Gameros partnered with the Allegiance team, which chopped and bagged the drying plants, and helped distribute them along a bare hillside on the entrance road to Round Mountain. The hope is that there will be a crop of bright, new spring flowers in March and April of 2024 – that is, if the fall and winter rains cooperate.

Allegiance Builders has earned repeated praise for its crews' work beautifying the Highway 60 corridor over the past year, a project known as the GilaPROUD that is funded by the Gila County and contributing partners. Here's a round of applause (and a bouquet of poppies) to the contractor and Mayor Gameros for creatively recycling this green waste. Cares, Brighter Tomorrows, AHCCCS, Gila County Opioid Rx prevention, Cricket, a representative from Excess and enTouch Wireless Services, Southwest Fair Housing Council and the Gideons.

Are you at risk of becoming homeless because of possible landlord-tenant issues? Needing to get a job? Do you need eye glasses and can't afford it? Is your homelessness due to drugs or alcohol, and do you want help? Do you need to get into a shelter? Do you need a Bible? If you don't have a phone and you are in a government program like AHCCCS or SNAP (food stamps), bring your cards or proof you are in one of these programs and your driver's license or ID. They will have the phones at the event to give out on the spot, if you qualify.

If you answered yes to any of these questions, then this is the event to be at. We will ask you to complete a short survey with someone so that data can be collected. We need to show that our community is in need of more resources and services in our area. You will then visit whichever resource might help you. A meal will be served. There will be a shower and wash basins to wash up provided by Azteca Glass and RAM Specialists. There will be clothing available to look through. Music by Extol will be provided to relax for a little while.

If you need a ride to get to the event, Copper Mountain Transit will get you to the Dollar General in Globe and then a van will pick you up and take you the rest of the way. Just show them a flyer or let them know that you are going to be attending this event. Make sure to check the bus schedule so that you will arrive in time to get to the resources needed. 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Asbestos or lead in your building? Call Copper Corridor Blight Busters

Are you interested in remodeling or expanding a building in the Copper Corridor, buying or selling a property – but one that might have contamination from lead or asbestos? The Copper Corridor Blight Busters program may be able to help.

Gila County is administering a \$600,000 grant from the federal Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) for Phase I and Phase II environmental site assessments; asbestos, and also lead-based paint surveys and abatements. It also recently applied for \$1 million from the En-

vironmental Justice Government-To-Government Program grant. Removal of lead and asbestos from the Hayden Motel - followed by the complete demolition of the dilapidated building – was one high-profile accomplishment under a Brownfields program. The renovated site now sports parking for trucks and campers, plus shaded picnic tables. More recently, the Bullion Plaza Cultural Center & Museum in Miami was a recipient, with 2022 inspections for lead and asbestos, a survey report, and an operations and maintenance plan for the popular Miami tourism destination. The historic Superior High School received equal treatment, and Inspiration School in Miami is in the process of being assessed.

The EPA funds are primarily for abandoned properties - sometimes called "Brownfields" or blighted properties - and those with owners no longer maintaining the space or paying taxes. Abandoned properties can quickly attract vandalism and illegal dumping, resulting in a degraded environment and depressed communities, and potentially putting human health at risk. Revitalizing Brownfields involves transforming properties into something new - from neighborhood parks to commercial or retail spaces.

The goals of the program include attracting public and private investments, creating green space in the community, increased property values, beautifying neighborhoods, eliminating blight, and creating jobs and increasing tax revenue.

Copper Corridor communities include Globe, Miami, Superior, Kearny, Winkelman, Hayden and some unincorporated areas of Pinal County.

Apply online at https://www. ccblightbusters.com or email Grant Administrator Aimee Staten at astaten@gilacountyaz.gov, and you will be guided through a process of site and grant eligibility. If eligible, the property will go through an evaluation process with a member of the Copper Corridor Blight Busters team. Criteria include that the property be an underused commercial or industrial site, and one with redevelopment potential.







How to plant a container like the pros do

Have you ever gone to the grocery store for, say, milk, and left with a cartful of impulse buys? Well, I visited a couple of nurseries last week in search of one specific plant and left with nearly everything except that plant, which both retailers had sold out.

As usual, I was seduced by the colorful, pre-planted annual containers on display, and hemmed and hawed about whether I should buy them or make mv own.

I often do the latter, but sometimes can't resist the allure of all that beautifully arranged eye candy.

Those thoughtfully planted pots and baskets are often created by talented garden center workers, sometimes following recipes provided by the plants' wholesale nursery growers. They're a great option if you're looking for instant gratification, which, if I'm being honest, I often am.

However, creating your own mixed container is an easy, fun and often moneysaving project that will reward you with flowers and pride all season long.

I'd love to tell you that you're limited only by your own tastes and desires, but the truth is there are some killjoy considerations that need to be taken into account when selecting plants.

You'll need to consider the mature sizes and aes-

thetic coordination of the plants you combine in a planter, and ensure they all have the same watering and sunlight requirements.

Choose a pot or window box that will accommodate plants when they're fully grown, and make sure they have holes in the bottom for drainage. If not, poke or drill the holes.

Never use garden soil in containers. It's heavy and too dense for young, tender roots to grow through. It also may contain weed seeds, or harbor fungal spores, bacteria or viral diseases that can kill plants.

Instead, use a prepared potting mix that's formulated for the types of plants you're growing. Or make your own by combining:

 One-third peat moss, coco coir or rice hulls (if using peat, add ¼ cup of garden lime per 6 gallons to balance the pH of your final product)

 One-third compost • One-third vermiculite (replace with perlite if planting succulents, cacti or other plants that require quick-draining soil)

• A slow-release, balanced fertilizer (read the label for dosages)

For lush, abundant container arrangements, the traditional recipe includes a cute, rhyming threesome of plant types: thrillers, fillers and spillers.

Thrillers are tall upright plants intended to draw the eye upward. Plant your thriller first, placing it in the center of the container.

Surround the thriller with fillers, which are shorter plants that will spread to fill in the space between the thriller and spillers.

Spillers are vining plants that will cascade over the edge of the pot as they grow. Place them just inside the perimeter of the container.

If your potting mix doesn't contain nutrients, apply a fast-release fertilizer right after planting.

Plants growing in containers will need more attention than their inground counterparts. That's because plants growing in the garden can spread their roots far and

wide to reach distant nutrient and water resources. Potted plants are limited by the contents of the container, so they're entirely reliant on you.

Soil in containers dries out much more guickly than in the garden. Sometimes I water pots in the morning only to return to wilting, thirsty plants at night. Check them twice a day, especially during hot, dry spells.

Follow fertilizer directions for potted plants: typically they recommend more frequent fertilizing than for beds and borders.



And when we yield to the Holy Spirit's control, He promises to guide us in the right direction.

Outside sources can be helpful for education, but at the end of the day, we should revere God's Word and Spirit above all else. Build your foundation of truth by spending time with the Lord, and He will not lead you astray.
