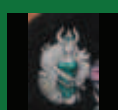

How to choose a church: The Pastor

When it comes to finding a new church home, here's the elephant in the living room: the pastor.

First and foremost, you need to feel rapport with a prospective pastor. Do you feel a close and harmonious relationship with that individual? Does that church's human leader understand your feelings and ideas and communicate well with you? Is he or she interested in you? Does Pastor X love crowds or love people? We like others to be fair with us, so be fair to a

prospective pastor. Relationships take time to develop. First impressions may be important but like fine wine, a healthy pastor/parishioner partnership may need time to mature.

Next, do that preacher's sermons nourish you spiritually? Do you find yourself looking forward to the next worship service led by that minister? After the sermon and service end, do you feel inwardly satisfied? Do that leader's words give you something to chew on and sustain you for the days ahead?

Let's dig a little deeper. Are the messages Christ-centered? Are Father, Son, Holy

Spirit, the complete Trinity, honored? Has careful thought, prayerful preparation and Biblical faithfulness gone into the address?

"Pastor" means "shepherd." Our Navajo friends know not to rush sheep from one place to another, but to take time leading them to pasture, water, a safe place to bed down for the night. Is this shepherd patient but does he or she also lead in clear directions?

Does your prospective pastor hide behind a bunch of rules or is he or she a Real Person? Even Jesus could not measure up to all the Pharisees' regulations in Luke 11!

Our Lord complimented them for observing the law but chided them for neglecting justice and the love of God. Do you find a balanced, Scripture-based approach in your new pastor's orientation? Does this person respect your boundaries and keep confidences? If not, keep looking for someone who feels like an ally, who cheers you on, who truly wants what's best for you and who understands the central message of the Bible is, "God loves you."

A good pastor has a clear head and a warm heart. Do you find this balance in that candidate for becoming your next pastor?

Graduating with a degree in teaching, she felt good but the feeling did not last long for she could not find work. Why? The answer was slow in coming. She did get a position teaching in a lumber camp where she felt disconnected and discouraged.

In her depression she wrote a hymn, "So Send I You...to Loneliness and longing, forsaking home and kindred, friend and dear one." Years later she realized that the lessons learned in that situation could not have been taught in school.

In a better frame of mind, she wrote the hymn. "So send I you - by grace made strong to triumph o'er hosts of hell, darkness, death and sin." A beautiful answer to her several "Why?"s.

Stellar Vista Observatory Sky Report

First, a quick run-down of the three planets visible tonight.

Saturn is already up when the sun sets, and at the end of twilight you'll find it low in the southeast, where it's noticeably brighter than any nearby star. Saturn is highest around 11 p.m., and that's the best time to observe it with a telescope, when it's above the densest, warmest and most turbulent layers of our atmosphere. Saturn is in eastern Capricornus. Be sure to finagle a look at Saturn through a friend's telescope in the next month or two.

Jupiter rises in the east during evening twilight and is up before the sky is fully dark. Jupiter is by far the brightest object in the evening sky. It's in Pisces, in an area of the sky that is totally absent of any bright stars.

Mars rises before midnight. It's brighter than any

star until Sirius rises, and its orange color gives it away.

Autumn begins at 7:04 p.m. MDT on the 22nd. That's the date when the sun rises due east and sets due west – one of 2 days of the year it does this (the equinoxes). The day and night are equal in length, and sunrise and sunset would be 6 a.m. and 6 p.m. if you were in the center of your time zone and if it were not for Daylight Saving Time. For the next six months – in the northern hemisphere – the nights will be longer than the days.

The moon aligns with the sun and is new at 3:54:34 p.m. MDT on September 25, and that begins a new lunar month. But how long is a month? The lengths of our calendar months were established by Julius Caesar in 46 BC and modified (and messed up) by his nephew Augustus a few years later, and their lengths are by decree: 30, 31 or 28, but sometimes 29, days. There are two lengths to an as-

tronomical lunar month, depending on what you measure, and these are indeed measured, not set by decree. They are the time it takes the moon to orbit the earth and get back in front of the same stars (a sidereal month) and the slightly longer time it takes the moon to orbit the earth and get back to alignment with the sun (a synodic month; I mention their names so you can Google them). You have to specify circle the earth with respect to what? The graphic will explain: Note the stars the moon is in front of when it is new on Sept. 25. On Oct. 23 it has moved once around the earth relative to the stars, but during that month the sun has moved eastward 1/2th of the way around the sky, or about 30°. It takes the moon an additional 2 days and 3½ hours to catch up to the sun and become the "new moon" again. The sidereal month is 27.32 days and the synodic month is 29.53 days.

