Eastern Arizona College celebrated its 134th Commencement Ceremony at the Miami High School Auditorium by awarding 45 degrees and 62 certificates of proficiency.

EAC alumnus Sara Murry, now a vocal performance major at Arizona State University, sang the national anthem and EAC graduate Kendra Corso offered the invocation. Dr. Phil McBride, EAC senior dean of the Gila County campuses, and Dr. Janice Lawhorn, interim president of the Gila County Provisional Community College District, welcomed the gathering.

that happen in our lives are not during the big moments, but rather during the small moments that seem insignificant," she said. "It's the little changes over time that change the way we think and act that mold us into the people we are today. Nothing worthwhile is easy; while it may

take hard work and persistence, dreams can be accomplished."

Mike O'Neal, superintendent of the Cobre Valley Institute of Technology (CVIT), delivered the commencement address. O'Neal, a lifelong Globe resident, has been serving students in public educa-

tion for 28 years as a coach, CTE teacher, CTE director, dean of students, executive program director and superintendent. He earned a Bachelor of Science, Master of Vocational Education and Master of Educational Leadership, all from Northern Arizona University.

O'Neal encouraged

graduates to "continue your search, no matter how long it takes, be lifelong learners, and surround yourselves with positive and passionate people. Regardless of your career path, treat people kindly with a smile on your face and you will have a positive impact on the lives of

those you serve."

The Changing Lives Award was a new item added to the commencement ceremony this year. This award allows EAC students to recognize outstanding EAC employees who have made a difference in their lives. Jennifer Carlson, who is dedicated to building the nursing assistant and certified medication technician programs, was recognized by Dr. McBride as this year's recipient. One nominator mentioned, "She takes an interest in all of her CVIT students and makes an effort to help them in any

way she can." Other nominators mentioned how she was available and encouraging during difficult times.

Following the awarding of certificates and degrees, Dr. McBride admonished graduates to keep striving to achieve their dreams. He concluded by stating, "Don't be afraid to dream big. As you dream the impossible dream, you will reach the unreachable star." He noted that two EAC Gila Pueblo administrative staff, Naomi Urquidez and Selma Williams, both received associate degrees.

Summer program hours will run from 7:30 a.m. until 5:30 p.m. For further information, contact Carmen Casillas at (602) 618-6479.





A man who abides by


the law - may or may not have sent me mace (illegal in NYC) to make sure I felt a little more protected and always sent a new package before expiration.



## Health and fitness activities at Globe Public Library

Globe Public Library wants to help keep you healthy. Here are the programs we have running during May and June.

Globe Public Library is collaborating with the AZ Health Zone through Gila County Health Department to have chair aerobics classes at Globe Public Library Tuesdays at noon.

AZ Health Zone is bringing another fun exercise class to Globe Public Library. Chair Yoga is every Wednesday night at 4 p.m. for the month of May. This class is fun for all ages.

Seed 2 Supper with AZ Health Zone will begin on June 16 at 11 a.m. This is a six week, two-hour program for adults that takes food from the garden to the table. There will be cooking every week.

Globe Public Library Literary Journeys is the new name for the Walk/Run Club. We have a hybrid type of program. You can choose how you participate. We will meet in person on Mondays, Thursdays and Fridays at 6 a.m. at the Globe Public Library, or you can participate independently and record online on the Globe Public Library Walk/Run Club Facebook group. All participants must complete a waiver available from the circulation desk at the Globe Public Library or available for download on the Globe Public Library Walk/Run Club Facebook group. The club is for all ages and abilities; an adult must accompany minors. Dogs who are friendly and get along with others are invited to participate. This time we are starting a literary journey that will run most if not all of this year. We are marching to Mordor. Who will join our fellowship as we take the one ring to the volcano in Mordor? Pick up your log and your ring from Globe Public Library. You can join us at any time. We welcome all at your current level of fitness. We have had one person finish the third leg of this journey.

Spice of the Month is on Thursday, June 15, at 5 p.m. We will be featuring za'atar. Each month we will be introducing a spice. Each spice will have basic information (description, origin, varieties, flavor profile and nutritional facts) and one or more recipes. We will have at least one dish to sample made using that spice. Everyone who comes will then be able to pick up two tablespoons of the spice to use at home in their cooking. We do not want you to bring back the spices; they are yours to keep. Two tablespoons will be given at circulation. There is a limit of one unit of spice per month. This will give you the ability to try a spice to see if you like it before you purchase it for yourself. Please share your experience with these spices with us. We would love to hear how it went.

All these programs are free and brought to you through partner-ships with the Friends of the Globe Public Library, the United Fund of Globe-Miami and the AZ Health Zone through the Gila County Health Department.



## Start early when planning grad parties


#### Smartphone wallet case



## Make your Memorial Day barbecue a success

Summer unofficially starts with the arrival of Memorial Day at the end of May. Although it is a holiday designed to honor American military personnel who have died in various wars, it also serves double-duty as a chance to gather with friends and loved ones and enjoy the return of the warm-weather entertaining season.

Barbecues are the centerpieces of Memorial Day celebrations. It may have been awhile since the grill was fired up, so anyone can use a little refresher course in barbecue etiquette. Here are some tips for making the most of Memorial Day parties.

#### Ready the grill

If your grill has lain dormant for several months, it's wise to inspect and thoroughly clean it in advance of Memorial Day. Insects like spiders may have built homes inside, and grease and grime may be lingering from last year. Ensure the



grill is in top form before cooking for guests.

#### Keep food safety in mind

A study from the U.S. Department of Agriculture found more than half of study participants don't try to wash their hands when preparing food. Wash hands thoroughly to ensure guests do not get sick at the barbecue. Keep food refriger-

ated until it is ready to be cooked or served. Use a food thermometer to cook to the required internal temperature to make sure bacteria is destroyed. Do not use the same utensils that touched raw meat to remove cooked food from the grill.

#### Arrange for shade

It can get quite warm outdoors even in May for many areas of the country. Therefore, prepare a spot where guests can escape the sun. If you don't have enough table umbrellas, consider light netting or canopies for shade. Shift them as needed as the sun moves across the sky.

#### Develop a signature rub

Set your food apart with unique flavors. Create a summer food rub using the herbs and spices you prefer. Make a big batch to use throughout the grilling season.

#### Don't leave food sitting

The USDA's Food Safety Inspection Service advises that food should not be left out for more than two hours, or one hour if the temperature is above 90 F. Keep buffet-style food covered so that insects do not land on the items and run the risk of contamination. Promptly

move leftovers indoors if you plan on keeping them.

## Offer a variety of beverages

It's important to stay hydrated when the weather is warm. Stock the cooler with plenty of water, juices, iced teas, and the like. If you plan to serve alcoholic beverages, keep them separate from the non-alcoholic items so that children do not have access.



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
