Defying inflation worries, US casinos have best quarter

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) — Inflation? High gas prices? American gamblers are shrugging them off — and losing money at casinos at a record pace.

Figures released Wednesday show the U.S. commercial casino industry had its best quarter ever, winning over \$15 billion from gamblers in the third quarter of this year.

Globe Ranger District prepares for prescribed burn

PHOENIX — Fire officials on the Globe Ranger District are preparing for a prescribed burn near the Timber Camp Campground on the Globe Ranger District Nov. 16-18, 2022.

The purpose of this 290acre burn along Ash Creek is to reintroduce fire into the ponderosa pine stands to help protect them from the negative impacts of uncharacteristically intense wildfire. The management action of introducing fire helps move the area towards the desired conditions by allowing for watershed protection, wildlife habitat improvement and the improvement of ecosystem function.

The Tonto National Forest land management strategy is centered on long-term forest and watershed health and that strategy includes using prescribed burns to reduce fuels for the protection of communities and critical infrastructure.

Experienced fire and fuels specialists on the Tonto National Forest build prescribed burn plans using the most up-to-date science and modeling along with their combined on-

Association, the trade organization for the casino industry, says the gambling halls are on track to have their best year ever in 2022. Out of 33 states in which gambling was operational a year ago, 16 reported quarterly highs in overall gambling revenue, including five of the six largest markets: Indiana, Michigan, Nevada, New York and Pennsylvania.

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success," said Bill Miller, a the association's president and CEO. "Our sustained (momentum in the face of broader economic volatility points to gaming's f overall health today and provides confidence as we look to the future."

to fuel our industry's record

bavid Schwartz, a gambling historian at the University of Nevada Las Vegas, said people are clearly still willing to lay their money down at casinos, regardless of economic conditions.

"I think it speaks to the continuing appeal of gambling, and that there may be even more appetite for it in uncertain times," he said, citing the recent Powerball jackpot which exceeded \$2 billion and drew wide interest from people across the country.

The commercial casinos (excluding tribal casinos, which report revenue separately) won \$15.17 billion from gamblers in July, August and September of this year. That exceeded the previous record of \$14.81 billion, set in the second quarter of this year, by 2%.

Miller said the casinos' year-over-year growth rate in the third quarter of 8.8% outperformed the broader U.S. economy's growth rate of 2.6% in the same period.

Land-based slots and table games continue to be the foundation for the industry's revenue growth, generating a record \$12.27 billion in the third quarter, an increase of 1.8% percent from the same period

a year ago.

Sports betting also set a quarterly revenue record of \$1.68 billion, up nearly 81% from a year ago. Seven new sports betting markets were added since Sept. 2021. The association cited a higher than usual sportsbook win percentage and solid growth in existing markets as factors in the increase.

Sports betting revenue through September has already reached an all-time annual high of \$4.78 billion, beating 2021's fullyear record of \$4.34 billion.

Internet gambling came close to setting a new quarterly record, but was less than 1% away from doing so, with \$1.21 billion in revenue.

Prescribed burns are conducted within the parameters of these "prescription" burn plans that determine the appropriate fuel moisture, temperature, humidity, wind and ventilation that is needed to conduct these operations safely.

"While prescribed burns are effective at reducing hazardous fuels, there are risks, and we take every precaution to conduct prescribed burns across the landscape in the safest way possible," said Fire Staff Officer Taiga Rohrer. "Prescription burns can change the behavior of a future wildfire to a less intense, more manageable surface fire, making it safer for firefighters to engage."

Fire specialists anticipate smoke impacts to US Highway 60. Officials urge motorists to use extreme caution while driving through these areas and to slow down for the safety of firefighters and the public.

Benjamin was born 14 years ago with a rare congenital heart defect known as HLHS disease. Hypoplastic left heart syndrome is a form of congenital heart disease in which the whole left half of the heart (including the aorta, aortic valve, left ventricle and mitral valve) is underdeveloped (hypoplastic). Benjamin has had three open heart surgeries along with two pacemaker surgeries in the past 14 years to keep his ticker tick-tocking.

Early this year his heart has been deteriorating. He

started the evaluation process last week to ensure he was a good candidate for a transplant and thankfully he is. He has been placed on the transplant list as tier 1A high priority. He will remain in ICU until he receives his new heart.



3-term Democratic Arizona Rep. Tom O'Halleran defeated

Work on Amster Building

PHOENIX (AP) - Democratic Rep. Tom O'Halleran, the most vulnerable incumbent in Arizona's ninemember congressional delegation, has been defeated after a spirited challenge from a Republican.

Businessman and former Navy Seal Eli Crane defeated the three-term incumbent on Thursday as more votes were counted from the election. Crane banked on redistricting making it easy to knock off O'Halleran.

Crane will now represent the sprawling 2nd Congressional District, which covers much of northeastern Arizona and

dips south to the northern Tucson suburbs. Redistricting remade the district into one that strongly favors the GOP by drawing in the Prescott area.

O'Halleran leaned on his moderate voting record, name ID and consistent work across the district that includes the Navaio Nation to hold onto the seat.

Crane had former President Donald Trump's backing and the new Republican advantage in the district in his favor.

Besides O'Halleran's district, three others among Arizona's nine congressional seats were in play in the

Section of destroyed shuttle Challenger found on ocean floor

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) - A large section of the destroyed space shuttle Challenger has been found buried in sand at the bottom of the Atlantic, more than three decades after the tragedy that killed a schoolteacher and six others.

NASA's Kennedy Space Center announced the discovery Thursday.