With September designated as "National Self-Improvement Month," CASA of Gila County is asking you to look into volunteering as a child advocate as part of your self-improvement goals.

"With over 100 children in the child welfare system from Gila County communities, we encourage every community member to look at all the ways they can help. We aim to get our community involved in helping our youth who all deserve safe, permanent, loving homes," said CASA of Gila County Coordinator Emily Nader.

When considering the

best volunteer role for you, she urges volunteers to think about the youth living in Arizona's foster care system.

"While we are in dire need of additional adults to volunteer as Court Appointed Special Advocates, we know that the role is unique and not the best fit for every adult looking to make a difference," said Nader, citing the multiple opportunities that are available in Gila County such as volunteering as a CASA, a foster parent, or serving on a Foster Care Review Board. There are multiple options for donating your time to helping

our youth in foster care. Here are a few of these options.

Become a CASA volunteer: A CASA volunteer in Gila County donates approximately 10 hours a month to the child they are appointed to. Their time is used through various tasks such as visiting the child, joining virtual or telephonic meetings with the team and documenting their volunteer activities. No special background or education is required to become a CASA volunteer, a caring and generous group that represents a wide range of cultures and professions, and educational and eth-

nic backgrounds. Once accepted into the program, CASA volunteers receive all necessary training. CASA volunteers must be at least 21 years old and willing to complete necessary background checks, provide references and participate in an interview. While serving as a child's CASA volunteer, you will receive ongoing support and assistance from a local CASA Coordinator. Learn more at www.CASAofGilaCounty.org.

Open your home and serve as a foster parent: Foster parents serve the essential role of providing a temporary home for a child or sibling group. While a

child's parent or parents work to remedy the circumstances that brought the child into care, the child needs a safe and consistent place to live. Learn more at <https://dcs.az.gov/foster>.

Volunteer as a member of the Foster Care Review Board. The primary role of FCRB is to advise the juvenile court on progress toward achieving a permanent home for a child involved in a dependency action and in out-of-home placement. Volunteers are assigned to one review board which meets for approximately eight hours one weekday a month;

some rural boards meet less often. Additionally, volunteers must be able to commit approximately six to eight hours at home reviewing case information in preparation for the case review. Learn more about this volunteer opportunity at <https://www.azcourts.gov/fcrb>.

Buying or selling a used vehicle?

PHOENIX – Ready to buy a used car? Don't be deceived.

The Arizona Department of Transportation-Motor Vehicle Division encourages consumers to protect themselves when buying a used vehicle, either from a private party or a used vehicle dealer and advises to follow these steps:

1- Once you find a vehicle you would like to buy, find a mechanic you trust to inspect the vehicle, make sure the odometer has not been tampered with, seller is not attempting to cover up water or collision damage that wasn't properly repaired. Now that we have had so

much rain in our state and country, make sure you 'literally' smell the car, if it has been in a flooded area the car may have a 'musty smell', you can also find mud in the car (under the mats, inside the seat belt system, etc.)... you don't want to have malfunctioning issues of the electrical system or engine in the near future.

2- Verify the vehicle's title doesn't have a lien. Unfortunately, there are unscrupulous sellers that go to an auto-title/loan business and receive a loan against their vehicle one day before they sell it. The auto-title/loan business applies a lien to

that particular vehicle so it can't be sold until the loan is paid.

When a vehicle title has a lien, it can not be transferred to a new owner. Avoid this issue by buying in advance that vehicle's Motor Vehicle Record at an MVD or Third Party office.

3- Before you pay for the new-to-you car, it could be safe to ask the seller to go together to transfer the title at an MVD or Third Party office; it is a way to avoid fraud.

Don't lose your hard earned money, walk away if you see any of these red flags.

If you sold a vehicle, fol-

low these steps:

1- Make sure the title or Title Application of the vehicle you are selling is signed and notarized and provide it to the buyer.

2- Take the license plate off the vehicle before the new owner drives it away.

3- Complete a 'Sold Notice' form either online or by printing a copy from the ADOT-MVD website and submit it to an MVD or Third Party office; you will need the buyer's name and address to complete it. This process takes off any future responsibility once your car has a new owner.

