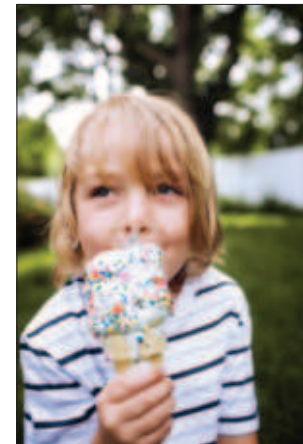

The Third Tuesday, September 19, is Kids STEM. Come for a science adventure each month. We will be exploring a fun new science idea.

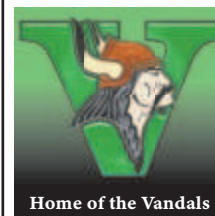
The Fourth Tuesday, September 26, is Kids Cooking. These cooking activities vary from fun and simple to the science of cooking and baking.

Why save seeds?

You probably think of seed saving as something your mother or grandmother did. My mother scraped the seeds out of a pumpkin or winter squash, pulled out most of the slimy fiber, and dried the seeds on newspapers. Paper envelopes filled with seeds were stored in the basement until spring. Although paper towels have replaced newspapers and goo on pumpkin seeds is removed by rinsing or fermentation, saving seeds is still a messy process. Saving flower seeds generates less goo but is labor intensive.

So why would anyone save seeds? Seeds are cheap. Even

most uncommon varieties, such as the Orange Accordion Tomato and the Goronong Hot Pepper, cost less than \$5 for a packet. But seeds from prize-winning pumpkins can run \$199 per seed. If you want to grow prize-winning watermelons, squash, tomatoes, or pumpkins, seed saving can rescue your budget.

Another reason for saving seeds is to guarantee availability. For those who want to plant a winter garden, seeds are getting scarce in town. Walmart already disposed of their seed stock, and most of the other stores won't be far behind. There is the local nursery, but what if it runs out of the seeds you want? Spring brings a similar compli-

cation. There is no guarantee that the varieties you planted this year will be available next year.

Creating plants better adapted to the local area and your wants can result from saving seeds. If produce from one of your squashes, tomatoes, or other vegetables tastes better, produces more, or flourishes better in local soil, saving seeds from that plant and its descendants can improve the quality over time. Breeding plants for special qualities can even be profitable. Alice Vonk took over 20 years to breed a white marigold by saving seeds from her lightest flowers. In 1975, her persistence won her fame and a \$10,000

prize from the Burpee Seed Company for producing a white marigold.

Saving seeds allows you to share varieties you like with friends and neighbors. This year I experimented with Desi Summer Squash. The plants were hardy and productive, and the round, yellow fruits were a hit cooked or raw in salads. I'm keeping seeds for myself, but some will also end up in the seed bank at the Cobre Valley Center for the Arts.

The annual Globe-Miami display owes some of its glory to those who gathered seeds year after year, spreading them further through our area. In the fall you can see native wild asters and tansy asters sporting white, purple or yellow flowers. Individual plants may look leggy and uninteresting, but large clumps transform a hillside into a blaze of color. And the flowering can last from August into November or longer.

How does one learn about how to save seeds? You can go to the local Farmers Market and ask some of the vendors or you can call Chris Jones at the Gila County branch of the University of Arizona Cooperative Extension Service, (928) 402-8586. And there are many information sources on the Internet including the Old Farmers Almanac, NativeSeeds.org, and YouTube videos.

parents and his aunt. Jack had a gregarious personality that will be missed by

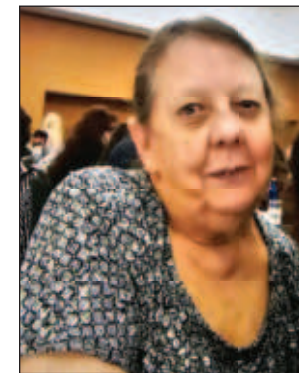
many.

Jesus planted His love in our hearts and wants us to share it with others.

Preparing a garden—cultivating the soil, watering regularly, managing the weeds—takes time and effort. But a gardener spends the least amount of time doing what is perhaps the most important task: choosing and planting the right seeds. Today's passage applies that experience to cultivating Christian love.

In the upper room, Jesus gave His disciples a "new commandment, that you love one another." His people, He

said, would be known by their love (John 13:34-35). This deep kind of love doesn't grow naturally from the human heart. If we are to see love grow in our life, we need better seed.

As Peter says in today's passage, fervent love for one another comes about when we are born again from the only "imperishable" seed—"the living and enduring word of God" (v. 23). It's easy to read "word" here as "the Scriptures,"

but as John's gospel tells us, Jesus Himself is the Word (John 1:1-4). He is God's Word of mercy and new creation, the source of our new birth.

But God has also given us His written Word to remind us of His work in the world and in us. Remind yourself today and every day of God's work in you, cultivating the fruit of love through a fresh meeting with Jesus and through reading the Bible.

Are you on the right road?

