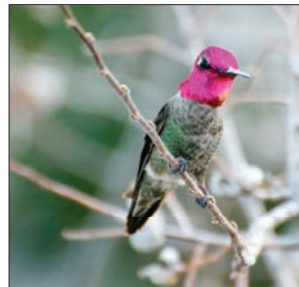

Christmas Bird Count. Saturday morning visitors will help identify and count the various colorful bird species found at Tonto National Monument. You don't need to be an expert; all levels of birding experience are encouraged, and this drop-in event is free and open to the public. To participate, meet up with park staff at the visitor center any time. Participants should bring their own binoculars; bird identification guides and data recording materials will be provided.

The Christmas Bird Count is the nation's longest-running community science bird project, and the data is used to study long-term health and status of bird populations across North America. This annual event also helps Tonto National Monument by providing an updated species inventory. 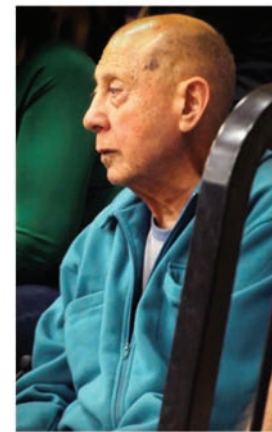

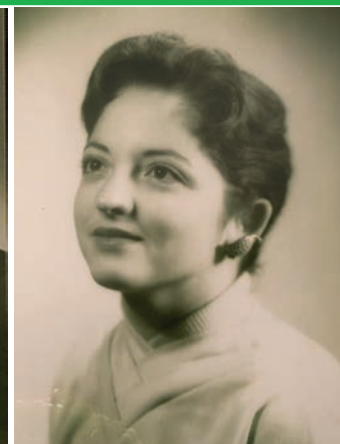

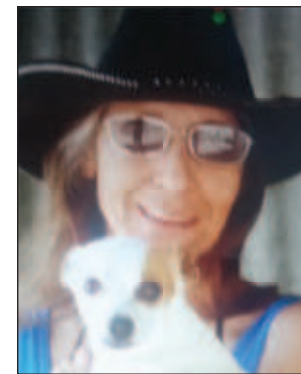
She and Eddie raised nine children together. When her children were younger she was an active

Our home always welcomed everyone in many ways. As busy as our household was, somehow my parents made the time to travel to many places, attending concerts and anything to do with music. He and mom always worked together visiting jails, hospitals and the homebound, bringing love to all through music.

He endured many trials – always in pain, but always there for all of us. He was a quiet man, giving of himself always. His legacy is with all of us; his children whom he loved unconditionally, and his grandchildren and great-grandchildren whom he spoiled. His love and spirit lives on as we cherish all our memories. He was a special, loving person who lived for others and made our world a special place.

Dad, we will miss you always.

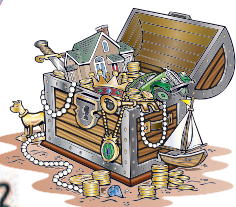

Handmade holiday cards are gifts in themselves; some tips

Around this time of year, Rose Keiko Higa often finds herself making holiday cards for family and friends. An art history major at Oberlin College, in Ohio, she uses cut and layered paper to craft Christmas cards, and paints traditional Japanese New Year's cards on watercolor paper.

"Written words can be such a meaningful gift on their own, it's nice to be able to create a vessel for them in the form of a handmade card," Higa says.

Not only can handmade cards feel more special than store-bought or digital ones (or none at all), but gathering to make them can be a social activity for kids and grownups ahead of the winter holidays.

"They've always been a thing but they're definitely having a moment now, with more people wanting to keep in touch in a low-fi way," says Leslie Corona, senior home editor at Real Simple.

Handmade cards also speak to a time "when more people are thinking of ways to reconnect with their inner crafter," says Oma Blaise Ford, executive editor of Better Homes & Gardens.

"It's a great craft for people who just want to dip their toe in. You can just make one or two cards. It doesn't have to involve a mass mailing," suggests Ford.

