

Days Challenge. We will be meeting at the library Monday, Wednesday and Thursday at 6:30 a.m. to walk if you want to walk with us.





auction; prices will be marked on the items. The sale takes place from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m.

"The building where we've stored surplus furniture and equipment has to be moved to make space for the expansion of the Russell Gulch Landfill," explained Finance Director Mary Springer. "In past years we auctioned items like these but landfill expansion plans make time of the essence, and we need to dispose of this furniture and equipment quickly so the building they're in can be dismantled. As a result, buyers can expect yard

sale bargain prices – and be able to equip an office on Saturday with onestop shopping. Bring cash only – no credit cards or checks. Items must be paid for on the day of the sale."

Items will be sold "as is" and must be removed from the premises by 2 p.m. on Saturday. Stellar Vista Observatory Sky Report, July 11-17

The moon is full on Wednesday, July 13, at precisely 12:38:26 p.m. MDT. How long is the moon full? Just for that one instant. It's full for as long as it's midnight, or any other time - just for that moment. In practice we say the moon is full for that entire night. But what do we think when the moon is full at approximately noon, as it is this month? Is it full the entire day that began at midnight on the morning of the 13th and ends at the following midnight? Or is it full from the afternoon of the 13th until the following afternoon? It's up to you. Generally you can consider it full on that one calendar

But what about other time zones? If it's full at, say, 12:30 a.m. in the Mountain Time Zone, it's full at 11:30 p.m. on the day before in the Pacific Time Zone. This is true for any astronomical event that happens at only one moment; it happens at a different time in each time zone and at different days where the time zone changes at midnight from one day to the next. It's a consequence of living on a globe and astronomers have learned to live with it, but it can cause confusion. When looking up dates of full moons in a table, for example, you need to know which time zone the table was prepared

So where is the moon when it's full on the evening of the 13th? It's quite low, in the middle of Sagittarius, the Centaur/Archer. a composite beast that is half man and half horse (the front half is the man!). Being opposite the sun – which is what a full moon is – it rises at sunset and is above the horizon the entire night. Sagittarius is in the direction of the center of the Milky Way, and that is the brightest part of the Milky Way, but you won't see the Milky Way because the moon's bright light washes it out. Look next week when the moon is out of the way, and perhaps I'll have more on that then.

On the 13th, 40° to the left of the moon is the planet Saturn, shining as bright as the brightest stars. On the 15th and 16th the moon is much closer to Saturn. passing closest to it at about 2 p.m. on the afternoon of the 15th, and if you were on the opposite side of the earth you'd enjoy a very close conjunction.

Jupiter is another 40some degrees to the left of Saturn, and it's brighter than any star. It rises around midnight, and it rises a half-hour earlier each week – as do all the planets except Venus.

Mars is 30° to the left of Jupiter. Mars is the same brightness as Saturn.

Last but far from least is Venus, which rises two hours before the sun and which is low, but brilliant, in the east-northeast in morning twilight.





Big changes take shape at High Desert Humane Society

Gila Rabies Control's decision to build a new shelter out at the county fairgrounds was a stroke of luck for High Desert Humane Society. Demand had outgrown the group's small dog rescue facility downtown. The old shelter on Hackney had been built by HDHS about 1970 and had been leased to the county a few years later. Now High Desert would have room enough for all.

Unfortunately, Rabies Control's announcement came during a rocky time for High Desert. The Hackney Street shelter needed major repairs, volunteers were tired, the pandemic kept people home and Cheryl Brazell, long-time ramrod of HDHS, needed to step down.

Unwilling to surrender, Brazell reached out to Cynthia Carr, who had been involved with the state rescue community for the last 10 years.

In November 2021. Carr was elected president of the organization. Ever since, she has spent three to four days per week working on projects ranging from working with Gila County IT to install a computer and data system to contacting potential donors to setting up a work party to spruce up the shelter. Under Carr's leadership, Anna Ortiz and the original board installed a plaque on the HDHS thrift

shop/dog rescue building recognizing all that Richard and Cheryl Brazell have done.

Carr energized and impressed those who worked

On May 17, Carr announced that the Hackney Street shelter project was definitely going forward. In early June, volunteers Lorraine and Fran Beder spent three days painting while other volunteers cleaned and removed trash.


