Town Hall Meeting July 27: Opioid and Substance Abuse in Globe-Miami

Last week Gila County Health and Emergency Management hosted open forums in Miami, Globe and Payson asking local residents who've been impacted by opioid use disorder to share their experiences, thoughts and suggestions. There were six separate forums – half of them tailored to friends, family and caregivers, the other half to first responders and professionals – and now local residents are invited to a July 27 town hall meeting where Gila County Health and Emergency Management staff will pres-

ent findings from the Opioid Use Disorder Focus Groups. Since 2017 Arizona Department of Health Services has attributed more than 9,900 deaths to opioids, more than 73,000 overdoses - and 2,800 cases of neonatal abstinence syndrome (withdrawal and other after-effects when babies are exposed to drugs in the womb before birth). The rising number of deaths represent a 15.8% increase in total opioid deaths since 2017, and a 198% increase since 2012.

1 Thessalonians 5:23 - "May your whole spirit, soul and body be preserved blameless at the coming of the Lord Jesus."

Paul says that the fullness of God exists in Christ. (Colossians 2:9.)

Being spiritually born again is connecting to the spirit of God. Jesus died a brutal death so that you and I would be born again and become children of God. Jesus was the last sacrifice for us to be able to enter the Kingdom of God. Inviting Jesus into your life brings great benefits.

This is not a fairytale, it is truth. If you believe in the death of Jesus Christ you become alive in your spirit, for it is tied to Jesus. Hebrews 10:10 says, "And by that will we have been sanctified (when you become believers, you have been separated

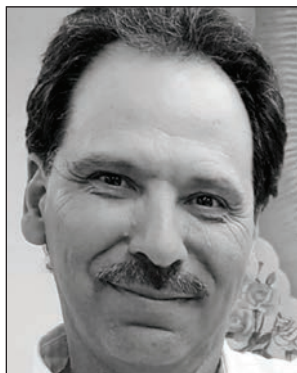

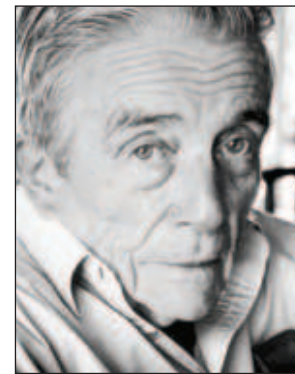

'Critical blood shortage': Red Cross needs donors Aug. 12

Last week's blood drive was abruptly cancelled due to reasons beyond the Red Cross' control. If you were unable to donate, please sign up now for the next date. Healthy donors are urgently needed for our community's next blood drive, at the Globe Elks Lodge on Maple Street near Denny's, on Friday, August 12. Call 1-800-RED-CROSS to reserve an appointment, or pick your choice of times and schedule yourself conveniently online at redcrossblood.org. All healthy donors are wel-

come. Giving blood is safe; facemasks are required as well as pre-arranged appointments in order to help Red Cross staff and Elks Lodge volunteers schedule the most efficient drive day possible. A critical blood shortage continues; Arizona fell 4,000 donations short during the winter months. Type-O blood is especially needed. Type-O is often used in trauma situations, especially Type-O negative, which can be transfused with any blood type.

Appointments are also

available for 'Power Red' donations, which allow you to safely donate two units of red blood cells during one donation. Blood is drawn from one arm by a machine that separates and collects two units of red cells, then safely returns the remaining blood components, along with some saline, back to you through the same arm - and just one needle jab is required. A Power Red donation takes approximately 30 minutes longer than a whole blood donation, so plan on about 35-45 minutes in the

chair and you're limited to donating approximately once every four months. New donors are welcome, and urgently needed. How often can you give blood? According to the Red Cross, "Wait at least eight weeks (56 days) between donations of whole blood, or 16 weeks (112 days) between Power Red donations. Whole blood donors can donate up to 6 times a year." Questions about giving blood, or a Power Red donation? Read more at redcrossblood.org.

state," said Carol Ptak, a lead volunteer for the program.

When you drive down to the lot the first thing you notice is a beautiful, 80-yard by 80-yard, grass field. The field is surrounded by a fence with a gate to allow participants and their dogs to come in and out. It is thanks to the help of quite a few volunteers that this entire project is coming together. "John Dixon got the grass for us from Brookes Farm, at cost. All we had to do was pick it up. It took 13 pallets; each pallet weighed 2,000 pounds. That's how we got the grass. The steel for the fences was donated by Beverly Hawkins and Chuck Sandoval did all the welding for us. Charlene Giles donated the trees and we are hoping to have some more trees coming in," said Amanda Haas, lot owner and 4-H volunteer.