And DIY cards "touch on issues of sustainability and not consuming as much over the holidays," she says.

Christopher Paul Stevens, an artist in the Atlanta area, makes distinctive holiday cards from old-fashioned looking block prints of winter scenes, and sells them on Etsy.com at 111 Restoration and Vintage Goods. Judy A. Steiner, an artist in Ada, Michigan, makes cards featuring elegant Christmas trees formed from watercolor brushstrokes in shades of green and blue.

"It's kind of neat for both purchaser and receiver" to know cards are handmade, says Steiner, who has been making cards for decades and sells them through Steiner Studio on Etsy.

While paintings are often expensive, she notes, handmade cards are a more affordable form of art, a gift unto themselves.

Tips for beginning card-makers include:

AIM FOR QUALITY, NOT QUANTITY

Avoid getting too ambitious, warns Corona. Don't set out to make 300 cards by hand. Or if you do, make it very simple. It's a good idea to try making just five or 10 beautiful cards for closest family and friends. Attempting anything overly grand can become overwhelming and stressful, she says.

"You want to walk away from it with a positive mem-

ory," she says.

CONSIDER WHAT YOU HAVE AT HAND

Before heading to the craft store, look at what you have around you. For example, round basket coffee filters or cupcake liners can make great snowflakes: Fold a few times and cut out designs along the sides and top, then paste them onto card stock, suggests Ford.

If you put a few drops of food coloring in some warm water, you can fold, dip-dye, and then allow the filters to dry before cutting the snowflakes. They're similar to tissue paper but much more durable, Ford says.

Other decorating tools you might have include colorful washi tape, designs you could cut out from past holiday cards, paper doilies, ribbon, felt, markers, paint and stickers. Gold-leaf adds some bling.

Paper paint samples from the hardware store can be cut into triangles to make a Christmas tree, suggests Bridget Mallon, editorial director of the home website The Spruce.

Free printable templates for designs can be found online, she adds.

MAKE IT A POSTCARD?

Are your cards being mailed? To save money on postage, consider postcard-style cards without an envelope. Just make sure you send your cards as early as possible, and be aware of any weight or size restrictions.

5 plants that say 'holiday season,' and how to care for them

Holiday horticulture tends to revolve around the same handful of plants. So if you don't already have any or all of these five holiday plants, now is the time to get them:

PAPERWHITES

The bulbs of these daffodil family members are pre-chilled so they can be planted now and produce flowers in a month to six weeks. If you find them for sale, by all means buy as many as you can. The only caveat is that some family members may object to

the unbelievably sweet smell of their blooms.

While you can grow these bulbs by siting their bases in just a bit of water, it is best to plant them in a shallow container of soil. They don't need much water and will perform well if given the best light you have. If yours sprouts, you are guaranteed flowers, at least the first year. People usually toss them when they are finished, as they're unlikely to flower again.

POINSETTIAS

Poinsettias, of course, are for sale in all manner of venues this time of

year. Many of us buy them, keep them for the next few weeks and then toss them. The trick is to keep them alive for the holiday season.

This requires first bringing the plant home with a minimum exposure to cold air. If you live in a cold climate, consider warming the car before transporting them. Once home, the plants should not be exposed to drafts from doorways or windows. Place them where daytime temperatures are between 65 and 75 Fahrenheit, and with 60 as an ideal night temp.

Soak the entire pot whenever the surface turns dry. Let them drain, and keep checking the soil surface for the next dunking.

Poinsettias should never sit in water, so if you want to keep the decorative foil that accompanies many of them, poke a hole in it to let water out.

CHRISTMAS TREES

These, too, are their own gardening activity. Make sure your tree is kept in plenty of water and pay the strictest attention to safety rules if you use lights. After Christmas, look for a place that will chip up and recy-

cle your tree, or place it in a back corner of your yard as cover for birds.

AMARYLLIS

These are the easiest and showiest bulbs you can buy, and they produce the largest flowers you are ever likely to grow. They are usually sold together with pot and soil, and all you need to do is ensure yours is planted so that 1/3 of the top of the bulb is above the soil line.

