HDHS continues mission to find "furever" homes

Their mission is to prevent animal cruelty, provide relief of animal suffering, educate the community about humane animal care, promote spaying and neutering to limit pet populations, and find "furever" homes for homeless animals – and to further this mission, High Desert Humane Society (HDHS) operates a cat rescue and a dog shelter, as well as a donation center, a thrift store and a furniture store.

The dog shelter moved into a new facility on Hackney Avenue in 2022, relocating from Mesquite Street in downtown Globe. HDHS board president Cynthia Carr said the organization had "worked really hard to refurbish" the shelter's new home. "It looks amazing," she said. However, she added, the building needed some roof work. HDHS was also looking for help to address drainage issues on the property.

To expand their mission,

HDHS also plans to turn the thrift store's upstairs section into a higher-end boutique a couple of days a month - and to raise community awareness. Carr said she aims to represent HDHS at Globe's upcoming First Friday events.

As they strive to promote animal welfare, the organization is on the lookout for volunteers and funding help. "We are always looking for volunteers, not only at our stores but to help with fund-

raisers, membership drives and outreach – to engage the public with our mission and help us raise funds," said Carr. "We'd also really like to get some younger folks to help with social media and possibly become board members."

HDHS can also use donations of pet food, litter for the cat rescue, volunteers to walk the dogs and talk with them. They would also like to hold vaccine clinics once a month, and could use funding help and volunteers for those clinics. In addition, Carr said, "We're always looking for spay/ neuter support, to cover spay/neuter costs not just for pets but for community cats." She said a recent \$650 donation from the Arizona Silver Belt would help on that front. "We have about 10 cats a week that go down for spay/neuter, and it's kitten season, so these funds will go to support our Trap-Neuter-Release program for community cats."

Tri-City Fire receives 3/3X ISO rating

The Tri-City Fire District announced on April 24 that it had achieved a 3/3X rating from the Insurance Services Office (ISO), an organization that evaluates and rates fire departments' capabilities to respond to fires and emergencies. The ISO rates fire departments on a scale from 1 to 10. Lower ratings indicate a higher level of protection and a lower risk of property damage due to fire; thus, 1 is the top rating a department can receive.

The ISO rating is an important measure for insurance companies in determining the premiums for fire insurance policies. In a press release announcing their new rating, Tri-City Fire District said it reflects their "commitment to maintaining a high level of proficiency in fire suppression, emergency medical services and other critical services."

"Achieving a 3/3X ISO rating is a significant accomplishment that reflects the dedication and hard work of our firefighters and staff," said Fire Chief Nick Renon. "We take great pride in providing our community with the highest level of fire protection possible, and this rating is a testament to our

commitment to excellence."

The ISO evaluation included a thorough examination of the department's fire suppression capabilities, water supply, emergency communications and community risk reduction efforts.

Tri-City Fire District Board Chairman Mitch Malkovich congratulated the fire district on their achievement, stating, "The safety of our citizens is our top priority. and the Tri-City Fire District plays a critical role in ensuring that safety. I am proud to have such a highly skilled and capable department serving our community."


Community Players present Tony award-winning play

Miami High School 2023 Prom



Robert "Titi" Gradillas

With a heavy heart and gratitude for his life, the family of Robert "Titi" Carrizosa Gradillas announced his passing on April 11. 2023, at the age of 83. Titi, the middle child of Frank and Charlotte Gradillas, was born on Sept. 2, 1939, in Globe, Arizona. He grew up within the safe confines of his deeply loving family and the mulberry tree on his beloved Euclid Street.

Titi was fortunate to have many positive influences in his life, most significantly his parents. As a boy, Titi was a member of the Termite youth group founded by Benny and Gloria Guerrero. Titi attended Globe public schools. During his years at Globe High School, Titi excelled at sports. He earned four letters in baseball and three letters in track. He also received two letters in basketball and, as a junior, was invited to play on the All-Star High School Basketball Team. During Titi's basketball tenure. Globe won the South Conference Championship two years in a row. Titi also played on the Class A State Championship Basketball Team. Titi played varsity football during high school, earning four varsity letters.

