


Harry Chris (Ty) Fansler

Humanity is Better for its Universal Connections

United Fund of Globe-Miami brings them home

Now 24 agencies strong, United Fund of Globe-Miami, Inc. held its 2022 Kick-Off Meeting via Zoom earlier in October.

"The participating agencies for 2022 were all well-represented," says UF Executive Director Maryn Belling.

Not only were there representatives from all 24 agencies, there were also individuals representing multiple agencies, along with agencies holding in-person sessions that logged in together, she says.

The meeting included a 90-minute virtual workshop with Liz Warren from the Story Telling Institute at South Mountain Community College. With family ties to Globe, Warren began by talking about her mother, Mary Elizabeth Warren, born in 1927 at a home in Globe where Besh Ba Gowah Archaeological Park and Museum now stands.

The keynote speaker encouraged attendees to embrace the idea that their stories are valuable: recognize that they are the ones to tell them and let themselves be as vulnerable as is comfortable for them.

"To gather and hear stories from others, and to engage your community in sharing stories, you will need to be willing to tell them yourself," Warren told participants. "That reciprocity is the foundation of how storytelling works to build community."

Warren also brought "a great mix of full-group and small-group activities and learning opportunities," to the workshop Belling says.

"For 90 minutes, we were transported to one another's lived experiences. We've all known one another in the context of our non-profit service, but to come together as individuals, wiling to share formative experiences and foundational values, was awesome," she says.

"Participants had opportunities to learn about—and through—one another. The overall experience showed all of us that the 'how to' of using stories to learn is an art we each

have the opportunity to maintain," says Belling, adding, "Humanity is better for its universal connections."

Attendance was limited to ensure "a quality experience for everyone." And while Zoom was a good format for the 90-minute session. "a longer, larger in-person session is in the works for 2022."

*Past, Present and Future In 1964, the local United Fund began as a means to raise funds for area service agencies helping the Globe-Miami community. That year, five agencies received a combined total of \$11,074.50.

From 2017 to 2021, 47 local non-profits received \$2,624,386 from United Fund, thanks to support from incredibly generous donors and corporate match partners.

Currently, United Fund uses both individual donations and generous corporate match dollars in providing \$300,000 to 21 local charities.

The local United Fund has set a 2022 fundraising goal of at least \$430,000.

"We know our donors will meet that challenge between 'Fair Share' donations (one hour's pay per month) from staff members at local employers, corporate match donations, individual donors. community canvassing and online giving," Belling explains. "We have a couple of great learning opportunities for our agencies coming up over the next few weeks, too." United Fund continues working with local employers to facilitate payroll-deduction programs. "Any employer interested can reach out to us and we're happy to collaborate," she explains.

"In addition to our amazing, ongoing payroll deduction employers, we've seen donations from seven new donors in response to the 2021 'Flood Raising' effort," Belling says. "We are humbled by the outpouring of support for our community."



Urgently sharing our faith

One lesson I learned as a kid was that if you were planning on going to the DMV (now the MVD), you better be prepared to wait. I remember going with my mom, and waiting forever for our number to be called. So as an adult, if I ever had to get a title transferred or get new plates, I know that urgency is not a key word at the Motor Vehicle Division. However, there are many times when urgency is extremely important. For instance, at the ER a head injury gets you seen more quickly than a broken bone. Although a head injury may not look bad on the outside, it can be much more serious in terms of damage. Similarly, as followers of Christ, there are many activities we participate in, but the task of evangelism (sharing our faith) is something that should done with a sense of urgency.

By "urgency" I don't mean that we simply speed through a conversation about the things of God. No, I mean we must remember the reason behind that task of evangelism. According to the Bible, there comes a time in every person's life when they will die. Shocking, right? However, the Bible goes on to tell us that after death comes judgment (Hebrews 9:27). And while many people in the world have their own opinion, the Bible is clear: not every single person goes to heaven when they die.

