Low-cost rabies clinic, dog tags & adoptions

Your dog needs the rabies vaccine? Maybe also the dog tag that accompanies your canine compadre's annual license - and which is required by law? Get either, or both - or even bring home a new four-legged family member - Oct. 15 when Gila County Animal Care & Control hosts a low-cost rabies clinic. If you haven't visited and toured the new shelter, here's a fine reason to meet the staff and see for yourself the impressive upgrade that Gila County Government completed one year ago with the new facility, located across from the Go-Kart track, along the road out to the Gila County Fairgrounds. For a Saturday special, rabies shots are \$15 during the Oct. 15 event, and if your dog's license needs renewal - or you're getting one for the first time – that's just \$5. For just \$20 your furry friend will be in compliance with all state laws and regulations - and a license proves the animal belongs to you, if it goes astray and ends up housed at Gila County Animal Care & Control. Additionally, all animals at the shelter will be available for adoption for just \$25 each, and that includes spay/neuter, shots, micro-chipping – and that Gila County license. The new shelter is at 591 E. Fairgrounds Rd. BLM starts Middle Gila South Transportation Plan

TUCSON – The Bureau of Land Management Tucson Field Office is starting an access and transportation management planning process that will designate roads

and trails on BLM lands in the Middle Gila South travel management planning area. The resulting travel management plan will identify the transportation system that will be maintained for multiple land use activities, public land infrastructure, hunting and

other recreational opportunities

These public lands provide outstanding opportunities for hunting deer, javelina, quail and other species, along with off highway vehicle driving, mountain biking, equestrian riding, sightseeing, camping and other recreational activities in scenic

Sonoran Desert mountain and canvon landscapes.

The public is invited to provide input on access needs, issues and concerns until Nov. 17, 2022. The BLM will consider input to evaluate the existing route system, determine appropriate management designations and options, and analyze the

potential impacts from the access and transportation route designations.

The planning area includes approximately 60,000 acres of BLM land about 40 to 60 miles from Tucson, near small communities in Cochise, Gila, Pima and Pinal counties. BLM lands include approximately 700 miles of existing routes intermingled with Arizona State Trust and other lands. Most of the existing routes are unmaintained primitive roads or trails in poor conditions,

with drainage and erosion problems.

"Arizona's growing population and increased seasonal visitation create great demand for outdoor recreation," said Gila District Manager Scott Feldhausen. "By designating and maintaining the public land access routes, visitors will enjoy a variety of recreational opportunities and the BLM will better manage the area, reducing environmental impacts and conflicts with other public land uses."

The BLM will conduct two virtual Zoom meetings to provide information about the project and how to participate in the planning process:

An environmental assessment for the proposed access and transportation management plan will be prepared in accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act, and opportunities for public review and comment will be available at milestone stages throughout the process.

Completion of the access and transportation management plan and environmental assessment is expected in July 2023.

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Today in History: October 12, China arrests "Gang of Four"

Today is Wednesday, Oct. 12, the 285th day of 2022. There are 80 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Oct. 12, 1976, it was announced in China that Hua Guofeng had been named to succeed the late Mao Zedong as chairman of the Communist Party; it was also announced that Mao's widow and three others, known as the "Gang of Four," had been arrested.

On this date:

In 1492 (according to the Old Style calendar), Christopher Columbus' expedition arrived in the present-day Bahamas.

In 1792, the first recorded U.S. celebration of Columbus Day was held to mark the tricentennial of Christopher Columbus' landing.

In 1870, General Robert E. Lee died in Lexington, Virginia, at age 63.

In 1933, bank robber John Dillinger escaped from a jail in Allen County, Ohio, with the help of his gang, who killed the sheriff, Jess Sarber.

In 1971, the rock opera "Jesus Christ Superstar" opened at the Mark Hellinger Theatre on Broadway.

In 1973, President Richard Nixon nominated House minority leader Gerald R. Ford of Michigan to succeed Spiro T. Agnew as vice president.

In 1984, British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher escaped an attempt on her life when an Irish Republican Army bomb exploded at a hotel in Brighton, England, killing five people.

In 1986, the superpower meeting in Reykjavik, Iceland, ended in stalemate, with President Ronald Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev unable to agree on arms control or a date for a full-fledged summit in the United States.

In 2000, 17 sailors were killed in a suicide bomb attack on the destroyer USS Cole in Yemen.

In 2002, bombs blamed on al-Qaida-linked militants destroyed a nightclub on the Indonesian island of Bali, killing 202 people, including 88 Australians and seven Americans.

In 2007, former Vice President Al Gore and the U.N.'s Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change won the Nobel Peace Prize for sounding the alarm over global warming.

