New contract ratified for Pinto Valley Mine workers

Near the end of August, members of six international unions voted to ratify a new contract that will cover about 420 workers at the Pinto Valley Mine, west of Miami. An August 29 press release by the United Steelworkers union (USW) said the members' vote was overwhelmingly in favor of the agreement. The press release said that about 170 members of USW Local 915 are em-



ployed at the mine, along with members of the Teamsters, Boilermakers, Operating Engineers, International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, and United Association of Journeymen and Apprentices of the Plumbing and Pipefitting Industry. These half-dozen unions, led by the USW, negotiate their labor agreements jointly with the company.

The Pinto Valley Mine, which is owned by Capstone Copper, is one of the largest employers in the Globe-Miami area.

The press release stated that the new four-year contract includes wage increases averaging 18%, a lump-sum signing bonus, improved retirement benefits, reduced healthcare

costs for members, an increase in paid sick time, the addition of vision coverage and "other improvements to contract language."

"I'm pleased to see our collective bargaining agreement renewed for four more years, and with wages adjusted upward as our emplovees manage the effects of the inflationary pressures we have all been experiencing," Pinto Valley Mine General Manager Mike Wickersham told the Arizona Silver Belt. "I'm also proud to now include paid sick leave and more flexibility in access to vacation time, changes we undertook early in the CO-VID pandemic which make sense to continue. The bargaining teams worked through the negotiations

process efficiently and productively – now it's time to focus on safely making copper with this great Pinto Valley Mine team."

In the August 29 press release, USW District 12 Director Gaylan Prescott said the agreement is an example of the strength workers can have when they stand together.

"The will of these mine workers, using their collective voices, resulted in increased wages, improved benefits and dignity in their workplace," Prescott said. "These workers, their families and the communities in which they live will all benefit because of what this group was able to accomplish as a result of their unity and solidarity."

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
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Film shoot planned in Miami for Sept. 16 & 17



Joseph's enslavement lasted for 13 years and went from bad to worse. He lost his favored position in Potiphar's household and went to prison when the master's wife told lies about him. His hope for release from jail died when the king's servant forgot his promise (Genesis 40:14; Genesis 40:23). His future looked bleak.

Despite the evidence of circumstances, God was carrying out His plan

to bless Joseph and his entire family. In fact, Joseph was God's appointed person to rescue them from the coming famine. But for that to happen, he had to learn the Egyptian language and culture, develop leadership abilities, and mature spiritually. The Lord's plan made it all possible.

Joseph learned two helpful lessons. First, the Lord is a faithful companion who uses our troubles to prepare us for His work. Second, once the Lord has accomplished His purposes, the difficulty will end. At God's chosen moment, Joseph was freed from jail, rewarded with a high-ranking appointment, and reconciled with his family.

Adversity can be painful, but the Lord uses it to further His purposes and equip us to carry out His plan. What is He trying to teach you in the midst of your trials?

How to choose a church: Prayer

If you were to tour my home state of Ohio and come to rural Kidron, you would notice some of those neat farms are connected to the electric grid while there are no wires leading to their neighbors' snug farm houses. Welcome to Amish country, where generations have handed down the skills of driving horses and buggies, speaking German and living without electricity.

However, if you are new to Gila County, Arizona you will spot few homes not connected to the grid or at least sporting solar power panels. And if you are a new arrival, one of your first to-dos will be to arrange to turn on the electricity. We rely on power to cook, illuminate, cool ourselves in Arizona summers and warm ourselves during our mild winters.

So! When you are looking for a new church home, find out if they are connected to prayer power.

Jesus considered this so important, we read in Mark 11:22-24: "Have faith in God,"

Jesus answered. "Truly f I tell you, if anyone says to this mountain, 'Go, throw yourself into the sea,' and does not doubt in their heart but believes that what they say will happen, it will be done for them. Therefore I tell you, whatever you ask for in prayer, believe that you have received it, and it will be yours." That's power!

That brings us to how to choose a church. Our Lord emphasized, "'My house will be called a house of prayer for all nations'" (Mark 11:17).

The most obvious introduction to a church's inner life occurs during worship services. Is prayer regular and frequent during that congregation's gatherings? Do their regular services include prayers of adoration, confession, thanksgiving and supplication, along with assurances of forgiveness and pardon?

There are many variations congregational prayer, ranging from formal through informal. Liturgical denominations have prayer books filled with beautiful expressions of devotion including uplifting prayers for special days and seasons of the year. Their

bulletins may be packed full of various prayers by and for worshipers. At the other end of the spectrum are churches which encourage folks to pray aloud as the Spirit leads them. As you seek your new church home and visit, where do you find prayers that resonate

with your soul? Do business meetings or classes begin and end with prayer?

Is there some sort of prayer chain, typically by emails?

When you arrive in our community, plug into all the power you need!

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WHO: New COVID cases, deaths keep falling nearly everywhere

AP-EU-MED-VIRUS-OUTBREAK-WHO-REPORT

GENEVA (AP) — The number of new coronavirus cases and deaths reported globally continued to fall nearly everywhere in the world in what the World Health Organization described as a "welcome decline" at a media briefing on Wednesday.

The U.N. health agency said there were 4.5 million new COVID-19 cases reported last week, a 16% drop from the previous week. Deaths were also down by 13%, with about 13,500 fatalities. WHO said COVID-19

infections dropped everywhere in the world while deaths decreased everywhere except for Southeast Asia, where they climbed by 15%, and in the Western Pacific, where they rose by 3%.

