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Gila Pueblo showcases welding program at open house

Due to a lack of instructors, the future of the welding program at Eastern Arizona College's Gila Pueblo Campus was uncertain. That problem was solved when Freeport Mc-MoRan agreed to lend Ernie Baca and John Freeman to the college; Baca now leads welding courses four days a week, with Freeman working the fifth day.

Not only did the program gain two skilled instructors; it also has a new space at the Miami Regional Training Center, which the college celebrat-

ed with an open house last Wednesday.

Baca said they spent this summer getting the spacious building ready, cleaning it up for the arrival of 12 new welding machines supplied by the manufacturer, Lincoln Electric. Those machines were in action Wednesday as students demonstrated MIG, TIG and stick welding.

However, the college hasn't finished enhancing the welding program. "This is just the start," said Baca. "We're going to grow this until they say 'stop,' and at this point I don't see that happening." The facility will be getting 15 new

welding booths this month, as well as a new ventilation system.

Baca said the welding program will give students the ability to enter a career in an industry "sorely short of skilled individuals." But, he added, it's not just for students seeking a career field; it's also for adult learners who just want to pick up the skill.

Baca also saluted the college's partners in building the program; Freeport McMoRan, the Cobre Valley Institute of Technology (CVIT), Lincoln Electric and Resolution Copper.

"These guys (Baca and Freeman) are passionate about what they're doing. They've connected with the students," said CVIT Superintendent Mike O'Neal. "We're excited about the vision, and it's just going to keep growing."

Ride with the Tribe: 19th Annual Run to the Rez Veterans Motorcycle Ride

SAN CARLOS, Ariz. — The 19th Annual Run to the Rez Veterans Honor Motorcycle Run took place on Oct. 13 - 15 and brought over 600 riders from all over the country to the San Carlos Apache Reservation.

Run to the Rez is the kickoff event for the San Carlos Apache Tribe's Veterans Day activities.

"It was a great rally," said organizer Dr. John Bush. "We got some rain on Saturday but all the bikers were blessed with scattered showers. Some of our bikers came from France, Puerto Rico, New York and Pennsylvania. Thank you all for honoring all of our veterans."

The event started Friday morning with the Casinoto-Casino Ride, with over 100 riders and passengers starting at the Apache Gold Casino before enjoying a ride through the Pinals to the Apache Sky Casino. At Apache Sky, the motorcycle riders enjoyed a lunch and various raffle prizes were given out to participants.

In the evening, riders were fed a traditional dinner on the Apache Gold golf course. Birdsingers from California gave a special performance during the dinner.

Friday night ended with the riders' favorite event — the Welcome Party at the Apache Gold Casino Convention Center. Mardee and the Buzz performed for attendees and many raffle prizes were given out.

On Saturday morning, the second day of the Run to the Rez started with the Veterans Honor Run to Burdette Hall in downtown San Carlos. During the Veterans Ceremony, Carol Hope-Slim was the emcee as 400 bikers rode down San Carlos Avenue; many community members lined up and down the street to wave as the riders came in.

The Run to the Rez committee honored Bylas resident Sara Rope. The Medicine Wheel Ride organization also recognized the family of the late Michael Noline. All of the veteran riders were called down and honored to end the ceremony.

After the festivities at Burdette Hall, a Bike Show took place at the Apache Gold Casino while other riders took part in the Poker Run, which included stops at San Carlos Lake, Apache Burger and nearby Globe.

Throughout Saturday there were live bands play-

ing for the Run to the Rez outside the casino entrance. Headlining the Run to the Rez concert lineup was Damage Inc, southern California's tribute to Metallica. Damage Inc was hand-selected by Metallica to perform as part of their 40th Anniversary San Francisco Weekend Takeover in 2021.

Another favorite of bikers was the Biker Steak Fry at the Apache Gold Pavilion on Saturday night.

The night ended with the Grand Prize giveaway of a Harley Davidson motorcycle. This year's lucky winner was Pam Devall from St. Johns. In addition to the bike, Devall also won a new Harley Davison leather jacket and \$1,000 cash.

Over the course of the event more than \$25,000 was given out in cash and prizes to the attendees but the most important donation from the event goes to the San Carlos Veterans Association, who will be receiving a substantial donation from the Run to the Rez organization.

