# Local community college welcomes new interim president

At a special meeting on Monday, Aug. 15, 2022, the Gila County Provisional Community College District (GCPCCD) Governing Board approved and awarded the contract for Interim College President to Dr. Janice Lawhorn of Lawhorn Consulting, LLC. Dr. Lawhorn comes to the College with a wealth of experience in higher education, including over 20 years in various teaching positions and leadership capacities at Eastern Arizona College. She also served as Senior Dean for the Gila County

Globe and Payson Campuses from 2020 to 2022.

In November 2002, voters approved a tax levy to financially support the formation of a provisional community college district in Gila County. Thus, the Gila County Provisional Community College District was established in June 2003. According to Arizona state law, provisional districts are considered the same as fully organized districts with one major exception. Since 2005, GCPCCD has contracted with Eastern Ari-




the leader we need to ensure attainment of this very important goal."

# The danger of bitterness

### Many are hurt when we give in to negative emotions.

Have you ever seen a person overtaken by bitterness? It is very sad to watch someone consumed by that type of darkness. None of us intend to end up in that condition, but unless we guard against it malice can take hold of us.

That's what happened to King Saul. He began his reign with great blessings—God's anointing, the prophet Samuel's guidance and the applause of the people. Yet he died a bitter man

because he allowed jealousy, anger and fear to dominate his life.

Instead of rejoicing that God had raised up someone to slay the giant Goliath, Saul became jealous and resented the fact that David received more praise than he did. Soon the king became suspicious and fearful because he knew he'd lost the Lord's favor, which was now being shown to David instead. In desperation, Saul plotted to kill him.

Although the details of your life differ from Saul's, the steps to bitterness and ruin are the same. Has jealousy poisoned your mind? Have you allowed unresolved anger to fester? Whom do you avoid because of ill will? If any of these things apply to you, confess them to God. Then ask Him to reprogram your mind and emotions so the bitterness can be removed.

last passenger runs on those same rails.

When thinking about that history, I recall a similar depot in Guernsey, Wyoming, my hometown. My Dad would take me the few blocks to the depot to deposit outgoing mail. When the train would come in, we would find the "mail car" and he would hold me up to make the deposit in the slot at the side of the car

and we would declare the letter or card had been "sent."

As with everything, times have changed, especially postal rates. I can remember "penny postcards," for that was their rate and you could buy postcards with the green stamp printed on the face. Letters were three cents and air mail cost six cents. Recently I sent a package to my grandson and the postage

was more than what I had spent on the gift.

This is not a complaint but merely a comment on rising costs. What is important is that we don't stop writing letters and sending gifts. E-mails and phone calls may be a means of speedy communications, but a written note will be kept for years.

# The danger of disobedience

We may be tempted to think that disobedience in a small matter really won't affect us too much. But in reality, we never have good motives for any act of disobedience, and the consequences aren't lessened by our attempt to diminish its size.

King Saul didn't want to go to battle until Samuel was there to offer the burnt sacrifice. But when the prophet didn't arrive on time and the army was beginning to desert, fear made Saul impatient. So he handled the offering himself, attempting to get God's blessing by disobediently usurping the role of the priest. When confronted by Samuel, the king tried to justify his actions.

What Saul saw as a small, necessary disobedience, God viewed as a serious act of rebellion. As a result, Saul's kingdom would end and the Lord would one day appoint someone else to Israel's throne.

Are there any "small disobediences" in your life that you're trying to justify? It could be something you've done or perhaps





# Colorado homeowner emptied pistol to kill bear that broke in

DENVER (AP) — Ken Mauldin was jolted awake last weekend with his wife screaming incessantly in their split level home in Colorado's mountain town of Steamboat Springs where their three children were sleeping one floor below. Then she yelled: "There's a bear in the house!"

Kelly Mauldin had just been awakened by the couple's barking dogs that didn't wake up her husband before dawn on Saturday. She walked to the door of the couple's bedroom and found herself staring at a male black bear weighing about 400 pounds (181 kilograms) — about 10 feet (3 meters) away in the dining room.

In an interview, Ken Mauldin said he grabbed his 40-caliber pistol, took his wife's place at the door and shot once, aiming for the center of the bear's body. He thinks the first shot hit the bear and it charged him as Mauldin continued firing.

As he was shooting, the bear got as close as 5 feet (1.5 meters) from Mauldin and then turned toward the stairs leading to the home's front door. The bear crashed through a bannister as Mauldin emptied the gun and slid down the stairs, mortally wounded.

The couple didn't know it at the time, but officials believe the bear got in-

side their home by flipping down the lever of their unlocked front door handle and pushing the door.

After it was shot, the bear lay breathing and heaving between Mauldin and his three sons on the home's lower floor, but he didn't think the bear would get back up. He called 911 and one of his sons called him on his cellphone and Mauldin told the son to stay put in his room.

"My only thought was protecting my family and putting that bear down," said Mauldin.

The bear had moved an unopened bag of dog food across the dining room. Police and state wildlife officers arrived a short time later and determined that the bear was dead.

They used a winch to pull it into a truck and were impressed by its size, said Justin Pollock, a Colorado Parks and Wildlife officer for 21 years.

"I deal with bears a lot and I'd say this was a big bear," he said.

Colorado has about 12,000 bears and breakins aren't uncommon in Rocky Mountain towns, but homeowners shooting bears in their homes is rare, said Rachael Gonzales, spokesperson for Colorado Parks and Wildlife. State law allows people to shoot bears if the people feel threatened, she said.

The lush mountain area where the Mauldin family lives is home to many bears because of its habitat, which includes oak brush that they use to hide, a river and vegetation that they eat.

In the days before the bear opened the door to the Mauldins home, neighbors had talked about a bear getting into their garages and other homeowners had reported bear break-ins. Mauldin said the family always does a nightly check to close windows and lock doors, but that night the front door had been left unlocked.

Gonzales said there's no way of knowing if the same bear seeking food at other homes broke into the Mauldin family's home. Black bears avoid humans but once they realize food is behind a window or stuffed inside a bird feeder, they will return, Pollock

said.

"Bears are very smart," Gonzales said. "Once they learn that it's easy to access food in a certain area, they are going to keep doing it."

The bear's hide and meat will be donated to people who have signed up on a list to receive them and its head will go up for auction, Pollock said.

Mauldin hopes the break-in at his home sparks greater awareness to prompt "something good from something so terrible that happened."

"We are in a situation now where we have town bears that have lost all of their natural fear of humans," Mauldin said. "In my mind that's what we have to address."
