

Let's fill Jan. 6 blood drive

Could there possibly be a more direct and personal way to help others? More than a dozen healthy donors are needed for our community's next blood drive at the Globe-Miami Elks lodge near Denny's Jan. 6 (Friday) from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Call 1-800-RED-CROSS to reserve one of the appointments, or pick your choice of times and schedule vourself conveniently online at redcrossblood.org. All healthy donors are welcome, and giving blood is safe. Pre-arranged appointments are required in order to help Red Cross staff and Elks Lodge volunteers schedule the most efficient drive day possible. Type-O blood is especially needed. Type-O is often used in trauma situations, especially Type-O negative, which can be transfused with any blood type.

Appointments are also available for 'Power Red' donations, which allow you to safely donate two units of red blood cells during one donation. Blood is drawn from one arm by a machine that separates and collects two units of red cells, then safely returns the remaining blood components, along with some saline, back to you through the same arm - and just one needle jab is required. A Power Red donation takes approximately 30 minutes longer than a whole blood donation, so plan on about 35-45 minutes in the chair and you're limited to donating approximately once every four months.

How often can you give blood? According to the Red Cross, "Wait at least eight weeks (56 days) between donations of whole blood, or 16 weeks (112 days) between Power Red donations. Whole blood donors can donate up to 6 times a year."

If you're ineligible during January, please sign up for the next blood drive Feb. 3, also from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.





Arizona Mining Association awards Resolution Copper 2022 SPADE Award

SUPERIOR, AZ - The Arizona Mining Association (AMA) awarded Resolution Copper the 2022 Sustainability, Preservation and Diversity in the Environment (SPADE) Award for Public Education. The prestigious award recognizes mining companies that have led, financed or hosted public education efforts for habitat preservation and enhancement or species protection and restoration.

"Over the past several years, AMA members have increased their efforts in safety practices and environmental protection, thereby raising the standard for SPADE excellence," said Arizona Mining Association Executive Director Steve Trussell. "AMA is honored to present the SPADE Award to Resolution Copper for their partnership with the US Forest Service, NAU and Western Apache Tribes in restoring the Emory oak that will nourish Native American

Communities for future generations."

Resolution Copper began a multiyear partnership with the Tonto and Coconino National Forests (TNF and CNF). Northern Arizona University (NAU) and Apache Tribes in Arizona to create the Emory Oak Collaborative Tribal Restoration Initiative in response to concerns voiced by Western Apache Tribal elders that the health of Emory oak groves is declining, with fewer and fewer acorns produced each year across Arizona.

The Emory oak is a culturally significant tree to the Western Apache people. The acorns provide a traditional food source in addition to other cultural and ceremonial uses. In recent years, drought, fire suppression, livestock over-grazing, species competition and climate change have circumvented the growth of new Emory oak seedlings and the production of acorns. The Emory Oak project partners with the Yavapai-Apache Nation, Tonto Apache Tribe and White Mountain Apache Tribe (WMAT), with assistance from San Carlos Apache Tribal elders, to research the protection and restoration of Emory oak groves across Arizona.

A fundamental component of the program involves transferring traditional ecological knowledge from elders to youth through education and collaboration. The Emory Oak project has sponsored multiple public education efforts, from planting Emory oak saplings to training, outreach, and developing research papers and presentations. The program also aims to create a record of the traditional ecological knowledge used to manage the Emory oak ecosystems so younger generations can access it in the years ahead.

"We are grateful for the collaborative partnership

between the US Forest Service. NAU and Western Apache Tribal elders,' said Victoria Peacey, Acting Project Director, Resolution Copper. "Indigenous traditional ecological knowledge has guided every aspect of this work, from identifying priority Emory oak groves to implementing best practices on the ground to preserve a critical aspect of Western Apache culture. By acknowledging, respecting and listening to the voice of Western Apache Tribal elders, mining companies can play a role in preserving this important species."



Every one of us has the power to change their future. All it takes is the heart to do so.





When did Christmas lights become so popular?


Holiday lights are now everywhere come the holi-

day season. Private homeowners tend to hang the



holiday lights outside their homes around Thanksgiving weekend and keep them up through New Year's Day. Though it might seem like a tradition without a deep history, decorating a Christmas tree with electric lights can be traced all the way back to the nineteenth century. In 1882, Edward Johnson, who was a friend

and colleague of the man who invented light bulbs, Thomas Edison, replaced candles, which had traditionally been used to briefly light Christmas trees, with



light bulbs. But at the time of Johnson's innovation, the high cost and relative infancy of light bulbs ensured the idea did not catch on. And though United States President Grover Cleveland used electric lights to illuminate a Christmas tree in the White House in 1895, it would be another eight years before General Electric would begin selling Christmas light kits. Those kits cost \$12 in 1903, which equates to several hundred dollars today. The first outdoor Christmas light shows started to become popular in the 1920s, and this is the same time when commercial sales of Christmas lights picked up. In the 1960s, GE's decision to begin manufacturing Christmas lights overseas helped reduce the price of outdoor lights even further, thus paving the way for the tradition of decorating home exteriors with string lights during the holiday season to take a firm hold. And that tradition remains wildly popular today.

Jesus received the most iconic tortures in His time. The Roman, Latin word flagrum (which means a rope with metal balls, bones, metal spikes) with which they flogged Jesus 39 times gave Him body marks/stripes. Each of the 39 strokes took care of sickness and disease.

The stripes of Jesus addressed cancer, HIV, stroke, high blood pressure and all manner of sickness and diseases, and put them on Himself. The Bible says, "Surely our sickness He has borne, and pain He has carried."

Whatever sickness or disease you may be suffering from, you are healed now in the name of Jesus. Amen.
