

Community assistance needed for Baby Åskar | Five attorneys elected An open letter of request for donation help

Many of you may have seen cash donation jars around various businesses in the last two months for a sweet baby boy named Åskar Kannegaard. These have been placed in these locations in hopes of obtaining much needed funds for heart transplant-related expenses, which as of this week was successfully performed at Phoenix Children's Hospital.

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Baby Åskar was born with a severely underdeveloped heart last year, and even with two major surgeries experienced within the first six months of his life, has been residing at Children's Hospital since March, awaiting his new heart.

The Children's Organ

Transplant Association (COTA) is a non-profit organization that helps manage funds for children and families who will have lifelong medical needs. As such, they have asked the Kannegaard family to raise \$25,000 by November of this year. To date the total stands at about \$14,000, but if this amount is reached by the fall, the COTA organization will provide an additional \$2,500. The end goal is to raise \$50,000. however.

We humbly ask our wonderful community to financially support this precious child and his family at this time. If 200 people would consider donating \$50 each, we could easily reach that \$25,000 goal by the

sionately advocate for the health and well-being of Gila County animals. and models that behavior to those around him." Among the main accomplishments AZACA highlighted were JC's tireless efforts to improve animal welfare with the grand opening of a new state-of-the-art animal care facility, which opened in September 2021. The new facility near the Gila County Fairgrounds is far more spacious than the original cramped and outdated shelter. Gila County's new animal shelter includes 27 separate indoor/outdoor kennels for dogs, two larger kennels specifically designed for puppies and three kennels for quarantined dogs, or those requiring medical care and individual accommodation. Also new? A grooming room, a 'get acquainted room,' and an adjacent fenced yard where potential adoptees and prospective new owners may spend time together to ensure a good match. The fenced yard expands opportunities for volunteers, too; people willing to help socialize shelter pets can chaperone them for outdoor play and exercise. Gila County's new animal shelter was built for cats, too - with a 'Community Cats' room and 'Catio,' along with feline-specific meetand-greet rooms. Ten individual cages allow cats to be housed separately when needed. Industrial grade HVAC will keep animals

cool and safe through Gila County's frequent 100+ degree summer days, and together with an integrated pressure-washer, ensures a hygienic and sanitary environment. Additional spaces include a surgical area and animal quarantine unit, rooms for animals other than cats and dogs, and a sally port where a mobile veterinary van can provide additional surgical, medical and dental services. "In my sincerest opinion, JC is among the most dedicated employees in the entire state of Arizona when it comes to the profession of animal care and control," said Beck. "John loves animals. He is passionate about his program and that passion can be seen in his work, and in his life outside of work. He cares about the safety and love of animals in Gila County, and he lives what he preaches. He remains an expert in his field, he is respected as a leader in the field by other counties and he has the utmost respect of our management staff." AZACA's prestigious award also recognized the 24-7 effort that JC and his few staffers made to accommodate pets and livestock during 2021 when Gila County dealt with two of the largest fires in Arizona history: the Telegraph and Mescal Fires. Each brought evacuations in Globe, Miami, El Capitan, and the surrounding areas - even the former

animal shelter was forced to evacuate and temporarilv move animals in its care to temporary and airconditioned quarters on the grounds of the High Desert Middle School. JC collaborated with the Governor's Office to acquire a portable stand-alone, air conditioned, shelter to act as a fully operational evacuation center and animal control facility for the county. His impressive efforts were realized and the county was able to care for all animals throughout the duration of the fire; livestock, too. JC worked all hours during the weeks of those evacuations, even unloading a tractortrailer load of hay by hand and bale-by-bale, to feed evacuated farm animals. "Mr. Castaneda's team continues to meet the program goal that 100 percent of incidents are responded to within 1-2 hours, with resolutions being made within 24 hours thereafter." added Beck. "His work with the mobile adoption trailer, community relationships and increased collaboration with Arizona Animal Welfare League (AAWL) as well as other animal shelters, has supported the adoption of numerous unwanted animals to responsible homes for Gila County. Perhaps more importantly, Animal Care and Control under John's leadership has increased the "live release" rate of owner-surrendered and adoptable animals, reducing euthanasia rates of impounded/shelter animals by 60 percent over the last decade. Now we're proud to report our live release rate is an impressive 82 percent . . . and our goal there is even higher. His supervision of the Animal Care and Control Facebook page currently has led to over 3,386 likes and followers, among Gila County's most popular Facebook communities and a place where the public can conveniently check from their phones to see all the stray and adoptable animals we have at our facility. One of the blessings about Facebook? Our page has proven to be an effective and powerful tool for returning lost pets, sometimes within hours of them being admitted - and finding forever homes for adoptable dogs and cats. "As a program manager, I believe John's passion and leadership are to be admired and cheered by all in the state as the standard for how we should be inspired to lead our programs and departments . . . he has educated me to the importance of stating that he is not a dog catcher, we are not simply a shelter and we do not simply control animals. We provide care and compassion. If you want to judge Gila County, look no further than how we care for our animals, as that is the truest reflection of our moral progress. JC Castaneda has been the foundation to that concept in Gila County for 30 years."

July 12 is deadline to apply for Local Sportsmen's Group grants

The Arizona Game and Fish Department (AZGFD) is accepting applications for \$75,000 in annual grant funding for local sportsmen's organizations to provide public, mentored projects that are focused on the recruitment and development of new hunters and anglers.

The Local Sportsmen's Group grants program places a high priority on projects that involve the pursuit or harvest of fish or wildlife with a valid license (and

any necessary hunt permittag) and are geared toward participants who have the appropriate experience and skill levels relevant to a particular project.

