New bereavement support group remembers children who died

Bereaved families who have experienced the death of a child now have an opportunity to meet with others on a regular basis who have endured similar tragedies.

The Compassionate Friends (TCF) of The Copper Corridor, AZ, a national self-help organization for families who have had a child die, held its first monthly meeting Monday, Nov. 27, 2023. Meetings will be held each month, on the fourth Monday, at the Globe-Miami Chamber of Commerce at 6 p.m.

"This area has long needed a bereavement organization where families could talk freely about their loss without judgment or shame," said new chapter leader Yvonne McCall. "After your child dies, no one

about your child, probably because they are afraid of making you feel bad and unless you have been through this type of loss, you truly cannot understand the importance of talking about your child. The irony is that talking about your child helps you - no one wants their child forgotten. And studies have proven that tears are an emotional release that help you to feel better."

The Compassionate Friends is a national nonprofit organization with more than 600 chapters in the United States and locations in every state. Chapters welcome immediate family members to attend including adult siblings. Meetings are for all families regardless of race, religious orien-

approximately two hours, and participants can talk freely about what happened to their child or anything related to their grief. Refreshments are also served.

The chapter has started a lending library and is seeking grief books to share with members, and will have a selection of handout brochures on many topics related to the death of a child. There are no fees or dues charged to attend, although love gifts are accepted in memory of the children of the chapter and will be used to publish a chapter newsletter, further outreach in the community and cover other expenses.

"The Compassionate Friends welcomes the Copper Corridor, AZ chapter," said TCF Executive Director Debbie Rambis. "When a child dies, at any age, the family suffers intense pain and may feel hopeless and isolated. The Compassionate Friends provides highly personal comfort, hope and support to every family experiencing the death of a son or a daughter, a brother or

a sister, or a grandchild, and helps others better assist the grieving family.

A special thank you to the Sara K Foundation for bringing TCF to the Copper Corridor and for the start-up funding and partnership it provided.

The joyous holiday season is enhanced by the beautiful and festive decorations that adorn homes and businesses during this special time of year. Twinkling lights are part of the holiday decorating equation. However, tangled lights in storage bins and boxes can sap anyone's holiday spirit.

Christmas lights can turn into a tangled mess no matter how hard people work to avoid such an outcome. Christmas lights get tangled partly because of their design. There is a metal wire inside the cord to help with the packaging of the lights, which gives the cord a natural curve. Furthermore, most light cords are made from twisted or braided wires that have spaces throughout. The lights themselves can get snagged in these pockets between the wires.

Although it can be frustrating to deal with tangled lights that look like balls of yarn in a knitting basket, there are ways to disentangle them with relative ease — and then pack them in a way that can reduce further tangles.

Begin by plugging all lights into the outlet to see if they work. If most of the bulbs are burnt out or the lights do not go on at all, discard the strand. There's no point untangling lights only to learn they don't work.

Start slowly, beginning on the plug end, when untangling the lights. Keep the strand you're working on separate from the other lights so they do not inadvertently become entangled. Tackle this job in a space with a lot of room. Lay the lights out on a large table or sit on the floor to do the untangling.

Utilize a pen or pencil to fish out more stubborn snags. This can help you loosen any knots and make it easier to pull snags through.

strands out in a safe area away from your working space as you work through each strand.

One of the ways to avoid the hassle of tangled lights is to remember to store the lights in ways that will reduce their propensity for tangling in the first place.

• Rather than wrap lights around your hand or arm to condense the strand, use something else. A piece of cardboard, a hanger and some PVC tubing can keep lights from becoming tangled.

• Store lights in a ziptop bag to keep them from tangling with other strands stored together.





• Save the original boxes and return the lights to them after each use.

• Icicle lights have hanging strands of lights on longer strands, which can compound tangling issues. Use a rubber band to gather the hanging "icicles" to-

gether, or use some plastic wrap for the same purpose.

• Invest in a cord reel. similar to what you might use for a garden hose. Longer light strands or wires are stored on such reels, and they can be used with Christmas lights.



All fear is gone

When I was about 6 years old, I had two fears. One was a monster that lived in our basement. It was not imaginary, but very real, and I could take you to see it at any time. It lived in the basement of our house, had a large, round body and four arms reaching out in different directions. At times it would rumble and roar, so I thought I couldn't get back up the stairs fast enough.

In reality, it was a gas-fired furnace. The four arms were heating ducts that were wrapped in asbestos, feeding floor vents in each of the rooms. When the furnace would fire, it was the scary noise. I should have thanked it for keeping us warm in a Wyoming winter. If I had allowed my dad to explain the device to me, all fear could have been erased.

Throughout life, there are real and imaginary fears, and at one time they may seem harrowing. As a Father, God knows this and has written about it in Psalm 56:3: "When I am afraid, I put my trust in you."

What we can do is put that trust in God and allow it to work in our stead. We may be assailed by fears of an upcoming exam. Talk to God, let him know your fear and allow Him to step in on your behalf, and learn from it. That way we don't have to reconfigure the problem every winter.

The Lamb is fighting for you

Toward the end of the book of Revelation, the conflict intensifies between those who have aligned themselves with Jesus and those who oppose Him. Waves of God's judgment unfold on earth and further harden His opponents' hearts. But the overall message of Revelation isn't doom and gloom; it's hope. The book is meant to bring comfort to God's people as they face tribulation.

Revelation 17:14 contains a message of encouragement that relates to both the first and second coming of Christ. The prophet Isaiah said the Messiah would be known as "Immanuel," meaning "God with us" (Isaiah 7:14; Matthew 1:22-23). Jesus, the Lamb of God, gave His life for us, overcoming death. And He promised to be with us always. So, when we find ourselves in the midst of fiery trials and spiritual battles, we can rest in the assurance of today's passage: "The Lamb will overcome them because He

is the Lord of lords and King of kings; and those who are with Him are the called and chosen and faithful."

Jesus will be with us to the end of time (Matthew 28:20). And Revelation reminds us that He will not only be near but will overcome His foes (and ours) because He is Ruler of all. He will have the final word. Our Savior wants us to know who He says we are: the called, chosen, and faithful. And since He is "Immanuel," we can forever be with Him.
