in Minnesota, they grow on cool, damp bedrock ledges, especially those with lots of calcium. In Maine, they are common on the gravel bars of the St. John River where taller plants are scoured away by a flood of ice each spring. These locations are all at the southern edge of the flower's range. In their main range of Canada and Alaska, they can grow in a wider variety of habitats. For example, the tundra of Alaska is often a mix of moss, gravel, and rock.

While not common down here, Bird's-eye Primrose is the most widespread of their genus, and wherever they grow, they look a little different. The petals of my Alaska friends were intensely fuchsia and so deeply notched that they looked like 10 separate petals at first glance. In Minnesota, the petals were pale pink with a modest notch. These characters, plus their size, the shape of their leaves, the amount of a powdery coating on their leaves and stems, and the brightness of their yellow eye can all vary from place to place. Botanists have sometimes separated the dif-

ferent looks into separate subspecies, but DNA studies have concluded that the variation is contained with a single species of Bird'seye Primrose.

As I nosed around taking photos in the mini-moss ecosystem on the North Shore, a different, yellow-green rosette of leaves caught my eye. These weren't just a different form of primrose. With edges that curl inward and a coating of sticky hairs, I recognized this as another species on my botanical bucket list. This rare plant doesn't bloom until later in June, so we'll all have to wait patiently to learn more about them.

Just a quick reminder here, if you're exploring sensitive habitats where there might be rare plants, watch where you step, and consider keeping your dog on a leash. Never pick these flowers. Not only are they legally protected, they

don't last long in a bouquet and are difficult to transplant. Instead, enjoy them gently in the wild.

COHO AT PORT WASHINGTON

I am currently in what could be termed as an overscheduled time in my life. Fortunately what is on my schedule is all good, such as hobby farming, pond building, volunteering, a litter of pups and in just a few days, my daughter Selina is coming home from Missoula, Montana for a wedding. The crazy

stuff will end or slow down after the 4th of July.

This week's column is about paddle trolling

out of my canoe on Lake Michigan at Port Washington for coho salmon. This spring the coho fishing has been incredible on Lake Michigan and I thought it would be fun to see if I could catch one out of my canoe and live to tell about it.

Friday, May 24th High 67, low 47

One of the main challenges in paddle trolling for salmon and actually catching a salmon is to be able to paddle your canoe fast enough to make your lures work to attract a salmon. Speaking of canoe fishing for salmon, how come I have never seen another person fishing for salmon

Anyways here is the scoop, I put my canoe in at a beach in Port Washington and after rigging three poles, one with a spoon and two with a flasher/fly set up I was headed out to sea. In reality you have to be in at least 30 feet of water before you start to set lines and it was interesting as I worked my way east and was passed by dozens of both charter boats and private boats that were headed out to at least 100

The wind was minimal, and I made a goal of paddling to 100 feet and that is what I did, which took me about 90 minutes. I did not have a strike, did not see anyone else catch a fish and kept fishing until an hour after dark.

Because I did not have a lodging plan, I slept in a Walmart parking lot in the GMC Hotel.

Saturday, May 25th High 89, low 50

I was moving at 4:30 this morning and as soon I got out of the truck after a pretty pathetic night's sleep, I decided that I needed some calories so I chugged a nutrition drink, which I do often as it is quick, reliable calories. Very bad luck came my way when I realized that my breakfast was curdled and that was a very unpleasant experience.

Today was going to be a big mile day as I was going to go as deep as I could and hopefully catch a coho. I headed southeast as that is the direction the wind was from, and I figured it would push me back to Port Washington. Nothing was happening for me and I paddled to where I could easily see the buildings in Milwaukee and at 184-feet of water I figured I had better start working my way back.

I had been in the canoe for 6 hours and generally, I am on my knees. Seven hours into my journey I was back to 50- feet of water and something hit a clown-colored crankbait that I was pulling. The coho jumped several times and I was one happy camper when it made it to the net. I figured I had better work this area a bit longer and within minutes had another coho hit a flasher/fly. I was about to net it and the manufactured knot came out and I watched my quarry swim away with the fly in it's mouth.

After 9 hours, I hit a very crowded beach and was one happy camper, my goal of catching a salmon out my canoe had been met and physically the experience did not kick my butt.

Set goals and do your best to achieve them!

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




Among her teammates, Joyce will be joined in La Crosse by a couple of fellow state returnees: junior Atlin Steinhoff and senior Eli Brown.



deal with. I've chased teams through all of it and

it's taken its toll. I'm burnt out.

For my job - not this one, but the GX3 Media affair I continue to play with - I can't afford to get burnt out. That sort of brain-fried-zombi-isms aren't going to help me produce content at a level that's reflective of my ability and there lies the problem surrounding so, so many of my problems - I'm spread pretty thin and maybe so much so that the creativity I need for idea plucking, has nearly evaporated.

What's the solution? Well, isn't that the million dollar question? Something has to give, though, or else the pressure I've

been under is going to get me to pop. There's a want, a desire, to get to several pet projects of mine. I think those types of design builds - things that are more for fun than just for commercial exploitation are crucial to my mental well being. If I'm not doing something creative, if Im' not making something, I'm suffering. Sure, most people would call that sort of

thing a hobby, and this job I do has many elements of a hobby, but I've twisted those constraints and remolded the idea of 'hobby' into 'job.' Can the two co-exist? I've always believed they could.

The biggest issue I have to contend with is maintaining the level of quality of work while trying to juggle all the parts I'm juggling. Have I been able to maintain what I consider a high standard when it comes to photography and design? I think that answer is 'yes,' but I know there have been many, many compromises along the way and cutting corners just to get the job done in a quick fashion isn't really in my vocabulary - especially when my name appears along side it

I think that's the real crux of my dilemma - and I thank anyone that's read through this long-winded, whiney mini-manifesto I've concocted here and coming to terms with the facts that I maybe have compromised too much is something very real, but maybe something only I can determine.

Let's fact it, no one's going to come out and tell me that I'm doing a bad job at anything even though I with they would if they feel that way. I mean, I had a client call me out on a project earlier this spring that gave me a bit of a jolt, even if the way they

went about it was one of the rudest ways possible. That situation made me think about what I was doing, though, which led me to look inward and ask if I really gave the right effort for their projects. On the one hand, I did. I worked within my time constraints, which limited what I could do on the design side. The client wasn't happy, though, but they failed to express that until items were about to be delivered.

I solved the problem by going back to the drawing board on certain parts and re-doing things. I was happier with the second attempt, but truly wished they'd have said something earlier. We could have found a solution then.

If you go to a restauant, order food only to get the wrong items delivered and you don't say anything, then you deserve to have the wrong things. People don't know there's a problem unless you tell them there's an issue.

Each of those types of situations has added dents in me this spring, though. That's why I know I'm burnt out at this point, which is why I'm saying there's

definitaly a problem. The finish line is close, I know, but limping across may be worse than not finishing this marathon at all.