In 1958, Titi graduated from Globe High School, earning a full scholarship



to Arizona State College as a standout in football. At Arizona State College in Flagstaff (now Northern Arizona University), Titi played both offensive back and defensive back from 1958 to 1961 under legendary coach Max Spilsbury. During Titi's freshman season in 1958, the 3rd-ranked Lumberjacks became the first Arizona college team to play in a nationally televised game, against 4th-ranked Northeastern Oklahoma State during the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics Championship "Holiday Bowl" in St. Petersburg, Florida. Despite the 19-13 loss, the team was inducted into the Northern Arizona University Athletics Hall of Fame in 1983.

In 1960, as a Lumberiack. Titi went to Mexico City to play a game at the largest football stadium at the time, Estadio Olimpico Universitario. Among Titi's college years highlights

was playing to a capacity crowd in the 75.000-seat stadium. In 2009, for his achievements in football. Titi was inducted into the Arizona Hispanic Sports Hall of Fame. He also served on the Board of Directors for the NAU Letterwinners Club.

In 1964, Titi married Karen Reed. Together, they raised four children at their home in Flagstaff. Arizona. Titi was a top regional salesman in the liquor industry for 20 years. He then worked for Gila County for ten years, assisting dislocated workers.


Titi is survived by his wife. Karen: his daughter Mia Oliver and son-in-law, Donnie: his son Chris Gradillas: his son James Gradillas and daughter-in-law, Michelle; and his son Sean Gradillas. Titi also leaves behind his brother Frank "Suki" Gradillas Jr., sisterin-law Phyllis and sister Olivia "Babio" Gradillas. Thomas Michael Yurkovich

Thomas Michael Yurkovich was born on Sept. 29, 1935, and passed away on April 9, 2023, in Globe, Arizona.

Thomas was raised in Eveleth, Minnesota; a son who was very proud of his immigrant parents' Slovenian and Croatian heritage. As a young man my father often helped supplement the family's mining income by hunting, fishing, and gathering wild blueberries and cranberries to be sold. Life near the Boundary Waters was beautiful. They were a hardworking and resourceful family, staking out their dreams in Minnesota's Iron Range. I am sure that these lessons of tenacity and hard work combined with a God-given talent forged my father into the incredible athlete he became.

As a young man growing up in Eveleth, hockey was king and my father was destined to be royalty. Hockey had many doors; indoors, outdoors, and then it opened the door to higher education. My father received a full-ride scholarship to the University of North Dakota and played goalie throughout college. After university, Thomas worked as a systems engineer for I.B.M. and went on to play semi-professional hockey for the Rochester Mustangs from 1957 to 1969. Thomas was chosen to play goalie for Team U.S.A. in the World Hockey Championships in both 1961 and 1966. In his hockey career, he was even fortunate enough to play in such venues as Madison Square Garden in New York. Thomas viewed the apex of



resenting the U.S.A. Olympic Team as their goalie in Innsbruck, Austria in 1964. His European tours made many great memories; one he recalled with great fondness came while playing in a tournament in Yugoslavia. He and a fellow team member, both of whom were introduced as descendants of the Slovenian native sons, were given even louder cheers from the crowd than the introduction given to President Tito. Like they say, "you can take the boy out of the country, but you can't take the country out of the boy." Thomas would later continue his love of hockey by transitioning from player to refereeing college teams from Notre Dame to Michigan Tech, and was on a plane every Friday to drop the puck. Even though my father was known for his goaltending abilities, very few skaters shared either his grace or his strength on ice. My father brought so much experience to the rink. In his final chapter of hockey, he volunteered to coach goalies at a local high school. Weekly he baked homemade bread for his boys, and he was known to leave a trail of iellybeans on the boards. A fun and

loving man with a sincere heart.

As the ice melted and spring unfolded, the hockey skates would be exchanged for golf clubs, and this too was another sport where he reigned supreme. Hockey came with its own dress code, but golf left much room for creativity - which of course my father embraced wholeheartedly. Think Rodney Dangerfield look-alike who rarely left the top purse behind!

My father had an amazing memory, especially when it came to sports. My father in his time could recall every shot, by whom and its proximity whether it be hockey or golf. It was not so much the final score, but the sportsmanship in which it was applied to the love of the game that was my father's passion.

