

These volunteers are not foster families; they do not have a role in the removal of the children, but instead they make obejective recommendations for the child. They are appointed by a judge after a family's case has opened and it has been determined that the child would benefit from a consistent adult who can focus their attention on the child's needs. But more volunteers

are needed in Gila County.

that our children in foster There are over 90 children

from Gila County communities who do not currently have a CASA appointed to their case. Applicants do not need to live within Gila County to serve. We encourage those who may be interested in volunteering to contact our office today.

CASA volunteers do not need any prior special training and come from all walks of life. Anyone 21 years of age or older, who can pass a thorough background check and complete 30 hours of training, is encouraged to apply. Another way to get involved is a program with similar requirements called the Foster Care Review Board (FCRB). A judge appoints volunteers to a five-member panel that meets online one weekday per month to review the cases of children in foster care.



Phone and Internet Discounts Available to CenturyLink Customers

The Arizona Corporation Commission designated CenturyLink as an Eligible Telecommunications Carrier within its service area for universal service purposes. CenturyLink's basic local service rates for residential voice lines are \$18.47 per month and business services are \$35.00 per month. Specific rates will be provided upon request.

CenturyLink participates in the Lifeline program, which makes residential telephone or qualifying broadband service more affordable to eligible lowincome individuals and families. Eligible customers may qualify for Lifeline discounts of \$5.25/month for voice or bundled voice service or \$9.25/month for qualifying broadband or broadband bundles. Residents who live on federally recognized Tribal Lands may qualify for additional Tribal benefits if they participate in certain additional federal eligibility programs. The Lifeline discount is available for only one telephone or qualifying broadband service per household, which can be either a wireline or wireless service. Broadband speeds must be at least 25 Mbps download and 3 Mbps upload to qualify.

CenturyLink also participates in the Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP), which provides eligible households with a discount on broadband service. The ACP provides a discount of up to \$30 per month toward broadband service for eligible households and up to \$75 per month for households on qualifying Tribal lands.

For both programs, a household is defined as any individual or group of individuals who live together at the same address and share income and expenses. Services are not transferable, and only eligible consumers may enroll in these programs. Consumers who willfully make false statements to obtain these discounts can be punished by fine or imprisonment and can be barred from these programs.



• Grow in the knowledge of God (v. 10)—The apostle's request is not merely for believers to gain facts regarding Christ. He speaks of a deeper understanding in the heart.

power (v. 11)—Having endurance and focus in the midst of life's trials requires God's strength. Our own simply isn't enough.

• Walk in gratitude (v. 12)—When we realize where all good gifts originate, we live with thankfulness. Contentment and joy come from a grateful heart, not our circumstances.

Life is busy, so prayer often gets squeezed out of our schedules. We must always remember that lifting our loved ones before God's throne is far more important than any other task.