Grants will be awarded through a competitive application process. Online applications and instructions are available at www. azgfd.gov/LSG. Applications must be received no later than 11:59 p.m. (Arizona time) Tuesday, July 12.

"This grant program

continues to provide muchneeded funding for Arizona's conservation organizations to connect with the public through quality, mentored projects at a time when there's a huge demand for traditional outdoor and wildlife recreation like hunting and fishing," said Doug Burt, AZGFD's recruitment, retention and reactivation (R3) manager.

"The projects from these funds, and the efforts of these community groups, return far more in value than the grant dollars would on their own by providing education about safe and ethical hunting and fishing, and how sportsmen play an important role in wildlife conservation."

There is no cost to Arizona taxpayers for the grant program. Game and Fish does not receive any of the state's general funds and operates under a user-pay. public-benefit model. The grant program is an investment in the continuance of wildlife conservation ef-

forts and outdoor recreation participation in Arizona.



Tips for planning a 4th of July party

More than 332 million people live in the United States, according to the most recent data from the U.S. Census Bureau. There's a good chance that, come July 4th, a considerable number of those individuals will be hosting or attending parties to celebrate American independence.

This year those planning a July 4th party can consider these tips as they prepare

to celebrate with family and friends.

• Borrow a second grill. Those tasked with grilling often find themselves standing there for hours over hot flames. Cut down on time at the grill by adding an extra cooking surface. That's easily achieved by having more than one grill going simultaneously. Cook fast-cooking items like hamburgers and hot dogs on one grill, and reserve the other for sausages and chicken, which may



need more time to reach safe levels of doneness.

• Stop peeking. Resist any urge to check the food too often. Every time you flip, press or move the meats, you compromise flavor and could make the food dry out.

• Lure insects away. Bees are attracted to sweet smells, but wasps and hornets are drawn to meats. Put a saucer of very sweet soda and some chicken scraps in a far corner of your yard to attract yellow jackets and other stinging insects to that area, drawing their attention away from guests and their meals.

• Give neighbors a headsup. Parties and barbecues on July 4th are largely expected, but you can offer a courtesy to neighbors by informing them of your plans, including the start time and proposed ending time. If you are close with neighbors, consider inviting them to participate.

• Skip the fireworks. Even if fireworks are permitted where you live, it's best to avoid the potential safety hazards and leave fireworks displays to the professionals. Shooting off fireworks in neighborhoods causes debris to rain down on guests or land in pools, and it may even be ingested by pets or wildlife. Even sparklers can be dangerous, as they burn at 2,000 F. In fact, the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission says sparklers account for around 60 percent of injuries among children under five during summer festivities.

• Create a patriotic playlist. Use your favorite music streaming service to curate a music list that features America-specific songs, songs about summer and general party tunes. Be sure the music is in the background and does not overpower the conversation.

Getting to know the Declaration of Independence

The Declaration of Independence is a formal document that served as the signatory colonies' statement that they were now "free and independent States." It is a vital document in American history.

On July 1, 1776, delegates from the original 13 colonies, making up the Second Continental Congress, met in Philadelphia to vote on Richard Henry Lee's motion for independence. After some deliberation, ultimately 12 of the 13 delegates voted in favor. In recognition of those 12 delegates, here are 12 facts regarding the Declaration of Independence.

1. The drafted document was officially adopted on July 4, 1776, two days after freedom from Britain was approved. However, most delegates signed the document on August 2, 1776, while others signed on a later date. John Dickinson and Robert R. Livingston never signed the Declaration of Independence.

2. John Dunlap was the official printer of Congress at the time. He worked all night and into the morn-

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ing of July 5 to produce the large, single-sided sheet, known as a broadside. About 200 copies of Dunlap's broadside were made.

3. The University of Virginia owns two copies of a rare early printing of the Declaration. It is on display in the Albert and Shirley Small Special Collections Library. It is believed the copy once belonged to George Washington.

4. Benjamin Franklin, George Read, Roger Sherman, Robert Morris, George Clymer, and James Wilson signed both the Declaration of Independence and the U.S. Constitution.

5. The Declaration of Independence and the Constitution were hidden at Fort Knox during World War II. two weeks after Pearl Harbor was attacked.

6. Despite what the movie "National Treasure" will have one believe, the message on the back of the document is visible and reads "Original Declaration of Independence dated 4th July 1776."

7. Richard Stockton, a lawyer from New Jersey, was a signer of the Decla-



ration who later recanted his support of the American revolution. He subsequently swore his allegiance to King George III after being captured by the British.

8. In 1989, an original Dunlap Broadside was found hidden behind a picture a Philadelphia man bought at a flea market for \$4. It later sold for \$8.1 million. Ultimately, 26 copies of the original prints have been found

9. The United States celebrates Independence Day on July 4th, even though independence was accepted on July 2nd.

10. Early on, not everyone in America was supportive of the Declaration of Independence. Partisan



until the Federalists were no longer involved in politics.

11. The one-year anniversary of Independence Day and the celebration of the adoption of the Declaration of Independence slipped the minds of Congress in 1777. When they remembered it was July 3rd, they planned a last-minute celebration on July 4th, and each year thereafter.

12 John Trumbull's painting "Declaration of Independence," which was made into a lithograph replica by Ralph Trembly, hangs in the Rotunda of the U.S. Capitol. It is a fictional depiction of the five-man drafting committee presenting their draft to Congress, and not the signing. The painting shows 42 of the 56 signees, since Trumbull couldn't get likenesses of all involved. The men featured in the painting were never all in the room at the same time during the Declaration's debate and signing.

The Declaration of Independence is a key document in American history, and its words are celebrated each Independence Day.