It makes some people feel better at funerals to imagine all our loved ones "watching over us from heaven," as if a person's whole life, choices and beliefs no longer mattered. When famed scientist Stephen Hawking, a self-professed atheist, died, social media was flooded with images of Hawking walking towards the clouds of heaven and leaving behind his now-unneeded wheelchair. Hawking once stated, "I regard the brain as a computer which will stop working when its compo-

nents fail. There is no heaven or afterlife for broken down computers; that is a fairy story for people afraid of the dark." Yet, after his death all of the people that looked to him now envision him in a "better place." Talk about a worldview clash. Urgency in gospel proclamation means that followers of Christ must keep in mind that about 150,000 people on this planet die each day, and whether or not they believe in God they will stand before Him. It doesn't matter what we say we "believe"; some things exist and are true regardless of what we think about them. Don't believe me? Say you don't believe in gravity and then jump out of a plane without a parachute. That'll make a believer out of you!

The problem is, we've lost the idea of objective truth in our modern day. We've come to understand "truth" to be whatever we

want it to be at any given time. However, ultimately, truth is what God says is truth. And God says death and judgment go hand in hand. We can practice self-deception, imagining everyone saved from the punishment of Hell, or we can do what God called us to do and be His ambassadors, calling people to be reconciled to God through Christ (2 Corinthians 5:20). The reality of judgment doesn't give us a picture of God being mean or cruel. Rather, judgment gives us a picture of God being holy, righteous and just. You see, our problem is that God is love (1 John 4:8). How is that a problem? If God is love, then God must punish that which is not love. True love cares about truth and justice.

When people carry out heinous crimes, we call for justice. Whenever we perceive that an individual is guilty of a crime and yet they are able to go free without any consequences, there is public outcry. Why? Justice must be served. Similarly. God. being the greatest good, will be perfect in His judgment and punishment of sin. So every thought, word and deed will be brought into account before our holy God. "For there is nothing hidden that will not be disclosed, and nothing concealed that will not be known or brought out into the open" (Luke 8:17).

The only hope fallen mankind has, then, is in the finished work of Christ upon the cross. We have no goodness in us, so we must turn to the One who does, Jesus Christ. He is the one who was without sin and who willingly went to the cross to die as the substitute for His people. Gospel urgency means calling all people, at all times, to turn

from sin and to turn to Christ.

Every day is a gift from God. No one is guaranteed tomorrow. Thousands of people wake up each day unaware they are living their last day on earth. The big question is, "Are you ready to die?" This is not intended to be a morbid question, but an urgent question coming from a place of love and concern.

Dear Christian, hear my plea: Do not let another day pass without telling your loved ones, your friends, your neighbors about the amazing, saving work of Jesus Christ. Urgency in evangelism means we do not put off sharing the gospel, because another day may never come. Charles Spurgeon once said, "If Hell must be filled, let it be filled in the teeth of our exertions, and let not one go unwarned and unprayed for." This is the urgency we must have!

Tree permits will be available to purchase online through Recreation. gov and at local ranger stations for the Payson and Pleasant Valley Ranger Districts beginning Nov. 9, 2021. Permit holders can begin cutting trees on November 19 until the permits expire at midnight on December 31.

"Cutting a Christmas tree on the Tonto is a unique and memorable experience for families and friends." said Forest Supervisor Neil Bosworth. "There's something very exciting about sharing the adventure of finding the perfect Christmas tree to celebrate the holiday season."

No refunds will be made, even if weather conditions prevent you from reaching your cutting area and cutting your tree. Maps and instructions, dates and types of trees that may be cut will be posted on the Tonto National Forest website and Recreation.gov.

To purchase a Christmas tree permit online, visit Recreation.gov and search for Tonto National Forest Christmas tree permits. It is important to carefully read the overview and need-to-know information prior to purchasing the permit. Visitors will also need to set up or log in to a Recreation.gov account to complete the transaction.

Removing these trees in designated areas helps other trees grow larger and can open areas that provide forage for wildlife.