My first car was a 1936 Chevrolet (not in that year). I bought it with my earnings from an after-school job. It was two weeks before I could drive it home as I had to wait for my birthday and my driver's license. It was a "neat" car and I took good care of it. Since then I have owned several cars and pickup trucks, given them names and felt they were an extension of me.

It came to me that while the vehicle is steel, glass, rubber, and wiring, the "personality" a vehicle displays is not representative of the car, but the driver. It can behave only as does the owner, politely granting the right of way to another; stopping suddenly to avoid a collision; choosing the right road to follow; and entertaining with music.

As with the car, so, we, the owner reflect our choices. We may select our route, when to refuel, maintenance schedule, speed and manner of behavior. When a car runs a red light, it is the driver that is the offender and the one who must accept the blame.

My friend, Angelo Paul Ramunni, wrote "Left Turn, Right Turn, U Turn." He says, "If we are not headed in the right direction, what is our best course of action?" He suggests that we can take a left turn, right turn, or continue as we are. "Thankfully, a fourth option exists. We could make a U-turn." Just as we make choices for the car, so we make them for ourselves. Accept the responsibility and the credit.

Fed with spiritual food

Do you have a well-balanced diet of God's Word?

Most children go through a picky eating phase. Parents resist this, knowing that children need variety in their diet. A bag of candy may have the same calorie count as a baked potato, but the candy doesn't provide the same nutrition.

The same is true for the Bible, which Jeremiah describes as spiritual food. Just as we need physical food to stay alive, we need spiritual food to sustain us. And just as we need a variety of foods, we need to read and listen to the whole counsel of Scripture.

Jeremiah prophesied to a rebellious Israel, and he found strength and sustenance in God's words. But the fact that verse 16 says they "became" a joy suggests they might not have been sweet at

first. The prophet may have needed to train his spiritual taste, and so do we.

Some Bible verses, after all, sound sweet. Psalm 23 begins with "The Lord is my shepherd, I will not be in need" (Psalm 23:1). But others, like "Happy is the person whom God disciplines" (Job 5:17), might be a little less appealing. And what about "If anyone wants to come after Me, he must deny himself, take up his cross daily, and follow Me" (Luke 9:23)?

Do you eat only the sweet, simple parts of the Bible? Or do you seek spiritual nourishment in the complexity of the whole Word, so that you become strong in the faith?

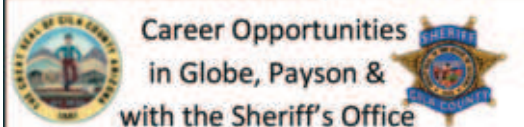

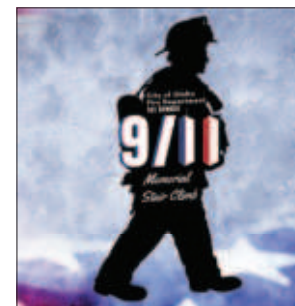

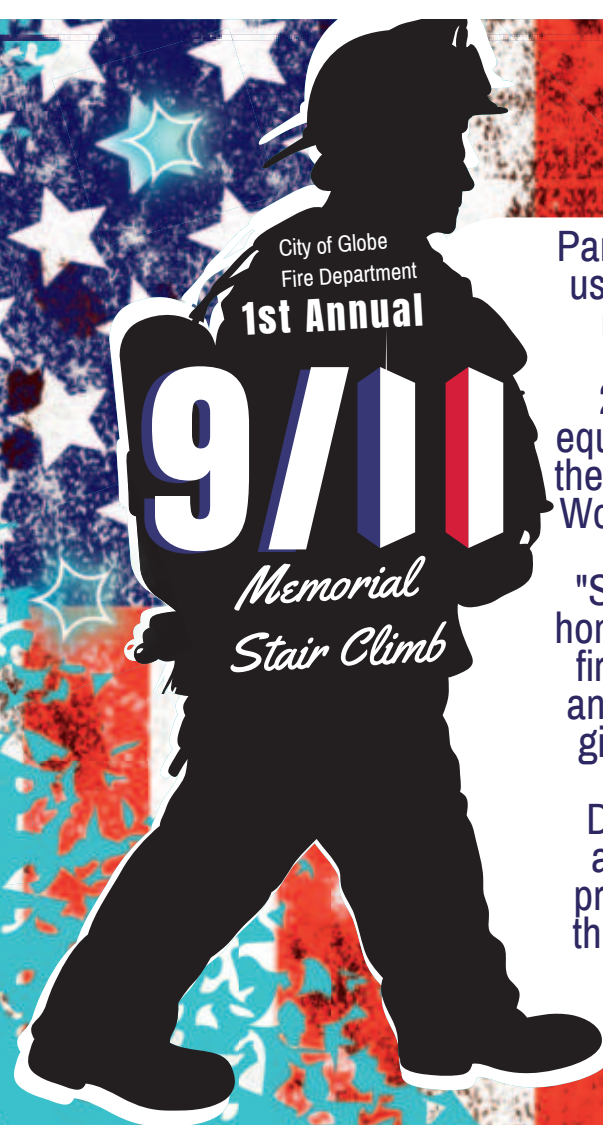