Keep the plant growing right through summer. Then put yours into a cool, dark location so it goes dormant, to be brought out again next holiday season

for flowering.

CHRISTMAS CACTUS

Christmas cacti, Schlumbergeras, are another great plant that blooms during the mid-winter holidays. They will live for dozens of holiday seasons (some are passed on from one generation to the next) and bloom each year if exposed to shortening days. Rooting cuttings is easy using just a leaf, so it is not uncommon for a clone of the same plant to be in more than one family member's home.

Christmas cacti do best in bright light. When it is in bloom, a Christmas cactus should only be watered when the soil is dry. Too much water and the flowers will drop off, so this is one of those times when too dry is better than too wet.

The rest of the year, water by soaking the pot when the surface soil dries out. Next fall, give yours natural light and keep cool, up against a window, and they will bloom again.

Jazzy 'Charlie Brown Christmas' swings on after 57 years

NEW YORK (AP) — The Mendelson family would love to find the envelope where their father, Lee, scribbled some lyrics to jazz musician Vince Guaraldi's composition "Christmas Time is Here" for an animated TV special featuring the "Peanuts" gang in 1965.

The producer always said it had taken less than half an hour to write, and he likely tossed the scrap of paper away. He was in a rush. Everything was rushed. No one even knew, once the special aired, whether it would ever be seen again.

Instead, "A Charlie Brown Christmas" became an indelible holiday tradition and so, too, has Guaraldi's music — perhaps even more so.

"Christmas just doesn't feel like Christmas without hearing that album in the background," said Derrick Bang, author of the biography "Vince Guaraldi at the Piano."

The special itself was a bit of an oddity: a cartoon story of the meaning of Christmas soundtracked by a sophisticated, mostly instrumental jazz trio of piano, bass and drum.

Yet it worked. Guaraldi's cascading piano evokes both motion and lightly falling snow on "Skating." The driving melody of "Linus and Lucy" is the eternal backdrop to a swinging party. "O Tannenbaum" shifts

from the traditional carol to a bass-driven groove. A children's choir adds charm to "Christmas Time is Here."

The soundtrack has sold more than five million copies. Its nostalgia-fueled popularity has only grown, getting a crucial boost in 1998 when Starbucks began selling it in stores, and fed steadily by new products. The latest, a box set of outtakes from Guaraldi's recording sessions, was released this year.

"A Charlie Brown Christmas" has aired every year since 1965, although that tradition is about to change.

The special's run on broadcast television ended last year. Apple TV+ bought the rights, and streams it exclusively starting this year. While a recognition of television's new direction, will that reduce the chances of new generations of children happening upon the story and music?

"I just remember, back in the days of three channels and scheduled programming, that was one of those things we were excited about because we knew it was coming on and we were familiar with it," said Harry Connick Jr., who covered "Christmas Time is Here" for his own holiday disc just out.

"It was actually an amazing opportunity for music like that to be heard by a lot of people," added Connick, a jazz devotee even as a youngster. "It was not necessarily the kind of mu-

sic that would be played on regular radio."

That's even less likely now, as jazz recedes into the history books or the background of dinner parties, said Nathaniel Sloan, musicologist at the University of Southern California and co-host of the "Switched on Pop" podcast.

During the 1960s, jazz was closer to the mainstream and more likely to be played alongside pop music, he said.

The music Guaraldi created for the soundtrack is ambiguous and more complex than most holiday music, Sloan said. Tied to warm feelings for illustrator Charles M. Schulz's classic comic page characters, time has made it traditional holiday music.

The list of people who have recorded "Christmas

Time is Here" is long and varied. They include John Legend, Alicia Keys, Gloria Estefan, Mariah Carey, Mel Tormé, Dave Brubeck, Sarah McLachlan, Stone Temple Pilots, Chicago, and Toni Braxton.

