Arizona Chief Justice approves plan to divide Gila County jury pool

By an Administrative Order. Arizona Supreme Court Chief Justice Robert Brutinel approved a proposal authored by Gila County Superior Court Judges Timothy Wright and Bryan Chambers that would effectively divide Gila County's jury pool so that Northern Gila County residents no longer have to travel to Globe for jury duty and residents of Southern Gila County no longer have to travel to Payson for jury duty.

Judges Wright and

Chambers presented the proposal to the Arizona Judicial Council in Phoenix in December. The Council, of which Judge Wright is also a member, voted to recommend approval of the plan by the Chief Justice. On January 12, the Chief Justice issued Administrative Order 2023-05 approving the plan.

According to the Administrative Order, the plan will take effect Feb. 1, 2023, for all civil cases. It will take ef-

fect Feb. 1, 2023 for jury trials for crimes alleged to be committed after Feb. 1, 2023. This means the plan will not be fully implemented until existing criminal cases are resolved.

"Jury service has been an integral part of our justice system going back hundreds of years to England and Magna Charta. This change will not only make it easier for citizens in the northern part of Gila County to participate in jury trials, but it should make jury service more available generally," said Judge Chambers.

"This is a major step toward allowing more of our citizens to serve as jurors, safely, conveniently and closer to their homes," said Judge Wright.

According to the Administrative Order, the plan is approved for five years and the presiding judge is directed to report to the Arizona Judicial Council on the plan's effectiveness in March 2025.

Point-in-time homeless count begins Jan. 25

What does it take to end homelessness in our community? A shared vision, housing solutions and reimagined systems.

In other words, according to Continuum of Care Coordinator Allison Torres, with the Gila County Community Services Department, it takes all of us.

Our county is part of what is known as the "Balance of State Continuum of Care (BoSCoC)," a state program for "non-metro" counties in Arizona, she explains. The program coordinates funding for housing resources and services for people experiencing homelessness.

In addition, goals and initiatives are created, which the Local Coalition to End Homelessness (LCEH) promotes within the community.

"The ultimate goal, of course, is ending home-lessness," Torres says.

The County's Community Services Department is the lead agency for our local LCEH, better known as the "Gila County Homeless Task Force."

"We meet monthly to address homelessness issues, share resources, promote community goals, explore funding and more," says Torres, adding, "All in Gila County are welcome!"

From Wednesday, Jan. 25-Monday, Jan. 30, the Homeless Task Force and the County will conduct their "Point in Time" (PIT) count survey, which is submitted to the State, then ultimately to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

Among other things, the statistics are used for "funding considerations, trying to bring new resources into our community, raising awareness and measuring progress on addressing the needs of those experiencing homelessness," Torres explains.

The PIT count survey will ask unsheltered individuals where they stayed the night of Jan. 24.

"We are shooting for Jan. 25 to be our big survey evening in both northern and southern Gila County," Torres says.

In southern Gila County, the CAP office at 5515 S. Apache Ave., Suite 200, Globe, will also conduct surveys Jan. 25-27 from 8 a.m.-5 p.m.

"Our big event will be a dinner at St. Paul's (220 E. Cedar St.) in Globe on Wednesday, Jan. 25, from 4 to 6 p.m., in collaboration with the Homeless Coalition of Cobre Valley," Torres says. "We will also have jackets, blankets and some other basic clothing and hygiene items available for those in need."

In northern Gila County, volunteers will be at New Directions--The Warming Center, 601 AZ-260, Payson, which opens 4 p.m. daily and serves dinner from 4:30-6:30 p.m. Showers will also be available. Volunteers will conduct the surveys during these hours from Wednesday, Jan. 25-Sunday, Jan. 30.

PIT count surveys may also be completed from 8 a.m.-5 p.m. Wednesday, Jan. 25-Friday, Jan. 27, at the Community Action Program (CAP) office, 514 S. Beeline Highway, Payson.

Torres points out that, along with events and surveys at specific locations, other volunteers will do



street outreach all five days.

While volunteers are welcome, they will need to receive brief training and sign a confidentiality statement, she explains. T h o s e

who would like to get involved with the cause may

attend the Homeless Task Force meetings, held via Zoom at 10 a.m. the fourth Thursday of each month. Due to the PIT count, the January meeting will be held Jan. 19 at 10 a.m. "This will allow for discussion and training in preparation for the surveys to be completed the next week," says Torres, who is also the contact for the Homeless Task Force.



Grant opportunities available for those who work with young children

SAN CARLOS — Dozens of grant opportunities for organizations who serve Arizona's babies, toddlers and preschoolers will be available soon from Arizona's early childhood agency.

First Things First (FTF), which works across Arizona to give children birth to age 5 the tools they need to arrive in kindergarten prepared to succeed, is hoping to increase the awareness of about 80 grants that will be released in early 2023 to support early childhood strategies. The grants, which will be available across the state, are expected to range from \$30,000 to \$2 million.

"First Things First is looking for organizations that are passionate about children's issues and that are embedded in our communities where services are needed," said K. Vilay, FTF's chief regional officer. "We know that these types of organizations have gained the trust of families living in those communities and carry a deep understanding of the culture and needs of those families."

Research has shown a child's early experiences lay the foundation for a lifetime of success in school and beyond. The FTF State Board, with input from the 28 FTF regional councils across Arizona, has spent the past year strategically planning the priorities of early childhood needs in communities across the state.

Approximately four rounds of Request for Grant Applications are scheduled to be released from midJanuary through mid-April 2023, with awards announced after the May and June FTF State Board meetings.

Organizations who are interested in receiving notification when grant applications are released are encouraged to sign up for email notifications at FirstThingsFirst.org and click on Grants. FTF has created a website to support potential grant applicants. Resources include eligibility qualifications for the grants, an overview of the

application and award process, a list of open grant opportunities, and an explanation of the strategies that FTF supports and the strategy requirements.