Sponsors of this year's run included the San Carlos Apache Tribe, Apache Gold Casino and Resorts, Superstition Harley Davidson and San Carlos Telecommunications Utility, Inc. (SCATUI).

"We are turning out to be one of the biggest and best bike rallies in Arizona," said Dr. Bush. "I want to thank the San Carlos Apache Tribe, Apache Gold Casino, SCATUI, the Peridot District staff and my family for their support. The 2023 event will be an awesome rally for sure. Thank you for attending."

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Today in History: November 2, Washington's Farewell Address

Today is Wednesday, Nov. 2, the 306th day of 2022. There are 59 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Nov. 2, 1783, General George Washington issued his Farewell Address to the Army near Princeton, New Jersey.

On this date:

In 1861, during the Civil War, President Abraham Lincoln relieved Maj. Gen. John C. Fremont of his command of the Army's Department of the West based in St. Louis, follow-

ing Fremont's unauthorized efforts to emancipate slaves in Missouri.

In 1917, British Foreign Secretary Arthur Balfour issued a declaration expressing support for a "national home" for the Jews in Palestine.

In 1920, white mobs rampaged through the Florida citrus town of Ocoee, setting fire to Blackowned homes and businesses, after a Black man, Mose Norman, showed up at the polls to vote on Election Day; some historians estimate as many as 60 people were killed.

In 1950, playwright George Bernard Shaw, 94,

died in Ayot St. Lawrence, Hertfordshire, England.

In 1976, former Georgia Gov. Jimmy Carter became the first candidate from the Deep South since the Civil War to be elected president as he defeated incumbent Gerald R. Ford.

In 1994, a jury in Pensacola, Florida, convicted Paul Hill of murder for the shotgun slayings of an abortion provider and his escort; Hill was executed in September 2003.

In 2000, American astronaut Bill Shepherd and two Russian cosmonauts, Yuri Gidzenko (gihd-ZEENG'koh) and Sergei Krikalev (SUR'-gay KREE'-kuh-lev), became the first residents of the international space station.

In 2003, in Iraq, insurgents shot down a Chinook helicopter carrying dozens of U.S. soldiers, killing 16.

In 2004, President George W. Bush was elected to a second term as Republicans strengthened their grip on Congress.

In 2007, British college student Meredith Kercher, 21, was found slain in her bedroom in Perugia, Italy; her roommate, American Amanda Knox and Knox's Italian boyfriend, Raffaele Sollecito (rah-fy-EHL'-ay soh-LEH'-chee-toh), were convicted of killing Kercher,

but both were later exonerated. (Rudy Guede (GAY'-day), a petty criminal who was convicted separately in the case, was released from prison in November 2021 after serving most of a 16-year sentence.)

In 2016, ending a championship drought that had lasted since 1908, the Chicago Cubs won the World Series, defeating the Cleveland Indians 8-7 in extra innings.

In 2020, in the closing hours of the presidential campaign, President Donald Trump charged across the nation delivering an incendiary but false allegation that the election was rigged, while Democrat Joe Biden pushed to claim states that were once seen as safely Republican.

Ten years ago: Four days before Election Day, President Barack Obama accused Mitt Romney of scaring voters with lies, while the Republican challenger warned grimly of political paralysis and another recession if Obama reclaimed the White House. The New York City Marathon was canceled when Mayor Michael Bloomberg reversed himself and yielded to mounting criticism that it was no time to be running a race in the wake of Superstorm Sandy.

Freeport, AzSOC among education honorees at "An InspirED Evening"

In an inaugural event held October 20 in Phoenix, "An InspirED Evening," **Education Forward Arizona** celebrated innovative education programs and leaders across Arizona. Honorees included the Freeport McMoRan Foundation and the Arizona Student Opportunity Collaborative (AzSOC), an enterprise led by Miami Junior-Senior High School Principal Glen Lineberry. During the event **Education Forward Arizona** presented both with North Star Awards, in the Postsecondary Education and High School categories respectively.

Freeport was recognized for its Native American scholarship program, which has provided more than 374 scholarships over the past 12 years. In April

2022 the Freeport McMo-Ran Foundation boosted scholarship investments by \$6 million, with a goal of helping 200 Native American students in Arizona earn a college degree or credential by 2027.

"Every student deserves an opportunity to create the future that they want for themselves," said Freeport McMoRan Foundation President, and Freeport Director of Community Development, Tracy Bame. "The best enabler of that is education. Access to a high-quality education and a higher education is what supports students in reaching their dreams and goals, and achieving whatever future they wish for themselves."