In 2011, a Nigerian al-

Qaida operative pleaded guilty to trying to bring down a jetliner with a bomb in his underwear; Umar Farouk Abdulmutallab (OO'-mahr fah-ROOK' ahb-DOOL'-moo-TAH'-lahb) defiantly told a federal judge in Detroit that he had acted in retaliation for the killing of Muslims worldwide.

Ten years ago: Thousands of supporters and opponents of Egyptian President Mohammed Morsi clashed in Cairo's Tahrir Square in the first such violence since Morsi took office more than three months earlier. The European Union won the Nobel Peace Prize for fostering peace on a continent long ravaged by war.

Five years ago: The Trump administration said it would "immediately" halt payments to insurers under the Obama-era health care law. President Donald Trump lashed out at hurricane-devastated Puerto Rico, saying the fed-

eral government can't keep sending help "forever" and suggesting that the U.S. territory was to blame for its financial struggles.

One year ago: The New Jersey Nets said Kyrie Irving could not play or practice with them until he could be a full participant: New York City required professional athletes to be vaccinated against COVID-19 in order to play or practice in public venues. (Irving would be allowed to rejoin the team for out-of-town games in January 2022, and for home games two months later.) The head of the Chicago police officers union called on its members to defy the city's requirement to report their COVID-19 vaccination status or be placed on unpaid leave. The Boeing Co. told employees they must be vaccinated against CO-VID-19 or possibly be fired. Florida issued its first fine to a county that it said had violated a new state law banning coronavirus vaccine mandates; Leon County was fined \$3.5 million.



Payson Ranger District restoration improves forest health for ponderosa pine and Emory oak

Phoenix, October 7, 2022 - The Tonto National Forest is implementing two mastication projects to restore ponderosa pine and Emory oak stands on the Payson Ranger District.

The Myrtle project near the community of Meads Ranch is currently treating 502 acres using mastication. The overall project objective is to restore the tree and brush species composition and forest structure within the 1990 Dude Fire burn area. The resulting treatments will make the landscape resilient to drought, and reduce the risk of severe wildfire and climate impacts.

The project will entail decreasing the density of trees and shrub species where appropriate using mastication equipment to shred smaller trees and brush to reduce species competing for nutrients, water, and sun. This will allow ponderosa pine planted in the 1990s to flourish. Additional reforestation ef-

forts will be implemented as needed and the project is expected to last through December 2022.

The effects of these treatments will cause the project area to shift to a state of "low" fire hazard. with conditions conducive to the reintroduction of low severity fire which is more natural to improving forest health and reduces the risk of wildfires to surrounding communities.

EOCTRI seeks to restore large Emory oak groves throughout Arizona and ensure the sustainability of subsistence foods for Arizona tribes. This project will

specifically benefit Apache and Yavapai groups as the Emory oak is an important traditional food and has spiritual and cultural significance. Tribal partners for the project include the White Mountain Apache Tribe, Yavapai-Apache Nation, and Tonto Apache Tribe.

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Fan who caught Aaron Judge's 62nd HR offered \$2M for ball

The owner of a sports memorabilia auction house says he has offered \$2 million to the fan who caught Aaron Judge's American League-record 62nd home run.

JP Cohen, president of Memory Lane Inc. in Tustin, California, told The Associated Press on Wednesday that he has texted and emailed Cory Youmans, the man who caught Judge's milestone shot Tuesday night at Globe Life Field in Arlington, Texas. Cohen says Youmans has not yet replied.

"I feel the offer is way above fair, if he is inclined to sell it," Cohen said in a telephone interview with the AP on Wednesday.

Youmans grabbed the historic souvenir on the fly as itsailed into the front row of section 31 in left field. The homer pushed Judge past Roger Maris for the AL season record — a mark many consider baseball's "clean" standard because the only National League players who hit more have been tarnished by ties to steroids.

Youmans, who is from Dallas, works in the financial world. He was asked Tuesday what he planned to do with the prize while security personnel whisked him away to have it authenticated.

"Good question. I haven't thought about it," he said.



BASEBALL NOTES

Yankees slugger Aaron Judge wasn't in the starting lineup for New York's regular-season finale Wednesday, a day after his 62nd home run that broke Roger Maris' 61-year-old American League single-season record.

When Judge homered in the first inning Tuesday night, in the second game of a doubleheader against the Texas Rangers, it was his 55th consecutive game. He has played in 157 games overall for the AL East champions.

The record price for a home run ball is \$3 million, paid for Mark McGwire's record 70th from the 1998 season.

Cohen had previously pledged to offer \$2 million for Judge's 62nd homer. He said his company has a good relationship with the Yankees and it would be willing to loan the ball to the team for an exhibit. He added the team has frequently exhibited items owned by Memory Lane at Yankee Stadium.

