Newly formed group assists with upkeep of local cemeteries

Have you been by the Pinal Cemetery in Central Heights lately? A wall is going up around the perimeter, and drainage issues are being fixed. This is the work of a partnership between the newly formed Gila County Memorial Foundation (GCMF), Gila County Public Works and Tonto National Forest.

Formerly the Globe-Miami Memorial Foundation, this group has restructured to include more areas and people. This new group's mission remains the same: to catalog the biographical records of local citizens and assist with the upkeep and platting of area cemeteries by providing work opportunities utilizing people of our communities. The foundation is a nonprofit, community-based organization existing solely to benefit the people of our communities. It is governed by a board of directors elected by the individuals who contribute to the foundation.

Currently, membership is represented by Gila County, City of Globe, Lamont Mortuary, Gila County Historical Society, Bullion Plaza Cultural Center & Museum, Globe Elks Club, Gila County 4-H, individuals and volunteers.

Donations to the GCMF, a 501(c)(3), enable the committee to do repairs and other projects, such as the new fence at Pinal Cemetery along Main Street. Significant funds will be needed to complete this one project and to fund future projects, both at Pinal

and other cemeteries in the county. You can mail donations to: Gila County Memorial Foundation, P.O. Box 489, Claypool, AZ 85532.

The GCMF is open to the public and meets every third Tuesday of the month at 3:30 p.m. in the Gila County Supervisors' Hearing Room at the Gila County Courthouse, 1400 E. Ash St., Globe. 

Expired or unused pills, patches, powders? Drug 'take-back' at Fry's

You shouldn't dispose of unused or expired medications by flushing them down the toilet – chemicals from prescription medicines can damage your town's water treatment system or your own septic system.

Instead, bring your expired and unused pills, powders, patches and ointments to a prescription medication takeback event Saturday, Oct. 28, at Fry's from 10 a.m. until 2 p.m. Medications, pills, powders, patches and ointments are accepted, but do not bring needles, inhalers or liquids.

Drug overdose deaths in the United States continue to rise at an alarming rate, with a new nationwide record in 2022, when 109,680 people died as the fentanyl crisis continued to deepen, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Most people who misuse prescription drugs get them from family, friends, and acquaintances – and the risk of overdose doubles for young people who have family using opioids.

Keep track of the medicine you have, and rethink where and how you store your medications in your home. Safely dispose of unused medications at events such as this one Oct. 28. Don't share; keep track of your legally prescribed controlled substances – that is, count your pills so you always know how much you should have and so you know when to take action if any go missing. Read more about prescription medication abuse at getsmartaboutdrugs.gov; this thorough website has videos and comprehensive pages that describe and illustrate both drugs and medications ranging from amphetamines and barbiturates to heroin, MDMA (AKA ecstasy or molly), fentanyl, inhalants, kratom, khat, methadone, oxycodone – even pevote and mescaline.

UA launches Globe-Miami youth science initiative

University of Arizona's Department of Environmental Science won grant funding to launch a new environmental science summer camp for 7th-12th graders in Globe-Miami, and is hiring three local part-time workers to make it happen. The new hires will collaborate with the Community Advisory Board that convened this spring, and to make the science summer camp a success, job tasks of the new hires include creating a Youth Advisory Board. Work is part-time (10 hours per week) with an hourly pay range from \$16.76-\$21.90, depending on experience. These positions will be located in Globe-Miami, Hayden-Winkelman, Superior and San Manuel.

Job duties include recruiting adults and youth for the community and youth advisory boards and environmental certification programs. Recruitment activities include pre-

senting to local schools, youth organizations and government; attending community fairs and other public events to inform the community; and working with local leaders to increase access to information and project promotion.

Other duties include informing and actively participating in the design of environmental science and art summer certification programs; developing and nurturing relationships with local schools, vouth organizations and government: and attending and participating in project planning meetings. He had an influence on the ski schools and ski racing programs at ski areas in North Idaho in the 1970s and 1980s. He then returned to the slopes of Utah for several years. Keith took his final runs at Lookout Pass, Idaho, at the age of 88. It was always a joy to spend time on the mountain with him ... skiing the powder, groomed or, his personal favorite, the "crud."

Keith was a person who was 100% invested in any relationship he formed. He is remembered for a life well lived by all who knew him. He is preceded in death by his mother. Velma Chapman Droste, and his father, Joseph Droste. Keith is especially cherished by his wife, Winona "Dale" Barcón; his three daughters, Darcy (Gwain) Oka, Paula (Dave) Halstead and Dana (Ed) Mulick; and his stepsons Vincent Barcón and Eric (Tammy) Barcón. He was loved and admired by his 13 grandchildren and his great-grandchildren, nieces and nephews.

He loved telling jokes with his infectious laughter




and smile.