Collaborative, a group of rural school leaders, is increasing access to advanced educational opportunities for rural students. By leveraging highly qualified teachers serving in rural schools, AzSOC was able to provide students with access to higher-level math, science and advanced placement courses at no cost to students or schools. The organization also partners with Arizona colleges and universities to help maximize affordable dual enrollment opportunities, as well as CTE certifications.

"What we're able to do is connect students who need these courses with the teachers and the curriculum so they can learn and gain the knowledge that they need in order to

take advanced courses," said Lineberry. "That way, they are able to compete on a level playing field when they get to a university, into the job market or into advanced vocational training."

Also receiving North Star Awards were Tempe PRE, a full-day community preschool partnership led by the City of Tempe (Early Learning category), and Read Better Be Better, an after-school literacy program for schools across the state (Elementary and Middle School category). In addition, Education Forward Arizona honored Benito Almanza, Bank of America's

Arizona President, with a Luminary Award.

"Education Forward Arizona represents the willingness of people from all parts of the state - those of different races and ethnicities: those from rural. suburban and urban areas: and those from business, education, philanthropic, nonprofit and other sectors - to work differently, collaboratively and more effectively to create better education opportunities, from early learning through postsecondary attainment," said President and CEO Rich Nickel.



Director James Gunn, Peter Safran to co-lead DC Studios

James Gunn, the writer-director who revived "The Suicide Squad" and made the "Guardians of the Galaxy" household names for Marvel, will soon be responsible for the future of Batman, Superman and the entire DC Universe for Warner Bros. Discovery. The studio on Tuesday named Gunn and veteran executive Peter Safran co-chairmen and CEOs of the newly formed DC Studios

The roles will have Gunn and Safran developing a long-term plan for the com-

pany's DC Comics properties, in film, television and animation. Both will continue to also produce, develop and direct individual projects, the studio said.

"We're honored to be the stewards of these DC characters we've loved since we were children," said Gunn and Safran in a written statement. "Our commitment to Superman, Batman, Wonder Woman, Aquaman, Harley Quinn, and the rest of the DC stable of characters is only equaled by our commitment to the wonder of human possibility these characters represent. We're excited to invigorate the theatrical ex-

perience around the world as we tell some of the biggest, most beautiful, and grandest stories ever told."

Safran has produced many films for Warner Bros. and New Line Cinema, including Gunn's "The Suicide Squad" as well as "Aquaman," "Shazam" and the horror films in "The Conjuring" universe.

Starting Nov. 1, Gunn and Safran will report directly to David Zaslav, the president and CEO of Warner Bros. Discovery, who praised their "singular and complementary talents" in a statement.

"Their decades of experience in filmmaking, close

ties to the creative community, and proven track record thrilling superhero fans around the globe make them uniquely qualified to develop a long-term strategy across film, TV, and animation, and take this iconic franchise to the next level of creative storytelling," Zaslav continued.


For the past four years, Walter Hamada headed what was previously called DC Films but officially departed the studio last week, ahead of the theatrical launch of "Black Adam." Zaslav had promised a "reset" to the studio's DC operations in an overhaul to implement a more Marvel-like 10-year

structure and improve quality, and with that, bring in a more centralized creative executive, akin to Marvel's Kevin Feige. Some in Hollywood were surprised Tuesday when, instead, two were named.

Unlike Marvel, DC has several different threads operating simultaneously in its films with Todd Phillips' "Joker" sequel and Matt Reeves' "The Batman," in addition to the films of Henry Cavill's Superman, who made an appearance in "Black Adam."

Gunn, the rare filmmaker to have active projects with both main superhero powerhouses, is also wrapping up his "Guardians of the Galaxy" trilogy, which is expected in May, and he'll have a "Guardians" holiday special on Disney+ in November too — the trailer was revealed just shortly before the DC announcement.

Mike De Luca and Pam Abdy, co-chairpersons and CEOs of Warner Bros. Film Group, said in a joint statement that, "to have them both committing to work together to forge this new era for DC is a literal dream come true. We all share a very similar sensibility and passion for this universe and the stars couldn't have aligned any better."







CASA of Arizona Celebrates National Adoption Day with hundreds of adoptions this year

With adoptions taking place across the country for National Adoption Day in November, CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocates) of Arizona will celebrate this milestone with hundreds of children across the state who have found their forever, loving homes this year.

