Could there possibly be a more direct and personal way to help others? More than a dozen healthy donors are needed for our community's next blood drive at the Globe-Miami Elks lodge near Denny's Jan. 6 (Friday) from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Call 1-800-RED-CROSS to reserve one of the appointments, or pick your choice of times and schedule yourself conveniently online at redcrossblood.org. All healthy donors are welcome, and giving blood is safe. Pre-arranged appointments are required in order to help Red Cross staff and Elks Lodge volunteers schedule the most efficient drive day possible. Type-O blood is especially needed. Type-O is often used in trauma situations, especially Type-O negative, which can be transfused with any blood type.

Appointments are also available for 'Power Red' donations, which allow you to safely donate two units of red blood cells during one donation. Blood is drawn from one arm by a machine that separates and collects two units of red cells, then safely returns the remaining blood components, along with some saline, back to you through the same arm - and just one needle jab is required. A Power Red donation takes approximately 30 minutes longer than a whole blood donation, so plan on about 35-45 minutes in the chair and you're limited to donating approximately once every four months.

How often can you give blood? According to the Red Cross, "Wait at least eight weeks (56 days) between donations of whole blood, or 16 weeks (112 days) between Power Red donations. Whole blood donors can donate up to 6 times a year."

If you're ineligible during January, please sign up for the next blood drive Feb. 3, also from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Gardening and Landscape class at Gila Pueblo Campus

Want to get more healthy greens and veggies from your garden, boost the health of a heritage fruit tree on your land or grow your most radiant flowers yet? Learn gardening basics and explore more advanced topics of horticulture, too, when County Extension Agent Christopher Jones hosts a weekly class that runs Thursday mornings from 9 a.m. till noon starting Jan. 19, and features expert guest speakers from throughout Gila County and the University of Arizona.

Taught here in Globe at the Gila Pueblo Campus, you'll find it listed online as AGR230 "Gardening and Landscape" and offered during spring semester 2023. Gila Pueblo Campus is located at 8274 S. Six Shooter Canvon Rd. Jones and his guest speakers will host a weekly lecture and provide hands-on activities to make this course exceptionally informative and well-tailored to southern Gila County. Did you know this is among other classes offered free to students 55 years and older? Make sure to ask about the senior waiver when you register. Cost for the course includes standard tuition and fees required by Eastern Arizona College. The text is the Arizona Master Gardener Manual, available online from UA Cooperative Extension Publications. Register at Gila County Community College in person, by phone at (928) 425-8481 or at https://www. gilaccc.org/.

This class also provides the training and opportunity to become a Master Gardener volunteer for Gila County. A Master Gardener receives certification after successfully completing the course, registering as an official UA volunteer and remaining active by conducting at least 50 hours of volunteer educational service in the following 12 months. Any student with a disability may request a reasonable accommodation, such as a sign language interpreter, by contacting Mori Farmer, (928) 474-4160. Requests should be made as early as possible to allow time to arrange the accommodation. For more information about the class and project, call Chris Jones at (928) 402-8586.

Rabies, bordatella, microchipping? Mobile pet clinic Sundays Jan. 8, 22

Gila County Animal Care & Control reminds dog owners that an up-to-date rabies vaccine is required for your dog to be licensed - and that annual license is required by law, too. A license is also essential to prove ownership if your stray dog ends up at the shelter. Are your pets microchipped? If they aren't, be aware that only 22 percent of lost dogs without a microchip get reunited with the anxious owners who love them, and that number drops to just two percent for stray cats. Low-cost vaccines,

preventative care, microchipping as low as \$15 and even nail trimming are all available when the PetVet mobile clinic revisits the Tractor Supply store in Claypool two Sundays each month from 2:30-4 p.m. Upcoming dates are Jan. 8 and 22.

No appointments are needed, but call PetVet mobile clinic staff at 800-427-7973 or visit petvet.vippetcare.com/services-pricing if you have questions about specific services, or to verify services available such as microchips (with lifetime registration), urinary tract care and Lyme disease vaccine (check for \$15 vaccination discount coupons online, too). Keep your dogs and cats protected and up-to-date on vaccines essential to guard against rabies, feline leukemia, bordatella and distemper. Did you know there's even a snakebite vaccine that can help dogs survive being bitten by a rattler? Pre-treatment with the snakebite vaccine also reduces your pet's pain and suffering - and the overall cost of treatment if bitten, too.

Historic events that occurred on January 1

January 1 is all about new beginnings. Upon waking up on the first day of a new year, it's not uncommon for people to turn over a new leaf or look ahead to the months to come. But the first day of the new year also merits a look back, as many historical events have taken place on January 1.

• 45 BC: Of the many memorable events to take place on January 1, perhaps none had a more lasting effect than January 1 in 45 BC. That's the day when the Roman Empire officially adopted the Julian calendar, which established January 1 as the first day of the new • 404: Gladiatorial fights are banned by Christian Emperor Honorius, who issues the ban after the Christian monk Telemachus is stoned to death by a crowd as he tries to stop a gladiatorial fight in a Roman ampithe-

• 1500: The coast of Brazil is discovered by Portuguese explorer Pedro Álvares Cabral. Cabral is acknowledged as the first European to discover Brazil and during his voyage in 1500 became the first human in history to be in four continents.

• 1600: More than 1,600

years after the Roman Empire recognized January 1 as the start of the new year, Scotland follows suit. Until this point, Scotland had considered March 25 as the start of its new year.

• 1776: In the midst of the Revolutionary War, General George Washington hoists the Grand Union Flag, a precursor to the American flag, at Prospect Hill in Somerville, Massachusetts. Historians cite this as the first time any American flag was raised.

• 1801: The United Kingdon of Great Britain and Ireland is proclaimed. The sovereign state would remain in existence until 1922, when the Irish Free State was established.

• 1863: The Emancipation Proclamation takes effect in Confederate territory. The proclamation from U.S. President Abraham Lincoln changed the legal status of more than 3.5 million African Americans from enslaved to free.

• 1898: The City of Greater New York is created when New York, NY, annexes land from surrounding counties. Four boroughs (Manhattan, Brooklyn, Queens, and The Bronx) are established, and a fifth (Staten Island) joined less than a month later.