Amanda is more than thrilled to see her family's lot being brought to life by the kids, their dogs and the volunteers who are helping to build this amazing dog training course. It was not always the design for this lot to become a 4-H hosted facility. In fact, this lot was originally going to be the space where her son, Jacob, built his home. Unfortunately, Jacob lost his life in an accident before this dream could be realized. Left with a decision on what to do with the property, Amanda and her family came up with a perfect plan - to not only memorialize the caring life of her son, but

also to provide a service to the community that the family could be proud to put in Jacob's name. "My son worked with Tri-City Fire Department. He was training his dog, Fen, for search and rescue. Dogs meant the world to Jacob, so this would have been something that he wanted to do," Amanda explained calmly, while holding back a storm of emotions. Jacob was also a coach for the local Little League teams. So, a lot where dogs and kids can come together - it doesn't get much better than that.

The field is designed simply but effectively. It provides enough space for the kids to effectively practice dog obedience, agility and rally. Rally has 18 to 22 stations where kids show off their dog's training at each station. As Amanda shows off the different aspects of the field, she can't help but rave about the kids and their dogs. "These kids put in a lot of time with these dogs. If you had seen them when we started, at the end of February, these dogs couldn't even be walked on a leash. All of these dogs are still a little reactive, but they are learning how to be more obedient, and to listen and focus on their owners. It's a huge difference, and these kids are building trust with their dogs, which establishes better communication skills."

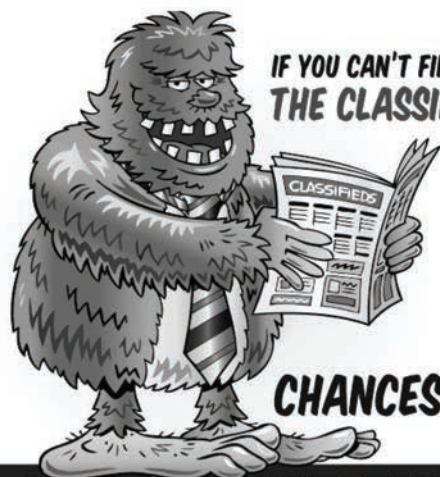

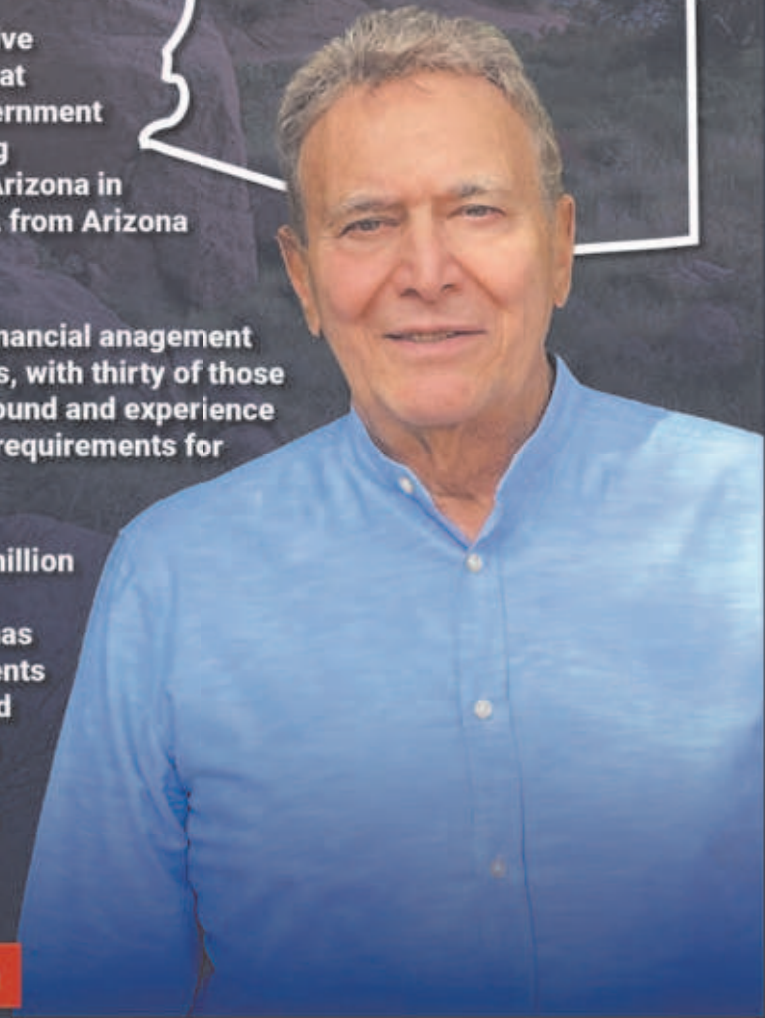