WHO Director-General Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus warned that with the coming onset of winter in the Northern Hemisphere and the possible emergence of a more dangerous new COVID-19 variant, experts expect to see a spike in hospitalizations and deaths. Tedros said vaccination rates, even in rich countries, were still too low, noting that 30% of health workers and 20% of older people re-

main unimmunized.

"These vaccination gaps pose a risk to all of us," he said. "Please get vaccinated if you are not and a booster if it's recommended that you have one."

In the U.S., the Food and Drug Administration cleared its first update to COVID-19 vaccines on Wednesday, booster doses that target today's most common omicron strain. Authorities said shots could begin within days.

Until now, COVID-19 vaccines have targeted the original coronavirus strain, even as wildly different mutants emerged. The new U.S. boosters are combina-

tion, or "bivalent," shots. They contain half that original vaccine recipe and half protection against the newest omicron versions, called BA.4 and BA.5, which are considered the most contagious yet.

Earlier this month, Britain decided it would offer adults 50 and over a different booster option from Moderna, a combo shot targeting that initial BA.1 omicron strain.

On Friday, the European Medicines Agency will consider whether to authorize the combination COVID-19 vaccine including BA.1 made by Pfizer-BioNTech and Moderna. Another version of the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine incorporating the BA.5 subvariant of omicron is also under review by the EU regulator.

Call to artists for 22nd annual Gold Canyon Arts Festival

The Gold Canvon Arts Festival is a one-day event held on the fourth Saturday of January each year. Many of our participating artists call our Festival the best one-day show in the state based on turnout and sales. The sponsor of the event is the Gold Canvon Arts Council in co-operation with the Artists of the Superstitions. This year's Festival will be held on Saturday, Jan. 28, 2023, again on the grounds of the United Methodist Church at 6640 S. King's Ranch Rd. in Gold Canyon, Arizona. This venue offers good parking and drive-by visibility.

Typically, 85-90 artists are accepted to show their work. Last year's attendance was about 4,000 during the festival hours of

9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Reserved artist spaces are 10 ft. x 10 ft. (tents are encouraged but not required). Your cost is a \$25 non-refundable application fee and, if selected by the jury, a \$125 artist fee, plus the contribution of a piece of your art to support the Gold Canyon Arts Council's arts education programs.

Artist hospitality volunteers are available to help you find your assigned space and "tent sit" during the day to allow you to take breaks. Restrooms are available inside the church. The festival also features food vendors and musical entertainment throughout the day.

All artists will be juried into the show. Your submitted work will be juried in one of the following areas: Painting/Drawing, Photographic art, Clay art, Metalwork art, Glass art, Wood art, Jewelry, Natural products (e.g., gourds, seeds), Other.

Nnee Bich'o Nii TANF Services return to classroom

Nnee Bich'o Nii TANF Services have returned to their classroom at the Gilson Wash Activity Center. Yes, they have a classroom.

The Nnee Bich'o Nii TANF Team host a number of classes for their participants. They offer Fatherhood is Sacred, Motherhood is Sacred, World of Work, Summer Youth Program, G.E.D. and driver's license classes. Due to COVID-19 restrictions, all class sizes have been limited to fewer than five people (participants and instructors).

June brought the return of the Summer Youth Program with Karina Bendle, Family Services Coordinator and Aurelia Rogers, Apache Language Instructor. The two-week program hosted four high school students whose families are participating in the Nnee Bich'o Nii program.

Over the two weeks, the students learned about setting goals for their future and about the Apache language and culture.

Bob Stevens, field supervisor with the Apache Language Preservation Department, provided a brief history of the language. Mr. Stevens told the students that there were no words in Apache for certain Eng-

lish words like "call" (as in placing a telephone call). Rather, Apaches describe the action and say "bésh bichi'i nłtsood," which roughly translates to "pull the wire to them." He told the heart-wrenching story of their elders who were harshly disciplined as children for speaking their native language. He encouraged the students to speak their language and not to be discouraged if they did not speak perfectly.

The Apache Language Preservation Department offers classes to anyone wishing to learn to speak Apache. They host their classes via Zoom and their link can be found on their Facebook page, Apache Language Preservation.

The Young Warriors Program counselors spent time with the students doing team building and stress relief exercises. They also took a tour of the Eastern Arizona College campus in Thatcher.

July saw the end of the first Motherhood is Sacred class taught by Bendle. Nnee Bich'o Nii TANF acknowledged the accomplishments of the three moms with a 70s-themed celebration.

Nnee Bich'o Nii TANF Services has been providing the Fatherhood is Sacred class for several years now and has had great success. They began teaching Motherhood is Sacred in 2021 and have met with the same success. The goal of Motherhood is Sacred is to strengthen families through responsible parenting.

In August, Bendle held World of Work (WOW) classes at the Gilson Wash Activity Center and the Bylas Nnee Bich'o Nii office. WOW is a job readiness course that covers a very wide range of topics related to entering the workforce. They start with helping participants to complete an application,

resume and cover letter. The participants are given mock interviews and critiqued on their strengths and weaknesses. They are given advice on the dos & don'ts in every aspect of work; punctuality, avoiding conflict, conflict resolution, etc.

With the exception of the Summer Youth Program, all classes will be offered throughout the year at scheduled times.
