Asbestos or lead in your building? Call Copper Corridor Blight Busters

Are you interested in remodeling or expanding a building in the Copper Corridor, buying or selling a property – but one that might have contamination from lead or asbestos? The Copper Corridor Blight Busters program may be able to help.

Gila County is administering a \$600,000 grant from the federal Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) for Phase I and Phase II environmental site assessments; asbestos, and also lead-based paint surveys and abatements. It also recently applied for \$1 million from the En-

vironmental Justice Government-To-Government Program grant. Removal of lead and asbestos from the Hayden Motel - followed by the complete demolition of the dilapidated building – was one high-profile accomplishment under a Brownfields program. The renovated site now sports parking for trucks and campers, plus shaded picnic tables. More recently, the Bullion Plaza Cultural Center & Museum in Miami was a recipient, with 2022 inspections for lead and asbestos, a survey report, and an operations and maintenance

plan for the popular Miami tourism destination. The historic Superior High School received equal treatment, and Inspiration School in Miami is in the process of being assessed.

The EPA funds are primarily for abandoned properties - sometimes called "Brownfields" or blighted properties - and those with owners no longer maintaining the space or paying taxes. Abandoned properties can quickly attract vandalism and illegal dumping, resulting in a degraded environment and depressed communities, and potentially putting human health at risk. Revitalizing Brownfields involves transforming properties into something new - from neighborhood parks to commercial or retail spaces.

The goals of the program include attracting public and private investments, creating green space in the community, increased property values, beautifying neighborhoods, eliminating blight, and creating jobs and increasing tax revenue.

Copper Corridor communities include Globe, Miami, Superior, Kearny, Winkelman, Hayden and some unincorporated areas of Pinal County.

Apply online at https://www. ccblightbusters.com or email Grant Administrator Aimee Staten at astaten@gilacountyaz.gov, and you will be guided through a process of site and grant eligibility. If eligible, the property will go through an evaluation process with a member of the Copper Corridor Blight Busters team. Criteria include that the property be an underused commercial or industrial site, and one with redevelopment potential.

Rabies, leukemia, microchipping? Mobile pet clinics June 25, July 9

Gila County Animal Care & Control reminds dog owners that an up-todate rabies vaccine is required for your dog to be licensed - and that annual Gila County dog license is required by law. A license is also essential to prove ownership if your stray dog ends up at the shelter. Are your pets microchipped? If they aren't, consider this; only 22 percent of lost dogs without a microchip get reunited with the anxious owners who love them, and that number drops to just two percent for stray cats. Low-cost vaccines, preventative care, microchipping and even nail trimming are all available June 25 and again July 9 when PetVet mobile clinics visit Payson and set up outside the Tractor Supply store at 2260 W. Highway 60 in Miami on Sunday afternoons from 4:30 - 6 p.m. Mark your calendar for these dates, too: July 23 and Aug. 6. Keep your dogs and cats protected and up to date on vaccines essential to guard against rabies, feline leukemia, bordatella and distemper. Did you know there's even a snakebite vaccine that can help dogs survive being bitten by a rattler? Pre-treatment with the snakebite vaccine also reduces your pet's pain and suffering - and dramatically reduces the overall cost of treatment if bitten, too. 

Most pool players never figure out that there is a big difference between practice and playing. I had a player come to me for instruction, and he said that he practices 2 to 4 hours a day but he never seems to improve his game or his skill level. Banging balls around for hours without any true focused practice goals, is the mistake that most players make when it comes to their practice session. One hour of focused practice will improve your game more than 4 hours of playing, or as I call it, banging balls around. Top level players are all very serious and focused when it comes to their practice time. Most players usually start with a few easy shots, a few cut shots, a few long shots, and a few banks. Then they are ready to play! That is not how quality practice works. An example of a quality practice routine, might be working on just the stroke for 10 to 15 minutes as 70% - 75% of all your missed shots are due to a poor stroke. You should practice long shots, mid range shots, thin cut shots, long banks, cross banks, or any shots you know you have trouble with when you are competing

I recommend that students shoot shots in sets of 10 shots. This way, they can give each shot a percentage. For example in 10 bank shots, if you made 4 and missed 6 your percentage for bank shots is 40%. By always noting your percentage, you will know if you're improving. Most importantly, if you can shoot a shot 80% of the time in practice, when competing, vou will have more confidence in that shot when you shoot it. I also encourage every player to note every miss they have when

competing. You need to shoot at least 10 of each one of those missed shots in your next practice session. Focusing on shots you miss when you're practicing, makes more sense than shooting easy shots you already know you can make consistently. When I was a tournament player, I would note every shot I missed. In my next practice session, I would shoot every shot until I either made the shot 10 times in a row or 30 total attempts. If I missed a real easy shot due to lack of focus, I would shoot that shot the next practice 30 times as a punishment. Sometimes I would have an easy 8 ball or 9 ball, and would stop to ask myself, "Do you want to focus on this shot, or do you want to shoot it 30 times tomorrow". This really helped me focus and not take easy shots for granted when competing. Be focused during practice, reflecting the way you normally play, as much as possible. I recommend that you include your pre-shot routine on all shots. If you want to take your game to the next level, the true practice to competing ratio should be at least 5 to 1. Willie Mosconi's was 40 to 1 and many top professionals on tour are at least 20 or 30 to 1. A 5 to 1 ratio will help you improve your game. Let me know if this helps you. Is there anything you're holding back from the Lord?

Genesis 18:1-33 tells us about unexpected visitors to Abraham's tent: Three men appeared out of nowhere, declaring that Sarah would give birth to a son. This announcement—which was surprising enough since it came from strangers—was even more unusual because of Sarah's advanced age. Before long, however, Abraham and Sarah rejoiced when God kept His promise and gave them Isaac.

They may have had questions or been afraid, but they chose to obey God anyway. Abraham was ready to give up what was most precious to him—and to do so without grumbling. But why would he be willing to obey when the stakes were so high? Because he truly knew God's goodness and believed the Lord would bless his obedience, no matter how painful.

You can know God just as intimately, and with just as much confidence in His love. Ask Him to show you the way.
