Last week for early voting

This is the final week to vote early before the Aug. 2 primary election. Gila County Recorder Sadie Bingham and her staff have arranged special early voting dates in towns across the county over the past few weeks. The last of these will be in Hayden-Winkelman on Thursday, July 28 at Winkelman Town Hall from 10 a.m. until 2 p.m.

Voters are also welcome to stop by the Gila County Recorder's Office at the county courthouse building, 1400 E. Ash St. in Globe, and cast their ballot in person until Friday, July 29. The Recorder's Office



Barbie and I have conducted grief support groups for many years and many people. Because the recovery involves several steps, we refer to it as a "process." Allowing time to receive the new information, digest it and change one's thinking, we generally extend the meetings to at least four

weeks.

During the first session, we are getting acquainted and watch as others either renew old acquaintances or find new friends. We stress the need for confidentiality and at first people are hesitant to reveal much about themselves or the reason they have come to such a meeting.

Within two or three sessions, we find them opening

up and digging deeper into the hurt they have covered up and kept hidden for years. As they open the wound, it begins to heal and they find they are not alone. In many instances, a person will discover that someone who seems not to have a care in the world has suffered as we all do.

Getting through the steps may seem like climbing a mountain, but when you have persisted you are rewarded with a wholly new view of life. You come out of the dark space in which you have been hiding and all is well.

One other thing you will notice is that you have now risen above the level at which you entered and are truly thankful for having made the effort.



Deadly heat wave continues: Follow these safety tips

More than 100 million people across the country are facing dangerously high temperatures and oppressive humidity as the relentless heat wave continues. Heat warnings are in place in as many as 28 states and the National Weather Service reports the scorching weather will remain in place through the rest of the week.

Facing the highest risk for the deadly heat are the Southwest, Central and South-central US, the coastal mid-Atlantic region and the Northeast. The combination of heat and high humidity leave many open to the possibility

of heat-related illness or heatstroke.

Some people are more at risk of developing a heat-related illness, including adults age 65 and older, those with chronic medical conditions, people who work outside, infants and children, and athletes. Some may take medications that make the effects of extreme heat worse. People with heart disease, poor blood circulation, obesity and mental illness are at risk for getting sick if the temperatures climb.

Working outside can produce heat stress, resulting in heat stroke, heat exhaustion, heat cramps or heat rashes. Heat can also increase the risk of injuries in workers as it may result in sweaty palms, fogged-up safety glasses and dizziness. Important safety information is available from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), at https:// www.cdc.gov/niosh/ updates/upd-07-02-18. html#:~:text=Working%20 outside%20can%20produce%20heat,up%20 safety%20glasses%2C%20 and%20dizziness.

As temperatures rise to over 100 degrees in many regions, the American Red Cross offers steps you can take to help stay safe when the temperatures soar.

Heat Safety Tips

Hot cars can be deadly. Never leave children or pets in your vehicle. The inside temperature of the car can quickly reach 120 degrees.

Stay hydrated by drinking plenty of fluids. Avoid drinks with caffeine or alcohol.

Check on family, friends and neighbors who do not have air conditioning, who spend much of their time alone or who are more likely to be affected by the heat.

If you don't have air conditioning, seek relief from the heat during the warmest part of the day in places like schools, libraries, theaters, malls, etc.

Avoid extreme temperature changes.

Wear loose-fitting, light-weight, light-colored clothing. Avoid dark colors because they absorb the sun's rays.

Slow down, stay indoors and avoid strenuous exercise during the hottest part of the day.

Postpone outdoor games and activities.

Use your oven less to help reduce the temperature in your home.

Check on animals frequently to ensure they are not suffering from the heat. Make sure they have plenty of cool water and

shade.

Excessive heat can lead to sunburn, heat cramps, heat exhaustion and heat stroke. If someone is experiencing heat cramps in the legs or abdomen, get them to a cooler place, have them rest. lightly stretch the affected muscle and replenish their fluids with half a glass (about 4 ounces) of cool water every 15 minutes. If someone is exhibiting signs of heat exhaustion (cool, moist, pale or flushed skin, heavy sweating, headache, nausea, dizziness, weakness and exhaustion), move them to a cooler place, remove or loosen tight clothing and spray the person with water or apply cool, wet cloths or towels to the skin. Fan the person. If they are conscious, give small amounts of cool water to drink. Make sure the person drinks slowly. Watch for changes in condition. If the person refuses water, vomits or begins to lose consciousness, call 911. Heat stroke is life threat-

ening. It usually occurs by ignoring the signals of heat exhaustion. Heat stroke develops when the body's systems are overwhelmed by heat and begin to stop functioning. Signs include hot, red skin which may be dry or moist; changes in consciousness; vomiting; and high body temperature. Call 911 immediately if someone shows signs of heat stroke. Move the person to a cooler place. Quickly cool the person's body by immersing them

up to their neck in cold water if possible. Otherwise, douse or spray the person with cold water, or cover the person with cold, wet towels or bags of ice.

The Red Cross Emergency app can help keep you and your loved ones safe by putting vital information in your hand with more than 35 customizable severe weather and emergency alerts. The Red Cross First Aid app puts instant access to information on handling the most common first aid scenarios, including heat emergencies, at your fingertips. "I was really impressed with the Gila Pueblo Campus; it makes it easy for the students because it's not a large, bustling campus. There's lots of opportunity to work with students one-on-one," she said. "The staff here was welcoming and more than helpful. You can't say that about too many places."

Graduates of EAC's twosemester dental assistant certificate program can go on to such specialties as orthodontic, pediatric or oral surgery; become a lab

program will earn a Certificate of Proficiency from the college, which prepares them to take the national certification test through the Dental Assisting National Board. Arizona law requires dental assistants to be nationally certified in order to take X-rays, but they don't have to wait for graduation to take the test.

For a tuition rate of \$1,350 a semester with the cost of books, graduates could move into dental assistant positions. In addition, financial aid can bring tuition costs down

considerably. Many dental assisting students in the area receive the full tuition rate from Pell Grants, paying nothing out of pocket.



2. In a large mixing bowl, add all your ingredients and mix well.

3. Using your hands, roll into small bite-sized balls. Place balls on the lined plate and refrigerate or freeze until firm. Notes

To store: Leftovers can be stored in the refrigerator, covered, for up to four weeks.

To freeze: Place bites in a ziplock bag and store in freezer for up to six months.
