

## **Community food and** hygiene drive in May

May brings a monthlong chance to donate nonperishable food and hygiene items for those in need. Donate during weekday business hours at Gila County Community Services, where a collection box is conveniently in the lobby at the Central Heights complex at 5515 S. Apache Ave.

And here's a five-hour drive-through donation opportunity: Saturday, May 20, from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m., volunteers will accept your

donations at the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints parking lot, 4247 Broadway in Claypool (please watch for signs and enter on Broadway, exiting on Second Street).

Suggested food items include canned soup/stew, canned fruits/veggies, canned beans, canned pasta, packaged tuna, readyto-heat rice, peanut butter, packaged foods (seeds,

nuts, oats, granola and cereal), bottled water and food that can be prepared in a microwave.

Other needed items include can openers, deodor-

ant, toilet paper, toothpaste, shampoo, lotion, lip balm, feminine hygiene items and socks. A similar food and hygiene drive was held in February, which organizers deemed "a great success."

"We are trying to make this a quarterly event," said Allison Torres, continuum of care coordinator with Gila County's Community Services Department. "The food helps multiple pantries in our community."

February's drive followed closely on the heels of the Point-in-Time Homeless (PIT) Count, conducted in January.

PIT Count goals include building awareness of community need, as well as providing individuals with information about existing resources, Torres said. She expects they should receive an initial report on this year's PIT Count from the State of Arizona by the end of the month.

"We are continuing to see an urgent need within our community for food resources and decided to make this an ongoing effort," prompting development of plans to hold a food and hygiene drive every three months, Torres explained.

The May food drive comes in time to prepare for the annual Jason Sanchez Homeless Connect Day event, scheduled from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. Friday, June 16, at the Maranatha Baptist Church, 1320 E. Saguaro Dr., Globe.

In collaboration with Gila **County Community Services** and the Gila County Homeless Task Force, the Homeless Coalition of Cobre Vallev will hold this one-stop resource event. "Among other resources, food will be available for those experiencing homelessness or atrisk of experiencing homelessness," Torres explained. In the meantime, food from the May food and hygiene drive "will help stock our local pantries and churches once again for those in need within our community."

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
## The Mystery of Lulu Verde, 1870-1900: Child Slave or Adopted Daughter?

Come hear Robert Estrada tell about an Apache girl, Lulu Verde, at the Second Friday event at Bullion Plaza Cultural Center & Museum in Miami, starting at 6 p.m. on Friday, May 12. Second Friday events are always free to the public, although donations are much appreciated.

Following an Indian massacre committed by the 3rd Cavalry, local lore claims the surviving Apache girl, Lulu Verde, was adopted by pioneers Wales and Sarah Arnold. Was she raised as a "child slave" or "beloved daughter"? Robert Estrada

shares Lulu's story of endurance and determination, along with that of other pioneer "adopted" daughters, in this presen-

Robert Estrada is an ethnobotanist and historical archaeologist with Verde Valley Archaeology Center and an interpreter at Montezuma's Well. In the past, he was an interpreter at the Natural Resources Division in Yosemite National Park. A resident of Rimrock, Az. since 2009, Robert spends his free time singing in his church choir, hiking, offroading and gardening

### **Adverse Childhood Experiences** Training at Globe Public Library

Globe Public Library is partnering with Arizona Youth Partnership to offer Adverse Childhood Experiences Training in person for anvone interested on Mav 20 at noon. An Adverse Childhood Experience (ACE) is trauma that happens before age 18. These include but are not limited to recurrent physical abuse; recurrent emotional abuse: contact sexual abuse; alcohol and/or drug abuse in the household: an incarcerated household member: a household member who was depressed, mentally ill, institutionalized or suicidal: a mother who was treated violently; one or no parent; and emotional or physical neglect. When adults were asked if they grew up with exposure to any of the above, the number of

exposures had a direct correlation to certain health, social and economic risks as an adult. This free training is available to anyone who wants to understand the impact of ACEs on the health and well-being of Arizona youth. The study of the impact of ACEs is not a treatment or program, but a movement to equip communities with the skills to better understand the benefit of prevention and understanding of Adverse Childhood Experiences. This training would be a great benefit to anyone who has regular contact with youth; teachers, coaches, pastors, scout leaders, camp counselors, activities directors, youth employers, members of law enforcement and medical professionals.




common type. O-negative blood can help any patient, including premature babies. Platelets most often help patients who are battling cancer.