Thomas Michael Yurkovich is truly one of a kind. A man of many words of the social variety banter - but few of those truly close to his heart. My father lived fully and received an Easter passage - we know who played for the home team! We love you very much and are so proud of you. Sharpen those CCM'S, Daddy, we'll be seeing you at the rink. Thomas is survived by his wife Pamela Yurkovich, sister Pasty Surina, daughter Sarah (Kenneth) Bernstein and grandchildren Alexander Day and Eleanora Bernstein, Don and Jan Blattie, children Linda (John), Mark and Jay.

Helen led an interesting life. Born in Globe, Az. on Nov. 23, 1942, she and her identical twin, Mildred, were quite well known. This was especially true when they were very young and rather high spirited. Their mother once said, "I had to halter and tie them together to maintain any control when doing my downtown shopping."

After their school years and becoming more disciplined, Helen married Duane Reece. He, with a lifetime ranching and rodeo history, made their home at the Reece Ranch



where Dripping Springs Wash meets the Gila River between Globe and Winkelman. Their two children were born there, but soon after they moved to another section of the ranch. After the kids became of school age and without bus service, Helen had to drive them to school in Winkel-

man. To avoid the difficulty of traveling back and forth over a rather rough road, she found a day job in town at the school cafeteria, then as Clerk of the Justice court. The aged J.P. then retired and Helen ran for office. In 1978 Helen was elected for Justice of the Peace and reelected five times. She retired in 1998 after 20 years of service when the court was combined with that in Globe.

As the election results proved during her time of tenure, she became quite revered in Southern Gila County. It was just her nature to try doing her very best for the people. Even after retirement, and for

years, she would receive calls day and night from those who hoped she could help solve their current problems. Husband Duane once threatened to tear the ranch phone line down if she didn't try limiting the calls.

On a lighter note, she often said that preforming weddings was her most enjoyable task, and those of a great number! When once asked how many, she said "close to a thousand." Even total strangers throughout the state often sought her out after hearing of her wedding rite style.

Her very favorite though, were those that she with Duane might require traveling for a distance to perform. They regularly were for those acquainted with Duane and held on cattle ranches. Although she never involved herself in a great deal of the actual ranch work, she cooked for "many'a roundup crew" and was well received by all. She often said that those times were about as close to a vacation as they ever had in nearly 60 years of marriage, what with Duane forever concerned with the ranch and cattle.

Helen is survived by husband Duane, son Corbet (Gina) Reece, daughter Kaycee (Mike) Jones, four grandchildren Austin Stratton, Wheeler Reece, Aisa (Jeremiah) White and Audrey Reece, and soon to be four great-grandchildren.




First and foremost, Harold loved the Lord and studying His word. He enjoyed spending time with his family and watching baseball, basketball and old Westerns.

County Animal Care & Control reminds dog owners that an up-todate rabies vaccine is required for your dog to be licensed - and that annual Gila County dog license is required by law. A license is also essential to prove ownership if your stray dog ends up at the shelter. Are your pets microchipped? If they aren't, consider this; only 22 percent of lost dogs without a microchip get reunited with the anxious owners who love them, and that number

drops to just two percent for stray cats. Low-cost vaccines, preventative care, microchipping and even nail trimming are all available May 14 and 28 when PetVet mobile clinics set up outside the Tractor Supply store at 2260 W. Highway 60 in Miami from 4:30 - 6 p.m. And mark your calendar for these dates next month; June 11 and 25. Keep your dogs and cats protected and up-to-date on vaccines essential to guard against rabies, feline leukemia, bordatella and

distemper. Did you know there's even a snakebite vaccine that can help dogs survive being bitten by a rattler? businesses. It is the result of a collaboration between the non-profit Rebuild Superior, Inc., the town government and Resolution Copper, a nearby proposed mine.

The CWG focuses on

potential environmental impact issues, science and policy, economic development and growth, and the pros and cons of the development proposed of the Resolution Copper mine, which could become one of the world's largest copper mining ventures. Members include residents and stakeholders from the Town of Superior, Queen Valley, and nearby communities. Topics include environmental stewardship. transportation, education, health, safety, natural resource issues, air quality, community investments, recreational changes and

other related subjects.

The ore deposit lies nearlv 7,000 feet below the earth's surface. It represents one of the most significant untapped copper deposits today. The mine has the potential to supply nearly 25% of US copper demand.




