Connie's Bridge project underway

Work has begun on a project to replace the Upper Pinal Creek Bridge (aka Connie's Bridge), after the City of Globe awarded a contract to Meridian Construction Company, a Tucson-based firm, on November 22.

Meridian started bringing equipment to the site and other preparatory work as well as utility coordination and relocation, beginning with potholing on December 20. The project site will soon be fenced for the safety of work crews and the public. Meridian crews started setting up traffic control, followed by removals and underground water-

EAC Gila Pueblo Campus welcomes new art instructor

GLOBE - This spring the Gila Pueblo Campus of Eastern Arizona College is welcoming a new instructor, who will lead a new evening class, to its arts program.

A specialist in silver who grew up in Globe, artist Tracey Goins is returning home to teach a quartet of courses: Jewelry Making I and II (ART 173, 174), and Stained Glass I and II (ART 122, 123). Goins, once an EAC Gila Pueblo student (he calls the campus his "alma mater"), makes his own silver clay and has worked in stained glass over the years. His experience includes stints with Jared Jewelry and a shop in Alaska. Along with leading classes this spring, Goins is developing his own jewelry line. He said he is "decently along" in this endeavor, producing 1-3 pieces a day, and hopes to build up enough to start selling through an online retailer.

The four courses will be Goins' first teaching experience. "I want to make sure I provide a good learning environment and a good experience for the students," he said. They will also be the first evening jewelry classes at Gila Pueblo, in what he described as a trial run; the jewelry making classes are on Tuesday and Wednesday from 5:20 - 8:20 p.m.

EAC Gila Pueblo Campus Spring 2023 Semester begins Jan. 17, 2023. Financial aid is available for students who qualify. EAC offers a tuition waiver for students 55+ who have lived in Arizona for over a year. 

Taking risks

Facing danger with the Lord is always better than seeking safety apart from Him.

Do you like playing it safe, or are you more adventurous in your choices? Many Christians don't like risk because the outcome is uncertain and may involve loss or other unwanted results. From a human viewpoint, eliminating potential harm makes sense. But for Christians, uncertainty is part of walking by faith. There are times when obedience may seem risky to us, but from God's perspective there's no danger since He controls all things and never fails to accomplish His purposes.

The Bible tells of real people who obeyed the Lord in unpredictable situations. One of them is Ananias, a disciple sent by God to minister to the newly converted Saul. Ananias risked his life by visiting this notorious opponent of Christianity. Saul, too, lived with risk after his conversion, facing peril almost every day of his life as he obediently preached the same gospel that he'd previously opposed. By focusing on God, His character and His promises, both of these men obeyed despite uncertainty and were used greatly by the Lord.

Where is God calling you to trust Him? Remember, each time you face risk it's an opportunity to experience His faithfulness firsthand.