Fire-flood environmental monitoring explained in Miami Sept. 22

After the devastating Telegraph Fire resulted in flash floods one year ago, Miami and Globe residents had concerns about environmental quality: potential contaminants released by the fires and transported by water and wind. On Thursday, Sept. 22, at the Bullion Plaza Cultural Center & Museum in Miami from 5 p.m. to 6:30 p.m., learn more and find out how you can join a community monitoring effort. Light refreshments and food will be served from 5 – 5:30 p.m., followed by a one-hour presentation and discussion starting at 5:30.

Hosted by University of Arizona Department of Environmental Science and Cooperative Extension Gila County, the forum's goal is to unite local residents concerned about environmental quality related to post-fire flooding, gather to discuss project goals and details, and plan for a two-year project where local residents/community scientists will inform the investigation, participate in the scientific process and co-generate environmental monitoring data to inform action.

"Events as massive and landscape-wide as the Telegraph Fire can alter the physical, chemical and biogeochemical properties of the soil and surface materials," said Mónica Ramírez-Andreotta, University of Arizona Associate Professor of Environmental Science. "Wildfires can release contaminants into the soil, and resulting dust can change air quality. It is critical to determine whether these activities are presenting exposure pathways to contaminants. This research

will help communities prepare for compound events and the public health risks posed by the confluence of climate change and resource extraction."

This two-year community science effort and study is cooperatively funded by the National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences and the University of Arizona's College of Agriculture and Life Sciences, and it's a research project likely to have impacts even beyond our local region. Goals include:

- Surveying families to identify areas that have been impacted and determine individual- and community-level vulnerabilities and resiliencies
- Building human capacity through empowerment education and community science, and training residents on how to collect environmental samples and interpret datasets
- Characterizing contaminants released during wildfires

in soil, sediment, and/or settled dust within and around residential areas over time to prepare for future events

- Sharing and reporting data back to participants and providing intervention/prevention strategies to protect families.

"Activities being planned include building a Community Advisory Board (CAB) to inform research and activities," said Professor Ramírez-Andreotta. "The CAB will serve as a way for people in the community to actively participate in the decision-making process. Community members who are part of the CAB can learn more about the project and research, get up-to-date information, ask questions, help inform decisions and discuss community concerns. Additional details to be announced and shared. Com-

munity trainings on environmental monitoring and sample collection will follow in October. Learn how to properly collect samples and interpret data. Build your capacity and environmental health science skills! Join us for one of our two-hour training events set for October 2022. And one more goal is to hire a Community Outreach Assistant, a community educator to provide information, training and support to residents. We seek applicants, who are trusted within the community, share similar social backgrounds or life experiences with the community, have strong communication skills and are enthusiastic about working with others on environmental health issues. To

Bingo, Lite-Brite, Nerf among Toy Hall of Fame finalists

ROCHESTER, N.Y. (AP) — Voting opened Wednesday on which toys should go into the National Toy Hall

of Fame this year. The class of 2022 finalists are: bingo, Breyer Horses, Catan, Lite-Brite, Nerf Toys, Masters of

the Universe, piñata, Phase 10, Pound Puppies, Rack-O, Spirograph, and the top.

"These 12 toys span the history of play. The top is as old as civilization itself and bingo has been played in some form for hundreds of years," said Christopher Bensch, vice president for collections at The Strong museum in Rochester, where the hall of fame is housed.

The public is invited to vote online through Sept. 21. The three toys that receive the most public votes will make up a single "Player's Choice" ballot. That ballot will be counted alongside those turned in by a national selection committee whose members include industry experts, academics and others.

The inductees will be an-

nounced Nov. 10.

"All 12 of these toys have what it takes to be contenders for the class of 2022," Bensch said.

Anyone can nominate a toy for the annual honor, but to be recognized by the hall of fame, toys have to have achieved icon status, longevity and foster learning or discovery. They also must have changed play or toy design.

The National Toy Hall of Fame opened at The Strong in 1998. So far, 77 toys have been inducted, from simple favorites like the paper airplane, bubbles and sidewalk chalk to the even more ubiquitous, including the stick and cardboard box.

Last year's honorees were American Girl Dolls, Risk, and sand.

In 1985, in North Korea and South Korea, family members who had been separated for decades were allowed to visit each other as both countries opened their borders in an unprecedented family-reunion program.

In 1989, Hurricane Hugo crashed into Charleston, South Carolina (the storm was blamed for 56 deaths in the Caribbean and 29 in the United States).