National Adoption Day is a collective effort to raise awareness of the more than 115,000 children waiting to be adopted from foster care in the United States. Each November, children across the country get to celebrate a new life with loving families. In many of these cases, a CASA advocate has been there to support the child along the way.

On any given day, there are more than 11,500 children and youth in Arizona

living in foster homes, group homes or shelters, or with relatives, due to neglect and abuse. At present, more than 10,000 of these children don't have access to a CASA volunteer to advocate for their best interest.

A family in Arizona recently experienced the gift of adoption as they formally adopted a sevenyear-old boy and four-yearold girl whom they had fostered since the youngest was seven months old. The day coincided with the girl's four-year birthday and the family threw a neighborhood party for everyone who had been involved to celebrate this new sense of security that their son described with these words: "I belong now. This is my family."

"This is a new start for

these children," said the adopted father and mother in this case — Joe and Christina. "Seeing the kids get something good in their life and finally finding a life full of love provides such a sense of relief and happiness for us all — and we couldn't have gotten to this point without CASA."

CASA volunteers are everyday members of the community who are appointed by a judge to represent the best interest of abused and neglected children during a dependency case. Their role is to act as a consistent adult presence for a child in foster care as they go through court proceedings and adjust to life in their temporary homes — to walk the walk with the child and let them know they're not alone.

"CASAs are desperately

needed because they advocate for each child's best interest above anything else," said Joe and Christina. "The minute our CASA volunteer was appointed, we felt a positive shift in the case with progress being made to establish stability and permanency in the children's lives. Our CASA volunteer provided us with the miracle these children so desperately needed."

CASA volunteers have the unique opportunity to make a huge, direct impact in the lives of children — while also becoming integral parts of the CASA program, court process and families' lives. "If you're looking for an opportunity to change someone's life and set them on a completely different life path, becoming a CASA is

for you," said CASA volunteer Al, who has been with the program for nine years. "For me, the idea that I've put these kids into a home where I know they will be loved and cared for — and if they get a boo-boo, mom and dad will put a band-aid on it — is irreplaceable. I can make time for that any day."

CASA of Arizona is seeking volunteers to fill the caseload gap in the state, including all 15 Arizona counties. Further, CASA of Arizona is seeking to increase the diversity and demographics of its volunteers. Volunteers with CASA of Arizona do not need any prior special training and can come from all walks of life. Anyone 21 years of age or older, who can pass a thorough background check and complete required training, is encouraged to apply. Another way to get involved is a program with similar requirements called the Foster Care Review Board (FCRB) in which volunteers are appointed by the Court to a five-member panel that meets one weekday per month to review the cases of children in foster care.

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

Bacon makes pumpkin pie even better

Pumpkin pie is a fall favorite, but it's also a perfect pie to serve throughout the holiday season.

There are many different pumpkin pie recipes, even though it's difficult to improve on pumpkin pie which is known for its creamy consistency and warm spices. But pumpkin pie can be even more delicious with the addition of an extra-special ingredient: bacon.

Joe's Incredible Bacon **Pumpkin Pie**


Serves 12

1/2 cup cubed fresh pumpkin

11/2 cups cream cheese, softened

- cup packed brown sugar
 - 3 eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
 - 1 cup half-and-half
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1/2 teaspoon ground allspice
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cloves

- (10-inch) pared graham cracker pie crusts
- 16 slices maplecured bacon
 - 1. Preheat oven to 425 F.
- 2. Bring a small pot of salted water to a boil; add the pumpkin and cook until soft enough to easily pierce with a fork, about 10 minutes. Drain.
- 3. Mash the cooked pumpkin with a potato masher in your favorite large bowl. Mix the cream cheese and brown sugar with the mashed pumpkin. Whisk in the eggs one at a time. Add the vanilla, halfand-half, cinnamon, ginger, allspice and cloves; stir



until you have a thin batter. The batter should be slightly thinner than pancake batter. Pour the batter into the pie crusts.

4. Place the bacon in a

large skillet over medium heat until evenly brown. Trim soft, fatty bits from strips. Press seven pieces of bacon into the batter of each pie with a fork.

5. Bake the pies in the preheated oven for 15 minutes. Decrease the heat to 375 F. Top each pie with two pieces of cooked bacon and bake.