"We did make an offer of \$2 million and that offer is still valid." Cohen said.

After the Yankees lost 3-2, Judge said he didn't have possession of the home run ball.

"I don't know where it's at," he said. "We'll see what happens with that. It would be great to get it back, but that's a souvenir for a fan. He made a great catch out there, and they've got every right to it."

Youmans was among

the crowd of 38,832, the largest to watch a base-ball game at the 3-year-old ballpark.

We need to be careful about not only what we say but also how we say it.

Words are powerful. They can either tear down or build up. As we saw yesterday, harsh remarks can cause a destructive chain reaction—like the damage a lit match could do to a forest. In contrast, kind comments feel like a light summer rain that brings relief from the day's heat.

We should always be careful about what we say. Scripture clearly condemns gossip, deception, complaining,

slander, angry outbursts, foul language and vulgar joking. Yet the goal isn't simply to avoid all bad speech; it's to speak truth in an uplifting manner. After all, even correction can be delivered in a way that's encouraging.

Sometimes the problem is not so much what we say but how we say it. Oftentimes our tone of voice and body language convey much more than our words do. Nonverbal signals can reveal

impatience, resentment, anger, malice and bitterness—all of which tear others down. But wordless signals can instead edify by showing love, compassion, appreciation and gratitude.

In terms of godly behavior we all fall short of perfection, but if we saturate our mind with God's Word He'll transform our heart, attitudes and speech. And when our words are gracious, others are blessed and God is glorified.

Claiming a Promise of God

Today's passage says God is faithful to fulfill His promises. But if you're like most Christians, you have probably felt as if He's let you down at some point. Perhaps you found a promise in Scripture and believed the Lord would do it, but He hasn't. The problem isn't God's faithfulness; more than likely, there's a misunderstanding of His promises. So, when evaluating whether a passage applies to you, ask these questions:

Is there a condition to the promise? If so, we must meet that requirement. Otherwise, it won't apply to us.

Am I asking for a need or a desire? God assures us He'll provide whatever He considers necessary to complete His work in our life (2 Peter 1:3). But that doesn't include everything we want.

These guidelines will help us discern which promises are ours. But we should remember that some might be fulfilled only in eternity. When that's the case, we can look to the saints of Hebrews 11 as role models. They took God at His word-even if they didn't see His promises fulfilled in their lifetime.

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Stellar Vista **Observatory** Sky Report

The solar system is pretty flat and the moon and

planets orbit in more-orless the same plane, which we see edge-on as we look up into the sky. The planets pass each other as they orbit the sun at their differing speeds. When one passes another they're in "conjunction," and conjunctions are always visually interesting, especially if one passes exceptionally close to the other. Rarest of all conjunctions are "occultations" when one passes in front of another. Planets are tiny targets, and it's a remarkable coincidence when their alignment is so exact that one positions itself directly in front of another.



The last planetary occultation was in 1818 and the next not until 2065 (both Venus in front of Jupiter; don't hold out for the one in 2065 because they will be so near the sun it won't be visible). So it is common for a person to live a long life without seeing one planet occult another.

by the Occultations moon, however, are a different matter; the moon is huge in the sky compared to a planet and it moves across the sky much faster than a planet. This brings us to a rare occultation of a planet by the moon this coming Tuesday, October 11.

that carries it around the earth, and around the sky, once a month, carries the moon in front of Uranus. One hour after moonrise. which is about as soon as you can expect to see Uranus, the little planet will be 1.1° (two moon-diameters) to the lower-left of the waning gibbous moon. Uranus will look like a faint star. People have seen Uranus with the naked eye under ideal conditions, but not so close to the bright moon. The occultation will be easy to observe if you have any telescope or that pair of binoculars I've urged every stargazer to own. (Amazon and Big 5 have starter binoculars for under \$50; I recommend 7x50; second choice 10x50; get a pair you can attach to a cheap camera tripod.)

As time passes, watch the moon approach Uranus. Uranus is 3.6 arcseconds in diameter, so without a magnification of at least 150x it looks like a star. At 10:22 MDT Uranus is 1/2° from the moon, and at 10:54 the moon's bright edge slides over the planet in an event that takes several seconds.

Uranus reappears from behind the dark limb of the moon at 11:44 in an event that will be visually more interesting because the planet will seem to materialize out of nowhere next to the moon.

The occultation is visible from the NW half of the United States and Canada. The time "10:54" is valid for southern Utah; elsewhere the time will be different (from Denver, for example, it is 11:08). Details are at https://is.gd/ uranusoccultation.