"Of course, the emotions come back, right?" said Michael Ciannilli, a NASA manager who confirmed the remnant's authenticity. When he saw the underwater video footage, "My heart skipped a beat, I must say, and it brought me right back to 1986 ... and what we all went through as a nation."

It's one of the biggest pieces of Challenger found in the decades since the accident, according to Ciannilli, and the first remnant to be discovered since two fragments from

the left wing washed ashore in 1996.

Divers for a TV documentary first spotted the piece in March while look-

ing for wreckage of a World War II plane. NASA verified through video a few months ago that the piece was part of the shuttle that broke apart shortly after liftoff on Jan. 28, 1986. All seven on board were killed, including the first schoolteacher bound for space, Christa McAuliffe.

The underwater video provided "pretty clear and convincing evidence," said Ciannilli.

The piece is more than 15 feet by 15 feet (4.5 meters by 4.5 meters); it's likely bigger because part of it is covered with sand. Because there are square thermal tiles on the piece, it's believed to be from the shuttle's belly, Ciannilli said.

The fragment remains on the ocean floor just off the Florida coast near Cape Canaveral as NASA determines the next step. It remains the

property of the U.S. government. The families of all seven Challenger crew members have been notified.

"We want to make sure whatever we do, we do the right thing for the legacy of the crew," Ciannilli said.

Roughly 118 tons (107 metric tons) of Challenger debris have been recovered since the accident. That represents about 47% of the entire vehicle, including parts of the two solid-fuel boosters and external fuel tank.

Most of the recovered wreckage remains buried in abandoned missile silos at Cape Canaveral Space Force Station. The exception is a left side shuttle panel on display at Kennedy Space Center's visitor complex, alongside the charred cockpit window frame from shuttle Columbia, which broke apart over Texas during reentry in 2003, killing seven astronauts.

Far less has been recovered of Columbia — 42 tons (38 metric tons) representing 38% of the shuttle. The Columbia remains are stored in converted offices inside Kennedy's massive hangar.

Launched on an exceptionally cold morning, Challenger was brought down by eroded O-ring seals in the right booster. Columbia ended up with a slashed left wing, the result of foam insulation breaking off the external fuel tank at liftoff. Mismanagement was also blamed.

Forest Service prepares for prescribed burn on Pleasant Valley

PHOENIX — Fire specialists on the Tonto National Forest are preparing for prescribed burn operations south of Forest Road 512 near Gruwell Canyon on the Pleasant Valley Ranger District Nov. 16-18, 2022.

Crews plan to burn 543 acres 6 miles northeast of Young, Arizona to reduce the risk of destructive wildfires to surrounding communities, ranches and critical infrastructure. The Tonto National Forest land management strategy is centered on long-term forest health and that strategy includes reducing forest fuels and using prescribed burning on the landscape.

Prescribed burns are conducted within a "prescription" that is determined by appropriate fuel moisture, temperature, humidity, wind and ventilation. Experienced fire and fuels specialists on the Tonto National Forest build prescribed burn plans using the most up-to-date science and modeling along with their combined onthe-ground fire and fuels experience.

ment, evaluate, check, and patrol each burn to ensure it meets the goals and objectives outlined in the prescribed fire plans," said Fire Staff Officer Taiga Rohrer. "After a prescribed fire is completed, if a future wildfire reaches the area, the fire behavior will likely be modified to a less intense, more manageable surface fire, making it safer for firefighters to engage."

The Forest Service will post signs on roads likely to be affected by smoke. Fire specialists anticipate daytime smoke impacts to Forest Service Road 512 and nighttime impacts to the town of Young. Officials urge motorists to use extreme caution while driving through these areas and to slow down for the safety of firefighters and the public.

To minimize the impact of smoke, fire specialists will terminate ignitions by 3 p.m. Affected communities should remain aware of smoke advisories and conditions. Learn more about smoke impacts on the Arizona Department of Environmental Quality website.



> > Jalapeño Pork Stew With Pickled Onions

4 tablespoons olive oil

5 pounds boneless pork shoulder or butt, trimmed and cut into 2-inch pieces

2 tablespoons ground cumin

Kosher salt and black pepper 3 tablespoons all-

purpose flour 1 cup fresh orange juice

1 14.5-ounce can diced tomatoes, drained

cloves garlic 12 1 to 2 jalapeño pep-

pers, seeded and sliced

1 large red onion, thinly sliced

1/4 cup red wine vinegar 1

1-pound package frozen cut okra

11/2 cups grits

Heat oven to 325 F. Heat 2 tablespoons of the oil in a large ovenproof pot or Dutch oven over medium-high heat. Season the pork with the cumin, 11/2 teaspoons salt and 1/2 teaspoon black pepper. In batches, cook the pork until browned, turning occasionally, 6 to 8 minutes; transfer to a plate.

Add the flour and the remaining 2 tablespoons of oil to the pot and cook, stirring for 1 minute. Add the orange juice, tomatoes, garlic, jalapeños, and 4 cups water and bring to a boil. Return the pork to the pot, cover, transfer to oven, and cook until the pork is tender, 21/2 to 3 hours.

Meanwhile, in a small bowl, toss the onion with the vinegar, 1/2 cup water, and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Let sit, tossing occasionally, for at least 30 minutes (and up to 4 hours).

Skim off and discard any fat from the stew. Add the okra. Cover the pot, return it to the oven, and cook until the okra is tender, about 15 minutes. If the stew is too thin, place the pot on the stove and simmer, uncovered, until thickened, 5 to 10 minutes more.

Meanwhile, cook the grits according to the package directions. Serve with the stew and marinated onions.
