Outlaw region in the Globe-Miami area and the Jackal region to the east of Globe.

Four preliminary alternatives are being proposed.

Alternative 1 is a No Action, meaning airspace optimization would not occur and the existing MOAs would remain unchanged. The other three alternatives are requests for changes in all regions in Arizona, including the Outlaw and Jackal MOAs. The changes include lowering the floor of the MOAs to support low-altitude training, a lowered altitude for releasing flares and adjustments to supersonic operations.

Alternatives 2 and 4 would lower the floor of the Outlaw and Jackal MOAs to 500 feet above ground level: Alternative 3 would lower the Outlaw MOA's floor to 500 feet and the Jackal MOA's to 100 feet. All three would lower the minimum release altitude for flares to 2,000 feet above ground level in the Outlaw and Jackal MOAs. Alternatives 2 and 3 would authorize supersonic operations down to 5,000 feet above ground level in the two MOAs, while Alternative 4 would authorize them down to 10,000 feet. Additionally, all three would add an hour of use to

both MOAs, changing the starting time from 7 a.m. to 6 a.m.

The Air Force is soliciting public comments on Alternatives 2-4; the EIS will also evaluate the No Action alternative. Comments are being accepted through March 4, 2022; they can be submitted online at https://www.arizonaregionalairspaceeis.com/comments/or mailed to: Arizona Regional Airspace EIS, 501 Butler Farm Rd., Suite H, Hampton, VA 23666.

## Homeless 'Point In Time' Count Feb. 22

How many people are homeless here in Globe-Miami? It's a challenging question to answer. Once a vear Gila County and the county-wide Homeless Task Force - made up of numerous non-profits. behavioral health, food banks, churches and other local volunteers - hit the streets and check under bridges, beneath overpasses and inside empty buildings where homeless people are known to find shelter during winter's annual 'point in time' census. Originally planned for January, the tally was moved to Tuesday, Feb. 22 due to the recent surge in Covid-19 infections. The annual winter survey is part of the federal and statewide count. An accurate tally here in Globe-Miami helps demonstrate the need for homeless service funding in Gila County. On a more personal level, the winter count also helps with more



# SCAHC plans to open skilled nursing facility

(Message from Chairman

TERRY RAMBLER)

The San Carlos Council in partnership with its subsidiary corporation, the San Carlos Apache Healthcare (SCAHC), Corporation has started the planning of a long-term care skilled nursing home facility. The council recognizes the need to care for our tribal member Covid-19 long-hauler patients and elders over the age of 55 who are too ill to be at home or care for themselves at home. The planning, design and construction of the nursing home is made possible by funding from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). The council allocated \$36 million in ARPA funds for the project.

Even with 20 percent mortality in patients over

the age of 65, there are still many patients over 65 whose health has deteriorated to the level of requiring assisted living. Many of our patients age 45 to 65 suffered permanent lung injury due to Covid-19. Lung function declines with age, and it is anticipated that many younger patients who suffered from Covid will have progressive pulmonary insufficiency and require future assistance at a long-term care skilled nursing facility.

Covid-19 infection is a risk factor for our people. These factors can cause hidden long-term cognitive effects that could accelerate the aging process and lead to an increased need for long-term care placement in post-Covid-19 patients.

Our local nursing home will focus on caring for our

tribal member Covid-19 long-hauler patients and elder residents, and will be a sustainable operation based upon current AHCCCS reimbursement rates. Our SCAHC expects to operate the 100-bed nursing home facility on a SCAHC campus by December 2024 at a cost of \$36 million.

The nursing home facility will be constructed on an 840-acre parcel of undeveloped land approximately 4,000 feet from Highway 70 and in close proximity to the hospital in Peridot. SCAHC will be operating the facility and grounds.

SCAHC anticipates adding an additional nursing home staff of 155 employees. This will increase our SCAHC employment level from its current 786 to 941 employees.



# Concern over police dispatching in Miami

A short time ago the Town of Miami ended its decades-long system of communicating directly with the Police Department office to report issues or concerns and rely only on 911 service. My concern with that was the loss of the town's personal touch of communicating non-emergency calls directly to the Police Department along with the ability to walk up to the dispatcher's window to report an incident. Recently I discovered that any concern regarding that personal touch of talking with an individual was alleviated with the installation of a call box at the entry door to the station, and just a push of a button connects you directly to one of the county dispatchers via an intercom-like system. As for phoning in a non-emergency concern, dialing the old dispatcher's number of (928) 473-2466 - and I understand that (928) 473-2467 works as well - will connect you to the county dispatching substation. Also, a simple call to the Miami Town Hall line, (928) 473-4403,

will direct you though a list of options that include a connection with the county dispatching substation. I hope this information will help communicate the new process to report non-emergency issues or be an avenue to communicate with law enforcement or first responders.

### **Board of Supervisors finalizes flood mitigation funding**



During their February 1 meeting the Gila County Board of Supervisors took the last step in securing approximately \$9.16 million for seven flood mitigation projects, voting to authorize Board Chairman Tim Humphrey's signature on a pair of grant award documents from the Natural Resources Conservation Service.

The funding, through NRCS' Emergency Water-

shed Protection Program, came in two packages; one of approximately \$8.23 million to fund post-Telegraph Fire flood mitigation projects in Russell Gulch, Bloody Tanks Wash, Ice House Canyon Wash and Six Shooter Canyon, and one of approximately \$930,248 for post-Bush Fire projects at Tonto Creek Trail/Landing Wash, Lazy JR RV Park and Sycamore Creek.

The combined cost of the Telegraph Fire projects was estimated at about \$10.97 million, and that of the Bush Fire projects at about \$1.24 million. Gila County, as project sponsor, was required to provide a 25% percent match, which came to around \$2.74 million and \$310,082 for the respective project packages. The county's matches are being paid by the Department of Forestry and Fire Management. The seven projects are currently in the design stage, and the county will have 220 days to complete them.





# **Opioid focus group needs Globe-Miami participants**

Have you or a family member or friend struggled with addiction to prescription opioids such as oxycodone, morphine, methadone or fentanyl? Arizona Department of Health Services and ASU's Southwest Research Center invite participants to join focus groups that are being held throughout February and March to research opioid use disorder, and hear directly from local citizens here in Gila County, to more effectively deal with

the continuing opioid epidemic. Focus groups meet online via Zoom conferences and take about 90 minutes; participants receive a \$25 gift card for discussing their "lived experiences about past or current opioid use, as well as the experiences of friends family members." Since 2017 Arizona Department of Health Services has attributed more than 9.900 deaths, more than 73,000 overdoses and 2,800 cases of neonatal abstinence syndrome (withdrawal and other after-effects when babies are exposed to drugs in the womb) to opioids. The rising number of deaths represent a 15.8% increase in total opioid deaths since 2017, and a 198% increase since 2012.
