

Telegraph Fire projects public outreach meetings planned

Gila County Public Works has scheduled two public meetings this month to inform residents about the County's Telegraph Fire flood mitigation projects – ongoing mitigation following the 2021 Telegraph Fire, which burned more than 180,000 acres last year, resulting in floods once the summer rains began.

The meetings will discuss plans, specifications and estimated costs for the projects. A short PowerPoint presentation will be followed by the opportunity for property owners, local residents and members of the public who are potentially impacted by construction to meet one-to-one and speak with county engineering staff, other county officials and JE Fuller representatives to discuss project specifics and ask questions. Both meetings will be held in the Board of Supervisors conference room on the west side of the Gila County courthouse at 1400 E. Ash St.

* Wednesday, June 29 from 6 - 8 p.m. This meeting will cover Six Shooter Canyon channel stabilization project improvements and the Ice House Canyon Project.

* Thursday, June 30 from 6 – 8 p.m. This meeting will cover the Russell Gulch channel improvement project.

True change starts with the Holy Spirit transforming our heart and thoughts.

God calls His children to live holy lives. Yet in our attempts to obey this command, we often commit to change our behavior only to fail a few days later. The problem is that we're starting at the wrong place.

Ungodly actions flow from sinful thoughts and attitudes, like selfishness, greed, jealousy, anger, resentment and unforgiveness. These can be changed only as our mind is renewed by the Holy Spirit. As we spend time each day in Scripture, the Spirit transforms our mind and strengthens our inner being. But when we neglect God's Word, we leave ourselves open to the influence of the world and our "flesh," both of which oppose godliness. Then, if we try to change our behavior without adjusting our thinking, we'll find ourselves doing precisely what we want to avoid (Romans 7:15). It's a lifelong process that requires learning God's thoughts and adopting them as our own. Then, as the Spirit develops within us the mind of Christ, our actions will become increasingly holy.

Running the race of life

1 Corinthians 9:24 - "Striving for a Crown" as we run this race of life.

We run this race of life for the prize at the finish line...so run in such a way that you may obtain the prize. And everyone who competes for the prize is temperate in all things, showing self-restraint, self-control, not extreme in opinion and statement.

I coached track for the Globe Unified School District for many years. During my coaching days, I taught the athletes to run with endurance in assurance of finishing the race - not to look to the right or to the left, which takes the focus off of your run.

Therefore, run with certainty. Fight, but not as one who beats the air; discipline your body into subjection. Paul the apostle said, "I do not fight like a man beating the air aimlessly; no, I discipline my body and make it my slave so that after I have preached to others, I myself will not be disqualified for the prize." (1 Corinthians 9:26-27)

If we want to finish the race of our life with joy and good standing, by God's grace, we must learn to cultivate the same attitude our Lord and the Apostle Paul had toward the Father's planned course for our lives.

In 2 Timothy 4:7, before his death, Paul said: "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith." This is also about perseverance and continuing, even when the road is hard. Never give up. This reminds me of my niece Lisa Valencia, coaching hundreds of athletes in track: I use her as an example of "Never Give Up." A very fast runner, she was sure to take first place in the 100-meter. She was running against eight runners. She took off and tripped, and fell on her knees. With blood running down both knees, she quickly got up. She did not look around, but kept her focus; she ran to the finish line and got third place. Her prize, to my amazement, was the fans standing up in the bleachers clapping and cheering for her. God works in mysterious ways. Lisa should have never tripped, but did; why? Because I believe I was to use this event in many of my lessons as I used her as an example of "when you fall, get the heck up" and continue your race. There is no time to have a pity party.

So run your own race of life. Do your work. Don't allow envy, ego or greed to derail you. Do the right thing every day and stay on the course so you can say with Paul, "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith."

For those who are fathers, we ask for wisdom and humility in the face of the task of parenting. Give them the strength to do well by their children and by You. In Your Holy name, O God, we pray. Amen.

Vincent Mark Ganilla, born May 24, 1958 in Phoenix, Arizona passed away on June 5, 2022 in San Carlos, Arizona. He was 64 years old. He was the son of Allen Ganilla, Sr. and Cyrilla Endfield Ganilla, and a member of the San Carlos Apache Nation who resided on the reservation. Before moving to San Carlos from Inglewood, California in 1973 at the age of 15, he was in the marching band at Redondo Beach Union High School and played the clarinet. He graduated from Globe High School in 1976. He attended Mesa Community College and the University of Arizona, where he studied forestry and conservation.

Vincent retired from the U.S. Forest Service after 20+ years of service. He respected nature, and especially enjoyed being outdoors. In his career with the U.S. Forest Service, he was a crew boss for the SWFF crews and traveled throughout the U.S. for the B.I.A. Fire Program with the fire crews. He was a Forest Development Technician working in the forest - measuring trees and getting them ready for tim-



ber sales. He worked at the University of Arizona Tree Ring Lab in Tucson dating fire scars and their frequencies for the Forest History Project. He also worked for the forestry department on the Yakama Indian Reservation in Washington State. and for the Mount Hood National Forest Service in Oregon as well as the Tule River area in California. He also participated in special U.S. Forest Service research projects for the Mexican gray wolf and the Mexican spotted owl.

He had a great intellect, and a passion for science, the unknown and the possibility of otherworldly phenomena. As a Trekkie of Gene Roddenberry's Star Trek, he had enormous curiosity about the universe. Sleeping outside under the stars hoping to catch something in the night sky, sit-

ting by a campfire at night discussing Carlos Castaneda and shamanism or one of his outdoor experiences while in the Forest Service, telling one of his latest jokes, listening to music and storytelling were some of his favorite pastimes.

Vincent is survived by his two sons Isaac (Amy) Ganilla and Isaiah (Sarah) Ganilla; one granddaughter, Aniah Ganilla (parents Isaac/Amy); siblings Christine (Ben) Menasherov, Leon Ganilla, Allen Ganilla, Jr. and Regina Sandberg; and many relatives here and afar. Happy Father's Day! The history of Father's Day

Each year, the third Sunday in June is a time to pay homage to fathers and the millions of other men who have stepped into the role of father. While it may seem as though Father's Day has been around forever, it didn't become a nationally recognized holiday in the United States until 1972, when President Richard Nixon signed Joint Resolution 187 into law.

Many thank Sonora Smart Dodd for making Father's Day happen. In 1909, while attending a Mother's Day sermon in church, Dodd felt fathers were equally deserving of praise.



To honor her own father, a Civil War veteran and wid-

ower who raised six chil- for a dren alone, Dodd petitioned 5th (t

six chil- for a Father's Day on June titioned 5th (the anniversary of her father's death) in her native Spokane, Wash. The celebration was deferred to the third Sunday in June. Another account says Grace Golden Clayton came up with the idea for a Father's Day in 1908 in Fairmont, West Virginia. Clayton was inspired to celebrate fathers after 361 local men perished in a deadly mine explosion. Clayton brought the idea up to the minister of her local church.

Historians say that Father's Day may even be a much older idea. St. Joseph's Day, which was celebrated each year on March 19 in Catholic nations of Europe since the medieval era, and later elsewhere around the world, commemorates Joseph, the husband of Mary and father figure to Jesus. It was said that Joseph should be held up as the ideal example of fatherhood. The Coptic Orthodox Church celebrates St. Joseph's Day on July 20. In the Orthodox Christian Church, the second Sunday before the Nativity is celebrated as the Sunday of the Forefathers - celebrating all of Jesus' male ancestors, with an emphasis on Abraham, the patriarch of the Jewish faith.