Similarly, the unexpected places where the melody to "Linus and Lucy" have appeared testifies to how ingrained it is in American life. Michelle Obama played it on the piano when returning to her childhood home in the "Becoming" documentary. Foo Fighters included it in a rocking "Saturday Night Live" holiday medley. Prince banged it out during his last concert.

It all started in the San Francisco area, home base for Guaraldi, as it was for Mendelson and Schulz. Mendelson's popular documentary on Willie Mays —

Schulz's favorite baseball player — convinced the reclusive cartoonist to participate in a "day in the life" film about his work. One of Mendelson's favorite songs was Guaraldi's breezy hit, "Cast Your Fate to the Wind," so the jazzman was recruited for a soundtrack.

In the days before cable and streaming, Mendelson couldn't sell the documentary, so it went unseen.

After the popularity of "Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer" in 1964, a sponsor asked Mendelson if he'd considered making a "Peanuts" Christmas special. He lied that he had. Schulz agreed to outline a story, and Guaraldi came aboard, too, recycling "Linus and Lucy" from the documentary.

Animation is time-consuming, so the team had

a tight deadline to make it onto television. It was Mendelson who decided that "Christmas Time is Here" was missing something without lyrics. He asked several songwriters to take on the task, but the deadline was too daunting.

So Mendelson sat in his office and did it himself: "Christmas time is here, happiness and cheer..."

"I've always loved the music and the melody, but I really didn't understand how beautiful the lyrics were until I recorded it," said Norah Jones, who included her take on the song on a disc released last year.

"The version with the children singing is so special," she told The Associated Press. "There's something very unique and heartwarming about children singing."

The struggle with jealousy

Slow cooking creates free time

Who couldn't use a little more free time in his or her day? Slow cookers can create that by enabling home chefs to set their ingredients to simmer early in the day and then head to work, school, recreational activities — pretty much whatever they need to get done — as the food cooks. Not being beholden to the kitchen is a benefit slow cookers offer.

Since slow cookers cook foods slowly at low temperatures, they are quite handy and even can help people save money. Tougher cuts of meat or poultry tend to cost a little less, and they can be cooked to perfection in the slow cooker. The long, moist cooking environment tenderizes the ingredients during the cooking process.

Stews and slow cookers often go hand-in-hand. Enjoy this recipe for "Chicken Stew with Herb Dumplings" from "Crock*Pot® 365 Year-Round Recipes" (Publications International, Ltd.) by the Crock*Pot Test Kitchen.

Chicken Stew with Herb Dumplings
 Makes 4 servings

2 cups sliced carrots
 1 cup chopped onion
 1 large green bell pepper, sliced
 1/2 cup sliced celery
 2 cans (about 14 ounces each) chicken broth, divided
 2/3 cup all-purpose flour
 1 pound boneless, skinless chicken breasts, cut into 1-inch pieces
 1 large red potato,

unpeeled and cut into 1-inch pieces
 6 ounces mushrooms, halved
 3/4 cup frozen peas
 1 1/4 teaspoons dried basil, divided
 1 teaspoon dried rosemary
 3/8 teaspoon dried tarragon, divided
 1/4 cup heavy cream
 3/4 to 1 teaspoon salt
 1/4 teaspoon black pepper
 1 cup biscuit baking mix
 1/3 cup reduced-fat (2%) milk

1. Combine carrots, onion, bell pepper, celery and all but 1 cup chicken broth in the slow cooker. Cover; cook on low 2 hours.
 2. Stir remaining 1 cup



mushrooms, peas, 1 teaspoon basil, 3/4 teaspoon rosemary and 1/4 teaspoon tarragon. Cover; cook on low 4 hours or until vegetables and chicken are tender. Stir in cream, salt and pepper.

3. Combine baking mix, remaining 1/4 teaspoon basil, 1/4 teaspoon rosemary and 1/8 teaspoon tarragon in small bowl. Stir in milk to form soft dough. Add dumpling mixture to top of stew in 4 large spoonfuls. Cook, uncovered, 30 minutes. Cover; cook 30 to 45 minutes or until dumplings are firm and toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Serve in shallow bowls.
