# 4-H launches new Gila Monster League

Dog training and agility, woodworking, archery, marksmanship, farm-totable cuisine, agriculture - just when you thought our local 4-H already has something for all interests comes the announcement of a new Gila Monster League. You're not required to possess an actual Gila monster - in fact, you can't: Arizona's famous native venomous lizard is protected by state law and it's illegal to own a Gila monster or even touch one in the wild.

However, this new 4-H club is for members interested in reptiles or amphibians, especially if you already own one - but owning a turtle, snake, frog or other slithery critter is not a requirement. The first club meeting will be Oct. 10; participants will learn about these fascinating and often-misunderstood animals and how to care for them, while also learning about Arizona's native reptiles and amphibians.

Did you know Arizona has 52 species of snakes, 49 species of lizards and six species of turtles? And that National Reptile Awareness Day returns Oct. 21, when you can knowingly tell friends that Arizona boasts 13 species of rattlesnakes - which is one-third of the world's total number of rattlesnake species?

Learn more by joining the new 4-H Gila Monster League; meetings will be Tuesday evenings at 5:30 p.m. in Miami, and members plan to attend the upcoming reptile expo scheduled for November. 



Cliff and Rosa Lee knew



# **Really? Every Night!**

The young boy was being as good as he knew how to be but was still learning. He was caught a little off guard when his pastor asked if he said his prayers every night. Wanting to be correct, he admitted, "Some nights, I don't say them." Not content to let the matter go away, the pastor asked why he didn't ask on those nights. His answer was simple enough: "I don't need something every night."

Most of us learn to recite our prayers beside our bed, on our knees and when very sleepy. The bedtime litany grows until it gets unwieldly. It is probably easy to slip up. But this is a chance to teach the rest of the story.

"Thank you, God" should be at the top of a list for my days, for God has been with me on each one. "God, when that car almost hit me on Brown Street; and when that kid chased after the ball and didn't see me; and then there was that stranger who pumped up my tire so I could ride safely home."

How about setting aside a specific time – Monday evening at 7:00 – and make an appointment to discuss meaningful issues with each child and with God. Make it important to each one of them and start your list for next week. Don't let it slip by. Like anything, it will improve with practice – the greatest investment you can make.

# Trials and joy

Suffering becomes easier to bear when we consider the good gifts God provides through it

Today's passage [James 1:2-4, 12] says, "Consider it all joy, my brothers and sisters, when you encounter various trials" (v. 2). What a preposterous statement! Do you know anyone who thinks joy and trials fit together? But James is presenting God's perspective—not a human one. Suffering has some surprising benefits that aren't readily apparent to most people.

It's important to realize these verses are not telling us to be happy in our pain but rather to rejoice in the blessings that accompany suffering. The word consider means "to regard." When we look at hardships from God's perspective, we can rejoice in the beneficial outcome, even while experiencing pain.

For many, understanding the purpose of trials makes

rejoicing easier. The Lord wants adversity to test our faith and produce endurance and spiritual maturity. In every hardship, He has hidden a beautiful and precious reward, but whether we receive it depends upon our response. Those who really want to be transformed into the image of Christ can rejoice in the good that will

result from hard circumstances.

Does your hunger to know the Lord and be transformed by Him exceed your dread of distress? None of us want to experience pain, but since it's an unavoidable reality in this fallen world, why not respond in a way that produces eternal benefit? Let's not waste our suffering.





This award-winning 2023 documentary film positions the literacy crisis in America as a civil rights issue.

books are under attack. They're being removed from libraries and schools. Shelves have been emptied because of a small number of people and their misguided efforts toward censorship. The American Library Association's (ALA) Office for Intellectual Freedom documented an unparalleled increase in attempts to remove books and other materials from libraries and schools in 2022: 1,269 demands to censor library books and resources, the highest number of attempted book bans since ALA began compiling censorship data more than 20 years ago. These demands targeted 2,571 unique titles, a 38% increase over the previous year.

Since it was founded in 1982, Banned Books Week has drawn attention to the attempts to remove books and other materials from libraries, schools and bookstores. The 2023 Banned Books Week theme "Let Freedom Read" is a call to action about the urgent need to defend the right to read and to support the community of readers, library staff, educators, authors, publish-


